Senate Natural Resources to consider limiting hearings at TNRCC

The Texas Senate Natural Resources will meet 1 p.m. May 4 in Austin. The committee is meeting to discuss "how the availability of hearings at the Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission can be further limited," according to Myron Hess.

Hess is legal counsel to Save Our Resources and Environment, a group formed to oppose rock crushers in the area.

"You may be interested in having some representa-

tives attend to express your displeasure at not having the opportunity to be heard on the air permitting issue for the rock crusher," Hess told members of SORE.

"We anticipate that industry will be well represented and will be arguing that opportunities for hearing need to be further limited," Hess explained. "It is important that Committee members hear the viewpoint of landowner whose rights and property values may be affected by proposed

activities."

The Texas Senate Natural Resources Committee is chaired by Bill Sims, a San Angelo Democrat. Salado and Bell County will be part of the Senatorial District for which Sims is seeking election in November. He faces Temple businessman Hugh Shine.

SORE recently received a letter from John Hall, chairman of the Texas

Natural Resources Conservation Commission.

"The Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission has no jurisdiction in the regulating of quarrying or blasting," Hall wrote. "In fact, after checking with other state agencies, we have discovered that this activity falls outside the authority of any regulatory body, except for some worker safety issues."

Hall added: "It is my understanding that you and other concerned citizens

are working with your legislators to explore possible legislation to regulate rock quarrying. The TNRCC looks forward to working with you, other concerned citizens and area legislators on this matter."

Mayfest 94 is cancelled, but parade goes on

Mayfest '94 has been cancelled. Dana Britt, chair of the planned event, explained, "Following a number of meetings, the organizing committee found that there was a lack of time for preparations and felt that the event would be more successful at a later date" She stated that the community would be informed when a new date is set.

The Memorial Day Parade will remain on May 30 beginning at 10 a.m. in the IGA Village Food parking lot. Entry forms for the parade will out April 26.

Endicott to discuss influencing D.C.

Jim Endicott, the former General Counsel of the U. S. Department of Veterans Affairs, will tell the Salado Lion's Club April 27 how to influence the action in Washington. Endicott was the VA top counsel from 1991 to 1993 and was a member of the State Veterans Commission from 1988 to 1991.

The Salado Lions Club meets the second and fourth Wednesday of each month at 11:30 a.m. in the dining room of the Mill Creek County Club.

Endicott is currently

Vice President and Counselor to the Federal Issues Foundation and is working in the area of health care issues for the military and veterans.

Endicott left active army service in 1982 as a Colonel. He served as both Staff Judge of 2d Armored Division and Deputy Staff Judge Advocate of III Corps and Fort Hood.

He was in private law practice in Bell County from 1982 to 1989 - with an active trial practice in both state and federal courts.

In 1989, Endicott was ap-

pointed as a family law court master who heard Attorney General Child Support in 12 central Texas counties.

From 1986 to 1989, he served as a Texas Veterans Commissioner and was also active with the VFW, Disabled American Veterans, and the American Legion.

In September 1991, the President nominated Endicott to become the second General Counsel of the U. S. Department of Veterans Affairs. He was confirmed by the Senate in November 1991 and served

in that office until January 20, 1993.

The VA is the second largest department of government and runs the largest hospital system in the United States, the largest home loan program, and one of the largest insurance programs.

Endicott returned to Bell County in March where he has resumed his private law practice and is also involved in research and consulting work for the newly forming Federal Issues Foundation - which is doing work in national security, health care, and legal reform.

Glenn Miller Orchestra to perform at CAC May 5

"Take a minimum daily requirement of big-band sounds," suggests Larry O'Brien, director of the Glenn Miller orchestra which will play at the Frank Mayborn Convention Center Thursday, May 5 at 7 p.m.

Tickets, \$15, are available at the Cultural Activities Center which is sponsoring the concert/dance. Box office hours at the CAC are Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Tickets may be purchased over the phone by calling 773-9926.

It's hard not to like Glenn Miller music. The sound is upbeat, smooth, sexy, or happy. It touches on all those things that makes us feel good.

The music was immensely popular during Miller's day, and it continues to be popular.

"It's many-faceted," says O'Brien. "There's more than one reason for the continuing popularity of the band. For one thing, Glenn

gave up a lucrative band business when he was at his zenith to join the service — when he didn't have to. He was immensely popular when he went into service. The band had sold more records in a year than, I think, Elvis or the Beatles ever did in a year.

"Then he went on to form a monster band, play all over Europe for the G. I.'s, sell a lot of war bonds, improve morale and generally contribute greatly to the war effort.

"Finally, he died mysteriously in a plane that took off from England for France on December 15, 1944. The plane and his body never have been found.

"So I think it's a combination of all these factors in addition to the great Miller sound itself that keeps his music and his name alive."

Just as in Glenn's day, the average age of the players is 23. Most of them have degrees in music from some of the most illustrious music schools

One of the more interesting aspects of village life is the almost daily munching of gossip washed down with light to medium draughts of rumor. Not immune to such fun antics, Salado itself has been touched many times, and as recent as this past week, by the rumor that the village was once an incorporated township (true) and never officially dissolved itself (rumor), ergo, we are and have been incorporated lo, these many years - without knowing it!

Like many others, this writer has heard these fanciful tales and joined in the scoffing at the notion that we have been sitting around discussing the issue when in fact we have been a corporate entity without portfolio since shortly after the Civil War. This time around, we asked for help to research the matter and

this week's column is simply an interim report with more to follow - hopefully.

We asked help from several noted villagers - whose names we will protect for fear of instant verbal retaliation by those who hold fast to either side of the argument. One such researcher discovered that it was two short years after

the war between the states in January of 1867, Salado incorporated under general law to sell some bridge bonds. One Judge O.T. Tyler became mayor and president of the incorporation and a Colonel Jones became treasurer. This digger of detail could not find anything in the record books to indicate that the articles of incorporation had been dissolved.

We then turned to another leading village historian who opined that after a certain period of time, unless otherwise acted upon - the articles became moot and die.

Another helper turned up some law on the matter and discovered a court of civil appeals decision on the subject. The justices intoned that once a commu-

nity was organized and incorporated it would take an election to unincorporate. Presumably if such an election did not take place the town would still be under the Texas Local Government Codes. So if Salado became a full fledged town in 1867 and never dissolved itself by an election - it was still in place under the law.

Was such an election ever held? We turned next to County Clerk Vada Sutton for the answer. She reported that there had been some searching of records of the commissioner's court years ago and that she recalled that the dissolution had taken place - but could not recall details. This would appear to be the next stop on the road to discovery and eventual putting to rest of the rumor that we

are already incorporated albeit without benefit of elected officers and/or taxes.

If it should, on the other hand, come to pass that we are in fact a government lacking only officials, it would not take a rocket scientist long to realize the immediate Pandora's Box of wealth on the horizon. Can you imagine the big bucks that could be made by producing and selling yard signs and bumper

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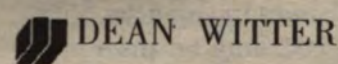
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Readers respond to letter, voice concern for animals

My cousin Ann has become an extension of the Salado Humane Society because of her love for dogs, especially strays. She had large dog runs with 6 ft. high cyclone fence for coyote protection, shelter for adverse weather, water to each pen and plenty of food available -- supervised dinner.

Originally the runs were for her own dogs, but the strays started coming and more and more runs were made. At first she neutered a spayed them. Now her finances have diminished. Payday buys a lot of dog food.

She will not take any dog in, until it is thoroughly de-wormed, which to her means it stays overnight at the vet.

Presently her runs are full. Pictures of the dogs available for adoption are on the front door of Sir Wigglesworth. (with my shop phone number) and at Gospel Gifts.

After hours, 5 p.m.-ish-6 p.m.-ish on Sat. I will take you to her farm so you can choose. We ask a meager \$25-\$40 per animal or more if you can offset our out-of-pocket expenses which usually pays the vet or buys more food.

Overflow? Yes, I'm temporarily housing one dog at our farm and that's pretty good for a cat person. Occasionally I'll bring a dog for adoption to my shop on weekends.

I gladly accept donations for both Ann and the Salado Humane Society if you just want to give but not adopt.

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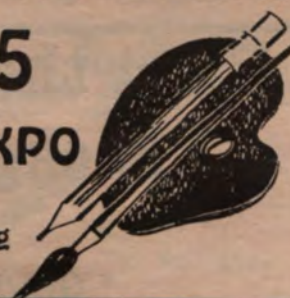

As many as 150 participants are expected to attend the third annual Texas Watch Meeting of the Monitors next month in Galveston, a gathering of volunteer water quality monitors from around the state.

The three-day event will be held May 6-8 at the Hotel Galvez. Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commissioner Peggy Garner, Galveston Mayor Barbara Crews and TNRCC Region 12 Manager Allan Parker will address the participants at 9 a.m. on May 6.

Texas Watch is a TNRCC program that trains and organizes volunteers to monitor the quality of the state's waterways by collecting and testing water sample. Approximately 4,00 volunteer monitors provide important data on Texas' streams and rivers,

bay and estuaries, reservoirs and the entire coastline.

Twelve awards will be presented for outstanding contributions to the Texas Watch program by EPA project officer Michael Bira.

Among those receiving a Certificate of Appreciation is Salado Creek Preservation Committee SCPC, a committee of about 30 members of the Salado Historical Society.

The Salado Creek Preservation Committee began monitoring in March 1991 and were successful in identifying elevated levels of fecal coliform in Salado creek and have been working with the Brazos River Authority in isolating the source of the elevated levels and working cooperatively with property owners in rectifying the problem. The SCPC monitors five sites on Salado Creek each month. Linda Pehoski will accept the award for the group.

The theme of this year's event is "Getting to Know your Watershed." It will feature a variety of workshops and seminars

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Older investors may want to take a new look at annuities

Today's low interest rates are prompting many older investors to consider their investment alternatives. Fixed Annuities

Investors in their late 50s through 70s who want to invest funds that they don't plan to touch for several years may want to consider fixed annuities.

A fixed annuity allows your earnings to accumulate tax deferred until you withdraw your money. With a fixed annuity, the issuing insurance company guarantees a fixed interest rate for a specified period of time. While your money accumulates tax deferred, the insurance company guarantees the interest and principal against loss. (Withdrawals prior to age 59-1/2 may be subject to a 10% IRS penalty).

Even before considering this tax-deferral benefit, fixed annuities offer interest rates that generally beat bank CDs. As a result, you may be able to boost your interest earnings by moving some of your money from CDs to fixed annuities. But remember, just as important as the initial rate you receive are the period for which the rate is fixed and any penalties for dropping the annuity contract before the end of that period. (Also keep in mind that CDs are federally insured).

Immediate Annuities

Immediate annuities can be beneficial for retired investors who are living off their CD interest and have recently watched helplessly as their income has dropped along with interest rates.

An immediate annuity is, as the name suggests, an annuity that provide immediate monthly income. As the buyer, you give a lump sum to an insurance company and in return generally receive a fixed payment each month guaranteed for life or another designated period. These monthly annuity checks can add up to more than what some investors have been earning on their CDs. That's because instead of returning your original investment at the end of the contract period, the insurer pays out part of your principal in each check.

You should keep in mind that payments of most immediate annuities are not adjusted to keep pace with inflation. To offset this, you may want to consider buying a number of contracts over a period of years, rather than investing all your annuity money at low current rates.

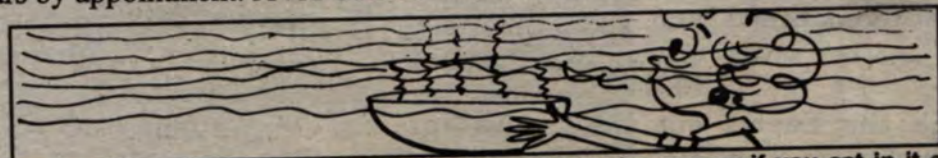

Salado Masonic Lodge will hold an open house May 8, according to an announcement made by Gerald Bridges, the Master of the Lodge. The Lodge is located on Church Street, behind the First State Bank.

The public is cordially invited to attend and view the lodge room and its unusual furniture and equipment, much of it looking exactly the same as it looked when Masonry first came

to Texas in the early 1830's. Light refreshments will be served during the afternoon.

Salado Masonic Lodge was founded in 1867, and has been in its present location since 1961. The lodge has a membership of

Many local area leaders have been members of Salado Masonic Lodge over the years. Some of the best known include A.J. Rose, G. W. Tyler, and E.S.C. Robertson.

Although it is impossible to determine exactly when the first Masons came to Texas, we do know that Ben Milam came to the Texas country about 1818, and General Zebulon Pike led an expedition into the area a few years later. Both were Masons.

By the 1830's, numerous Masons had come to the area from both Mexico and the United States. Antonio Navarro, Lorenzo de Zavala and Juan Seguin joined others like Stephen F. Austin, Anson Jones and Sam Houston in forming lodges. The first lodge was formed at Brazoria in 1835, and in the same year, the Grand Lodge of Louisiana authorized lodges at Houston, Nacogdoches and San Augustine.

In 1837, those first three lodges formed the Grand Lodge in the Senate Chambers of the new Republic of Texas, with General Sam Houston as the presiding officer, and a total of 27 members. Anson Jones, later to be the last President of the Republic, was elected the first Grand Master. Today, Texas Masonry has over 180,000 members and 954 lodges.

The incoming Master was asked, "What is Freemasonry?"

He answered: "Basically, it is a society of friends and brothers, banded together for their common good and the good of mankind — men who want to become better men. It's a voluntary organization, and does not solicit membership, but any man can make his interest known, and if he believes in God, and is basically a good man to start with, can become a Mason.

"Freemasonry developed from the stone masons of the Middle Ages, and although Masons do not work in stone, they work on the lives of men, and use the stone mason's tools as symbols to teach Masonic philosophy. The terms "acting on the square" and "being on the level," are purely Masonic terms that have crept into our every day language.

"Although old by modern standards, Masonry isn't nearly as old as some would claim. The oldest Masonic document dates to just before 1400 A.D., or about 600 years. Early Masonry struggled for some

300 years, and then, in 1717, in London, several lodges got together and formed the first Grand Lodge. That was actually the true beginning of Masonry as we know it.

Freemasonry works very hard to help people in time of need through the Shrine Crippled Childrens Hospitals; the Burns Institutes, Texas' incredible Scottish Rite Hospital for Children at Dallas; the Scottish Rite Learning Centers for dyslexic children; the many, many scholarships; the Grotto's dental care for the handicapped — all contribute to a better life for everybody.

Some of the world's greatest men have been and are Masons: George Washington, Benjamin Franklin, Franklin Roosevelt, Harry Truman, Norman Vincent Peale, Gerald Ford, Mark Twain, Astronaut Buzz Aldrin — 35 Texas Governors, all of the Presidents of the Republic of Texas — many, many others.

As each of them would say, "Masonry has but one aim: the improvement of mankind."

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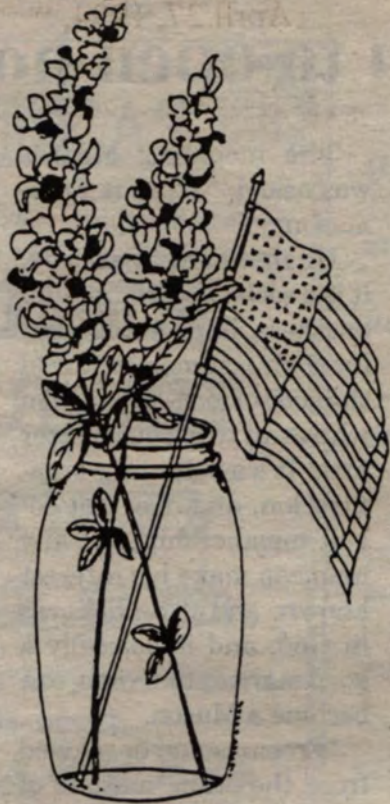
