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SISD Trustees plan purchase, hear TAAS test results & hire new teachers

Salado I.S.D. will pursue purchasing the Grace Baptist Church building and three acres for use as administrative offices.

School trustees voted 5-0-1 to pursue purchase of the property after other alternatives fell through.

If the Grace Baptist Church charter allows the building to be sold to a school, then Salado ISD will make the purchase.

The motion was made by Roger Hunter and received a second by Cindy Fisher. Rita Brown abstained from the vote.

Superintendent Steven Ervin reported to the board on Texas Assessment of Academic Skills Test results for Salado ISD.

"The overall results show 83 percent of the Salado students passed all the reading, math, writing, science and social studies," Ervin said.

The science and social studies are new tests administered for the first time this year.

The board also accepted the resignations of five teachers during its regular meeting June 21. Those teachers are Doug Walters, physics and math; Domina Paffic, third grade; Sarah Lewis, Kindergarten; Andrea Barton, fourth grade and Janice Klein, High School Special Education.

After executive session, the board hired four teachers: Allen Haire, Elementary PE; Larry Lum, High School Special Education; Mary Matthews, third grade and Michele Culver, Elementary.

The board met June 28 to interview the top three candidates for high school principal. The results of that meeting were not available at press time.

A preliminary report was given on possibilities for a 47,000 sq. ft. middle school with a gym and centralized school library. The cost for the project has been esti-

ated at \$3.5 million.

"We plan to have town meetings later this summer concerning the growth of Salado schools and our alternatives," Superintendent Steven Ervin said.

"We will also involve key members of the community for further input," Ervin added.

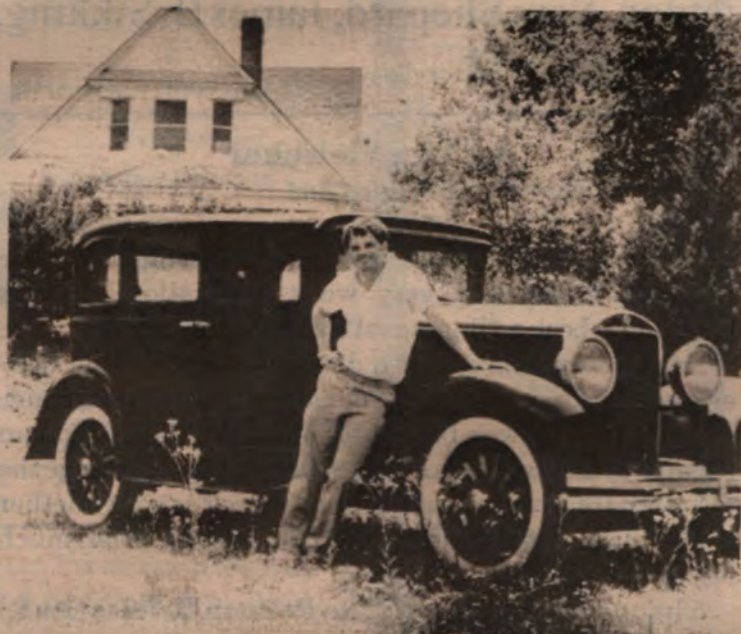
A bond election for this proposed construction and other possible renovations of present school buildings may be held this fall.

Salado schools have grown from 603 students in fall 1992 to an estimated 750 students this fall.

"Growth in Salado ISD will continue for at least two more years," Erving said.

The board voted unanimously to allow employees to use the \$1,700 stipend as either salary, which is taxable, or as a tax deductible insurance stipend.

"Many of our employees are covered under other policies and will never use the insurance stipend during a year," Ervin said.

He has been featured in *Texas Highways Magazine*, *Art Voices South*, *Southwest Art* and many other publications. He has received special recognition as one of the 11 finalists for the title of Official Texas State Artist- Texas State Legislature in 1990 and

The artists and craftsmen present and sale works of all media. oil paintings, watercolors, sculpture, jewelry, toys, woodcrafts and clothing. So there will be no confusion as to the location of each artist, a free booklet containing a map of the grounds is presented at the gate.

The Salado Art Fair is held in Pace Park with round-trip bus transportation provided from the free parking area. Handicapped parking is provided at the fair grounds. Reasonably priced food and drinks sold by various organizations in Salado is available near the hospitality tent.

Admission is \$3 for adults, free to children 12 and under. The gates will open 9 a.m.- 5 p.m. Aug. 6 and 10 a.m.-5 p.m. Aug. 7.

Starring Julia Roberts and Denzel Washington, **The Pelican Brief** is a very weak adaptation of John Grisham's best-selling novel by the same name.

For Grisham fans, it is a disappointment. Julia Roberts as third-year law student Darby Shaw...yeah, right. Roberts is in no way believable as an intelligent woman capable of uncovering an assassination plot to change the face of the Supreme Court. I found myself asking whether Roberts character Darby Shaw could read a brief, much less write one.

The only saving grace to **The Pelican Brief** is Denzel Washington's portrayal of reporter Gray Grantham. As usual, Washington turns in a strong performance, though he has very little chemistry with Roberts.

As time goes on, I think viewers will realize that Julia Roberts reached her peak with **Pretty Woman**. Every other role since then has been a steady decline.

The Pelican Brief is an excellent legal thriller, as a novel. As a movie, it stinks thanks to the lackluster performance of Roberts and the poor effort of the filmmakers.

One can only hope Grisham's fourth novel, **The Client**, does not suffer the same fate.

Republicans are also united against universal coverage and feel in their heart of hearts that going home just before the November elections with "no-plan" will stand them in better stead than a "take-away" plan that currently worries many voters - and they just may be right. Democrats are divided, as always, on everything from "who gets coverage" to "how much money can we dredge up to pay for the plans". As a result they can't push anything through by themselves despite the majority in both houses they currently enjoy.

The medical and related health giver groups are also divided. Pharmaceutical houses are opposed to anything that strikes at their profitability and insurance companies blather at the thought of covering pre-existing health problems as well as including everyone since they like to pick and choose in order to boost their already obscene receipts.

The one positive feature

of this national debate is that it has focused our attention on the problems associated with our current health delivery system in America. It is far too costly and excludes too many of our fellow citizens. This bothers all of us. Some few, who appear as voices crying in the wilderness, have suggested that we find those without insurance coverage and place them in a new insurance pool at government expense or just add them to the policy enjoyed by our elected federal officials. And leave the rest of us alone. If a person is laid-off (not a quitter) or is otherwise temporarily without insurance - let that person become a part of the pool. There really may not be 35 million folks involved in all this. Perhaps more like half that number. Surely it would be less costly and far less bureaucratic to care for the few

rather than start all over and upset everyone else. Someday there may be universal social coverage in health but this is not the time nor do we have the funds or ability at the federal level to manage such a broad sweeping program. We know from experience that outside the brilliant efforts during World War

She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roger Hunter, of Salado, and was sponsored to Girls State by the Local American Legion Auxiliary Unit #55.

Girls State was organized as a National Americanism activity in 1937 by the American Legion Auxiliary. Non-partisan and non-political, the purposes of the Girls State program are to provide citizenship training for girls of high school age, to afford them an opportunity to live together as a self-governing group and to inform them of the duties, privileges, rights, and responsibilities which they will assume when they become adults. They learn the problems of government by simulating the duties of city, county, and state officials. Each year citizens are selected at local levels from students who have just completed their junior year in high school. The selection is

based principally on character, leadership and scholarship.

The 1994 session of the American Legion Auxiliary Texas Bluebonnet Girls State has grown from an experimental conference of 94 girls, held at Baylor University in 1941, to become the largest single extracurricular educational program for high school girls in Texas. Because no sessions were held during World War II, the 1994 session marks the 50th year, or "Golden Session" of Bluebonnet Girls State. This year 586 girls attended, making a total of more than 23,000 girls in Texas who have participated in this top-level citizenship program.

Former citizens of Girls State and members of the Texas American Legion Auxiliary comprise the 70

members of the staff and counselors who volunteer their services to direct and lead this program. The Director, Frances Goff (semi-retired) of Houston, is Staff Assistant to the President of The University of Texas M. D. Anderson Cancer Center in Houston. The Associate Director for Administration, Tammy Broz, of Plano, Texas, is Director of Media Relations for the Southland Conference. The Associate Director of Education is Connie Bridges of Austin, Texas, who is a teacher at Pflugerville High School.

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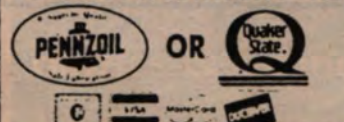

He has been a member of the Sons of Confederate Veterans since 1982. He was the original Camp commander of the Temple Camp, and has served as Central Texas Brigade Commander since 1990. He has received numerous awards from the Texas Division and from the national Sons of Confederate Veterans. He has received the Meritorious Service medal and Dixie Club recognition for recruitment.

Perry also edits the *Confederate Gazette*, a monthly newsletter published by the Temple, camp. The *Confederate Gazette* was voted

the best newsletter in Texas 1991-93 and best in the nation in 1991. Perry is also the author of several articles that have been published in periodicals devoted to Civil War history.

The Sons of Confederate Veterans is a national, non-profit, educational organization that is open to male descendants of men that honorably served in the Confederate armed forces. For those that are interested in War Between the State history, but do not have a Confederate ancestor, they can join local camps as associate members. The Temple camp meets on the second Tuesday of each month at King's Daughters Hospital.

Win Against Insect Pests

(NAPS)—Don't let an invasion from unwanted "guests"—insect pests—spoil your outdoor parties and picnics. Many insects can cause serious lawn damage and be a nuisance. Heed these hints from the experts and the grass could stay greener on your side of the fence.

Although more than 1,000 species of insects may be found on the turf and in the soil of just one home lawn, only about seven cause damage to lawns. Key insect pests include chinch bugs, billbugs, grubs, mole crickets, crane flies, cutworms and sod webworms. The key to solving your lawn problems is proper identification of the bugs present.

- Look for signs of insect damage in your lawn: withered turf, patches of brown or yellow grass or grass that looks dug up which often results from raccoons, skunks and armadillos foraging for grubs.

- Watch the activities of birds on the lawn. An increasing number of birds pecking at the grass is another sign of possible grub, cutworm and sod webworm infestation.

- Learn about the life cycles of lawn pests and

use control methods during the appropriate life stages when pests are easiest to control.

- Plant appropriate insect-tolerant grass varieties, mow at the correct height and frequency, irrigate and fertilize properly and manage thatch accumulations. Your local university horticulture extension agent can offer more information about this.

- Before insect pest infestations become intolerable and cause damage to your turf, use Dursban* insecticide according to label directions. Dursban controls more than 100 insect pests and is registered by the Environmental Protection Agency for use in and around the home, on turfgrass, ornamental trees, shrubs and flowers.

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Can Congress Balance Environment And Industry?

(NAPS)—Home buyers and home builders should be able to make reasonable calculations about wood cost and availability. But government policies on wood harvesting in national forests have only added more confusion to an already volatile lumber market. The National Association of Home Builders points out that rising lumber prices have added about \$4,000 to the cost of building a 2,000-square-foot single-family home, chiefly because of a national policy that has created gridlock in the forest industry of the Pacific Northwest.

And these policies persist despite the fact that tree planting exceeds harvesting by more than a third.

We need balance between economic and environmental issues, says the Association's President, Tommy Thompson. "We really do have healthy forests and they can co-exist with the use of wood as a renewable resource."

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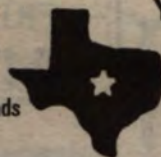
