Remember Salado VFD First Responders during National EMS Week

On a recent morning Mrs. John Doe couldn't wake her husband. She wasn't even sure if he was still breathing! She needed HELP-FAST! She calls 911, Help will soon be on the way. Belton Fire Department EMS will be responding but the ambulance is just leaving Scott and White Emergency Room and is 20 minutes away. But Mr. Doe need HELP NOW. Salado Volunteer Fire Department is alerted and dispatched. Volunteers who are getting ready for work or who are already on their job are notified via pagers.

They are enroute quickly and are at the Doe's home in a matter of minutes. The mission of these special trained "First Responders" is to stabilize Mr. Doe's medical condition until an ambulance can arrive. Mr. Doe will be okay, with a little help from some friends.

Although this story is fiction, this scene is repeated again and again in Bell County.

The third week of May has been proclaimed as Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Week in honor of the men and women of EMS both volunteer and paid, by President Gerald Ford.

In 1994 EMS Week will be highlighted with an exhibit at Temple Mall, as well as visits to local schools and displays by area EMS providers.

The Salado Volunteer Fire Department will be visiting Thomas Arnold Elementary School May 20. Volunteers will be talking about safety and the EMS system.

May 21, the Salado Volunteer First Responders will be at IGA Village Foods 10 a.m.-3 p.m. to display equipment, check blood pressure, answer questions and hand out information.

Texas Romance set May 20-21 at Tablerock

Its charm is its witty humor that comes from real human conflict. Margaret Wilson, a middle-aged widow, refuses to take her place embroidering tablecloths. Inspired by the readings of Fitzgerald, Lawrence and Joyce, one side of her wants to entertain the advances of a very young suitor named Garland Steinholden, an idealistic and inexperienced young man. Her other side, however, knows that a "brand new life" will take some arranging.

Then there's Maggie's sister, Doris who fully understands why her sister and young Garland's rela-

tionship won't work. Doris is married to a tubercular "crotchety old man" and is torn between the doctor's advise to take him to that "tarantula republic out west" for better air and staying home and letting him die. Although Doris finds every opportunity to discourage the romance and control Maggie's life, Maggie and Garland try to work through the obstacles which keep them apart.

Performances are scheduled May 20-21 7:30 p.m. with a matinee 2 p.m. May 22. There is a special Memorial day picnic performance noon May 30. Ticket prices are \$7 for adults and \$3 for children.

Rather, the supporting characters played by Oliver Platt and Tim Curry. Platt is hilarious, goofy and Teddy Bear-ish. Curry is deliciously sinister as the Cardinal who plans to assassinate the King of France.

Curry is a favorite of mine, easily recognizable in any of his films, including **The Rocky Horror Picture Show, Legend, Clue** and countless others. Super-talented, Curry will forever steal the show in his supporting roles.

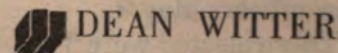

Letters written about Senate committee

Dear Editor:

Thank you for spotlighting (Editorial, April 27th) the lack of laws available for the Save Our Resources and Environment (SORE) group to resist establishment of a rock quarry adjacent to the homes of the folks in that group. That there is no mechanism for these folks to fight such a project is a shortcoming in our permitting system that I and my staff are currently investigating.

I must add, however, that I was surprised and disappointed to find that you had relied on a hearsay report to conclude that the Texas Senate Natural Resources Committee was holding a hearing on May 4th in Austin for the purpose of exploring ways of curtailing public comment and protests in the permitting process. In fact, the exact opposite is true.

The Committee's charge from Lt. Governor Bullock laid out one clear goal with two facets when he wrote directing the committee to examine ways "to eliminate any unnecessary costs and delays that may exist under current permitting procedures while preserving

and strengthening citizen involvement in these processes."

As a long-time rural land owner and Chairman of the Senate Natural Resources Committee, I have seen many attempts to short circuit public comment on environmentally sensitive projects. I have fought to ensure that any citizen who wishes to express his or her thoughts on a project is heard. I will continue to do so.

The land has taken care of Texans for a couple of centuries. Now we must take care of it as our primary legacy to our children and grandchildren. That means Texans must be able to speak directly to their elected officials about the future of our resources and environment. As your Senator and a devoted Texan, I will always demand that the public be involved in all components of our state government.

Dear Editor:

I was a speaker at the Senate Natural Resources Committee hearing May 4. This event was a disap-

pointment to me as a Texas citizen in many ways.

The meeting began close to 1 p.m. as scheduled. (I arrived at 12:40 p.m., signed the appropriate card and placed it as directed). Senator Sims made an opening remark and the meeting began with Dos Republicas representatives speaking.

Problems which I had with this hearing are these:

1) There was NO time limit on speakers

2) Apparently speakers were selected not on a "first come, first served" basis; but as decided by someone at his or her discretion

3) Much of the time was spent in "fun and games" repartee; strident arguments complete with snide remarks were exchanged between opposing sides of an issue; and

4) Many speakers delivered irrelevant comments. Discouraged at my chance of being heard at all, at 6 p.m. I decided to leave. As I handed in my written statement, I was pleased to learn I was next in line to speak! Of course I waited, less impatiently.

As I delivered my (less than 5 minute) remarks, the panel on the podium was restless, talking, joking and laughing. The brief comments I made were very important to me; otherwise I would not have spent the considerable time and effort needed to prepare for and attend this hearing.

It was no surprise that few persons on the panel listened; I myself was exhausted after having waited for 5-1/2 hours for my turn. I had complete empathy for the weariness of the panelists and their aides on the podium.

Because of the situation just described I make this suggestion:

Rules on length of presentations, comments (on the subject), questions and answers on the presentations should be in place AND ENFORCED.

It serves no one well to hold hearings such as the one I attended on May 4th.

Please look into this. It would be advantageous to all concerned to have efficient and effective public hearings in place.

CDs are also guaranteed by the government through the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation and are very safe. However, FDIC and FSLIC investment is limited to \$100,000 in principal and interest per investor per institution.

Second, treasury securities are free from state and local taxes, while CD investors must pay state and local taxes on earnings. This

difference can make a substantial difference in the after-tax yields these investments provide. (Earnings from both CDs and treasuries are subject to federal taxes).

Third, treasury notes are continuously available while attractive CDs sometimes can be difficult to find. In addition, treasury securities offer excellent liquidity should you need to sell them before maturity. Keep in mind, however, that if you do need to sell before maturity, their values will fluctuate based on current interest rates and market conditions. Generally, rising interest rates cause treasury values to rise. Holding them until maturity guarantees your principal and interest.

If you're an investor concerned about safety of principal and earning attractive yields, consider treasuries now. The current market has created a window of opportunity that may not last long. 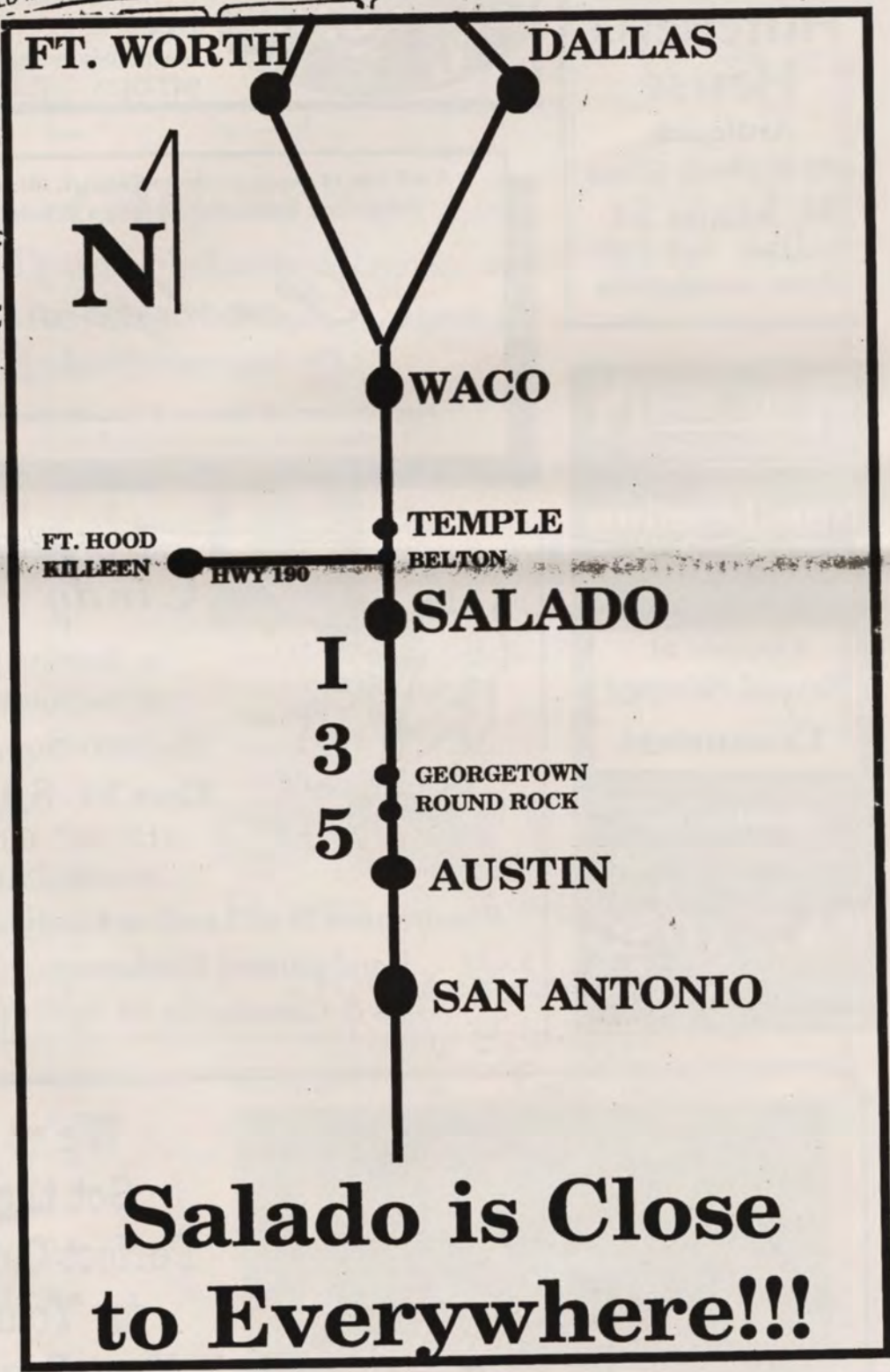

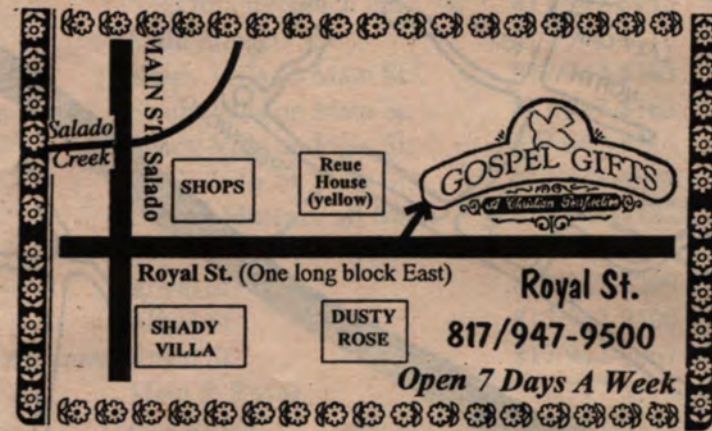

Choose Versatile Tools For Home Improvements

(NU)—Do-it-yourself home improvement looks so darned simple on television. No wonder. Those TV show hosts can choose virtually every power tool known to mankind.

There are circular saws for long cutting runs mainly through wood, or saber and jigsaws and heavy-duty reciprocating saws for making accurate cuts in wood and other materials. All of these tools together probably cost several hundred dollars.

New power tool features are increasing versatility while reducing the need for a bunch of expensive specialty tools. One manufacturer, Roto Zip Corporation, has just released a 15-year-old, multi-purpose professional tool for the average consumer.

The tool, Roto Mite, was originally designed as a fast and easy drywall cutter for outlet boxes and special shapes.

It's a great tool for DIYers tackling drywalling because no measuring and marking is necessary. Just plunge the spinning bit into the outlet box, move the tool until "feeling" the side of the box and then "feel" the way around the opening. It takes barely 10 seconds and most of the dust is pushed inward, saving considerable cleanup.

New specialty bits make such cutting tools even more versatile. Mark Englund, editor of *HomeStyles* magazine, says just one or two power tools now facilitate such projects as:

- Cutting out sink openings, even through cement board and ceramic tile or solid surface materials like Corian.
- Scroll work in hardwoods such as oak trim and accents on woodworking projects.

- Trimming plastic laminates and thin plastics and metals.
