Newspaper announces plans for publication

A Jewel in the Crown of Texas

The Original is back for the seventh year in a row!

Salado Village Voice is announcing its plan to publish in mid-July **Salado: A Jewel in the Crown of Texas**, a booklet to introduce visitors and newcomers to Salado.

This edition of Salado: A Jewel in the Crown of Texas will coincide with the 28th Annual Salado Art Fair. Copies of the publication will be handed out to those paying admission to attend the Art Fair Aug. 6-7.

Also, Salado: A Jewel in the Crown of Texas is distributed in each room of the Stagecoach Inn.

Other distribution points include the Salado Civic Center and Salado shops, galleries, restaurants and bed and breakfast inns.

Altogether, 25,000 copies will be distributed with this edition.

Salado Village Voice is donating eight-pages of the publication to the Chamber of Commerce for use to promote its 28th Annual Art Fair.

"We want to thank the advertisers for making the publication possible, because it is given free to anyone with an interest in Salado," said editor Tim Fleischer.

By using newsprint, the Salado Village Voice is able to make advertising in the magazine more affordable to all of the shops.

"Our advertisers find more bang for the buck in our booklets because we are able to print at least 20,000 copies per issue while keeping the cost down," Fleischer added. "We have

not had a price increase in the seven years we have published promotional

magazines in Salado, which is a pretty good track record."

In addition to advertising, the booklets are filled with a shopping map to Salado, histories and photos of historic homes and other interesting features.

Prices for advertising are \$75 for a quarter-page, \$135 for a half page and \$240 for a full-page.

Salado mourns loss of Daurice Bowmer

Daurice Bowmer passed away in Temple on June 8, 1994. Graveside services were held June 10 in the church cemetery of the Peaceable Kingdom Baptist Church Rt. 2 Box 120, Killeen, a church which she helped found, with Reverend Ed Stewart presiding, assisted by Reverend David Crosby.

Mrs. Bowmer was active until her death in the Peaceable Kingdom Retreat for Children, a free rural retreat for chronically ill children which she founded. The retreat is located on the Lampasas River about 15 miles west of Salado in the scenic hill country of West Bell County. A large part of her time for the last several years has been spent in heading up the establishment and construction of the retreat.

The retreat grew from a fishing day-camp she started through the Peaceable Kingdom Baptist Church in the early 1980's in memory of her deceased grandson Charles Bowmer Schreiner, V, who died of a heart ailment when nearly a year old. The fact that three of her grandchildren developed childhood diabetes also gave impetus to the

project. Shortly after her own recovery from pneumonia and congestive heart failure in 1989, Mrs. Bowmer, then 70, began supervision of the construction of the retreat on approximately 125 acres of the Bowmer Ranch, and has been its moving spirit ever since. The retreat is now owned by a charitable foundation she caused to be formed. She was the honorary chairman of its Board.

The retreat served over 2,100 people last year. Mrs. Bowmer until her death was actively developing plans for its enlargement. It is supported by private donations and receives no government funds.

Mrs. Bowmer and her husband Jim were the first recipients of the Frank W. Mayborn Humanitarian Award for their work in founding the retreat.

Daurice Bowmer was born November 21, 1918, in Temple, Texas, the daughter of Jack Spoons and Nell Wharton Spoons. She grew up in Temple,

Before you go see Wyatt Earp at the theater, be sure to watch **Tombstone**, which stars Kurt Russell as Wyatt Earp and Val Kilmer as Doc Holiday. Tombstone is a terrific Western with an all-star cast.

But Val Kilmer steals the show as the tubercular Doc Holiday, gambler, gunfighter, Southern gentleman and best friend to Wyatt Earp. You may remember Kilmer from **The Doors**, **Thunderheart** and numerous other movies. He is one of the best (and least known) young actors today.

Tombstone carefully examines the deep friendship between these two legendary gunmen. It is more than just a shoot-em-up cowboy flick. Don't get me wrong, there's plenty of action, but there is as much character as gunpowder in the movie.

Russell will be hard to follow as Wyatt Earp and Kilmer's portrayal of Holiday is unbeatable. But judge for yourself. **Tombstone** will be available on videocassette June 22 and Wyatt Earp will be at the theaters late mid-summer.

Extremists pull apart political parties, by turning off 'middle'

Now that the Republican state convention is over, having followed by one week the Democratic conclave, both sides have a platform to stand on and plenty of ammunition to hurl at each other. Highlight of the rancorous meetings saw the GOPers thumbing their collective noses at Phil Gramm's fair haired candidate for state party chief - Joe Barton (R-Ennis) while picking super conservative Tom Pauken, a Dallas attorney. Dolly Madison McKenna, a moderate candidate stood about as much chance at this convention as the proverbial snowball.

As in Virginia, a majority of the Texas GOP delegates came from the so called "Christian-Coalition." What this group stands for is a bit of a mystery other than pro-life; home schools; anti-gummint; school prayer and family values. Not a bad platform - except in the narrow minded way these things play out on the battlefield of politics. Some watchful pundits termed these new right wingers "the foot soldiers of the GOP," much like labor is to the Demos. Others say they are akin to the "Shiites,"

who among Islamics are the militants who have no patience with anyone who disagrees. The truth, no doubt, lies somewhere in the middle of these descriptions. Whatever these newly hatched converts may or may not be - they are workers and no one in the grand old party wants to alienate them. They will knock on doors; get out the vote; raise money; put up yard signs and hand out bumperstickers. They also frighten some of the moderate GOPers. Even Bob Dole got the message after he put the knock on Oliver North, who won the Virginia GOP senate nomination nod, and then later changed his mind and sent five grand to Ollie's campaign.

There is a most unusual parallel in what has happened in the Texas GOP this year and that which took place in 1972 among Democrats. In both parties, in both those years, the main stream members were moderates. In 1972, along came Democratic Senator George McGovern

with his party rules that pushed the liberals as far to the left as you can get and drove the rest of the membership either nuts or out! Many went over to the GOP where they remain to this day. A large number became right leaning independents who are swing voters in many state elections. At least they are wooed by both sides.

This year, the moderate GOPers were challenged, successfully, by the far right wing of the party and now we hear tales of woe coming from the centrists who claim the party is ruined and they may decamp to become independents - like Senator John Warner of Virginia.

The movement to the far right or left by zealots does not bode well for any organization. Most people are moderate in their thinking.

They believe in a certain amount of help to be given to the poor. But not the entire national budget. They believe in a good defense but not one that takes all of the taxable wealth nor do they like the run-down of today's military.

A moderate usually is termed to be a conservative. See Record, Page 20

Saturday Night at the Movies continues

The **Saturday Night at the Movies** series continues June 18 at Salado's Tablerock Amphitheater with their presentation of **The Rules of the Game** judged by both the American Film Institute and the British Film Board as one of the best films of all time. This is the fourth movie in the series of outdoor showings of classic films.

The Rules of the Game is a 1939 French film directed by Jean Renoir. It stars Marcel Dario, Nora Gregor, Gaston Modet, Julien Carette and Jean Renior. This classic film was severely damaged by editing and cuts before its

release and even more editing during WWII. It was finally restored to its intended form by the director in 1961. Critics who have reviewed this movie say it is an astonishing example of directorial control and vision.

This cinematic accomplishment is only enhanced when you understand that a lot of the dialogue and the blocking of the various scenes were improvised on location. Renoir's ability to take this collaborative effort and make it into a dramatic *tour de force* is further proof of his artistic genius.

The story itself concerns

the love affairs of the jaded aristocracy and the serving class during one weekend in the country. The films emotional richness dazzles the viewer as various romantic encounters run their course of infidelities and jealousy leading inevitably to tragedy. This film will be introduced by Saladoan Darwin Britt.

Tickets are \$3 for adults and \$1 for students. The box office and concession stand will open at 7:30 p.m. with the film to be shown at dusk.

The series will conclude June 25 with the showing of Orson Welles' **Citizen Kane**.

Moffat, Troy and Belton. She is a descendant of pioneer Texas families by each parent. The Spoontz family having helped found the town of Moffat in 1854. Her mother's family, the Whartons, had helped found the Republic of Texas and Wharton County and the large general store at Moffat and would sometimes conduct services at the Baptist Church there when there was no minister available. Her father was one of Bell County's longest office holders in history, having served as County Clerk, County Auditor and county Treasurer. Mrs. Bowmer was long active in Democratic Party politics.

Mrs. Bowmer graduated from Belton High School at the age of 15 and was a recipient of many honors there. She attended Mary Hardin Baylor College, and at the age of 17 became a secretary for Texas Railroad Commissioner Judge Olin Culberson. During

World War II, she was one of the first employees of the future Camp Hood, helping set up the Temple office which preceded and supervised the construction of the camp prior to the building of its headquarters at the camp.

In 1971, Mrs. Bowmer established Salado Galleries, the first art gallery in Salado and helped start Salado on its road to being an art center. They began the gallery as a part time enterprise but it soon became one of the most prominent galleries in the State.

It achieved international fame when Sir Winston Churchill's widow, then in her 90's, was forced to sell

some of Churchill's paintings to help support herself. On hearing of it, Mrs. Bowmer offered to buy for the gallery some of his paintings from Lady Churchill, for delivery only after Lady Churchill's death. The idea that the only gallery making such an offer was in a rural Central Texas village was so fascinating to the public that it drew attention to Salado both in this country and in England, since Churchill has been a noted artist as well as a statesman. Shortly thereafter, the gallery obtained some of Churchill's most historic paintings from another source, drawing hundreds of people from, all over the State to the gallery at Salado and helping give impetus to the development of the village of Salado as an art center.

In the early 1970's Mrs. Bowmer conceived of and co-sponsored a Central Texas tour of potential movie sites for the newly formed Texas Film Commission, which also drew much favorable publicity to the Central Texas area.

An ardent lover of nature, she helped found the Central Texas Natural Laboratory on the Bowmer Ranch, with Justice William O. Douglas, a family friend, as Honorary Chairman. She was also co-founder of the Texas Explorers Club. A member of the Audobon Society, Sierra Club and the Texas Chapter of Nature Conservancy, she remained interested in birds, wildlife and native plants and has hosted many distinguished environmentalists.

While a resident of Temple, she had been a Girl

Scout leader, teacher of children's Sunday school lass at First Baptist Church in Temple, active in parent-teachers work, a members of the City Federation of Women's Clubs, the Nan Brown Garden Club, the Temple Iris Society and the Waco Symphony.

Mrs. Bowmer retired from the gallery at the age of 60 after she and her husband had moved to the Bowmer Ranch. She retired so that she could devote more of her time to her grandchildren and to the Peaceable Kingdom Baptist Church, of which she was a deaconess and a trustee.

In 1993, Mrs. Bowmer was a recipient of the Distinguished Women's Award of the Bluebonnet Council of Girl Scouts, and also received the Mayor's Award for Meritorious Service

from the Temple Mayor's Committee on People with Disabilities.

Survivors are her husband Jim D. Bowmer of Killeen, two daughters Bonnie Nell Neal of Temple and Mary Helen Schreiner of Salado and the Y.O. Ranch at Mountain Home; son-in-law Larry Neal and Charles Schreiner, IV. Grandchildren are Scott Edmund Simmonds, Dan DeWitt Simmonds, Brian Allen Neal, Julie Daurice Neal, Tiffany Nell Schreiner, Tessa Charlene Schreiner and Tyndal Daurice Schreiner. Her grandson Charles Bowmer Schreiner, V preceded her in death.

Essay contest held for reasons not to smoke

The following is a letter submitted to the *Salado Village Voice* by Flora "Patt" Borom a Salado resident.

On May 20 1994, I discussed with my dear husband, Jim Borom an idea I had to warn the new generation of the dire consequences of using tobacco--especially cigarette smoking.

My husband who was suffering of emphysema and cancer and knew he was dying, assured me it was a great idea and that he approved wholeheartedly. He said he would die feeling he had helped in some way to warn children.

I called the newspaper folks and they suggested I call the superintendent of the school with this "excellent plan" --which I did on that day. The superintendent said it was an excellent plan and the children would love the challenge and that he would announce it right away, which he did.

The contest was for the higher grades only and the title my husband and I picked was: **"Why I hope This New Generation Will Not Use Tobacco In Any Form:** This title tells the whole story as you will see when you read the winners letters for yourself.

The whole purpose of the idea was to print the best letters and the superintendent, myself and the Marilyn of the *Salado Village Voice* were to pick the winners. Later it was eerie that we all separately and unknown to one another all picked the same three top winners.

I gave the Superintendent a check on the Peoples Bank for \$500. The prizes were to be as follows: first prize \$250, second prize \$150 and third prize \$100.

I later split the second prize of \$150 into two prizes of \$75 each for ties - because they were brother and sister. Their letter were

equally good and of similar reasons.

I also added an additional \$75 prize for another a very good letter.

We both planned to hold other contests in other schools, as we thought we were getting out the message to children of this new generation.

We felt sure that by having these powerful letters (written by the children themselves) and printed for the world to see would be helping the children as well as the parents.

Jim Borom loved humanity and regretted that he had started smoking as a mere child -- and though he had tried many times to quit he found it impossible.

He died on the week of our anniversary after 43 years of marriage. He was buried in the Salado Cemetery on June 2, 1994.

He knew that those who loved him were suffering, because of their complete and utter helplessness.

My heart is broken at the loss of my beloved and helpmate, but I know he died with the knowledge that he tried to get the message out that God loves humanity and forgives our sins.

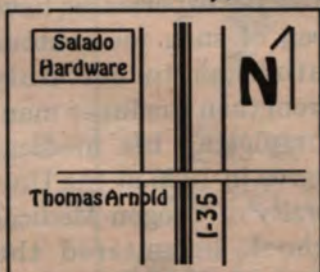
I love my grandfather and I don't want to lose him.

I thank you for reading this and I hope it may change someone's bad habits and their opinion about the use of any and every kind of tobacco.

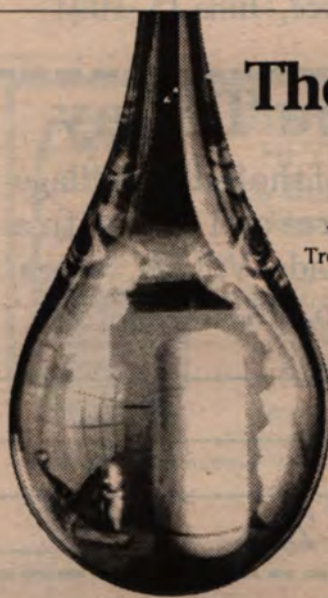

Flying with Salado's Dr. Ellis

The passing years have disposed this World War II vintage fly-boy to give close support to the ancient adage that the essential difference between men and boys is the price of their y/s.

Recently, this early bird-man rode an open Mercury Convertible with 62-year-old Dr. Donald T. Ellis of Salado to Burnet for the Bluebonnet Festival fly-in and air show.

The air show is an annual event put on by the Highland Lakes Squadron of the Confederate Air Force. Ellis is a "Colonel" in that squadron.

"Doc" Ellis is a man of action. His everyday professional title may be chief of general surgery at Olin E. Teague Veterans' Center, but on a weekend when he dons his WWII leather helmet, leather jacket with white scarf he becomes a frustrated fighter pilot with zero aerial victories.

Actually, his frustration can be traced back to the great war and the ensuing aerial combat films that thrilled a nation throughout the 40s. Back then, Doc says, he just knew that he could have been a real fighter pilot if only he had been a few years older. "I think I'd have made a hot dog," Doc admits. Or was that something Snoopy said when speaking of an encounter with the Red Baron.

Doc's self-assurance is readily understood when he talks about his childhood and the father who became the best man he never knew. Born Jan. 17, 1931, an only child, Doc got an early start working on automobiles and engines.

Two years ago as a spectator at the world-renowned Experimental Aircraft Association Airshow in Kerrville, he began the long climb up the aerial ladder to becoming a top gun fighter pilot. The lack of a pilot's license notwithstanding, he purchased a WWII Stearman PT-17 biplane after just one demonstration ride.

With the purchase of the Stearman, Doc was unknowingly following the training footsteps of America's Ace of Aces, Major Richard Bong credited with 40 aerial victories in the Southwest Pacific. Dick Bong took his primary night training in the Stearman PT-17 as did the majority of us WWII pilots.

In a quick aside, I might add that Dick Bong began his combat career in my flight of four P-38 Lightnings at Port Moresby, New Guinea. Bong was a man of action—self-reliant and courageous. He and Doc would have made a good team as a two-ship element of Lt. Jones' night of four.

Even at 62, Ellis should make a fairly cool-headed combat fighter pilot after he gets checked-out in his antique biplane trainer and licensed to solo "the thang." I don't know where he will take his aerial gunner training. Perhaps Snoopy can tow targets for Doc over the Fort Hood firing ranges or even over my farm east of Holland.

Seriously, however, Dr. Ellis' life experiences have been of such momentous nature as to certainly strengthen the inner man. Completing his medical degree in 1956 at the University of Oregon Medical School, he entered the Army Medical Corps and served for two decades.

As commander of an Army Surgical Hospital at Phu-Bai, Vietnam, in 1968 and 1969, he underwent the case hardening of war: Thousands of wounded and dead came his way, particularly during the Tet Offensive. He retired from Army medicine in 1978 and entered private practice in San Antonio. In 1988 he moved to Salado and joined the staff of Teague.

In 1992, I first encountered Doc when he did some minor surgery on my right hand. During the operation — when he learned that I had flown P-38 fighters in WWII — he bombarded me with questions and insisted that I go downstairs with him after the procedure to meet Dr. Alfred Wahlen, then chief of orthopedics, who had been a teen-age soldier in WWII for the German Wehrmacht. I was wearing my P-38 Association cap at the time we met Wahlen in the hallway. Upon spying the cap, Wahlen shouted "Ach! Zo! AP-38! You shot at me during the war!" Doc Ellis was gleeful he had brought the shooter to meet the shootee.

Besides being a No. 1 human mechanic, Ellis has also been a master mechanic on automobiles since he was 15 years old.

He has an old barn in Salado crammed full of old vintage classic cars that he displays at various club shows from time to time.

Recently Doc had it both ways - he got to take part in a "fly-in" in the morning in Burnet with the static display Or his Stearman and to take part in a "drive-in" in the afternoon with the display of his orange 1956 Lincoln convertible.

Not bad for a Confederate Air Force "Top Gun" trainee.

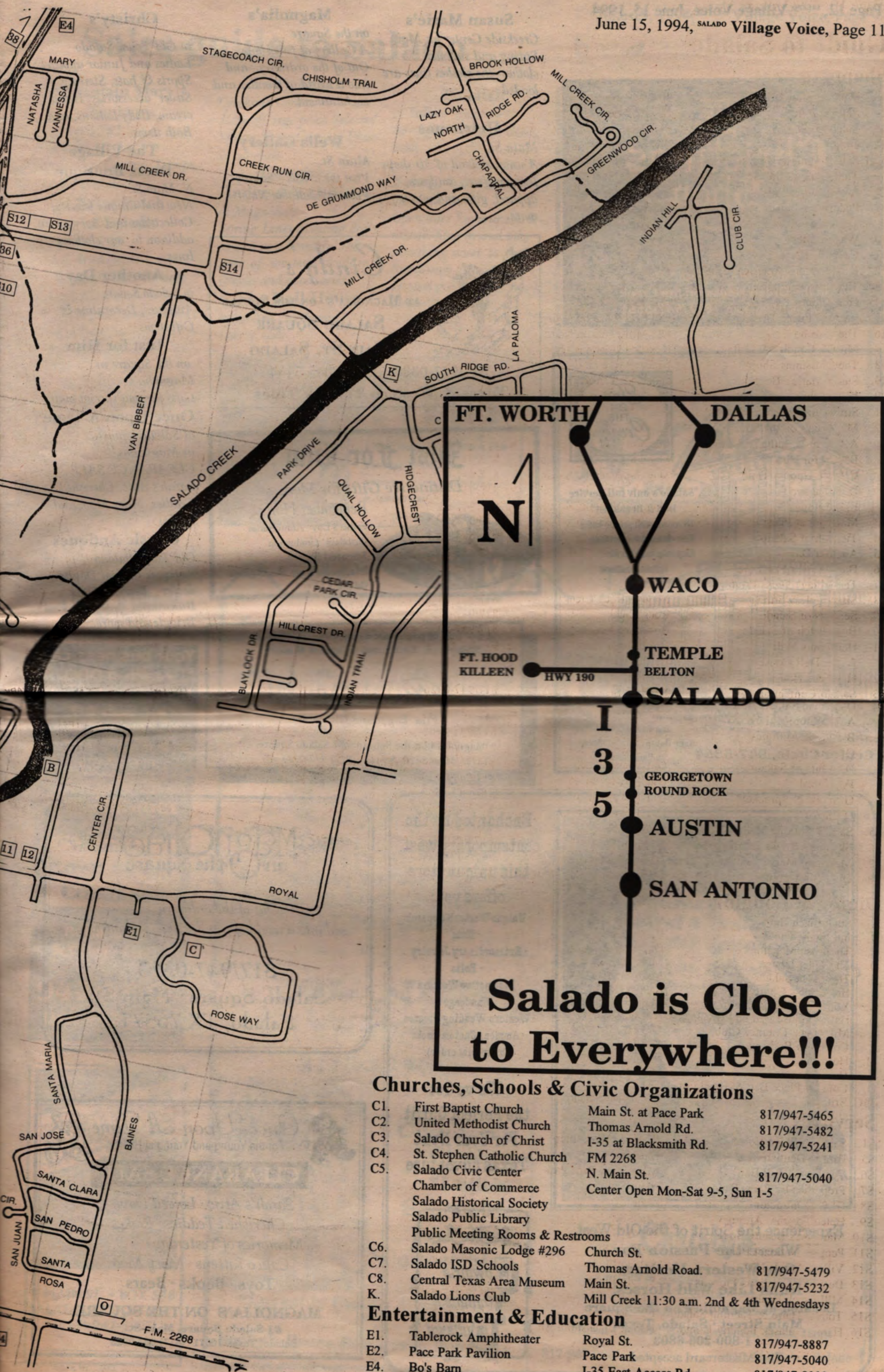

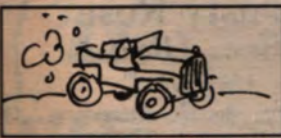

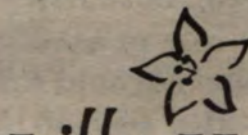
