

Democrat, Republican races head to run-offs

With only absentee and early voting reporting as of presstime, it is apparent that some local, statewide and federal races will be heading towards May primary run-offs.

With early votes coming in, Joe Biden and Bernie Sanders are neck and neck at about 26% each for the Democrat nomination statewide. Michael Bloomberg is in third place at about 3% of the votes.

Pres. Donald Trump has no real challenge in the Republican primary.

In the race for the Democratic nomination to the U.S. Senate seat occupied by Republican John Cornyn (who will comfortably win the

Republican nod), MJ Hegar is at the head of the pack, but does not have enough votes to forego a run-off. With 26% of the polling locations reporting statewide, Hegar has 24.88% of the vote with 124,549 votes followed by Cristina Tzintun Ramirez with 64,432 (12.87%) votes.

With 26% of the polling locations statewide reporting, Christine Eady Mann has a sizeable lead in the Democratic race for the nomination to run against Republican incumbent John Carter for U.S. House District 31. She has 11,622 votes, or 41.59%, followed by Donna Imam with 30.21% or 8,442 votes. Rep. Carter is on track to easily win the Republican nomination with about 85% of the vote.

Hegar and Ramirez and

Mann and Imam are heading to a May run-off in the Democrat primary.

On the Republican side, Bell County Sheriff Eddy Lange looks like he will win easily over challenger Fred Harris. With the early vote and absentee ballots reporting, Lange has 14,810 votes or 67%, compared to Harris' 7,034 or 32%.

In a statewide race that gained a great deal of attention, it looks as if incumbent Bert Richardson will stave off challenger Gina Parker for Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 3. Richardson has 52% of the vote while Parker has 47%.

The Eaglebots were part

Public hearing March 5 for variance for fence

Salado aldermen acting as the Zoning Board of Adjustments will hold a public hearing 6:30 p.m. March 5 at the Salado Municipal Building to consider a request for variance from the Zoning Ordinance, Section 5.3B2, which prohibits fences in the front yard of property zoned non-residential.

The applicant, Hauptstrasse Brewing Company, LLC, is proposing to build a seven-foot tall wooden privacy fence along the side property line and a portion of the rear property line of the property at 109 Royal Street property. A portion of the side property line fence is proposed to extend into the front yard of the property which is prohibited by Code.

While a privacy fence is allowed along a side property line of a non-residential property, Section 5.3(8)(2) of the Village of Salado Zoning Ordinance prohibits a fence from extending into the front

yard of the property. The applicant is seeking a variance from the Code requirement to allow for a front yard extension of the subject fence.

The site plan outlines 72 angled parking spaces on the property.

The following conditions must exist for a variance to approved: That there are special circumstances or conditions affecting the land involved such that the strict application of the provisions of this Ordinance would deprive the applicant of the reasonable use of the land; That the variance is necessary for the preservation and enjoyment of a substantial property right of the applicant; that the granting of the variance will not be detrimental to the public health, safety or welfare, or injurious to other property within the area; and that the granting of the variance will not have the effect of preventing the orderly use of other land within the area

in accordance with the provisions of this Ordinance.

The property, according to Bell County Appraisal District, is a 2.679 acre tract that includes a building that will house Rio Salado Cocina and Cantina.

All of the properties (including the Shady Villa Shopping Center and Peddler's Alley) at the southeast corner of Royal Street and Main Street were owned for many years by Stagecoach Properties. In 1998-99, Morris Foster bought Stagecoach Inn, including the retail properties there. The property was commonly used by Stagecoach Inn, Shady Villa, Peddler's Alley, Salado Museum and neighboring properties for parking.

In April 2018, Stagecoach Inn Properties sold the 2.679 acre tract to Salado DH Salado Holdings, LLC, which sold it to Hauptstrasse Brewing Company LLC in December 2019.

Sanctuary breaks ground on Phase 1

Village of Salado mayor Skip Blancett and aldermen Frank Coachman and John Cole joined developers of Sanctuary March 2 to break ground on Phase 1 of the development.

Phase 1 is a Residential Community. While the advertising sign for the development states that it will have 175 lots, the Construction Plat for the development available at saladotx.gov shows that there are 192 residential lots, 47 parkland spaces, five drainage lots and four Home Owners Association lots. The Construction Plat describes Phase 1 as being 67.73 acres, being a portion of a 178.0 acre tract owned by Billie Hanks.

The largest residential lot in Phase 1, according to the Construction Plat available online, is 0.452 acre. The smallest residential lot is 0.088 acre (1/12th acre). Of the residential lots listed on page 4 of the Construction Plat, 166 are 0.20 acre

or smaller in size. Of those lots, 31 are smaller than 1/8th acre.

Street widths will be between 20 feet, 50 feet or 60 feet (for Elderberry Dr., the main entrance into residential section).

Novak Construction is the project contractor.

Construction plans were presented to the Village in August 2019, at which time Village Administrator Don Ferguson told aldermen that "work can begin within 60 days of approval." Seven months later, ground has been broken.

At the time that Phase 1 was presented to aldermen, Ferguson told the board that Sanctuary developers told him that "plans for the mixed use commercial development are almost ready for submission."

Since then, no plans have for the other phases of Sanctuary have been brought before the Board of Aldermen.

Phase 1 residential could be built out in a two- to five-year period, Ferguson told aldermen in August.

When Sanctuary was first introduced to Saladoans in late 2014, it was pitched as a 15-year build-out program that will include 345,000

square feet of shops and restaurants, 65,000 sq. ft. of office space, 400 rooms of lodging, 350 units of apartments and 525 homes. The

development will include an entertainment district, with a 1,800-seat indoor music venue and an outdoor performance venue with 2,500

capacity outdoors. The live music facility will be approximately 20,000 sq. ft. and will be a showplace for The Sanctuary.



Coronavirus correction comes home to roost

First, the “bad” news. The Standard and Poor’s 500 Stock Index (SPX) dropped 11.49% for the week ending the month of February. That puts the SPX down 12.76% since its recent record high on February 19. As a short-term market decline of 10% or more is the classic definition of a “correction”, we have one. It also leaves the SPX down about 8.6% year-to-date. The good news is that first, the index has retained a gain of 5.37% for one year. A second point of good news is that the decline seems to have leveled off on Friday. As a matter of fact, if one charts the opening SPX value as the start point on Friday, the index rose about 2% by the end of the day. That is not to say the carnage is over, but an out-and-out panic is not currently happening. The other good news is that this market decline is a classic uncertainty “V” shaped correction. More on that below.

We’ve been saying for some time that the stock market was overdue for a correction and the economy for a recession and the correction chicken has come home to roost. Last year, S&P 500 earnings growth was essentially flat but the SPX rose nearly 29%. That is the classic sign of the end of a bull market as the stock market ignores reality and surges to record highs. When it “corrects” to account for reality we get, logically, a correction.

The ten-year U.S. Treasury note ended the week yielding 1.168%, as far as we can tell, a record low yield. That record cements into place a severely invert-

ed yield curve. The bond market sees a recession this year as a clear threat and so do we. West Texas Intermediate oil (WTI) was in full agreement with the bond and stock market and closed around \$45.35, down over 15% for the week and about 26% year-to-date.

The Economy

The stock market is not the economy, but it is one of the leading economic indicators. Last week we reported that the U.S. Purchasing Manager’s Output Index (PMI) composite turned negative in January. That signaled at least a temporary contraction in business activity across both the manufacturing and services side of our economy. It also signaled an expansion that likely was running low on potential future growth. There was no specific issue other than at some point consumers can no longer raise their spending without suffering pain. Once an economy hits a plateau, as ours experienced all last year, at some point an unexpected shock will come along triggering a temporary pullback. The unexpected shock historically has been something that injects a significant level of uncertainty into the carefully figured calculations as to what the stocks in the market will generate in future earnings. The COVID-19 coronavirus is that unex-

pected shock, commonly known on Wall Street as a “black swan.”

If the infections were limited to China, the most likely outcome would be a stagnant first half of the year followed by a rebound in the second half. COVID-19 is highly contagious and can easily be spread by people who have no idea they are infected. This correction started when traders concluded there will likely be widespread infection in the U.S. When that happened in China, its services sector effectively shut down. Manufacturing there, like here, was already in a slump, at least partly from the trade war, but as people did not show up for work, it ground to a near halt. Our economic growth over the last six months was solely from consumer activity in the services sector. If a coronavirus panic hits the U.S., we will likely do as the Chinese did and stop gathering at restaurants, movies, or anywhere else. That will put the services sector into a recession and the whole economy will follow suit. That’s the bad news.

The good news is that viral epidemics do not last forever. This one has already peaked in China with new cases each day dropping. It probably took three months for it to peak and may take another three months to decline to the point that normal life and economic activity can return to normal. Once that occurs, the economic rebound will probably be quite substantial.

If the virus gets loose in the United States, there will very likely be a recession. That downturn will reveal that there are more than a few companies that are only profitable in good times and will fail. We need that to happen from time to time lest the number of “zombie companies” build up to the point that when they do fail, they cause a major economic contraction. In short, going too long without a recession is dangerous. As the epidemic fades away, probably by or before the end of the year, the economic rebound is likely to be dramatic and will mark the beginning of a new bull market.

Another point is worth mentioning here. Epidemic-caused market declines and recessions then to be “V” shaped with a rapid decline and an enthusiastic and rapid recovery. The recession we had in 2008-2009 was a “financial” recession. Those tend to be “L” shaped with a lengthy and slow recovery. The key for investors is to know that guessing when to bail out to miss the downside and when to jump in to catch the upside is a losers game. To the best of our knowledge, no one has been able to consistently get that right and a lot of money has been lost trying.

Peggy professed her love for the Lord and was baptized at age 13. She attended schools in Friona for 12 years. In high school, she played basketball, acted as a drum major for 3 years, and played the timpani. After graduating from Friona High School in 1949, she attended West Texas State University.

Lady Eagles fall to Fredericksburg in 4A Region IV basketball finals



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Salado Lady Eagles were able to go step-for-step with the Fredericksburg Lady Billies through three quarters of their Region IV Final, but the swarming, taunting defense of the Billies led to turnovers and trips to the free throw line as they won 53-40 on Feb. 29.

In the first half, both defenses kept the offenses on the exteriors as neither could find a path to easy shots. Salado trailed 7-6 at the end of the first and held a paper-thin lead of 15-14 at the half.

Fredericksburg's defense began to wear down Salado in the third as the Billies outscored Salado 16-11 to hold a 30-26 lead. The Billies went to the free throw line six times and hit 9-of-11 shots in the third quarter.

Fredericksburg guard Ella Hartman was perfect at

the line, hitting 11 shots on her way to lead both teams with 23 points. Salado held her to just 2 points in the entire first half.

Salado did not have an answer to Hartman or the Billies in the fourth quarter as she scored 12 points to lead Fredericksburg's 23-point fourth quarter effort. Fredericksburg went to the free throw line six times in the fourth quarter as well, where they were again 9-of-11.

Salado had 10 total trips to the free throw line. The Lady Eagles were 14-of-19 at the free throw line.

Priscilla Torczynski led the Lady Eagles as they tried to overcome the Billies' leadlate in the game, scoring 5 of her 7 points in the fourth quarter.

Opening lead — ace of hearts.

The outcome of many deals is for the most part predictable, but in some cases one side or the other achieves a better result than would normally be expected.

For example, take this deal where South gets to six clubs on the sequence shown. It is true that six notrump with South as declarer is a much better contract; indeed, it can't be defeated

regardless of how the East-West cards are divided.

But theory and practice are two different things, and South wound up playing the hand at the practical contract of six clubs instead of the theoretically best contract of six notrump.

The slam would have gone down one but for an unusual play by declarer. West led the ace of hearts and would surely have led another heart had South followed suit with the four.

But declarer, concluding that West would lead another heart if he played his four on the ace, played the king instead! This made it difficult for West to continue with either the queen or a low heart, and, rightly or not, he switched to the jack of diamonds at trick two.

Declarer's brilliant falsecard thus enabled him to make the slam. Perhaps West should have led a second heart, but it was understandably difficult for him to assume that South had dropped the king, a winner, on the ace, instead of the four, a loser.

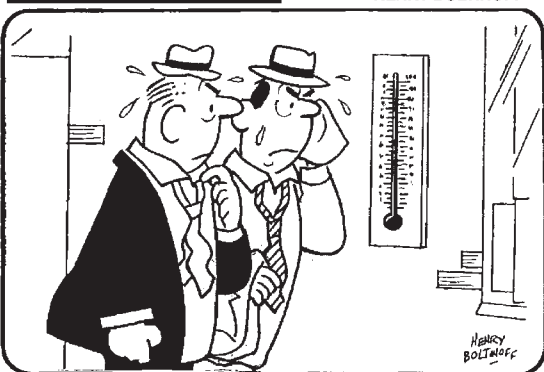
South could not have felt certain that his king play at trick one was correct. West's four-heart bid might have been based on six hearts rather than seven, and in that case the falsecard could have proved fatal. But South backed his judgment that West had a seven-card suit and was handsomely rewarded for his imaginative play.

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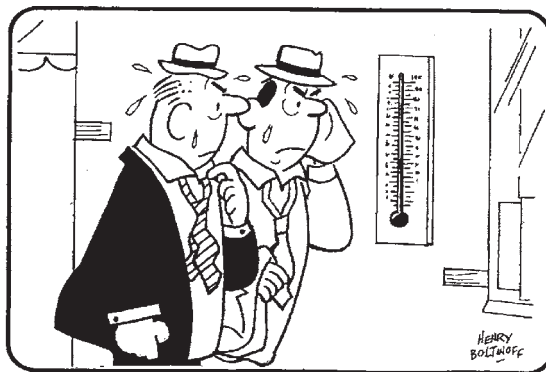
