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Churches, groups cancel gatherings

As Bell County health officials recommend that citizens avoid gatherings of 50 people or more and practice social distancing, several local events have been canceled or postponed.

Bell County health officials have announced that Bell County has entered into Stage 2 of its Coronavirus Plan, because of a presumptive case of the virus in the County. Two presumptive cases have been identified at this time.

Stage 2 of the Plan includes all of the suggestions in Stage 1 below and additional suggestions on steps to take to prevent the possible spread of the virus.

Stage 1 Steps

- Stay home if you are sick.
- Avoid contact with persons who are sick
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unclean hands
- Cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue and throw the tissue away
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces with a disinfectant
- Don't travel to areas with active community spread of COVID19
- Wash your hands with soap and water regularly and use hand sanitizers with at least 60% of alcohol content when soap and water are not available

Stage 2 (a confirmed case of COVID19) Steps

- All of Stage 1 measures
- Actively practice 'social distancing' ... whenever possible maintain 6 feet distance from other persons
- Avoid physical contact with other persons in social and workplace settings

Salado Public Library canceled all events for the remainder of March.

The Tri-Region Packard Gathering in Salado in April was canceled by organizers.

The Bluebonnet evening planned for this month at Salado Museum has been canceled.

The Salado Area Republican Women Fine China Luncheon has been canceled.

Several local churches have canceled or changed services.

First Baptist Church of Salado announces the canceling of the following events: Women's Conference - March 27-28, Tabernacle Exercise, Salado Community Chorus Spring Concert - April 28

Other Baptist Church activities will not meet in person until they are cleared by state protocols: Wednesday Night Adult Bible Study, Wednesday Night Fellow-

ship Meals, Midweek Youth Activities, Kids Kingdom and Bible Drill, Music Rehearsals - Handbell Choir, Worship Choir, E4 Worship Band and Sunday school and Sunday church services.

Previous sermons can be viewed online.

Salado United Methodist Church has canceled all in-person worship services, meetings and events through April 5. Worship is available on Sundays online at saladoumc.org.

The Wild Game Dinner planned for later in March has been postponed and the Salado UMC Easter Egg hunt has been canceled.

Salado Church of Christ will cancel all in-person meetings and services until restrictions have been waived concerning coronavirus. Messages from Pastor Joe Keyes will be broadcast via Youtube and other online social media.

Presbyterian Church of Salado announced that all functions of the church have been canceled until the church receives word from local health organizations that it is safe to return to normal activities.

Saint Joseph Episcopal Church will not have services this week and will address the situation going further based on advice from the Diocese as well as local health authorities.

Cedar Valley Baptist Church will cancel its services until recommendations on groups changes. This will also affect the Fourth Friday Gospel Singing for March.

3C Cowboy Fellowship church elders will meet after presstime, so no firm decision has been made regarding services. If the church elders decide to cancel inperson services, sermons will be broadcast through the Church Facebook page. Salado Village Voice will update this story online as well.

Grace Church of Salado has canceled services for the time being. Small groups are still meeting. The Men's Retreat planned for April has been postponed to a later date, to be announced.

Heritage Church reported that they will continue with services as usual for the time being.

Village Church of Salado reports that they are canceling services until health officials announce recommendations that groups can meet in larger numbers.

The Easter morning community sunrise service at Tablerock has been canceled.

Most Reverend Joe S. Vasquez, Bishop of the Catholic Diocese of Austin, announced on March 17 that "Out of pastoral concern for the people of central Texas, I am suspending all public Masses and liturgies throughout the diocese, effective immediately.

Salado ISD Superintendent Michael Novotny announced March 13 that Spring Break would be extended until March 23.

He told *Salado Village Voice* that the District will make a decision on March 19 about whether schools

will remain closed.

The closure also applies to all after-school care, extended day programs, field trips, extra-curricular and district-sponsored events, including our high school prom.

"This was not an easy de-

cision to make due to the potential impact it will have on our families, but the safety of our students and our staff is our highest priority. Further, this helps protect our greater community, which includes those that are most vulnerable to the virus," he added. Salado ISD has made this decision in conjunction with other local entities and with direction from the Bell County and State Health Departments. Salado ISD will continue to consult with lo-

Jon Williams, who moved from Salado to Germany to take a position as Operations Chief for Communications Electronics Command (CECOM) Europe has been quarantined since late March

He attended the Defender Europe planning conference (NATO) the first week of March in Budapest.

On March 13, he was notified that an Army officer attending the same conference who sat near him had tested positive earlier that day for COVID-19 Coronavirus.

Williams will remain quarantined in his house for 14 days. He reports to *Salado Village Voice* that he has plenty of groceries to last through the quarantine.

He also says that he has

no signs of any illness.

Like most government employees in Europe, Williams is on telework status.

While in quarantine, Williams is reading a series of legal novels by John Ellsworth. He has watched half of The New Pope season on HBO and watched Won't You Be My Neighbor, which stars Tom Hanks, who announced last week that he tested positive for Coronavirus

He admits that he brought home some Polinka from Budapest and has been enjoying it (on occasion) while in quarantine.

He had planned a trip back to Salado in April, but that has been postponed to

Local couple quarantined in CA

"We've been busy as cranberry merchants," Janice Means told me this week. She and her husband Vic have been in quarantine at Marine Corps Air Station

The Means were on the Princess Cruise ship that had 21 cases of coronavirus on it after 45 people were tested on board the ship.

At the time I spoke to them via Facetime on March 17, the couple were awaiting the results of their own tests. They had been tested the day before and were expecting results by no later than March 18.

So far, the two have shown no symptoms of the virus. They have their temperatures taken daily. Meals are delivered to the room in the lodging building on the base three times a day.

"We have to put on our masks in order to answer the door," Janice said.

The couple boarded the Princess Cruise ship on Feb. 22 for a 15-day round trip cruise from San Francisco that stopped at all of the Hawaiian islands.

It was on the return that the virus was detected on the ship. The Means were quarantined with all the other passengers and crew members for five days on the ship until they were moved to their present location for a 14-day quarantine.

"We have gotten to know each other better in the past couple of weeks than in 10 years of marriage," Vic joked.

Two black swans and a bear drag down markets by 20+%

In markets and in the economy a totally unexpected negative event that moves markets is referred to as a "black swan." Having one is unusual but tends to happen about once a decade. In the last two weeks we had two. The obvious first black swan was the advent of COVID-19, aka "the coronavirus." The second was Saudi Arabia's switch from often being the only adult in OPEC and friends, reliably stabilizing the oil markets for the last four decades or so, to suddenly being the instigator of what may be the most destabilizing price war in the history of petroleum. The result of two black swans was a bear market. Bear markets are defined as a relatively sudden decline in the value of the S&P 500 by 20% or more. This bear market appears to be quite a lot different from the bear of 2008-2009 or even that of 2000-2002. This one is

heavily front-loaded and so far, does not seem to be a result of a structural deficiency in our economy, instead it is exogenic, meaning it came from the outside. Exogenic bears tend to be front loaded, relatively short, and "V" shaped, rather than the "L" shape of bears that resulted from structural excesses inside our economy.

The Markets

The S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) topped out at 3,386.15 back on February 19, hit a presumptive bottom of 2,480.64 on March 12, for a total drop of 905.51 points, or 26.7% but then came roaring back on Friday the 13th, rising 9.36% to close at 2711.02, down 19.93% from its recent alltime high, and down 8.79% for the week. There is no way of telling at this point which way the SPX will go from here, so this may be a temporary reprieve or the shortest bear market on record. Our gut reaction is that this event is not over but if we could tell you the future you couldn't afford to ask! The key here is to recognize that this bear market was caused by two very temporary if severe events. More on that below.

The U.S. Treasury 10year note, the benchmark for bonds in general was the real shocker. The yield on the 10-yr. note closed at 0.569% on March 9 and despite the still-plunging stock market, for the next three days, the yield rose,

and then rose again with the stock market surge on Friday. That means, beginning on Tuesday, March 10, the value of bonds fell substantially, even as the stock market declined! The spot price of gold, the mythical "safe haven" peaked on March 5, at \$1,675 and then preceded to fall to \$1,532 by Friday the 13th, down 8.62% for the week. The behavior of bonds and gold may seem irrational if you believe in safe havens, but what appears to have happened was that people and businesses suddenly found themselves faced with a cash-crunch and sold both Treasury bonds and gold to raise cash. We saw the same behavior in 2009. Things just "ain't" what they used to be, and probably never were.

The real market shocker was the price of oil. West Texas Intermediate (WTI) closed at \$32.97, down 21%

for the week. The WTI price per barrel has now declined over 46% since the beginning of the year. The Saudis are opening their spigots, leasing super tankers, and flooding the market with cheap oil. Their stated target is the Russians, but the back blast is likely to sink a lot of shale drillers in the U.S.

The Economy

The American and world economies are faced with three major challenges. First, the COVID-19 coronavirus is the real thing. The best historical model we have for it is the 1918 "Spanish" flu epidemic. COVID-19 is a "novel" virus, meaning that no one has any immunity to it. It is very contagious and in a best-case scenario has about a 1% death rate. That may not sound like much but if only 40% (a low estimate) of Americans get it, we may

see 1,300,000 deaths in the next six months or so. As a point of reference, influenza kills between 12,000 and 61,000 people per year. In a worst-case scenario where we all get sick at about the same time and overwhelm the hospitals, four to five times that number could die. Get ready to see restaurants, movie theaters, malls, convention centers, big box stores and anywhere else people congregate suddenly become empty money-losers. The light at the end of the tunnel is that in 1918 the worst was over in about six months. In that pandemic, another wave hit a year later in 1919, but we are confident that a year from now we will have an effective vaccine and nearly universal immunity. The key for the present is to slow the spread so we all don't get sick at the same time.



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

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Woke-era pandemic

The coronavirus outbreak is the first pandemic of the woke era, and as such it's not surprising that there is a fierce debate over how to refer to it without offending against social justice.

Republican Rep. Paul Gosar of Arizona lost whatever sympathy he would have garnered in certain quarters over his self-quarantine when he referred to "the Wuhan virus," a perfectly appropriate name that has been deemed grotesque and unacceptable.

Wuhan is in China, a



non-Western country, and people of color live there, so Q.E.D., calling the virus by the name of that city must

Luminaries across the left denounced Gosar. They even accused him of bringing what is technically the SARS-CoV-2 virus to our shores by misnaming it. Democratic Rep. Ted Lieu of California slammed the Republican's reference to the Wuhan virus as "an example of the myopia that allowed it to spread in the U.S. The virus is not constrained by country or race."

Nonetheless, the virus first became known in Wuhan, and the locked-down city has remained the epicenter of the Chinese epidemic ever since. As of mid-February, the Wuhan area accounted for 86% of all cases in China.

Naming a virus after the location of the outbreak that first brought it to attention is not unusual.

The West Nile virus emerged in the West Nile district of Northern Uganda in the 1930s. It is similar to the St. Louis encephalitis virus, which broke out around St. Louis, Missouri, in 1933, and the Japanese encephalitis virus that began in the 1870s.

Coxsackie in New York state, Marburg in Germany and Hendra in Australia all have viruses named after them. MERS, caused by a virus first identified in 2012, stands for Middle East respiratory syndrome, or even more offensively,

No one had a fainting fit over any of this, but we live in a more sensitive, and ab-

surd, time. The WHO issued guidelines a couple of years ago warning against naming diseases after geographic locations, or animals (swine flu, bird flu, monkey pox) or membership organizations or occupations (Legionnaires' disease). With regard to the latest outbreak, the WHO has warned that "certain words and language may have a negative meaning for people and fuel stigmatizing attitudes."

There is no doubt that a raging virus that got its start in China, has shut down all of Italy, and caused disruption and fear around the world may create negative associations around China. This would happen, though, regardless of the name.

Such international contention over the name of a virus or disease isn't new. Syphilis was the Neapolitan disease, the French disease or the Polish disease, depending on who was naming it. The 1918 influenza came to be known as "the Spanish flu," although Spaniards called it "the French flu."

There was no good reason for naming the flu after the Spanish, though. The case of China is different. Its government tried to suppress warnings about the new coronavirus and looked the other way, giving it the room to become a national

and then a global crisis. It deserves to be connected to the virus it did more than its share to loose on the world, no matter what its foreign ministry or the sensitivity police say. Rich Lowry is editor of the National Review.

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
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
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University of Mary Hardin-Baylor has extended Spring Break through March





The Lady Eagles had six hits on the night. Oborski









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UIL suspends all activities to March 29

To support the health and safety of students and communities, the University Interscholastic League (UIL) is suspending all UIL-sanctioned contests, rehearsals, practices and workouts due to the outbreak of COV-ID-19 (Coronavirus) in Texas. Effective March 16, all UIL interscholastic activities are suspended through March 29.

According to the UIL website, during school closures, schools shall not con-

duct practices or use school facilities or equipment. School practices include open gyms, open facilities, and open weight rooms. All athletic facilities should remain closed for both nonschool and school activities.

If school is in session, then normal use of the inschool athletic period is allowed, not to exceed 60 minutes when classes meet every day (300 minutes per week for block schedules). Schools in session shall not

conduct after school practices or use school facilities or equipment.

Soccer Bi-District playoffs have been rescheduled for April 14, according to UIL. Area will be played April 18 and Regional Quarterfinals

District Academic Meets, originally scheduled March 23-28, may now be held March 30-April 11. This includes speaking events. Entry deadlines may be adjusted as needed. We ask

that schools and local District Executive Committees work collaboratively and reasonably with one another in rescheduling district competitions.

One-Act Play District/ Bi-District certification deadline, originally scheduled March 26, has been extended to April 7. One-Act Play Area certification deadline, originally scheduled for April 4, has been extended to April 14. Sunday contests will be allowed.

Academic Regional Meets are still scheduled for April 17-18 and One-Act Play Regional dates remain April 15-18. Current sites are subject to change.

"We are urging our member schools and their communities to stay vigilant and take every possible precaution to remain safe and healthy," said UIL Executive Director Dr. Charles Breithaupt. "We understand there is a lot of uncertainty during this unprecedented

time. Please know UIL leadership is working diligently to adjust to this rapidly evolving situation and will share updates as soon as possible."

As this is a fluid situation, the UIL will continue to follow the direction of state and local officials to monitor this situation and will make additional announcements as needed.

Salado Village Voice will announce schedule changes online as they happen.
