The Art of Truth

Lecture to focus on history, literature

Dr. Robert Conquest, the 1993 Jefferson Lecturer in the Humanities, is the second speaker in the Institute for the Humanities' fall seminar and lecture series "Hope: Beyond Survival." He addresses the Institute Oct. 22-23.

Dr. Conquest's seminar Oct. 22, is 10 a.m.-3:30 p.m. at the Allen Meeting Hall in Salado. The seminar will be on "History and Literature: The Art of Truth."

October 23, Dr. Conquest will give a lecture and direct discussion beginning at 4 p.m. at Mill Creek dining room. His lecture topic is "True and False Internationalism."

Conquest writes that the tasks of the historian is the notoriously difficult one of trying to represent

clearly and truly in a few hundred pages events which cover years of time and nations of men and women." He has published 15 books of Soviet history, including *The Harvest*

of Sorrow, The Great Terror, and Stalin: Breaker of Nations.

Dr. Conquest is a senior research fellow at the Hoover Institution at Stanford University and curator of its Russian and East European collection. He is also an adjunct fellow at the Washington Center for Strategic Studies and a research associate at Harvard's Ukrainian research Institute.

Dr. Conquest's seminar and lecture are funded in part by the Texas Committee for the Humanities, a state program of

A.C. Greene to sign new book

Fletcher's Books will present Salado author A.C. Greene and his wife Judy with his new book, **900 Miles on the Butterfield Trail**, in a gala autograph party 4-6 p.m. Oct. 22.

The book is published by the University of North Texas Press and was designed by award-winning Texas book designer Tom Taylor. This Salado party at Fletcher's Books is the first of a dozen signing parties across Texas already scheduled for the Greens and 900 Miles on the Butterfield Trail.

The Butterfield Overland mail thundered across Texas and the southwest for less than three years, 1858 to 1861, but the romance, the high adventure, and the dangers of the Butterfield Trail, as the route came to be called, have made it the center of movies, history books, television episodes and novels. Called

the "longest stagecoach ride in the world," it ran day and night, twice a week, all seasons, carrying mail and passengers from St. Louis, Missouri to San Francisco, California.

Greene became interested in the Butterfield Overland Mail in 1958 when he wrote a series of newspaper articles on the centennial of that first run. At first he thought he would use this as a basis for a small book, but as he did research and read other writings on the Butterfield Mail, he realized that not only had nothing new been done on the subject in 50 years but much of the history of the region through which the mail ran had been overlooked and some of the most colorful characters and events left out. When he and Judy decided to retrace the Butterfield Trail, they had no idea

now many extra miles they would be on (and off!) the road following the old stagecoach run from what is now Denison, on the Red River, to El Paso. Frances Vick, Director of the UNT Press, suggested that title, 900 Miles on the Butterfield Trail but the Greens ended up following the Trail all the way to Los Angeles -- closer to 1900 miles than 900--visiting such colorful places as Mesilla, N.M. where the Old Butterfield stage station is now a Mexican restaurant, Soldiers Farewell, named for a suicide, and the Apache Pass, the only place where a Butterfield stagecoach was attacked by the Indians. One Butterfield station in Los Angeles was across the street from what became the front gate of Universal Studios. The new book has been highly praised by such western historians as Robert Utley, Dee Brown and Archie McDonald.

Eagles 2-0 in district, face Rogers for Championship Oct. 21

The Eagles defense was tough in the rain against the Somerville Yeguas. The Eagles won 20-6 for their second district win. Salado face the Rogers Eagles 8 p.m. Oct. 21 in Rogers for the District Championship as only Salado and Rogers are undefeated.

Let it rain, let it rain, let it rain.

For the Salado Eagles, rain is an ally rather than an unknown component to the game.

Rain or shine, the meat-and-potatoes offense of Salado take basically one approach to the game: run the ball.

With good reason. Salado has talent in its running backs: Hosch brothers Jason and Jereme, David Berumen, Shawn Easley and Joshua Goodnight. Goodnight is out with an injury for four weeks, but Easley is back after missing three weeks.

Salado also has a dominant offensive line with Jerry Soto and younger brother Gabe Soto at the tackles, Brian Hill and David Dunlap at guards and Marshall Adams at the center.

Where the Eagles truly dominate in the wet weather is on defense. Without as much threat of the pass, Eagle linemen Michael Sierra, Jessie Finger, Jerry Ratliff, Adams and Dunlap are tough on opposing runners.

The rain has been good to Salado as the Eagles won their last two outings in the moisture: 38-0 against Hutto and 20-6 against Somerville Yeguas last week.

Salado led throughout the game, drawing first blood with 11:05 left in the half on a 5 yard run by Jason Hosch.

Jason Hosch returned a Yegua punt 75 yards to the Somerville 4 yard line early

in the second half. David Berumen scored on a 4 yard run with 10:14 left in the third quarter. Shane Johnston threw to William Culp for the PAT to give Salado a 14-0 lead.

D'Ron Carney ran in from the 4 for the Yeguas with 8:17 remaining in the third period to bring Somerville to 14-6.

Salado put the game away when Jereme Hosch picked up a Yegua fumble, caused by Marshall Adams, and ran 25 yards into the endzone. The PAT failed giving Salado its final lead of 20-6.

The Eagles totalled 202 yards offense, including 183 rushing and 19 passing. Jason Hosch led all runners with 79 yards on 14 carries. Berumen followed with 50 yards on 12 carries and Jereme Hosch had 34 yards on 7 carries. Shane Johnston was 3 of 6 for 19 yards.

Leading the defense was Michael Sierra with 17

tackles and 2 batted passes. Jerry Ratliff had 12 tackles and Rusty Wasik had 12 tackles.

Salado will need a strong defense to stop the Roger Eagles, which are also undefeated in district play.

The confrontation between the two Eagle teams Oct. 21 8 p.m. at Roger stadium, will be for the district championship as only Rogers and Salado remain undefeated in district play.

For those who like trench battles, look for Sierra's fight with Kris Kotrla.

Kotrla is also a strong noseguard who may give

Salado offensive linemen trouble.

Coach Dan Wasik said that the game against Rogers will probably be the most evenly matched of the year...and the most exciting as the District Championship is on the line.

Salado Eagles fans should show up early for the game.

And pray for rain.

Is early retirement a good deal?

Whether because of mergers, acquisitions, restructuring or competition, many larger companies are looking for ways to cut their staffs by dangling a seemingly irresistible early-retirement carrot. That means long before you turn 65, your employer may offer you an incentive package aimed at easing you out the door and into retirement.

Should you resist or should you bite? Of course, the first questions to ask yourself before making the final decision is this: Do you have a choice? Your company may truly make you an offer you can't refuse. If your job is shaky, you may not be able to afford to turn down the offer. Career consultants advise that if you are part of a select group of employees who are invited to leave -- middle managers over age 50 or employees of a certain division -- the company may be sending the message: "Be retired or be fired."

Even if that is the case, you might be able to negotiate a better deal. You will have to determine whether you can live on the benefits being offered plus your own investments after factoring in inflation. The rule of thumb is that you will need 60-80 percent of your present gross income to maintain your current standard of living. Compare your offer to the pension you would get if you stayed until reaching the age at which you expect to retire (your benefits department can usually give you an estimate). Your incentive package should at least match it.

Also, consider how long you'll have to wait until social security benefits kick in at age 65, or at age 62 with reduced benefits. Under better incentive packages, the company will give you credit

for more time on the job or greater age when calculating your pension benefits. Some companies will even offer several months' or a year's regular pay to sweeten the package.

Another important factor to consider is which benefits you will be allowed to keep. Will your employer continue your health insurance until you're eligible for Medicare benefits? If not, count on the added expense of individual coverage. What about company provided life insurance? Can you keep it? Will your premiums increase? Will your coverage decrease?

The next question: Are you still marketable? Many "retirees" choose to work full- or part-time, making their retirement packages pure gravy. Often, hobbies become profitable small businesses or many years of experience translate into a paid consulting role. If you are hoping to abandon the workforce, you'll need professional advice on the best strategies to make you retirement funds last.

With many companies, you have the option of taking your retirement income in one lump sum or getting a monthly check for a fixed amount. According to many financial professionals, most of the time it is better to take a lump sum and roll it over into an IRA or other appropriate investments. Again, you should seek the advice of an investment broker or other financial professionals before making your final decision.

I do not reply to Letters to the Editor, preferring to run them without comment. Yours, however, is deserving of a response since it asks direct questions of this newspaper.

First, our policy on Letters to the Editor is based on the fact that the overwhelming number of letters are written on local issues: problems in the village, growth of Salado, the schools, the Chamber, etc. We ask that they be constructive and concise because they often deal with private individuals: our neighbors and friends.

State and national politicians, on the other hand, are public figures and do not enjoy the rights of private individuals. The term "public office" itself identifies the microscope under which our elected officials must live.

Second, as a political commentator on the edito-

rial page of the *Salado Village Voice*, Ken Clapp is expressing his opinion based on his research.

We have had as many letters of disgust and anger from liberals as from conservatives. Clapp has wielded his pen on Democrats and Republicans alike. To put it simply, Ken Clapp is "an equal opportunity offender."

Perhaps you were not living in Salado to read Clapp's attacks on those on the "left," such as Democrats Bill Clinton, Ann Richards, Chet Edwards and the like. 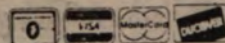

Marker dedication set for Ma Ferguson

The first elected woman governor in the United States, Texas Governor Miriam Amanda Wallace Ferguson, will be honored at a commemorative grave marking ceremony sponsored by the Republic of Texas Museum, Daughters of the Republic of Texas. A special bronze marker will be formally dedicated in a public ceremony 2:30 p.m., Oct. 22 at Governor Ferguson's grave site located in the State Cemetery in Austin.

Governor Miriam Ferguson was born on June 13, 1875 in rural Bell County and educated at Salado College in Salado, Texas and at Baylor Female College in Belton. In 1899 she married James Edward Ferguson and they had two children. James Ferguson became

a successful banker in Temple, Texas and in early 1914 he became a candidate for governor.

Mrs. Ferguson became the First Lady of Texas following the election of James Ferguson to the position of Governor in 1914. Her husband was re-elected in 1916, but was removed from office in 1917 following allegations of mismanagement of State funds. After the Ferguson's returned to Temple, Mrs. Ferguson vowed one day to clear her husband's good name and return to Austin.

In 1925, ten year's and a day after her husband had been sworn in as Governor, Mrs. Ferguson, known to thousands of Texans as "MA" was herself, sworn in as the chief executive in Texas. She had run on a platform

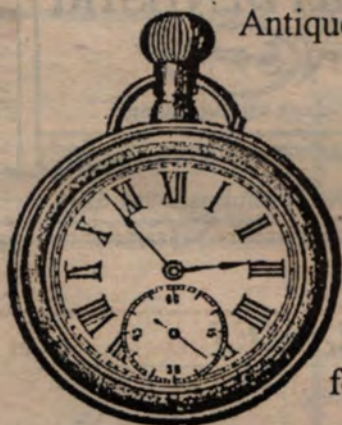
removing the Klu Klux Klan from Texas and restoring her family's honor. Her supporters were primarily those who had remained loyal to her husband. Mrs. Ferguson passed the anti-mask bill which rid Texas of the scourge of the Klan. Mrs. Ferguson cleared her husband's name through the passage of the amnesty bill. Although her enemies later had the bill rescinded, this was a high point in her first term.

The Ferguson "vest pocket" vote helped re-elect Mrs. Ferguson in 1933. She passed the bread bond issue and helped feed

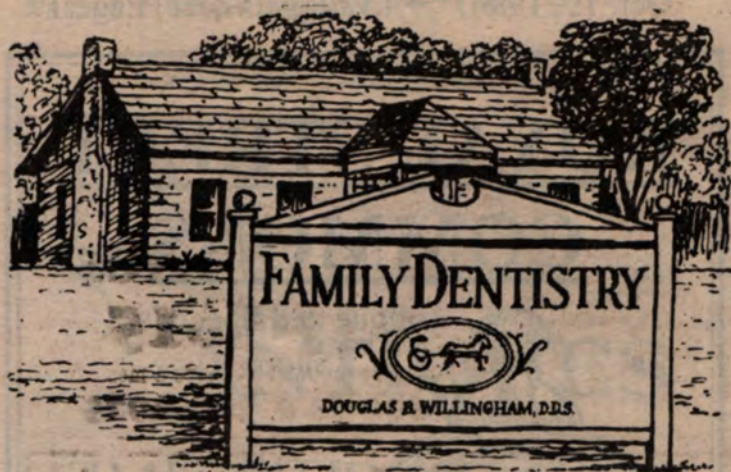

those hardest hit by the Great Depression. Two days before President Franklin Roosevelt declared a national bank holiday, Mrs. Ferguson closed the Texas banks and averted a tremendous state-wide financial crisis. She also did much for the fledgling Texas highway system and Texas education.

Jim Ferguson died in 1944 and Mrs. Ferguson spent her remaining years at her home at 1500 Windsor Road in Austin. She came out of retirement, at the age of 77, to campaign for Lyndon Baines Johnson. In 1955 on the occasion of her 80th birthday, the citizens of

Texas held a large birthday celebration for Governor Ferguson at the Driskill Hotel in Austin. Mrs. Ferguson passed away June, 1961 at the age of 86. The inscription on her tombstone reads "Lifes race well run, Life's work well done, Life's victory, won, Now cometh rest."

The grave marking is sponsored by the Republic of Texas museum, a facility owned and operated by the Daughters of the Republic of Texas. The museum is dedicated to a broad number of Texas history related projects. The Daughters of the Re-

public of Texas is a lineage-based preservation organization open to any woman who can document her ancestry to the Republic of Texas period prior to February 19, 1846.

The public is invited to attend the Daughters of the Republic of Texas marker dedication at 2:30 p.m. Oct. 22 at the State Cemetery on East Seventh Street in Austin. Light refreshments will be served and music will be provided by the Austin Baroque Players.

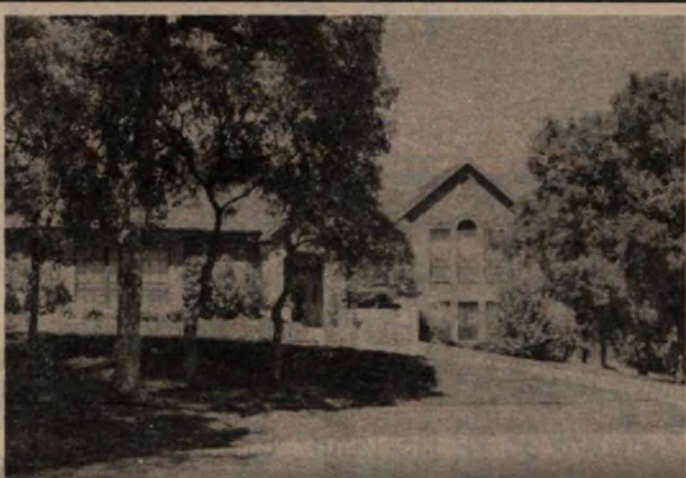

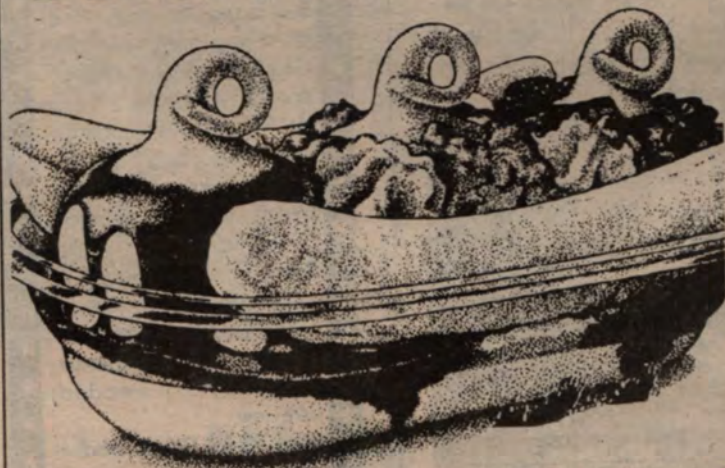
