DPS Officer addresses Auxiliary on personal safety

Salado's Chamber of Commerce Auxiliary Sept. 8, luncheon boasted 82 members and guests in attendance to hear Department of Public Safety Education officer Trooper Charlie Morgan.

Trooper Morgan offered hints to protect yourself and your vehicle.

"Bump and Ride" currently a popular method of car-jacking. Officer Morgan suggested this is one of the easiest types of car jacking to avoid. Motion the person that has bumped your car to follow you to the police station or to follow you to a crowded well-lighted area to examine the damage.

He warned that car-jacking also happens at the home. Morgan advised homeowners who have garage door openers to get into their car before opening the garage door, and to close the garage door before getting out of the car when returning home.

Upon approaching your home he advises to check for any evidence of an intruder before pulling into the driveway. Clues could be a loose screen, a broken window, an open door, or a strange car. If there is something suspicious drive on to the nearest phone or police station.

Upon entering your home, stop and listen..most intruders don't want to confront you. If you hear a noise go for help.

If shopping at night is necessary, park in a well-lighted area. If you see a stranger around your car, turn around and get the mall or store security guard.

In shopping situations, day or night leave the store with a group of people.

Check your car for intruders before getting into it.

Tips for travelers included staying in the center lane when stopped at a traffic light. Keep your car well maintained and check weather conditions to avoid unscheduled stops in areas that are unfamiliar.

Lastly Morgan advocated the use of key chain whistles, self protection devices and a car telephone. He said the decision to resist an attacker is a personal option, but added that often the resistance inflames the attacker.

Table decorations of police equipment included handcuffs, antique leg irons, a Ranger hat, protective gear and current Wanted Posters, created a proper surrounding for the affair.

The Crow is very eery, especially since its tar, Brandon Lee, was killed before filming was complete on the project. The director tries to out-Burton Tim Burton, but falls short of the mark left by the phenomenal Batman.

It always seems to be night-time and it always seems to be raining in The Crow, so the film is very dark and bleak. But it deals with a dark, bleak subject: revenge.

Brandon Lee stars as Eric Draven, who is killed alongside his fiancée, and returns from the grave to wreak havoc on the killers.

One by one, The Crow kills those who killed Eric Craven. But the revenge is not sweet, nor is it fulfilling for The Crow until he meets the leader of the gang, played beautifully by Michael Wincott.

Wincott is typecast as a bad guy after his roles in Robin Hood and The Three Musketeers. He is terrific, even better than Lee, who ends up coming across as somewhat silly with his black attire and clown makeup.

What The Crow lacks in substance, it makes up for in a sleek, stylish presentation.

Everyone knows (or should) that the Texas Constitution prohibits borrowing by the legislative, executive and judicial branches of government. We are a "pay-as-you-go" state, meaning we have to balance our biennial budget between income and expenses. If we spend more, we have to raise taxes. With all that said - why is it we have a higher state and local per capita debt in Texas than any other state in the union?

Analysts from Texas A&M University threw out some interesting stats recently that showed what each of us owes either the state and local taxing entities in the way of debt repayment promises. Last reporting period was 1992 and at that time this debt stood at \$3,739 for every man, woman and child in Texas with the national average holding at \$3,631.

We can understand voter approved bonds for construction by school districts, junior college and hospital districts. What is not understandable is the mounting State debt where the constitution clearly speaks against such borrowing. Nearly every session of the lawmakers will produce an amendment to

the constitution permitting borrowing but never once have they removed the basic prohibition that forbids such debt accumulation at the State level

Texans should demand that our elected officials either stay within existing revenues or face raising taxes to pay for new projects and stop borrowing on future revenues. That is what has shackled our federal money system and who can forget the day New York went belly-up and had to borrow from Uncle Sam to stay afloat. Wonder if they ever paid that back?

Debate On

It now appears that October 21, exactly 18 days before the general election, Governor Ann Richards and GOP challenger George W. Bush will square off in a TV debate. The date comes on a Friday which means in Texas no high school football zany will be around to view the political fun. It is also the first day of a week-end hence many will be out having fun rather than listening to the news of our future governor. Might add that it is a bit late in the gubernatorial game to

chance opening up a can of worms that could potentially explode in a candidate's face leaving too few days to control the damage.

Bush is reportedly telling his followers that he is looking forward to the face-off. Privately he may be thinking otherwise. This column has cautioned for months against such a debate on the part of Bush but he was caught in the trap of appearing afraid to discuss the issues while at the same time fearing the acid tongue of Queen Ann. Let's hope young George does not go on any more hunting trips between now and the show.

Should be interesting viewing although panel type debates with each candidate answering a question without face-to-face challenges and winding up with a pitch for votes they have tossed around for months. All about as exciting as watching championship bowling.

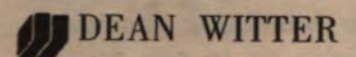

Agency securities: Value for income investors

With uncertainty surrounding whether interest rates will move higher, many investors are questioning whether now is the right time to buy bonds. While it's impossible to predict how interest rates will move in the future, rates on many bonds are higher now than they have been in two years.

In fact, for income investors, the bond market has much to offer right now, although in many cases you should look shorter-term to find the most value. Many investors seeking income are turning to U.S. Government securities, particularly treasury notes and government agency issues, such as those from the Federal National Mortgage Association (Fannie Mae), and the Federal Home Loan Bank (FHLB). In addition to providing regular income, these securities are highly liquid and provide the full or implied backing of the U.S. Government.

Many income investors are familiar with the features of treasury securities, which are fully government-guaranteed as to timely payment of principal and interest and are state tax-free. However, other government agency issues are often overlooked by income investors, but

their features and benefits are worth investigating.

Congress authorizes certain agencies of the federal government to issue bonds to meet part of the agencies' financial needs. Generally, the principal amount of these agency issues is not actually guaranteed by the U.S. government but is backed by the issuing agency itself. Such agencies include the Federal Farm Credit Bank, Federal Home Loan Bank, Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corporation (Freddie Mac) and the Federal National Mortgage Association (Fannie Mae).

As government-sponsored corporations, they have the implied support of the U.S. government. Agency issues are considered of the highest quality because it is widely accepted that the government would not permit a default on these securities. Recent examples of Congressional support of government-sponsored agencies include the bail-out of the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation (FSLIC) and the Farm Credit system. Neither of these agencies is backed by the full

faith and credit of the U.S. government, but are considered "moral obligations" of Congress.

Investors who prefer to own securities fully backed by the government should consider securities from agencies such as the Government National Mortgage Association (Ginnie Mae), Farmers Home Administration and the Federal Housing Administration/Department of Housing and Urban Development. The Treasury Department has the authority to provide the funds.

The slightly higher risk that income investors incur with agency issues, however, is typically rewarded with highest yields than treasury securities. In addition, the interest earned on some agency issues is free from state and local taxes but is subject to federal income tax. Be sure to check with your investment broker or accountant.

If you're considering agency securities, it's important to understand the different features among issuing agencies. Depending on which agency issues the security, your minimum investment, maturity, tax consequences and guarantor will differ. Your investment broker can advise you on which securities best suit your needs.

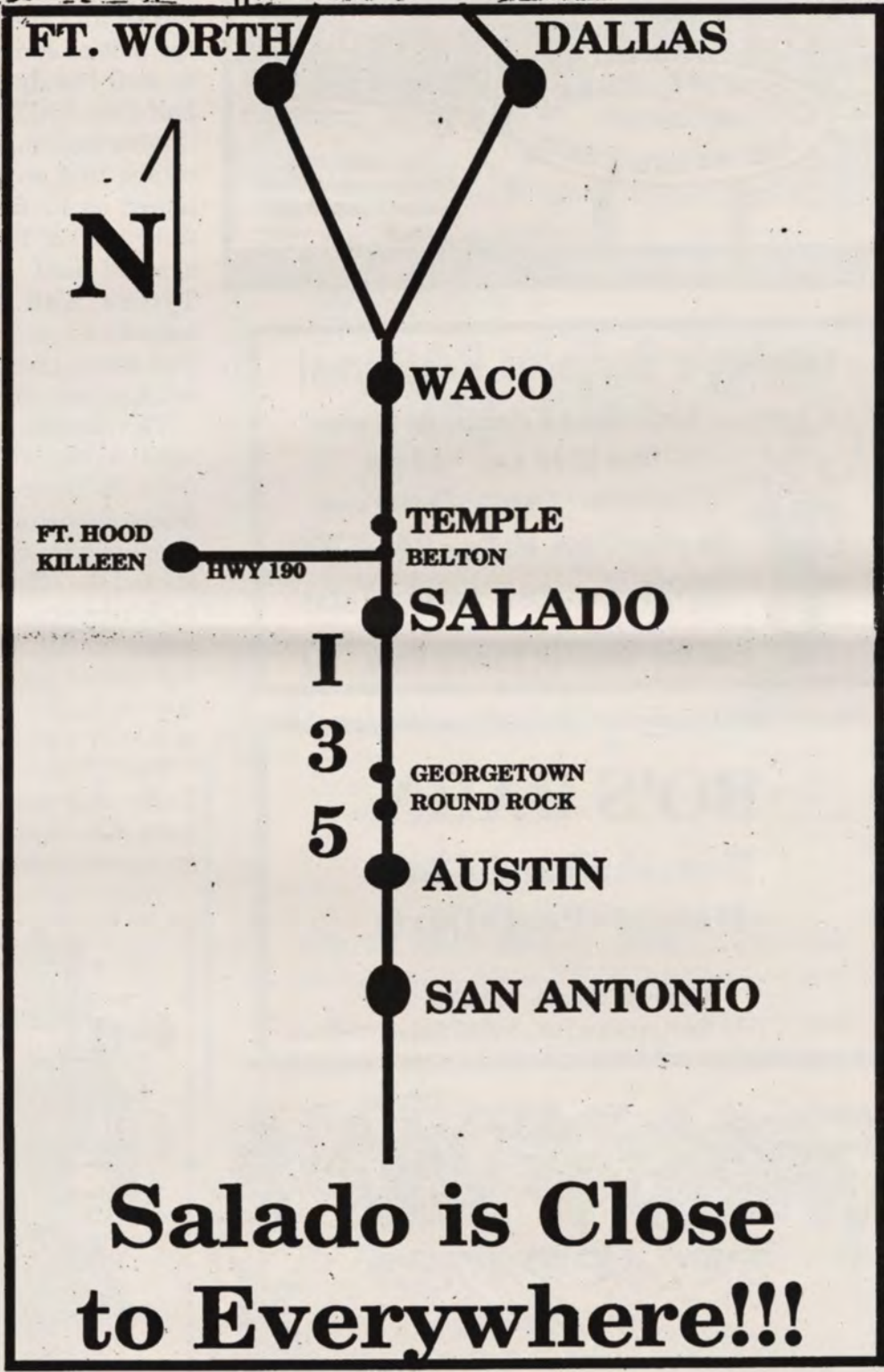

5-yard penalty may have cost game

Eagles fall 16-20 to Moody

A five yard penalty against Salado may have been the difference between a Homecoming victory and the Homecoming loss the Eagles suffered at the hands on the Moody Bearcats Sept. 9.

The flag came with 5:02 remaining in the first half as Salado lined up to go for the end zone on fourth down at Moody's 2-yard line. The delay of game call moved Salado back to the seven, where the Eagles settled for three points off the foot of Jereme Hosch, to trail Moody going into half-time 10-12.

After stopping the Eagles on the first series, Moody scored on its first possession, on an 18-yard run around end by senior Tyrone Wall. The run topped a 65 yard drive. The PAT failed, giving Moody a 6-0 lead over Salado.

The Eagles retaliated with a 68-yard scoring drive. A 16 yard pass from Shane Johnston to Jerome Peoples on third down kick-started the effort, followed by Johnston's quarterback sneak on 4th and inches and keeper around end to give the Eagles a first down at Moody's 27-yard line.

Four plays later, Shawn Easley followed blocks by Jerry Soto and Brian Hill on a power sweep for the 7

yard touchdown. Jereme Hosch booted the PAT to give Salado its first and only lead at 7-6.

Moody scored on the next series, driving 75 yards. The Bearcats failed on the PAT, giving them a 12-10 lead with 8:57 remaining in the half.

Jason Hosch took the ensuing kick-off up the middle into daylight before being tackled by the last defender at the Moody 43 yard line.

Jason Hosch took a pitch from =Johnston, broke two tackles in the backfield and scrambled for 28 yards to give the Eagles a first down at Moody's 5 yard line.

A flag against Moody brought the ball to the 3 yard line on first down. Salado was not able to punch in the ball on three attempts before lining up for 4th down and goal at the Moody 2 yard line.

The delay of game flag was thrown, pushing Salado back out to the 7 yard line, where they settled for a 24-yard field goal by Jereme Hosch.

Moody took the opening kick-off of the second half and drove the ball 65 yards to score with 6:28 remaining in the third quarter. The extra point try for two was good, giving Moody a 20-10 lead.

With 8:26 remaining in the game, Salado took the ball at their own 8 yard line. The Eagles marched down the field to score with 3:28 remaining in the game.

The drive was marked by Johnston's passing. He threw to Jason Hosch for 13 yards and twice to Peoples for 17 yards and 9 yards respectively.

Peoples' catch gave Salado the ball at Moody's 4 yard line. As the Eagles lined up on the 3 yard line on third down, it looked like the Moody defense would again hold tough.

But Jason Hosch broke one tackle at the line and dove across the goal line to bring Salado to within 4 points.

Easley's catch in the end zone on the PAT was ruled

a trap, so Salado trailed by 4 with 3:26 remaining in the game.

After holding the Bearcats on three plays, Salado received the Moody punt at their 22 yard line.

Salado was unable to convert the opportunity into points and turned the ball over on downs with 1:48 remaining.

The Eagles will face the 1-1 Liberty Hill Panthers, who have moved up to 3A this year. Liberty Hill stomped Academy last week, 31-6 after falling to Troy in the season opener.

The Eagles will have to stop 200 lb. tailback Billy Simmons to beat the Panthers. Simmons has been troublesome to Salado all four years he has played varsity ball.

Joshua Goodnight will be able to play defense, but cannot receive a snap due to a cut in his left hand. He may be able to return to the quarterback slot in two or three weeks.

Also questionable is Jesse Finger. Finger did not play in the loss to Moody and has been recovering from an overextended knee. He may see limited defensive action Sept. 16.

They had stopped at a little country service station for a fill up, and a single rest room stop for all. The adults and children were taking turns at the limited facilities offered by the little station while the elderly man in bib overalls patiently filled their tank with gas.

The scene was a circus. There were kids scrambling around inside of the station wagon. There were kids running into and out of the rest room. There were kids working on the cold drink and candy machine. There were only nine children, but after being released from their prison, they seemed more like 18.

The three year old girl was one of the first to finish her necessities. She was still too small to get her own cold drink, so she had a few moments to make friends with the only person around that wasn't a member of her family. She stood close to the old man putting gas into the family wagon. With big eyes filled with excitement, she joyfully tugged on his pant leg, and reported to him the family's destination and her mother's condition as only a three old year child could.

Looking up and with great expression, she said, "Guess what, we're going to Africa and get a new baby!"

The old man, who had been surveying the scene for some minutes now, spit tobacco juice to one side, and answered, "Just what you need."

THE CHRISTENING

Our new friends with eleven children were filled with stories about the conduct and misconduct of their brood. As I said before, it was mostly the mother that was quick to confess. She had a wonderful sense of humor, I thought, and perhaps it was her secret of survival.

She told us that her 11 children were all single births and that for a certain period they seemed to be arriving almost annually. All members wanted to attend the gala affair, but the family was growing to the point of causing a problem with transportation and control. The obvious solution was to leave the oldest in charge of one or more of the younger children while the rest made the trip to the latest activity at the chapel where the family was the center of attention.

The family members were all dressed up, and ready to go to the latest Christening. Last years arrival, Donny, was watching the activity from the arms of his older sister. As the family left the front door to load into the car, it became obvious to Donny that he was being left behind. Suddenly there was bawling, squalling, and huge tears at the front door. The view of the family's leaving was too much for the young one being left behind. A sister just a little older, but much wiser to the ways of the world, sought to console the crying child from a distance with words of solace. "Don't cry Donny, you can go next year!"

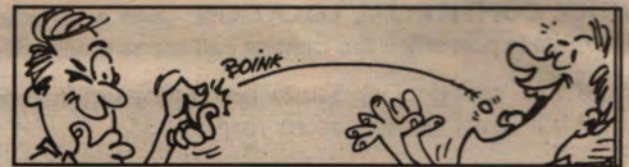
