Coggin files for Mayor; 3 for alder.

Michael Coggin filed for the Mayor's race on Jan. 29 after withdrawing his name from the Aldermen's race the same day.

Three candidates have filed for two two-year terms on the Village of Salado Board of Aldermen: Paul Cox, Jason Howard and Don Krause.

Mayor Skip Blancett announced that he will not seek election to a fourth term as Mayor.

Frank Coachman -- as of presstime -- has made no announcement of his intentions to file for re-election to the board of aldermen.

Three candidates have filed for three places on the Salado ISD Board of Trustees: incumbents Kim Bird and Troy Smith have both filed and Savannah Hennig has filed for the school board race. Three three-year terms will be chosen in the May election.

Two terms on the Salado Public Library Board will be decided in May. Bill Kinnison has filed for re-election to the Library Board. Nancy Mills Mackey is an incumbent but has not yet filed for re-election.

The last day to file for a place on the ballot of the three local races is Feb. 14 at the close of business. Applications for the Village of Salado are available at the municipal office, 301 N. Stagecoach Rd. Applications for the Salado ISD Board of Trustees are available at the SISD Administration office in the Salado Civic Center, 601 N. Main St. Applications for the Library Board of Directors are available at the library, 1151 North Main.

The last day to register to vote before the May election is April 2. Early voting will begin April 20 and end April 28. Election day will be May 2. Elections will be held jointly.

Wilma Smith celebrates 100th birthday

More than 100 people joined Wilma Smith in celebrating her 100th birthday at the Salado United Methodist Church.

Wilma McClung was born on February 1, 1920 in Sugar Loaf, a community in central Texas that would ultimately become part of Fort Hood.

She is the grand daughter of central Texas pioneers, from whom she learned that hard work, sacrifices and dreams are the patches on a beautiful quilt that brings warmth, comfort and courage to those that seek shelter," Mayor Skip Blancett read to the audience from a Proclamation by the Village of Salado declaring February 1, 2020 as Wilma Smith Day. The Mayor served as her minister during his tenure at the Salado United Methodist

He talked about how she was awarded the 4-H Gold Star, the highest achievement award given by the Texas 4-H Youth Development Board during her days

in Killeen schools.

She graduated from Killeen High School in 1937 and earned a Bachelor of Science Degree in Home Economics in 1941. She later earned a Master of Education in 1953 was was a home economics teacher and supervisor for more than 30 years before retiring.

Wilma and her husband Coopwood moved to Salado in 1980. "For the next 40 years she has been involved in civic and religious affilia-

Salado Museum gives UMHB great gift for 175th

A gift from the Salado Museum to the University of Mary Hardin-Baylor came at the right time as the university is celebrating the 175th anniversary of its founding.

February 1 marked the 175th anniversary of the day the Republic of Texas approved the charter for the first Baptist university west of the Mississippi, and UMHB alumni kicked off a year of celebrations with a dinner that evening, commemorating the school's rich history.

The alumni dinner was served "family-style" in a nod to the days when the family-style meals in the Hardy Hall dining room were used as opportunities not only for eating but also for the students to practice proper meal-time etiquette.

The Hardy Hall is named

after John C. Hardy, who was a long-time president of Mary Hardin-Baylor.

Salado Museum executive director Dave Swarthout presented the UMHB with a scrapbook from the Hardy family that celebrates the life of John C. Hardy with original photos, an original program from the Grand Opening of Baylor Female College when we moved to Belton in 1886, and photos and newspapers from his funeral.


"I can't even express what a profound piece of our history you uncovered," Michael Bawl, Senior Director of Development for UMHB told Swarthout. "It is getting immediate display and promotion."

Embedded in the scrapbook is a piece of history that UMHB had lost during one of the two fires. The scrapbook included an original 1886 program for the dedication of the Belton campus. "We don't have that," Bawl said. "Much was destroyed in two famous fires. That piece alone is like us having a copy of the Magna Cart."

The alumni dinner is the first of a series of anniversary celebrations UMHB has planned for the year. A special exhibit about the school's 175 years will open in February in the university's Museum at the Parker House. In early April, a 175th anniversary dinner will be held for members of the President's Leadership Circle, a group comprised of donors to the university. In mid-April, a Charter Celebration Weekend trip to the school's original campus in Independence, Texas, will

include a chapel service and lunch on the lawn of the historic Independence Baptist Church. The university will sponsor a special commemorative float in Belton's annual Fourth of July parade, and a big birthday bash is planned for Homecoming Weekend in October.

UMHB is one of the two oldest continuously operating universities in the state of Texas. UMHB shares its birthdate with Baylor University, since both institutions are descendants of the college established in 1845. Upon the request of the Texas Baptist Education Society, the ninth Congress of the Republic of Texas approved the establishment of a school known as Baylor University, which would offer co-educational classes as SEE UMHB, PAGE 3A

Worries over coronavirus causing economic uncertainty

The S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) reflected a classic battle between the bulls and the bears for the week that closed out January 2020 and the bears appear to be winning. The SPX closed down 2.12% for the week at 3,225.52, erasing all the gains and a bit more for the month and the year to date during which it is down 0.29%. It's hard to remember, or even believe that on the 17th it was still breaking all-time records. Part of the decline was credited to the uncertainty of the economic effect of the coronavirus but outside of that worry, one of the key bellwethers of the stock market, Caterpillar, announced it was seeing a reduction in demand in the midst of global economic uncertainty. Another ring of the alarm bell was sounded as the Chicago Business Barometer fell to 42.9 on a scale where numbers below 50 indicate a current contraction is underway in general business activity.

The yield on the tenyear U.S. Treasury note fell nearly 18% to close out the week's trading at 1.5%, below the 1.562% yield of the 90-day T-bill, thereby once again inverting the Treasury yield curve and adding to the alarm bells. Last year, the Federal Reserve Board erased the inverted yield curve by cutting short-term interest rates to below that of the 10-year Treasury but the 10-yr note yield has now declined below that of the Fed's overnight lending rate. The interest rate swoon was global as Germany's 10yr. Bund yield, which was finally climbing to nearly zero from negative territory. dropped back to -0.432%. The chorus of warning was joined by the price of West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) as it declined 4.8% to close the week at \$51.60. WTI is now down over 18% in the last month, putting it on the cusp of a bear market in oil prices.

Market & Economic Update

The big economic news for the week was the Commerce Department's headline 2.1% annualized GDP growth estimate for the fourth quarter of 2019. That first estimate of 2019's final quarter brings the annual growth rate for the year to 2.3%. That positive figure masks a couple of big negatives that may well show their heads more obviously in 2020. First, manufacturing has now been declining for five consecutive months. Caterpillar's announcement was echoed by 3M and DuPont, all warning that not only did orders fall in the second half of 2019 but all indications are that they will continue to decline in the first half of 2020. The 3M CEO said that the prospects for a business contraction are now bad enough that they will institute a second round of layoffs, eliminating 1,500 jobs in addition to the 2,000-worker layoff it announced last year.

The second hidden figure in the 4th quarter GDP report was a dramatic fall in imports. A decline in what American's buy from overseas creates a boost in the GDP numbers and our purchases fell a whopping 8.7% in the quarter. That decline in imports added 1.32% to the quarter's annualized GDP. Had we continued buying imports as we did in the third quarter, the 4th quarter's GDP would have come in at an annualized rate of 0.78%. At first glance it might seem that the tariffs were the cause of the decline in import purchases, but tariffs in the 4th quarter were not substantially different from the previous quarter, additionally our imports from Canada, Mexico, and the European Union all

declined as well.

The big, and to us obvious, question is, if we are making fewer goods domestically and we are buying a decreasing amount of goods from overseas, how is it that consumers are reportedly buying record amounts of goods? The answer appears to be twofold. First, inventories are being sold off, and second underneath the lagging numbers of consumer spending a trend is appearing. That trend is that while the consumers bought ever more things last year, that growth in buying was tapering off by the end of the year.

Another odd fact has

emerged for which we can only guess at the cause. Two weeks ago, the U.S. and China signed an agreement that Chinese merchants would buy a record \$36 billion in U.S. agricultural products in 2020 and the lion's share of those purchases would be soybeans. From the date of that signing, soybean futures contracts have now fallen 7%. It is as if the commodity markets simply don't believe it is going to happen. Part of that decline could be credited to the coronavirus scare as whole sections of the Chinese economy appear to be locked down, but people (and hogs) still must eat. Adding to the conundrum was the 2% decline in corn prices over the same timeframe despite the announcement that the U.S. now has approved and signed a new trade agreement with Mexico, our biggest export corn customer.

Once again, despite the rosy lagging indicators and statistics, we are skeptical, and our gut reaction is that some choppy times are ahead in 2020.

Salado elite riders have success in qualifying for regionals



Trump removal would be insane

It's easy to forget what the Senate impeachment trial is supposed to be about.

It's not a fight over whether the Senate will call a couple of witnesses that the House couldn't, or didn't bother to, obtain on its own.

The underlying question is whether the United States Senate will impose the most severe sanction it has ever inflicted on any chief executive, voting to remove a president for the first time in the history of the country and doing it about 10 months from his reelection

bid.

This is a truly radical step that, if it ever came about, would do more damage to the legitimacy of our political system than President Donald Trump's underlying offense.

If Trump were actually convicted, the 2020 election would proceed under a cloud of illegitimacy. Tens of millions of Trump voters wouldn't accept the result. They'd see it as an inside job to deny the incumbent president a chance to run for reelection, without a single voter having a direct say. The GOP would be brought to its knees by internal bloodletting, a prospect that Democrats surely would welcome, especially given that it would deliver them the presidency. Republicans





would be out for revenge, and instead of a halcyon return to normalcy, our politics would be even more poisonous than before.

Democrats argue that Trump can't stay in office because he's such a threat to the integrity of our elections. But the portrayal of Trump's Ukraine scheme as "election interference," as the Democrats always say, is tendentious and inapt. If the Ukrainians had complied with the Trump team's pressure to announce an investigation of the energy company Burisma, it wouldn't have changed one vote in 2020, even if former Vice President Joe Biden eventually is the Democrat-

ic nominee.

The fact is that impeachment, as my colleague Ramesh Ponnuru points out, is a weak check on the presidency. It requires a supermajority of the country to remove a president and one of the political parties being willing to nullify the choice of its own voters for president and an election he won. Both the Trump and Clinton impeachments show that this is a hateful prospect for

the president's party.

The best case for what the Democrats are doing now is that Republicans impeached Clinton in the 1990s with little or no hope for conviction in the Senate, and turnabout is fair play. But it's time to conclude that this is a failed model of impeachment. It depends on a process that diverts the time and energy of the nation's political institutions as if the survival of a presidency is at stake, even when

everyone knows it isn't.

Congress can hold hearings on a president's conduct, subpoena witnesses and documents and fight the executive with full force if they aren't produced, hold officials in contempt, withhold funding, deny the executive traditional forms of interbranch comity and, if it wants to put down a long-lasting marker, censure the president.

But it needn't drag the country through a melodrama based on the fiction that any president who hasn't crashed to, say, a 25% approval rating is going to be removed by his own party -- in other words, exactly what Adam Schiff and his managers are doing now. 

well as a Preparatory Department for students who were not yet ready for collegiate studies. In 1851, under the same charter, a Female Department and Male Department were created at the school, effectively ending co-education. In 1866, the Female Department obtained its own charter and began using the name Baylor Female College.

The university was established in Independence, Texas, only 16 miles from Washington-on-the Brazos, a center for cotton trade located on the Brazos River. In 1886, due to declining transportation and economics in the area, it was deemed necessary to move the school.

The Male Department decided to consolidate with Waco University in Waco, Texas, retaining the name Baylor University. The Female Department (under the name Baylor Female College) accepted the invitation to relocate in Belton, a 35-year-old small town in Central Texas that was the county seat of Bell County. Belton and its neighboring town of Temple both offered Baylor Female College 10 acres of land upon which to locate, but Belton beat out Temple's offer of \$30,000 to erect the first building on the campus by offering the school \$31,000 for that pur-

Through the years, the school went through a series of name changes. In 1925, the school was renamed Baylor College for Women. Nine years later, a pivotal gift from Mr. and Mrs. John G. Hardin pulled the college from the brink of bankruptcy and, in gratitude, the trustees voted to rename the school Mary Hardin-Baylor College. The school achieved university status in 1978, and its name was changed once again, this time to University of Mary Hardin-Baylor.



Eagles get new opponents in UIL Realignment



Salado Eagles will play in District 4A-2 District 9 football in 2020 and 2021. UIL released its realignment for the 2020-21 and 2021-22 school years on Feb. 3.

The Eagles will face China Spring, Gatesville, Jarrell, Robinson and Waco Connally in district football for the next two seasons.

Salado picks up China Spring, Gatesville and 4A newcomer Jarrell and loses four district opponents from 2018-20 alignment. Madisonville Mustangs move to 4A-2 District 10. Mexia Black Cats move to 4A-2 District 7. Lorena drops to 3A-1 District 11. Fairfield drops to 3A-1 District 8.

While Jarrell moves up to 4A-2 football, both China Spring and Gatesville move down from 4A-1 District 5 football.

China Spring had a 4-8 record in 2019, the fourth place team from 4A-1 District 5, but beat Kennedale

50-22 in the first round before losing to Melissa 40-31 in the second round. Gatesville Hornets laid a goose egg last year, going 0-10.

Jarrell was 5-5 and 2-4 in the talent-rich 3A-1 District 10 last year, which was dominated by Troy, Cameron Yoe and Rockdale last year. Cameron Yoe and Troy both lost to state champion Grandview Zebras in 2019 in the third and fourth rounds respectively.

The Eagles (8-4, 4-2) will play in 4A-2 Region 3 football. Perennial football powerhouse and 2019 4A-Div. 2 State Champions Texarkana Pleasant Grove moves out of Region 3 into Region 2. This is good news for the Eagles, who will be looking for a playoff run next year.

Bad news is that Carthage Bulldogs drop from 4A-1 football down to 4A-2, where they will play in District 10. Carthage has

eight state football championships and has won 47 of its last 48 games, losing in the 2018 state championship. District 10 will be the District 9 bidistrict foes in football for the next two years.

District 10 will include Carthage, Center, Jasper, Madisonville, Rusk and Shepherd.

Region 3 stretches from Gatesville in the west to West Orange Stark in the east, from Waco Connally in the north to Sweeney (southwest Houston area) in the south.

The realignment announcement included basketball and volleyball districts for 2020-21 and 2021-22 school years.

Salado will play basketball and volleyball in District 19-4A in Region 3 with Burnet, Georgetown Gateway, Jarrell, Lake Belton, and Taylor.

The Eagles currently

play in District 27-4A with Lampasas, Burnet, Liberty Hill, Taylor and Eastside Memorial.

The enrollment cut-offs for 4A are 515-1,229 students. The Division breaks for Div. I student enrollment of 880-1,229 with 95 schools and Div. 2 student enrollment of 515-879 with 93 schools.

The bidding: East South West North 1 NT 3 NT Pass Pass Opening lead — seven of hearts.

Most key plays made by declarer are arrived at through a progression of logical thoughts. Today's deal illustrates how this process works.

- 1. After West leads the heart seven, South can count seven sure winners — three spades, one diamond, two clubs and a heart. Two additional tricks are therefore needed.
- 2. If West has the king of diamonds, a simple finesse or two in that suit will yield 11 tricks, so declarer focuses on those hands where East has the king of diamonds.
- 3. The contract is safe if the oppos-

ing hearts are divided 4-4, since in that case the opponents can't score more than three hearts and a diamond. So the only real threat is a 5-3 or 6-2 heart division.

4. With this danger in mind, which heart should be played from dummy at trick one? Highly relevant is the question of who holds the ace.

5. West must have the ace. Assuming he has led his fourth-best heart, East can have only one card higher than the seven. It can't be the ace, because that would give West the J-10-9-7(x-x), from which he would have led the jack initially.

6. If the king is played from dummy at trick one, it will therefore win, but the contract will eventually fail after East takes the diamond king and returns a heart. So playing low from dummy must be considered.

7. Nothing can be gained by playing low from dummy if the first trick is taken with the queen. The contract will still fail if the hearts are divided 5-3 or 6-2 and the diamond finesse loses. Allowing East to hold the first trick must therefore be considered.

8. Ducking the first heart cannot succeed if the hearts are 5-3 and the diamond finesse loses. (West simply withholds his ace when East returns the second heart.) But if the hearts are divided 6-2, the contract can be made by letting East win the first trick. In the actual deal, playing low from both hands on the first trick renders the defense helpless, and South winds up with at least nine tricks.


Shopping Map of Salado
