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Historic District

Committee works with others in community for controlled growth

The Salado Historical Society Historic District Committee has worked actively as an Architectural and Site Review Committee in recent months.

The committee has reviewed 13 items of growth within the historic district since January. The committee has contacted 18 persons in the village, 13 of which have come before the committee with plans for consideration.

Following are some of the projects the committee has reviewed recently:

Bob Cottle presented the design for a proposed sign for the Salado Civic Center on Main St. The sign will be located at the center, front of the building, facing Main Street. It will be 6 feet by 10 feet of common brick construction to match

the building. The brick will be off-set brick to match the brick on the top of the building.

The framed 3 foot by 6 portion of the sign will be wooden with a listing of the organizations occupying the building. The lettering "Salado Civic Center" will be of wrought iron. A wrought iron and brick column fence projecting from either side of the sign is proposed. The landscaping committee plans to plant roses next to the iron-brick column fence as well as shrubs along the front and west side of the building.

Larry Sands reported to the committee about his visit with Michael Johns, Chief Director of the Bell County Health Department. Sands met with Johns about the 36 acre development off of Center Circle and Indian, part of which falls within the His-

toric District. Seven lots in the development are also along Salado Creek.

Sands reported that they discussed a new type of septic system called the Evapo-Transpo Septic System. Developments along Barton Creek in Austin have used this system before and it seems to be environmentally acceptable, according to Sands.

R.B and Margaret Payton brought floor plans and exterior sketches of the 1880 house from Belton that they plan to move near their home on Main St. The Paytons have acquired a half-acre lot behind their house. They have done some clearing and plan to move the storage buildings to the back of the lot. Plans call for a picket fence and shrubs to conceal these.

The 1880s house will

Institute for Humanities fall lecture series is Hope: Beyond Survival Salado Calendar of Events

The Institute for the Humanities at Salado is sponsoring a seminar and lecture dinner series on the second half of its cultural and ethnic survival theme on "Hope: Beyond Survival." The spirit of the program emphasizes hope and harmony in fostering respect for human rights, cultural development and diversity.

The first speaker in the fall series is Rick Halperin, professor of history and human rights at Southern Methodist University. Dr. Halperin was an eyewitness to the martyrdom of the Czech student Jan Palach and since that time has dedicated himself to improving human rights worldwide. Halperin is chairman of the U.S. branch of Amnesty International and earlier this year traveled to the Gaza Strip to inspect Palestin-

ian refugee camps. He will give a seminar and lecture on Oct. 8-9.

The next speaker is the historian and poet, Dr. Robert Conquest. He has published 15 books of Soviet history and is a senior research fellow at the Hoover Institution in Stanford, California, as well as, curator of its Russian and East European collection. Conquest will be at the Institute for the Humanities giving a seminar and lecture on Oct. 22-23.

The third speaker in the Institute's fall series is Gilda Cruz-Romo, an assistant professor of voice at The University of Texas at Austin. Gilda Cruz-Romo has sung, and frequently been engaged to open the season, in many of the world's opera houses, including La Scala, Covent Gardens

and the Metropolitan Opera. She has sung leading roles in *Madame Butterfly, Aida, Otello* and *La Traviata*. She will give a lecture and performance Nov. 6.

"Hope: Beyond Survival" will close with George Rupp, newly inaugurated president of Columbia University and former president of Rice University. Dr. Rupp received his Ph.D. in religion from Harvard University where he developed new programs in women's studies, religion and Jewish-Christian relations. He will offer a lecture on Nov. 20.

gambling with the promise of a half billion bucks in taxes plus thousands of new jobs. This new tax plan will be introduced and fail first time around. Reason is simple - we have a two billion dollar surplus in the bank halfway through the biennial budget period. No reason to fight the anti-gambling crowd or the anti-new-tax crowd over a tax enhancer that is not necessary, say our lawmaking Pooh-Bahs. Wait 'till it is needed. One wonders if we will have slot machines in every store eventually if we continue the nonsense of the no-new-tax litany!

We have gambling - both legal and illegal - in Texas as we speak. It is arguable that if we add to horse and dog racing and the lottery such things as casino gambling - that the final step will really be the slots, state franchised sports gambling centers and legalized numbers running. Thus we would sink to the level of Nevada and New Jersey. We plan to keep monitoring the gambling efforts during the next session and if there is any change it will be duly reported.

This column accurately predicted the year the lottery passed the Texas Legislature. That was in 1991 and for the previous four sessions it was apparent the gambling protagonists were doomed. This portention was not a mysterious act of legerdemain but came from the simple matter of talking to state officials and legislative leaders plus sampling citizen opinions who mistakenly thought the proceeds of lotto would go to the schools at a time in our history when taxes were not sufficient to fully support education without a new or increased statewide tax.

Lotto has raised a whale of a lot of state revenue, all of which has gone into the general treasury. Education, along with all other state functions got a share, but in the case of public schools - the state's share has been lowered with the result we have higher local taxes to support education than ever before. So much for what voters think about when they go to the polls.

Today we have the same issue - gambling - lurking in the wings of the upcoming 74th Legislative convocation due to kickoff in January. This time it is casino

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Perspectives on participating in today's market

During the past year, investors have watched the Dow Jones Industrial Average (DJIA) climb as much as 50 or 60 points one day and fall nearly as much on another. It's no wonder many investors are questioning whether to put their investment programs on hold until the markets settle down.

Yet, by not participating in this market, you could sacrifice achieving your long-term financial goals. Consider one of the worst-case scenarios: during the past 20 years, let's assume you invest \$5,000 each year in the stocks comprising the DJIA on the worst possible day (the highest point for the market during the year as measured by the DJIA). Even having the worst possible timing, history shows that your \$100,000 investment (assuming all dividends are reinvested and not reflecting transaction charges) would still be worth almost \$465,000 as of June 30, 1994, a total return of more than 364 percent. This example reveals that the biggest risk you face is not participating in the market.

Your best defense is to establish and continue a systematic investment program through dollar cost averaging. That way, you

can smooth out the highs and lows of market cycles by making regular monthly investments. With dollar cost averaging, you buy more of your particular investment when prices are low and less when prices are high.

Dollar cost averaging requires continuous investment regardless of fluctuating prices, so you should consider your financial and emotional ability to continue your program through both up markets and down. Of course, this strategy alone doesn't ensure a profit or protect against loss, but can help you take the guesswork out of investment timing.

While some people believe that timing the market is better than systematic investing, here's an example of what can happen if your timing is off by just a few days. From 1980 to 1989, the S&P 500 provided investors an average annual return of 17.6 percent. However, if you missed the best 10 days of that period, your average annual return fell to 12.7 percent. Missing the best 20 days of the decade decreased

your average annual return to 9.6 percent. Missing the best 40 days left you a dismal 4.4 percent average annual return, according to Ned Davis Research, Inc.

Because it is difficult to predict the exact date when significant moves in the market will occur, the lesson is clear: being out of the market can be a greater risk to achieving your investment objectives than investing on the worst possible days. Your best bet is to develop a diversified investment program you can continue throughout market and economic cycles of all kinds.

Although participating in the market is your first step to realizing your financial goals, the second step is knowing whether to look for opportunities. Most financial analysts believe selectivity will be the key to success in today's markets. Stay alert for opportunities the markets have to offer at any given time and take advantage of those opportunities in ways that are consistent with your long-term financial goals.

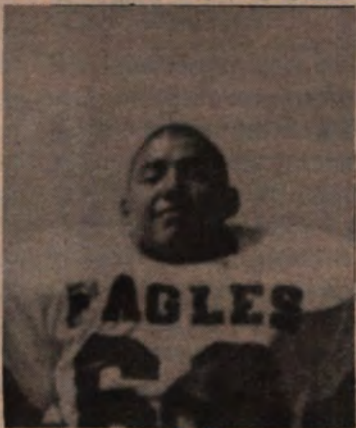

Unfortunately for Salado fans, the Eagle team that held tough for the first half against the #1 team in 1-A Thorndale Bulldogs, was not the same team that came out for the second half.

Either that, or Twone Simmons and Anthony Dominguez were possessed by a football spirit at half-time, leading the Bulldogs to romp Salado 34-9.

Salado dominated Thorndale for most of the first half, holding the Bulldogs to under 25 yards rushing.

The Eagles stopped an obvious fake punt to take over at the Bulldog 40 yard line with 5:34 left in the first quarter.

Jason Hosch carried seven times to bring the ball to the Thorndale 19 yard line before his brother Jereme Hosch kicked a 36

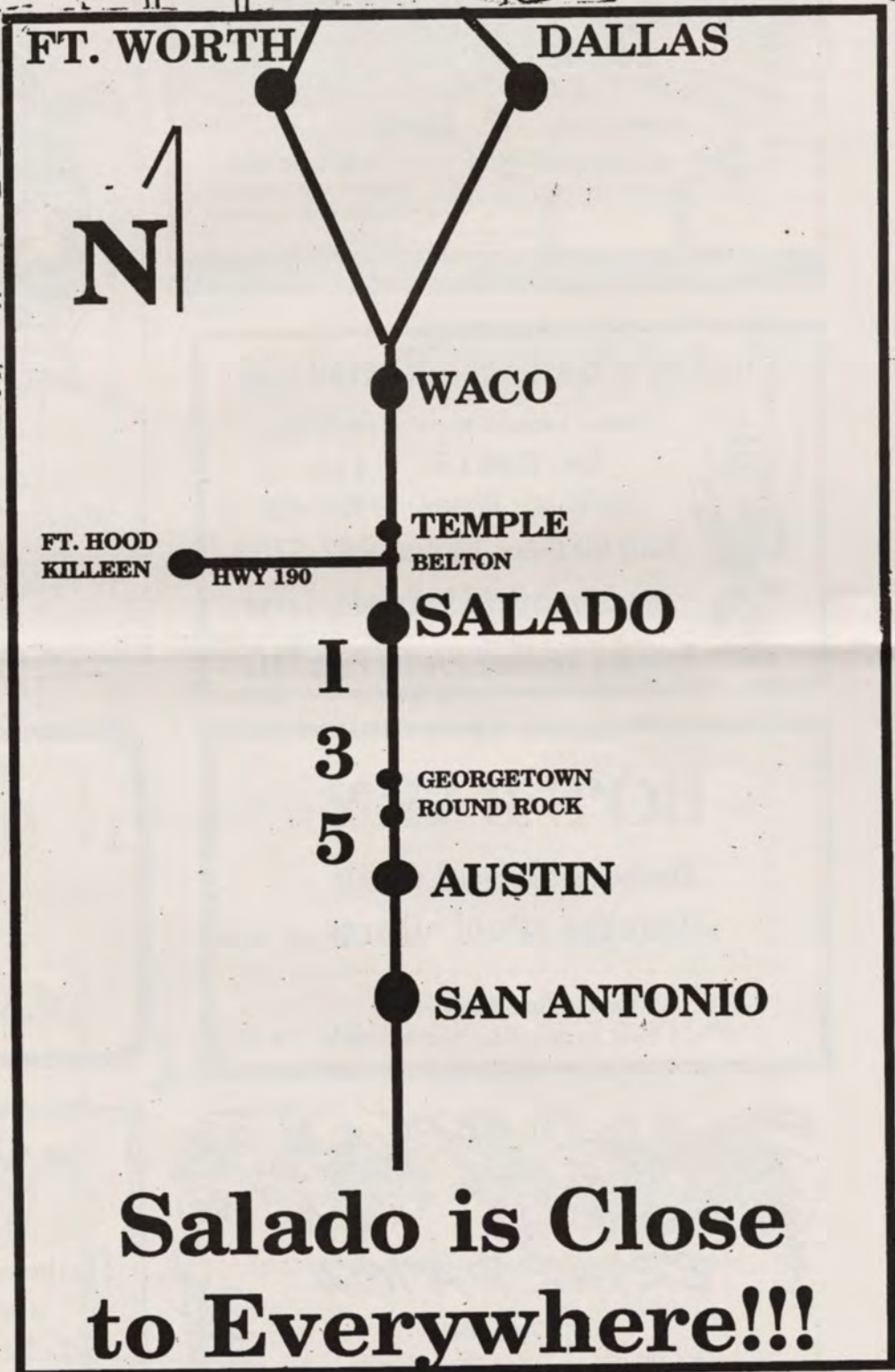

The Artists plan to have an open house for the community on Oct. 9. Salado is invited to view the new Art Center and the work of the artists.



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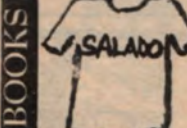
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10 SHS FFA members earn Greenhand Degrees

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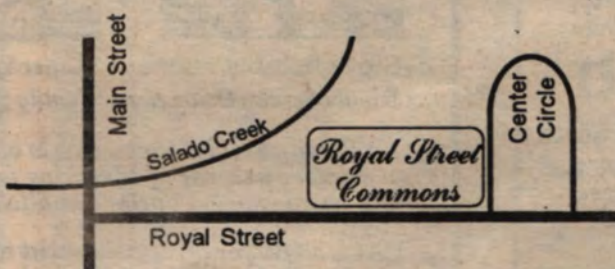
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Grace Baptist Church re-opens in Oct.

Pastor of the congregation is John Warden. Clarence Pinkerton will be leading the music.

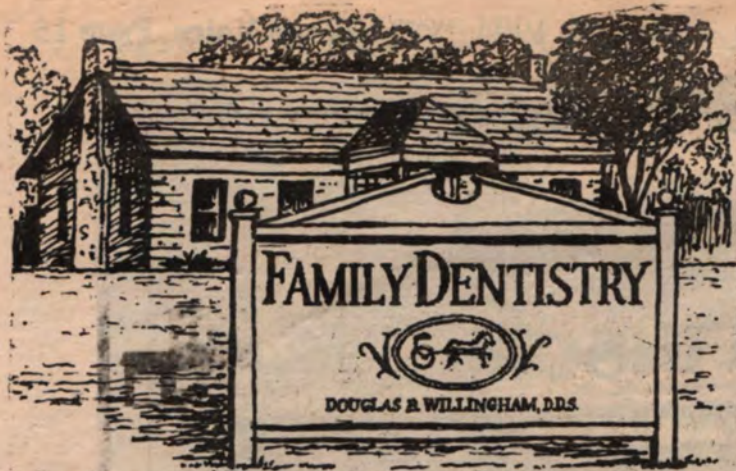

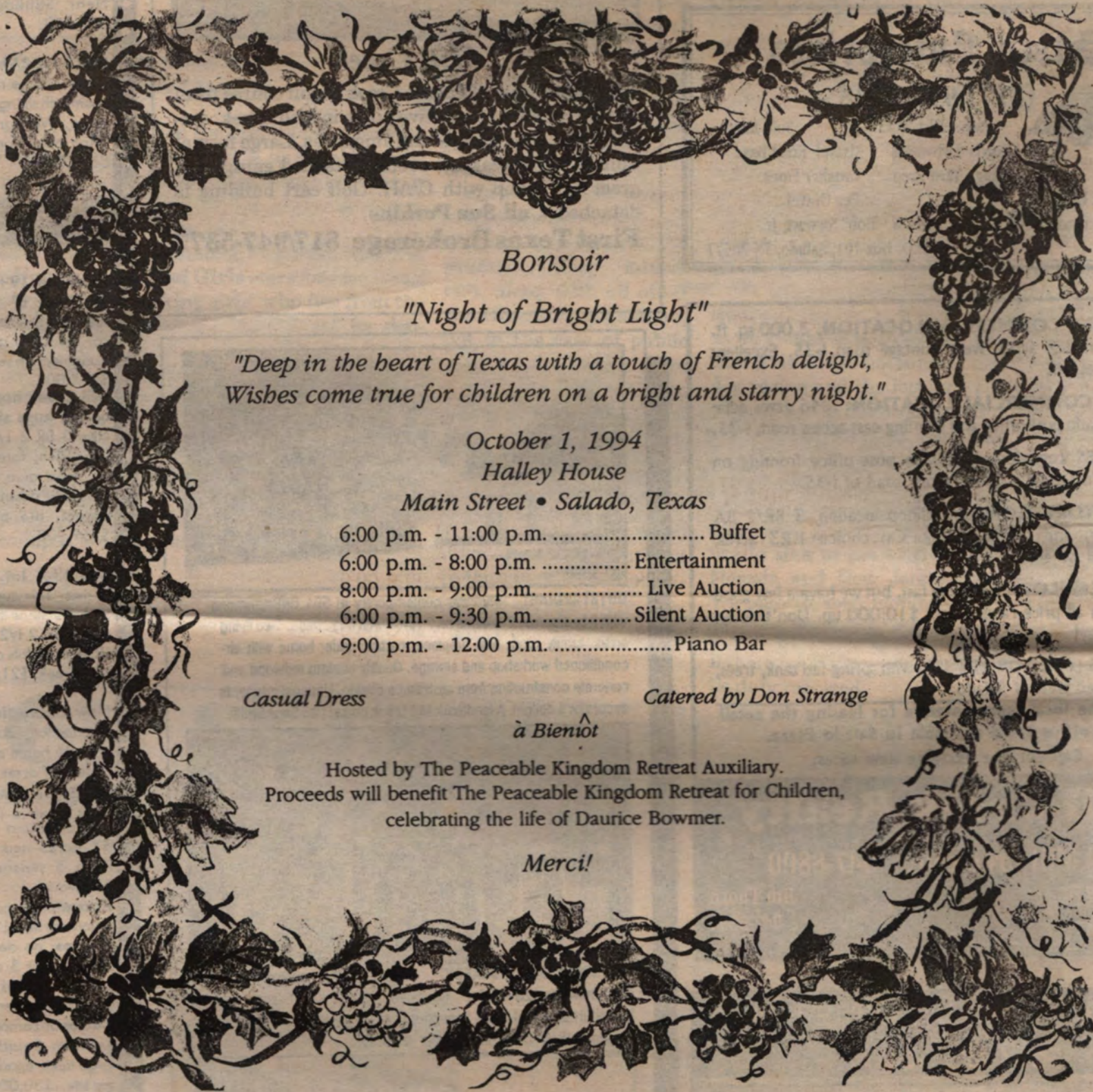
