## Chamber approves austere budget

The Board of Directors of the Salado Chamber of Commerce approved what was generally termed an "austere" budget for the 1993 year at the regular January meeting held this past Monday at the high school.

Ken Clapp, chairman of the Budget Committee, presented the 1993 spending proposal to the board which included a total of \$96,200 in estimated expenditures and an equal amount slated as income. This is the largest budget in chamber history and is an increase of \$13,700 over last year's funding plan.

The major change in the current budget, which was approved by a unanimous vote of directors present, was the allocation of nearly one-third of all expenses - some \$29,185 - towards the support of the civic and cultural center that is currently under renovation on Main street. The old school house, when work is complete, will contain the chamber offices; the Salado Public Library; the Historical Society Center, public restrooms; senior center and several general meeting rooms - all of which are on the first floor and expected to be finished by mid-year. The second floor, as yet unfunded, will contain the

general assembly hall, kitchen, meeting rooms and elevator.

The chamber will be the chief source of revenue for the civic and cultural center until such time as the renovation loan is repaid and the newly created Foundation is able to provide it's own operational funds. As a result, many of the traditional expenditures of the chamber have had to be curtailed or temporarily deleted. The Old Salado School Foundation (OSSF) has a number of fund raising plans on tap in order to become self sufficient according to Foundation president Stewart Smith. "Our immediate goal is to pay our own way as soon as possible and thus relieve the chamber of the burden of nearly full support of the new civic center," Smith noted.

Budget chairman Clapp, in presenting the budget to the board, noted in his cover letter; "The Committee (budget) deeply regrets having to recommend cutbacks in so many projects but there are just so many dollars that can be counted on as income at this time. It is the hope of the committee that the cuts can be restored as soon as the Foundation (OSSF), that will operate the new civic and cultural facility, becomes

self sufficient."

The letter continued; "The discussion (by the budget committee) was serious and far-reaching due to the fact that the proposed budget reduces many of our time-honored activities in order to accommodate the new spending items required as a result of the school renovation which comes on line during the current year."

A complete copy of the 1993 budget for the Salado Chamber of Commerce appears in this issue of the *Salado Village Voice*.

Chamber Board president Denver Mills told several representatives of the Merchants Committee, a major group within the Chamber, and who were present at the meeting, that it was the board's hope that the cuts made in the normal grants to the merchants committee including payment of rent for the northside billboard, would be fully restored as soon as economically possible.

The merchants present were understanding of the chambers financial situation and have been full supporters of the upcoming facility that will provide a tourist center for visitors as well as the much needed restrooms. It *See Budget, Page 4*

## "As Auxiliary goes, so goes Chamber"

"As the Auxiliary goes, so goes the Chamber!"

These words were voiced Jan. 14 to members of the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Salado Chamber of Commerce by Denver Mills, president of the Chamber of Commerce.

In introducing Mills to the group gathered for its monthly meeting, Program Chairman Wylene Williams stated that the Auxiliary was organized to help the Chamber in achieving its goals in the community.

Mills explained how the Chamber serves as a substitute for a government in the unincorporated Village of Salado, which claims 1,500-2,000 residents.

Among the Chamber functions: maintaining an administrative office to coordinate Chamber activities and to dispense information to the public; to maintain and protect Pace Park; to provide street lighting; and to support other entities, including the Salado Volunteer Fire Department, Salado Public Library, Salado Ag Fair Boosters and other groups.

The most recent and ambitious project of the Chamber is renovating the

Old Red Schoolhouse for use as a community center. The Old Salado School Foundation has been incorporated to oversee and to gradually take over this on-going project. The first phase of renovation will be completed early or mid-summer.

In order to carry out its goals, the Chamber must raise a large amount of money each year. The budget for 1993 is \$96,200, an increase of \$11,200 over last year. For more budget information, see related story and graphics this issue.

This donation will help defray the cost of renovating the building that is currently the scene of first floor work. The grant, largest

received to date, will allow the Foundation and the Chamber to begin planning to speed up the final phase of construction that now lacks less \$100,00 to complete the project.

Meyers, an internationally known motivational expert, is a part time resident of Salado and a full time supporter of the community. "Salado is a magic place in which to live. We, my family and myself, travel around the world

but we always think in terms of returning to Salado and our ranch at Summers Mill," Meyer noted in his address.

Denver Mills, president of the Salado Chamber of Commerce, recognized outgoing board members Bob Cottle, Dale Kehn and Suzi Epps. Patsy Sanford was also honored for her work as fundraising chairman of the school project as well as for heading the Salado Chamber of Commerce Auxiliary.

BrainDePalma is the closest thing to Alfred Hitchcock in today's Hollywood. While DePalma is very good, he is not as good as the Master. **Raising Cain** is a fast-moving psychological thriller, along the lines of DePalma's earlier **Body Double** and **Dressed to Kill**.

John Lithgow turns in a stellar performance as a character split down the middle. The evil side of Carter Nix begins to take over his personality (which is actually made of several distinct personalities). If you liked Lithgow in **Ricochet**, you will love him in **Raising Cain**.

**Raising Cain** is taut, never stopping to give the viewer a breath once it starts running. DePalma does an excellent job in capturing Lithgow as a tortured man, driven to extreme violence by memories of his father.

If you've seen **Rear Window**, **Vertigo**, **The Birds**, and **Psycho** more times than you can count, then you are ready for some **Raising Cain**.

### Funny Farm Reopens

The 73rd Session of the Texas Legislature opened to mixed reviews on Janu-

ary 12. Pete Laney, D-Hale Center, former farmer and currently a used car salesman in his spare time, was elected Speaker of the House of Representatives with a promise to work hard and reform the ugly machinations linked closely to the usual do-nothing lawmaking body. Laney gave his cohorts 30 days to come up with an education reform package that would pass muster with the courts and not do too much damage to taxpayers. Austin State District Judge Scott McCown has given the State until June 1, 1993, to produce a constitutional plan to equalize school funding or he will cut-off state funds to all schools as of that date and thereafter.

Laney also promised he would have a series of in-house reforms ready for the lower house's consideration this week including a term limitation on his own job as speaker.

Republicans, who thwarted an equalization

plan during the late but not lamented special session late in 1992, had little to say about breaking down the partisanship that could keep any measure off the ballot since they control enough votes to keep a two-thirds approval vote from being achieved.

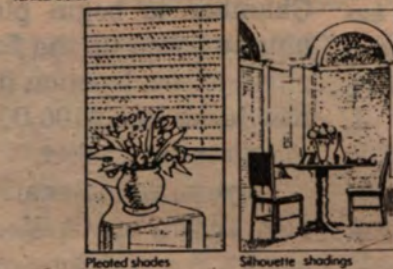
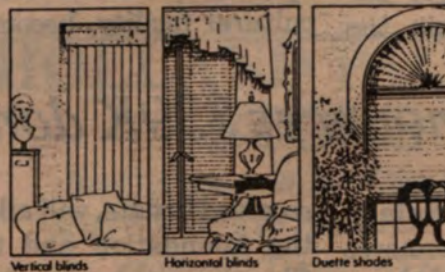

### Investors may miss a world of opportunity

An ADR is a receipt issued by an American bank that holds foreign shares for an investor. The benefits of ADRs include easy purchase or sale by U.S. investors; the issuing banks' subjectivity to standard U.S. accounting and reporting procedures; and pricing in U.S. dollars with dividends paid in U.S. dollars.

Mutual funds specializing in foreign stocks are perhaps the easiest and most economical avenue for investing overseas. The purchase of diversified foreign stocks through a professionally managed mutual fund may help minimize some pitfalls of foreign investing, such as currency fluctuations, political uncertainty, limited information on a company's fundamentals and differences in accounting practices.

Diversifying into foreign stocks can be very rewarding. However, before diving in, you should do your homework, just as you would before making any investment decision. Thoroughly research the companies you're considering, or the past performance or volatility of any mutual fund investment. Use common sense and don't invest a large percentage of your portfolio in any one foreign country or company. 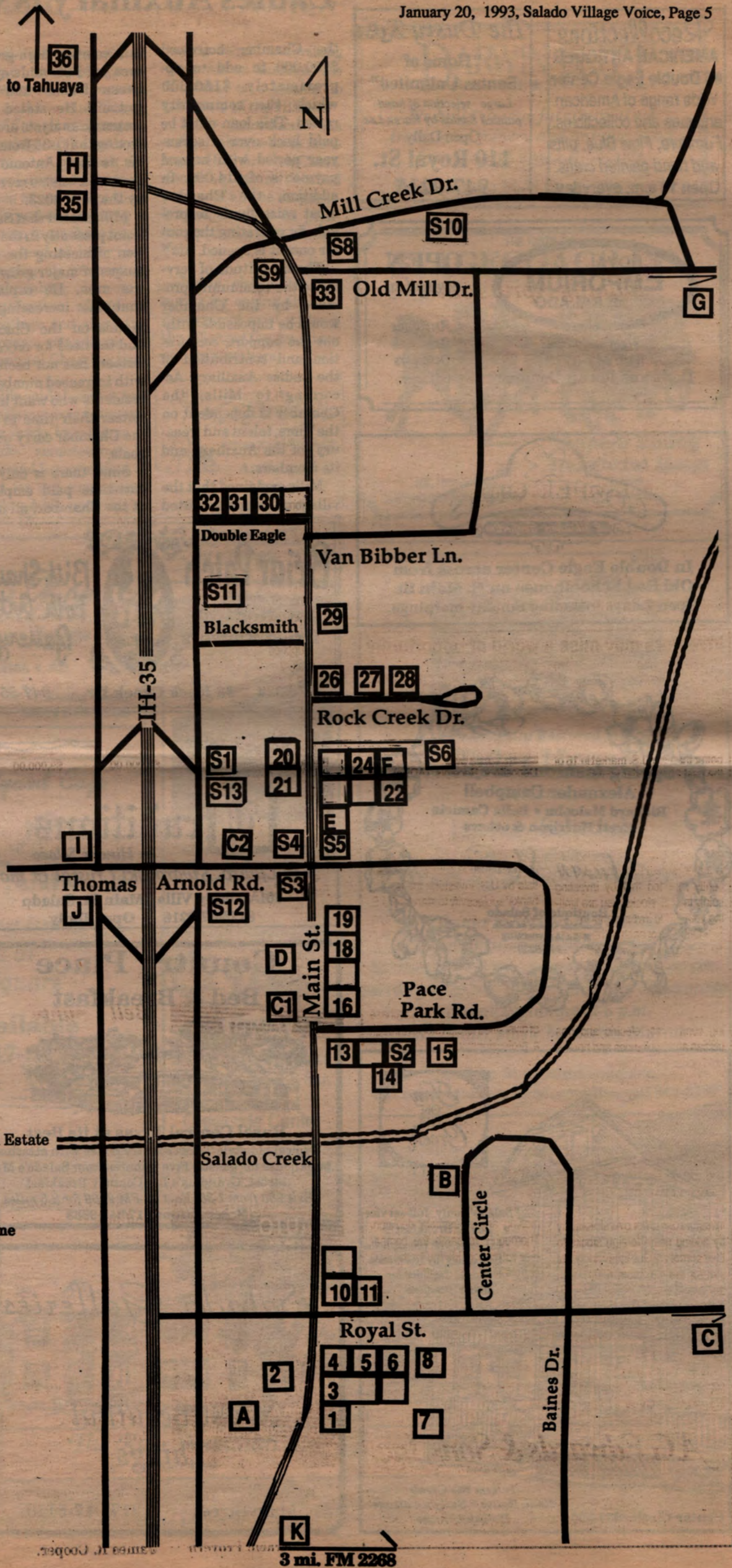

the Chamber borrowed \$100,000 to add to approximately \$150,000 which the community raised. This loan must be paid back over a seven-year period with annual payments of \$14,000. In addition, the Chamber must raise funds to provide for operating the center once it is opened.

The magnitude of service to the community provided by the Chamber would be impossible without the support, cooperation and contribution of the Ladies' Auxiliary. According to Mills, the Chamber is dependent on the "time, talent and treasury" of the Auxiliary and its members.

Mills explained that the village of Salado is located

in a volatile, high-growth area on I-35 midway between Dallas and San Antonio. He stated that economic analysts are predicting that I-35 from Dallas to San Antonio will become a "metro corridor" by the year 2023.

Since there is only one part-time paid employee at the Chamber, all other

work must be done by volunteers.

Members of the Auxiliary were challenged by Mills to continue to be allies of the Chamber, to accept as their own the goals of the Chamber, to study the agenda of the Chamber, to serve as spokesmen for the Chamber, exerting positive influences in the village.

Many children live in an environment filled with negative reinforcement. Such negative cues erode away at the child's self image creating a negative perception of self and the development of self defeating behaviors. While a teacher cannot alter the entire environment of the child, he/she can focus on eliminating many of the negative reinforcers that are present in the classroom.

"Sticks and stones may break my bones but words may never harm me." We've all heard this childhood saying and, as educators, we know that it's not true. We need to sensitize students to the verbal statements and non-verbal cues which are detrimental to others.

1. Have students keep a journal of the words and actions they have heard that are negative reinforcers.

2. Have the student play "Reinforcement Detective" making a list of the negative reinforcers they encounter in a day. For each negative reinforcer have students describe words or actions that encourage a sharing of ideas, thoughts and feelings.

3. Take a minute to discuss one negative reinforcer each day as a class. How does the cue make children feel? Why was the cue used? How could the cue have been eliminated?

4. Have a bounty on negative reinforcers. Students who encounter a negative reinforcer can turn it in for a positive reinforcement cue. Bounties could be "paid" by the teacher, an assigned student, peers, etc.
