I-35 Southbound 1-lane temporarily

Travel on southbound Interstate 35 has been restricted to one lane from FM 1670 to south of Salado creek.

The lane will remain closed continuously until the contractor has finished removing the existing pavement and placing a new riding surface.

Trucks with wide loads will be detoured off southbound I-35 at exit #286 and travel on the frontage road through the length of the project.

The work is part of a \$3.7

million project to widen the Salado Creek bridge, realign access ramps and surface almost two mile of I-35. Young Contractors, Inc. of Waco is doing the construction.

Work in the southbound lanes should last approximately two weeks, if there are no delays. Once completed, similar closures and work are planned for the northbound lanes. Motorists are urged to slow down, drive with caution and allow additional time if traveling through the area.

The Piano was nominated for eight Academy Awards and won two awards for Best Actress (Hunter) and Best Supporting Actress (Paquin). It deserved the nominations and its awards.

The Piano is easily one of the five best films of the year in a year of fantastic movies (including **Schindler's List** and **In the Name of the Father**.)

Hunter is stunning in her portrayal of Ada. Ada has not spoken a word since she was six. "My father always said I had a very strong will and the day that I decide to stop breathing would be my last," she recalls.

Without speaking, Hunter is able to express a wide range of emotions which her character undergoes as she and her daughter travel to New Zealand to meet her new husband through an arranged marriage by her father.

Paquin also delivers a powerful performance as Ada's headstrong and impetuous daughter.

Also worth mentioning is Keitel's performance as Baines, a landowner in New Zealand, who becomes involved with his partner's wife.

The Piano is a story of love, betrayal and redemption, beautifully filmed and portrayed. It is movie-making at its best: an art.

Rock Quarry

You will recall the alarm and justified grumbling some months back when news reached this hamlet that a rock crushing plant was to be introduced near Stillhouse Dam. Rural neighbors of the proposed environmental disaster held meetings, generated committees and tried to bring the state and county officials to bear on the problem. The state, through its natural resource agency, got things slowed down and later on the anti-rock group, SORE, raised some money and hired a top Austin legal gun.

The high mokus at the county level, as usual, complained they could do nothing and as a result did just that. In fact, not even of-

fering much sympathy. They cited "progress of business" and predicted little if any noise or dust pollution. All that without a study, thus, showing what powerful minds they bring to a problem! In any event, the current news is no news at all, since the entire matter has been quiet for weeks.

Sitting county Judge John Garth and his November GOP opponent Butch Cleveland have both said privately they felt the quarry folks - the Shallow Ford Construction Company - have decided to drop the matter. If this is the case, then we might want to celebrate. If, on the other hand, the company is merely hiding behind a log until the furor dies down, then constant vigilance would be the order of the day.

One observer of such antics at the county level opined that the rock crushers may be waiting to see if I-35 gets the international highway designation by the

feds. If that comes to pass then a new six lane super highway will be built and the need for crushed base rock would be enormous. Ergo - Shallow Ford would then be in a position to supply said rock without having to move it far from the pits to the interstate. Chances are there would then be a plethora of crushing sounds and fury in and around Salado.

Landscape Aid

The landscaping committee of the Salado Civic Center got a nice boost last week as a result of a novel fund raising scheme. The concept came from Christy Arnor who does business in the McAulay's "Old Town Salado" complex. Idea being to donate a percentage of a weekend's business profits to the landscaping endeavor. This was done and a hefty donation was turned over to the revitalization program. Lloyd Parks, chairman of the fund raising drive, reported the gift with high praise for the "Old Town" businesses. "This is a novel and unique way to raise funds for worthwhile projects. Hope

American Drill Team School meets here

The American Dance/Drill Team School held their 1994 Staff Training weekend here in Salado, the future home of their new national operations office (September 1994).

There were 65 dance and drill team instructors that gathered from around the southwestern United States to meet in Salado recently to plan curriculum, select music and choreograph routines that will be taught at their summer camps held at major universities around the U.S. The large staff used lodging at many area facilities including the Halley House, the Stagecoach Inn, the Hojo Inn, the Mill Creek Inn, as well as the home of Joyce and C.R. Pennington, owners of American Dance/Drill Team.

Meetings areas included the Gathering Room at the Halley House as well as the

new Staff Training Center located at the new corporate headquarters for American Dance/Drill Team on Van Bibber Lane.

American Dance/Drill Team school was founded in 1958 by Dr. Irving Dreibrodt, director emeritus of the Southern Methodist University Mustang Band where he served for 25 years, and the late Gussie Nell Davis, founder and director of the world famous Kilgore College Rangerettes. Joyce and C.R. Pennington purchased the company in 1984. Joyce Pennington attended the American Drill Team camps when a member of her high school drill team, then later served as a summer dance instructor while teaching school 1972-1982, when she took over as executive vice president.

The company presents summer camps, winter clinics, competitions, director

and student seminars and special performance tours for dance/drill teams throughout the Midwest, Central, Southwestern and Southeastern United States. Special events for the coming season include the 1995 Federal Express Orange Bowl halftime, a feature halftime during Thanksgiving weekend for the Dallas Mavericks, and a European performance tour to Pairs, Switzerland and Monte Carlo in July of 1995.

ADTS has become personally involved with the drill teams of Bell County including the Salado Strutters with their 1994 auditions, the newly formed team at Belton High School, the Killeen H.S. Kangerettes and the Temple Kittens. There will be a camp offered this year at the University of Mary Hardin Baylor in hopes to better serve the drill teams of Bell County and the surrounding area. The Pennington's hope to increase their participation with the area teams when the operations office opens in September.

Salado Eagles baseball squad has 11 named to All-District Team for 1994

The Salado Eagle baseball team were rewarded for their bi-district championship and 19-4 record with the selection of 11 players to the all-district teams.

Leading the way was junior Jereme Hosch who along with Thorndale's Steven Tucker was named co-MVP's. Jereme hit .442 on the year and .518 in district. He scored 29 runs for the Eagles and led the team with 5 home runs and 26 rbi's. Jereme had a 9 and 2 pitching record. He had 90 strikeouts in 62 innings with a 1.69 earned run average.

Seniors Chris Jackson and Richard Berumen were named to the first all-district squad as infielders. It was the third year in a row for both players. Chris hit .441 on the year and led Salado with 21 stolen bases and 30 runs scored. Richard hit .500 on the year to lead the Eagles in Batting average.

For the second consecutive year Brandon McGregor was named to the first team as an outfielder.

Brandon hit .320 in district and was an excellent defensive outfielder.

Junior Jason Hosch rounded out the Eagles selected to the first team. Although he caught for Salado, his hitting ability earned him a spot as the designated hitter. Jason hit .337 on the year and .451 in district play.

Senior Richard Jackson earned a second team outfield position with a .285 batting average. Junior Brent Cabaniss joined him on the second team as an infielder. Cabaniss has a .338 batting average on the year and hit .347 during district play.

Freshmen Chris Frazier was selected to the second team as a pitcher. Chris was 3-0 during district play with a 1.18 district earned run average.

The Eagles also had three players named to the honorable mention team. Senior Andrew Voelter was selected as an infielder. Senior Justin Brantley as a designated hitter and freshmen Josh Goodnight as a pitcher.

Avoid black widow & brown recluse

Although most spiders are harmless and are even beneficial to man, there are two types to avoid in Texas — the Black Widow and the Brown Recluse.

The Black Widow (so-called because she often eats her "husband" after mating) varies in color from dark brown to glossy black.

It can be easily recognized by a red, yellow or orange hourglass marking on the underside of her abdomen. (The male does not

have this mark and is not poisonous.) The Black Widow stays in her web and can be found both indoors (dark corners of barns and garages) and outside (under stones and logs, in long grass, hollow stumps and brush piles).

Bites cause pain, local redness and two tiny red spots may appear. Although the Black Widow's venom is more powerful than a rattlesnake's, it is injected in smaller amounts. If bitten, use an antiseptic on the bitten area to prevent secondary infection. Keep the patient quiet and call a doctor.

The Brown Recluse is similar to many other spiders except for the fiddle-shaped marking on its back (which explains its common name, "Fiddle-back spider"). It is light yellow to

medium dark brown in color. Although its natural habitat is outdoors, it can readily establish an infestation inside homes.

A victim of a bite from a Brown Recluse rarely sees the spider because pain may not be noticed for 2 to 8 hours. Blisters, swelling, hemorrhage or ulceration may occur. If bitten, contact your doctor.

To prevent spider bites, use caution when cleaning little-used areas in the home (attics and store-rooms) and wear gloves when working in areas where there might be spiders. General cleanliness, paint and light discourage spiders.

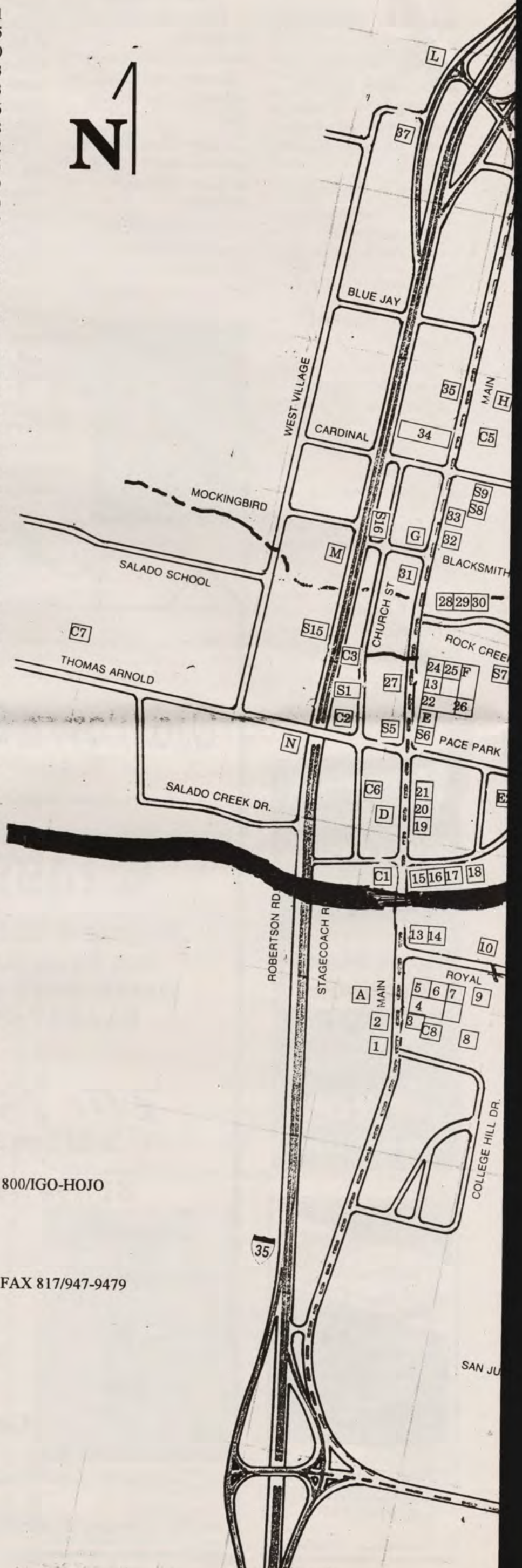

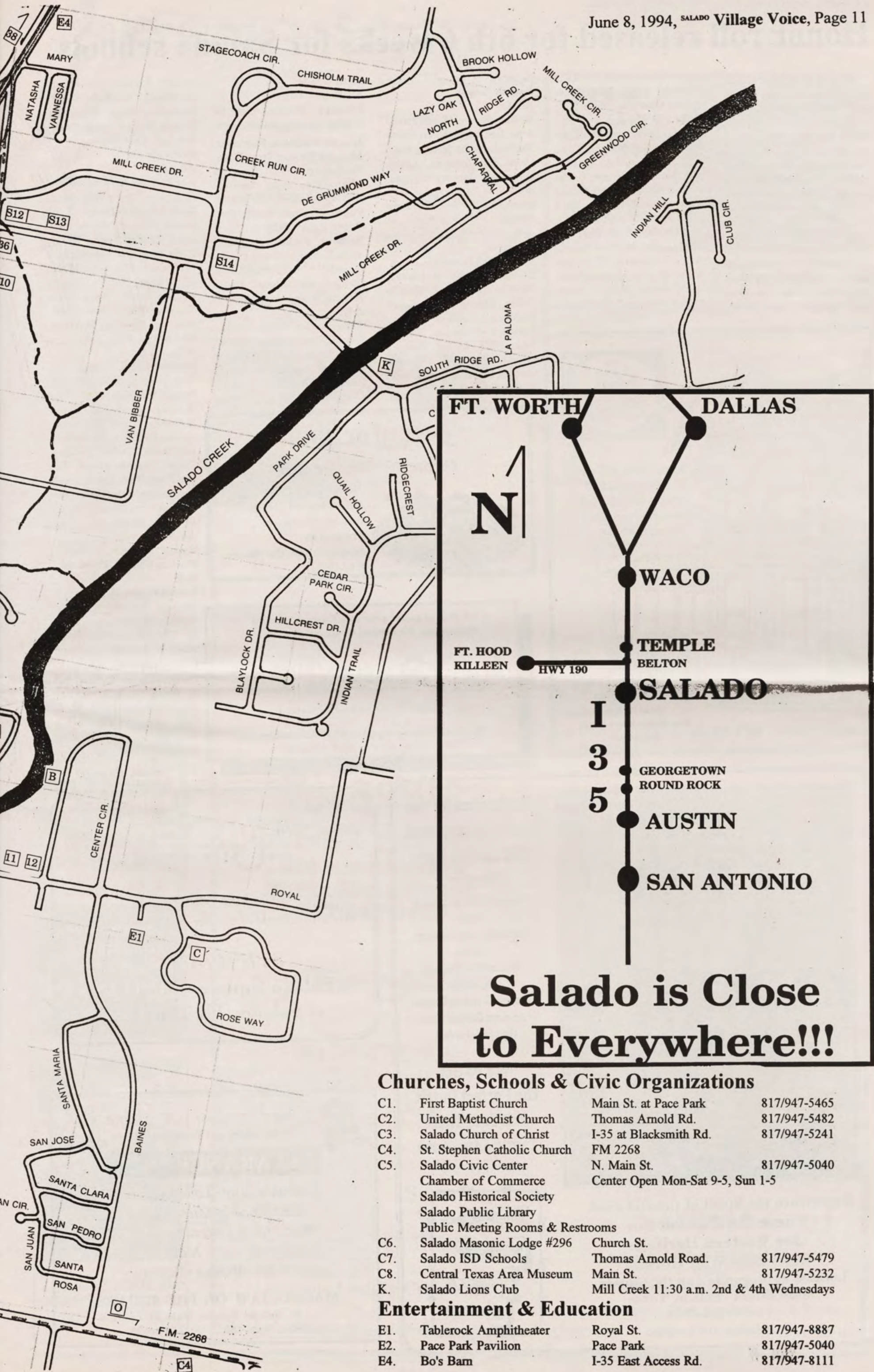

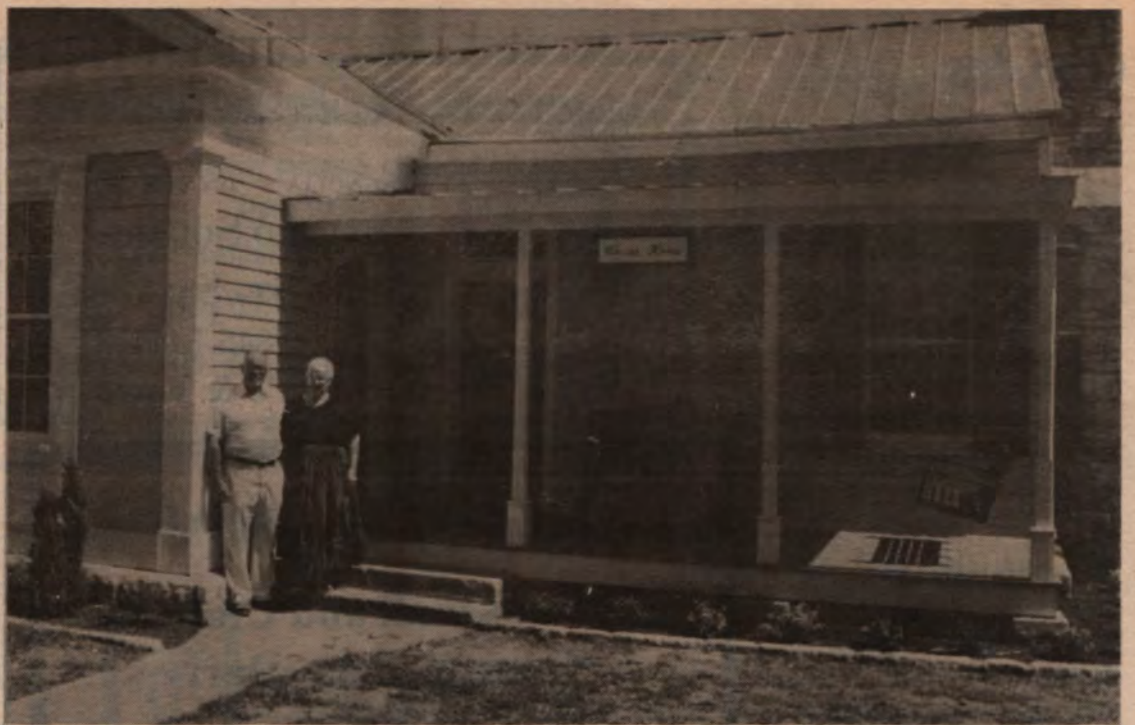

For more than 125 years, one of Salado's oldest homes has quietly rested across the street from Chester and Betty Critchfield. Originally built about 1868 by J.R. Eubank, this Greek Revival classic is framed with cedar posts, rafters and floor joists. Its front decor is still held in place only by wooden pegs. Rough sawed lumber used in the roof still bears the name "Eubank", probably applied to the stack before it was hauled by oxen from Bastrop.

Aside from Eubank, some of its earliest owners include Willie J. Keng 1872-83, A.M. Kellar 1883-86), Lou C. Aiken 1886-90, and Janie McLean 1890-. It last occupant was Betty Critchfield's uncle, Pat LaFand.


Late last year the house was sold and moved to the Rose Mansion grounds, where its's remaining two rooms were restored and a previous room, since torn away, was replaced. Three private baths were added and now it accommodates six guests, under the name "Chester House."

Its' owner George Kolb sheepishly admits that for awhile it was called the historic mobile home of Salado because he moved it behind the Inn at Salado. It didn't look good there, so back came the movers and hauled it to the Rose Mansion where it fits in nicely.

The Republic of Texas Museum Daughters of the Republic of Texas, will host governor Miriam Ferguson's 119th anniversary birthday tea at the museum at 510 E. Anderson Lane in Austin.

it catches on throughout the community," he said.

The Civic Center beautification program includes, in phase one, the installation of a water system, grading and sodding, planting of shrubs and bushes and the construction of a permanent sign to replace the temporary leaning marker currently in place.

Incorporation Revisited

If you thought the subject of incorporation of Salado had passed away and been buried - think again. A number of citizens are meeting and talking up this divisive subject. Veteran Salado watchers know that the move to governmentalize the village has been run up the flagpole several times with no one saluting. "Down in flames" is the way the incorporators went after each vote was held.

New people who have moved to Salado in recent years coupled with the same old group that has had in-

corporation in their craw for a long time feel strongly that the town can be incorporated and all facets of small government can be paid for with the town's share of the sales tax and no property levy. This is pure wishful thinking. What most folks forget is that to become an approved town the size our population would dictate - we would have only a two square mile city limit. That would take in, at best, the Main Street businesses from the old post office building on South Main up to the IGA complex, probably taking in both access roads of I-35, plus most of Mill Creek in order to get the tax base needed to run a city.

It may be that the time has come to revisit the issue but it might also be a good idea to have those who study the situation be only citizens who would be included in the new city limits and not those who live outside the two mile limit.

Too easy to vote for and support a new taxing entity when one does not have to pay the tax bill. In fact - it just might be a better idea to let this subject brew a little longer.

One other item to consider is that a small general law city, such as Salado would be, does not have extra-territorial jurisdiction as many think, thus severely restricting the future tax flow as costs escalate as they always do in city government. The last figures bandied about indicated an eventual need for at least a one dollar tax rate per hundred dollars in home and business evaluations.

When all this becomes a pocketbook issue rather than an emotional one - folks may change sides and let the matter go for another year or so. Either way - it will be interesting to follow all this as it shakes out in the coming months.
