## Old School receives \$117K grant from Meadows

The Meadows Foundation, based in Dallas, notified the Old Salado School Foundation Feb. 2, that a grant in the amount of \$117,859 had been approved by the Meadows Board of Trustees to assist in the renovation of the old Salado school building. The money will pay for the entire second floor phase of the project and will bring the OSSF within \$11,362 of being able to complete all four phases of the renovation including the outside paving, lighting and landscaping.

Total cost of the renovation project is \$391,383. Funds raised and on hand include: \$83,574 in 1992 paid pledges; \$28,588 in 1993 pledges paid to date; a \$50,000 grant from the Salado Chamber of Commerce; the Meadows Grant of \$117,859 and a loan from Salado National Bank in the amount of \$100,000 for total of \$380,021 thus leaving \$11,362 needed to finish the outside work on the building.

### ALGUR H. MEADOWS & THE MEADOWS FOUNDATION

Algur H. Meadows, with his wife Virginia, created the Meadows Foundation in 1948 to benefit the people of Texas. Born in a small town in Georgia, Al Meadows built General American Oil Company of Texas into one of the nation's most successful independent oil and gas production companies. This success enabled him to accumulate significant personal wealth that he generously shared with charitable causes during his lifetime.

Meadows often stated that his own life had been greatly enriched by giving. He established the Meadows Foundation so that his philanthropy would continue after his death, under the guidance and direction of family members and trusted advisors.

Today, the Meadows Foundation benefits programs throughout Texas in health, education, arts and culture, social services and civic endeavors. Almost 1,200 institutions and their subdivisions have received grants, and charitable expenditures totalling \$175 million have been made since the Foundation's creation. Operations, programs, endowments, capital projects, and research have all been funded by Meadows Foundation grants.

The Foundation has been particularly interested in imaginative, innovative ways to solve community problems; in projects leading to organizational self-sufficiency; in capital plans which enable programs to flourish; and in ways to alleviate pain, ameliorate social ills, and promote better human relationships.

The Meadows Foundation is one of largest private foundations in Texas.

1993, is some \$14,600, which is more than enough to take care of the balance that will be due when con-

struction is completed, provided these pledges are paid by June 1.

Bob Cottle, former

chairman of the Salado Chamber of Commerce's Long Range Committee - the group that headed up the planning for the renovation, noted when news of the Meadows Grant reached Salado: "I am thrilled beyond words. It is a dream come true for all of us. Now we will have our civic and cultural center completed in one phase rather than the drawn out phase-for which we were planning."

Cottle, who coordinated the grant requests to the various foundations throughout the State, credited Don Davis for his work in helping to prepare the prospectus used to present the renovation plan.

Stewart Smith, president of OSSF and Ken Clapp, treasurer, signed the papers this past Thursday accepting the grant and in doing so were unanimous in their praise of Cottle. "If there is any one person in this village who deserves the full credit for securing this grant-it is Bob Cottle," the

two officers said. "Now we can go full steam ahead and complete the renovation this year provided we receive all of the 1993 pledges by mid-year."

Cottle is currently serving as a special grant consultant and financial adviser to the OSSF. He did the entire liaison work between the Chamber, the Foundation and the various foundations that were contacted.

Support for the school project began in 1991 by the local Chamber of Commerce and its Long Range Planning Committee. In addition to chairman Cottle, the group included Susie Epps, Ken Clapp and Jack Buchanan. Several

**Unlawful Entry** is a rollercoaster thriller of a ride. Once it starts, **Unlawful Entry** is a relentless picture as Michael and Karen Carr (Russell and Stowe) meet local cop Pete Davis (Liotta) when a burglar breaks into their suburban home. Their friendship turns fowl very quickly as Davis begins to stalk Carr's wife.

Much like its predecessor, **Fatal Attraction**, **Unlawful Entry** is a real nail biter. It is perhaps the best film of its kind this year.

Liotta is very chilling as the cop who at first appears helpful and later becomes dangerous to the couple.

As with all movies of this type, it is predictable to the end. But don't let that stop you from watching **Unlawful Entry**.

### House Bill 615

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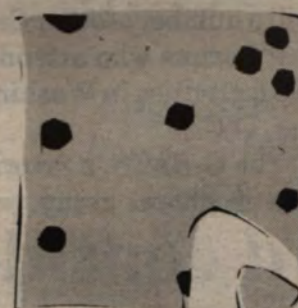

January 1983, an invitation appeared in the *Salado Village Voice* for all interested parties to come to an organizational meeting of an 'art club' for Salado.

From this invitation began the Salado Village Artists, who will celebrate their 10th anniversary Valentine's Day.

The group met first at Old Church Place with programs from Bill Shaw, Bill Jaxon, Jim Benton and Zelma Taylor in its first year. The club also took its first trip that year, a car caravan through the Central Texas wildflower trail.

Early on, the Village Artists gave to the village with posters, bazaar items for Christmas in October, quilts for drawings and working with students in Salado schools.

The group sewed an historical wall hanging, which now can be seen in People National Bank.

In its second year, the Artists began meeting in Tablerock Goodnight Amphitheater, where it meets every Tuesday morning to this date. The Artists showed their work at the Alleyganza in Belton and other places.

1985 was the last year the Village Artists requested a grant from the Ladies Auxiliary (\$250), thereafter being self-supporting by dues and other fundraisers.

The Village Artists donated to the Sesquicentennial committee in 1986 and sponsored an art show at Old Salado Days that summer, showing paintings of an historical nature. A quilting demon-

stration and items were available for sale by the stitchers.

The Village Artists looked forward to meeting year round in 1988 when heat came to the Goodnight Amphithetaer. There were trips to Kerrville, San Antonio and a Mexican Fiesta complete with costumes and enchiladas that year. Among the programs that year were these artists: Jerry Goodman, Zelma Taylor, Novella Lowery, Evelyn Smith, Bob Biestek, Pat Barrett, Jim Falkner, Troy Kelley, Barbara Sutherland, Ellen Berry, Joan Hoffman and Linda Boyd.

The group traveled to Scarborough Faire in Waxahachie in 1989 and hosted shows at Salado Square and the old fire station. The Artist of the Month was conceived this year with the cooperation of Salado National Bank. Today, both banks in Salado show work of Salado Village Artists.

The club had to limit membership at 75 in 1990. The group showed at Salado Square, entered the Bluebonnet parade and had 17 members involved in a juried show at the CAC. Two artists, Jerry Goodman and Marguerite Gandy were chosen to have a two-person show at later date.

feasibility studies were put together and finally a town meeting was called to go over the ways and means of financing the renovation project. Full support was immediately secured by the citizens of Salado in attendance at the crowded town hall session and from that moment on it was apparent Salado was to have a Civic and Cultural Center on Main Street.

Pledges made to support the plan were made and money poured into the Chamber office. The fund raising was capped off with two very generous gifts, one from the Paul J. Meyer's family in the amount of \$39,000 and the second largest from Morris Foster, son of Wilbur and Jessie Foster. Morris grew up in Salado and is today the Chairman of the Board of Esso International, the overseas branch of Exxon, U.S.A. He is in charge of operations for the entire Pacific basin and is headquartered in Malasia.

#### Commerce Meets

The Chamber of Commerce board of directors and the trustees of the OSSF met in joint session Feb. 8, to hear the news of the Meadows grant. It was determined at that time to move ahead at once on the second floor of the old school house and hopefully be able to have construction on that phase begun within a few weeks. The two boards now plan to wait until the building is completely finished before moving in rather than taking possession of the chamber office and library

after just the first floor is finished as was first planned and before word of the Meadows gift was received. "It was anticipated early on that the upstairs would not be funded until 1994 or later and only as funds were raised during the year. With receipt of the Meadows grant the waiting period is over and although pledged funds will still be needed, the overall project completion is within striking distance," according to a statement for Chamber of Commerce president Denver Mills.

Estimated completion date for the entire project is now late summer or early fall depending on weather and other possible construction delays that normally occur in a project of this size.

Ken Clapp, treasurer of the Old Salado School Foundation, reported that raising money is, "...still most important since we have a \$100,000 loan to repay to the Salado National Bank. Until such time as that debt is repaid, the Chamber will be paying nearly \$15,000 a year on the principal plus interest. The sooner we can secure additional funds through fund raising, gifts, or grants, the sooner the Chamber can be relieved of the burden of supporting the operation of the civic center and be able to resume taking care of a variety of other activities within the village that had to be cut in order to fund the renovation project," he concluded.

### *SHS students compete in recent literary events*

Salado High school students recently competed at the Gatesville Invitational Literary Tournament.

Sophomore Brent Cabaniss placed third in Number Sense, and Freshmen Kelsey Johnson placed ninth. The Number Sense team including Cabaniss, Johnson and freshman Kyle Anderson placed second behind Stephenville. In the Mathematics Contest Junior Chris Duzich, Cabaniss and Johnson placed fourth behind Stephenville, Brownwood and Copperas Cove.

Last week, Salado competed at the Belton Invitational Literary Tournament. In the Freshman

Class Number Sense Contest, Kelsey Johnson placed first and Kyle Anderson placed third. Brent Cabaniss placed third in the Sophomore Number Sense contest and had the fifth highest score of the contestants in all grade levels.

The team of Johnson, Anderson and Cabaniss had the fifth highest total score placing behind Waco Midway "A" Team, Wacow Midway "B" Team, Connally and Stephenville. Thirty-three schools competed in the Belton Tournament. The Number Sense and Mathematics teams are coached by Dennis Cabaniss.

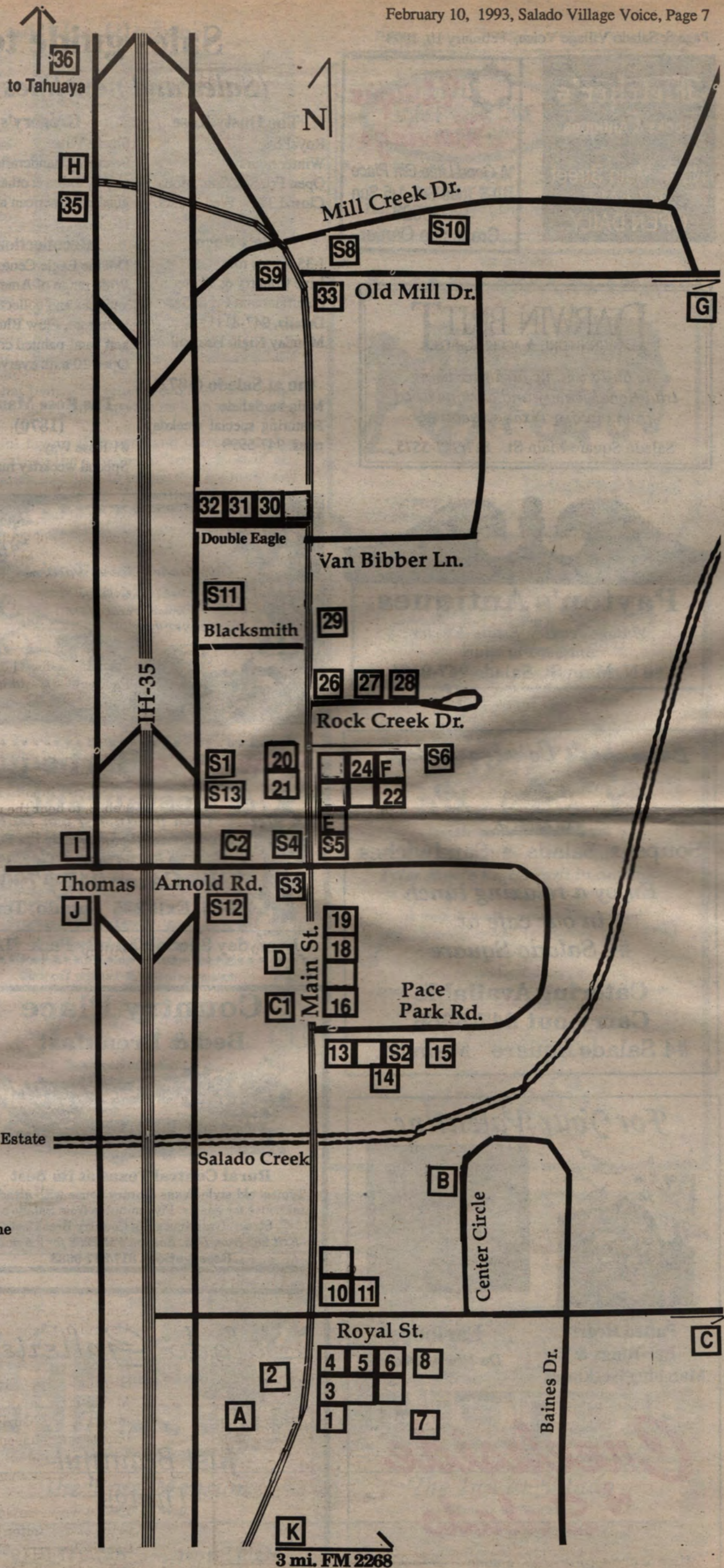

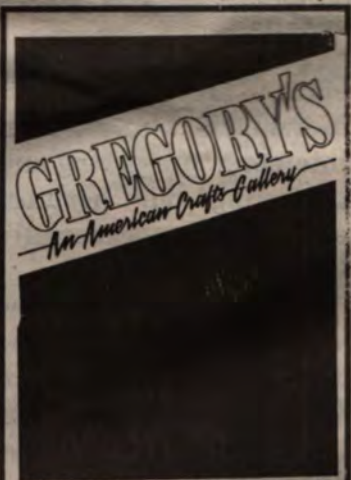

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## Clubs provide experience for novices

In general, Americans have more experience with spending money than investing it. If you're interested in learning the basics of investing without putting a great deal of money at risk, you may want to consider forming or joining an investment club.

Investment clubs provide a comfortable atmosphere for the investment-shy to allay their fears with other novices and take steps toward gaining financial know-how. The tone and scope of the club is really determined by the members. Some club meetings are informal talks over sandwiches. Other clubs meet with all the formality of a corporate board of directors. Whatever fits your style, there are basic guidelines that can help you set up an investment club and perhaps make your meetings productive.

The first step is to contact the national association of investors corporation (NAIC), which will provide a beginner's handbook and help your club set realistic goals. The club and each member will pay annual dues to the NAIC.

Next, begin a "library" to help

all members keep pace with financial trends. Although clubs can be a good learning experience, no one wants to learn by losing all the money they contributed. Your investments will need to be protected by sound research gathered by you or from an investment broker.

Many investment clubs that fail do so because impatient members try to "predict" the ups and downs on the stock market and thus try to trade the market. Successful clubs generally invest in quality companies with earnings and dividends exceeding the industry average, and hold those stocks for the long term.

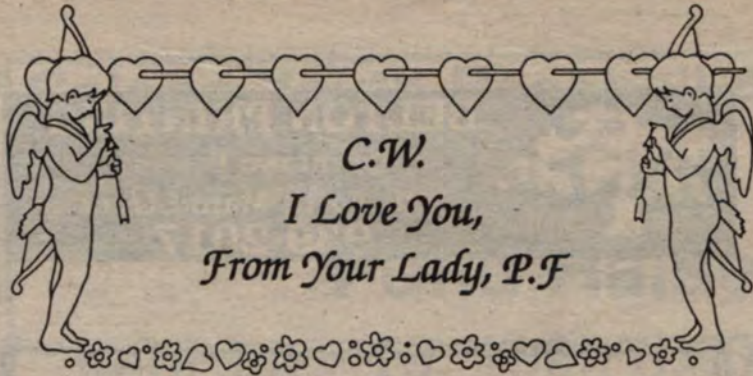
Next, make a pledge to reinvest the earnings on your investments. Compounding can provide a much more impressive return over time.

Finally, maintain realistic goals for your group. You're probably not going to make your fortune in an investment club. The NAIC estimated that the average individual portfolio earned \$1,009 in 1992. An investment club won't make you a millionaire, but it may afford some smaller rewards, such as financing a dream vacation or two, or simply increasing your investment knowledge.

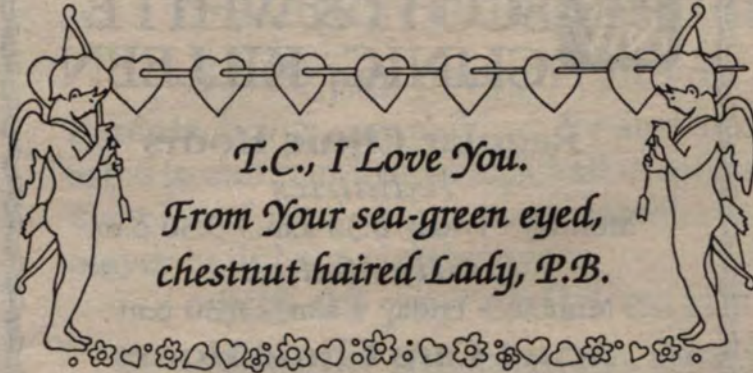
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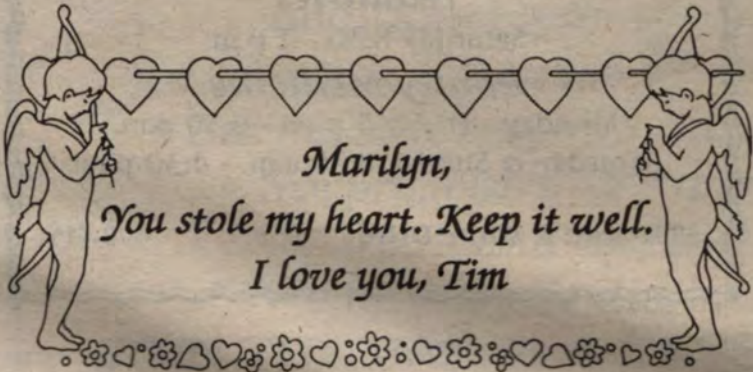
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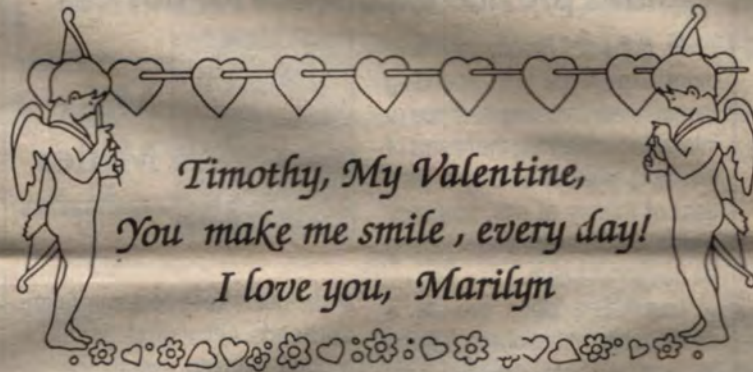

## First Hand: Signs of positive self-concept

Teachers need to determine the developmental status of the self concept of each individual in his/her classroom. Based on the informal observations teachers develop a framework in which to evaluate the progress and provide the support necessary for the healthy development of the child's self concept.

The following are some descriptions of behaviors that teachers can look for which reflect a positive development of the self concept:

1. Uses positive commu-

nications as reflected through verbal comments, listening skills, written expression and body language.

2. Does not purposefully hurt or abuse (physically or verbally) others.

3. Expresses, shares and accepts feelings freely and comfortably.

4. Describes and accepts self realistically regarding the present and the future.

5. Strives toward continuous betterment of self and others.

6. Identifies and utilizes the strengths of others to form beneficial team interrelationships.

7. Compares and weighs factors to make value decisions.

8. Respects values and opinions of others even though they may differ.

9. Moves on a continuum in the clarification of values.

10. Understands and accepts individual differences.

11. Develops mutually trusting relationships with others.

12. Expresses opinions even though they may be in the minority.

13. Does not resort to degrading or discriminatory remarks to establish a feeling of superiority.



Additional visits will be scheduled during the 1993 school year.



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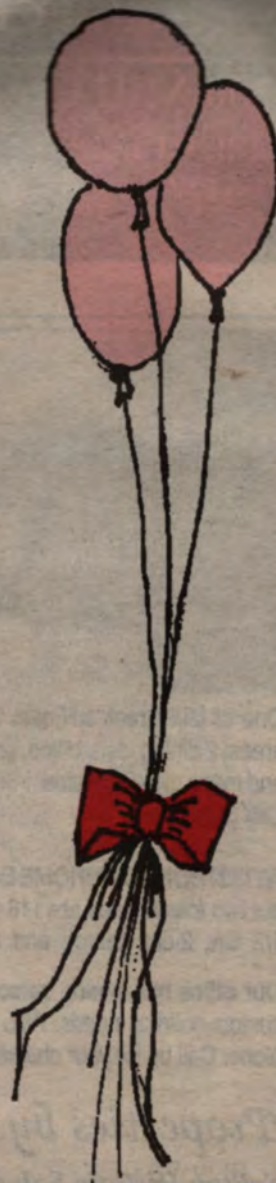
