Labor Day marks official start of brawl for Texas Governor's chair

Greedy is a hilarious, biting comedy, though it is pretty damning of our value system. Michael J. Fox stars as David McTeague, a struggling bowler who is tracked down by his family to convince Uncle Joe (Douglas) to leave his millions to his nieces and nephews.

Phil Hartman, Ed Begley, Jr. and Colleen Camp steal the show as the grubby, conniving family members. Cousins Frank and Carl go as far as naming all their children (including their girls) Joe to get in good with the old man.

The film centers on whether Cousin David will become as greedy as his family members in their pursuit of Uncle Joe's millions. Fox is perfect for the role, which is little more than a reworking of his previous roles in *Family Ties*.

Greedy is a good comedy, but a little long. Editing would have made **Greedy** a better film. The jokes begin to wear thin and some of the gags would have best been left on the editing floor than in the final product.

But other than that, **Greedy** is fun stuff and most viewers will see their own family members somewhere in the cast of characters.

September having finally arrived, most wisely turn their thoughts to the first blue norther while others of lesser station ponder the opening of the quadrennial silly season that sees candidates vying for public office. Traditionally, Labor Day marks the kick-off of these activities, however in the race for the Governor's Mansion this year - the contest began the day after the first primary when it became official that incumbent Democratic Governor Ann Richards would face GOPer George Bush. That was early Spring and they have been going at it tooth and nail ever since.

This year's gubernatorial brouhaha is one for the record books. What should have been a cakewalk for the incumbent first term Governor has turned into a neck and neck - at least according to the most recent Texas Poll. Bush has patiently criss-crossed the State speaking before any group that extends an invite and it is paying off handsomely much to the chagrin of Queen Ann.

When a campaign begins to lose momentum it's radio and TV ads tend

to pick up speed and to some degree a bit of personal mischief. A few days back this came to pass when Richards team put out a radio spot calling "Bush Boy" a bit of a political interloper. Citing financial "bail-outs" and always starting at the "top", the ad contends Bush wants to do this in government as well! This shortly after the Governor's off-the-cuff remark calling Bush a "jerk". Richard's camp says all this in retaliation for calling the governor's "links" to Washington bureaucrats who, Bush says, "want to strip away Texan's property rights."

All of this "she said this" and "he did that" are reminiscent of the primary school playground but par for the course in Texas political campaigns. The important thing here, at least according to those who carefully watch the give and take of the political battle field, is that although Richards has not done anything blatantly wrong to have to defend - she is still on the defensive against a certified

newcomer. Reason they claim is a general feeling abroad in the nation of wanting to throw the rascals out as a result of such fiascos as the squabbling that took place in Congress over the crime bill. Neither party distinguished itself with such partisan shucking and jiving by leaders of the GOP and Demo groups. The shallowness of the debated and the lack of leadership gave both sides failing grades. And all over an unfunded crime bill that will be lucky to solve one-tenth of one percent of the lawlessness rampant in America.

What happens at the State levels this fall may be a referendum on what took place the past two years on the congressional scene plus a slap or two at the president himself who has shown a complete lack of discipline in this thinking and actions.

Getting back to the race for the Governor's office in Texas -- it will be nine weeks of mass exposure to the faces and ideas of the two candidates. The issues are drawn: Crime (they are against it); Education (both want more results but are unwilling to pay the price); Welfare (both

Morris Foster gives \$100K to A&M Engineering

Morris E. Foster '65 chairman and chief executive officer of Esso Companies in Malaysia has pledged \$100,000 to Texas A&M's College of Engineering.



"The education I received from the mechanical engineering department provided a solid foundation for my career with Esso," Foster said. "The personal guidance of Professor George Thompson and Charles Crawford provided valuable counseling and advice and is responsible for my success in the business community today."

Foster designated that \$70,000 of his gift will create equal scholarship endowments for mechanical engineering and Engineering Scholars Program. The remaining \$30,000 will go the Mechanical Engineering Excellence Fund.

In his current position, Foster is head of the Malaysian oil and gas affiliates of Exxon Co., international (ECI). ECI is a division of Exxon Corporation, Foster served previously as production manager for Esso Exploration & Production in London and as vice president for exploration and production for Exxon International in New Jersey.

Texas A&M recognized Foster's professional achievements by naming him to the Mechanical Engineering Academy of Distinguished Alumni in 1993. Fewer than one percent of the university's mechanical engineering graduates receive this honor.

Dr. C. Roland Haden,

vice chancellor and dean of engineering at Texas A&M commented on Foster's gift.

"We appreciate Morris Foster's leadership in the Capturing the Spirit Campaign," Haden said. "This gift will provide important resources for the Department of Mechanical Engineering and the college."

Morris is the son of the Wilbur and Jessie Foster of Salado.

Eagles drop ball (several times) in first contest against Riesel

"It was like dejavu all over again," Yogi Bera

For the Salado Eagles, the opening game of the football season was very much a replay of last year's openers against the Riesel Indians.

It was marked by turnovers, poor tackling and mental error. And five touchdowns by the Indians, who won the game 32-0.

The A-Train, Atrone Taylor, was troublesome for Salado on both sides of the ball. The 200 lb. junior took the first ball from scrimmage and ran 60 yards for the Indians' score, after Riesel recovered the first of 9 turnovers.

The Indians scored again after recovering a fumble deep in Eagle territory. After taking over at the Salado 14 yard line, the Indians punched in the ball on a 2-yard dive by Willie Holloway.

Riesel scored once more in the first half on a 28-yard screen pass to Taylor with 4:11 in the second quarter. The PAT failed and Riesel held a 19-0 lead.

Taylor took the first hand-off of the Indian's second series 67 yards for his third touchdown of the night with 6:47 left in the third quarter.

The Indians recovered another Salado fumble at the Eagle 44-yard line, converting it into a touchdown in six plays. Rudy Bravo carried in from the 4 yard line to give Riesel its final score.

Salado threatened in the final minute of the third quarter with quick passes from Joshua Goodnight to Jerome Peoples and Kurt Salisbury and good runs by Jason Hosch. The drive was stopped at the Riesel 29-yard line by an interception.

Riesel seemed to be one step ahead of the Eagles on both sides of the ball. Quarterback Russell Urhantle

kept Eagle defenders on their heels by changing the plays at the line to adjust to the defense lineup.

"We did not wrap up when we tackled their running backs," Wasik said, "Taylor seemed to be unstoppable. He is as good a back as I've seen."

The defense will make some changes to adjust for the Moody Bearcats. David Berumen will move to linebacker and Jereme Hosch will move back to defensive end. Ryan Cooley may replace the injured Jesse Finger at defensive tackle, if Finger cannot play. Finger hyperextended his knee during the Riesel contest.

Coach Dan Wasik said the offense will concentrate on hanging onto the ball. "I think our offensive line improved and did well

blocking. Mental errors and turnovers killed our offense," Wasik said.

Soto will move back to right offensive tackle and David Dunlap will play left offensive guard.

The Eagles will have to get their heads in the game when they face the Moody Bearcats 8 p.m. Sept. 9 at Eagle Field. for Salado's Homecoming.

"Moody is an all-around balanced team with a lot of speed. They have nine returning to both the offense and defense," Wasik said.

Moody is coming off a close loss to Hamilton 38-34. Salado beat Moody 31-0 last year.

Homecoming activities will precede the game with the crowning of the Homecoming Queen at 7:15 p.m.

Tobacco Prevention Partnership to have advocacy training Sept. 10

Tobacco is the number one preventable cause of death in Texas. It kills more Texans than auto accidents, AIDS, alcohol, homicides, suicides, fires, heroin and cocaine combined. Latest estimates indicate that nearly 25,000 Texans die each year from smoking alone.

The newly-formed Bell County Kids and Tobacco Community Prevention Partnership will conduct an educational advocacy training session 9 a.m.-12:45 p.m. Sept. 10, at the Texas Department of Health, 2408 S. 37th Street. The purpose of the training is to educate citizens about the growing problem of tobacco use among youth and to focus on preventive measures that can be implemented in Bell County. Representative Dianne White Delisi will be the luncheon speaker and will address "Current Tobacco Control Legislation Concerning Youth."

Although the numbers of adult smokers have de-

creased over the past two decades, studies show that tobacco use among young people is on the rise. And perhaps the most significant fact of all is that statistically "zero" percent of adults are starting to use tobacco products; the vast majority of new users are under the age of 18. In fact, the average age for a new smoker is 13; a new user of spitting tobacco, age 10.

The Kids and Tobacco Partnership; is currently comprised of a number of local supporters, including Scott and White Center for

Cancer Prevention; the Texas Department of Health; the American Cancer Society; employees of Scott and White Memorial Hospital, the Veterans Administration Hospital, and Kings's Daughter's Hospital; local law enforcement and school officials, and other concerned citizens. Dan Reed, a physician assistant at the Veterans Administration Hospital and spokesperson for the partnership, is hoping to band together those persons in Bell County who have a concern about the growing problem of tobacco use among youth.

"Kids are being targeted by the tobacco companies in order to replace the smokers and 'dippers' who are quitting and dying," said Reed. "Somehow we have to find a way to create awareness among young people of the disadvantages of tobacco use and to correct their perception that most teens smoke. We have a number of excellent re-

sources available, but we need interested citizens to help us use them effectively."

One resource that is new to Bell County is the Texas Department of Health's Tobacco Education/Prevention Specialist, Sharon Kohout. Kohout's role is to educate communities about tobacco issues and to mobilize citizens to work together on prevention. "This is not an anti-smoker campaign. We need a solid group of concerned citizens, including smokers and 'dippers,' to focus their efforts on preventing tobacco use among kids. Ninety percent of those who use tobacco wish they had never started. We need their help in finding effective ways to keep youth from going down that same path."

Studies show that an effective youth prevention program includes reducing the demand for tobacco products by focusing on education and changing perceptions regarding tobacco use. The other important piece includes reducing the supply by restricting ways that youth have access to tobacco products - through merchant education, compliance checks and strong youth access ordinances.

"We hope that the training session will encourage people to take a more active role in prevention. Most of us have relatives or friends who have been victims of tobacco use. That first experimentation with tobacco very often starts a deadly, lifelong habit," said Kohout. "Our kids are bombarded with tobacco advertising that portrays smoking as glamorous, macho, and sexy - and widespread. We need to counter those messages with the truth: tobacco is addictive, and it's a killer."

Following the training, which will introduce a variety of opportunities for people to become involved, the group will be meeting on the first and third Thursdays of the month at the Veterans Administration Hospital.

We all sat quietly through the show and never saw Sonny or Cher, but we would never forget the small boy without arms. The scene still comes to my mind sometimes when I catch myself about to make a rash move without the proper facts.

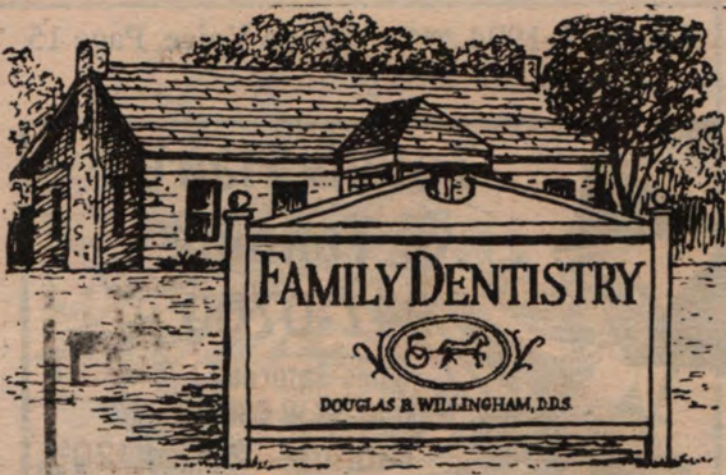

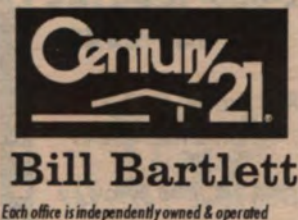
