Friends Day April 25 at Church of Christ

This Sunday, April 25, is a special day in the life of the Salado Church of Christ. It has been designated as "Friend's Day" by members of the congregation and as such is given over to a program designed for the friends and neighbors of the members. "The purpose is to better acquaint others with the good news of the Gospel of Jesus Christ and to meet all of the members of the local Church of Christ," noted Dempsey Stripling, minister of the Salado Church of Christ.

Continuing, he noted; "We annually select a day to ask our friends to take part in a special service starting at 10 a.m. This is followed by a short song service and then a meal in our fellowship hall. A short devotional following lunch will conclude the day's activities."

The Salado Church of Christ celebrated its 134th year in the village this past month, making it one of the oldest congregations in the State. The first service was held in a brush arbor on the north bank of Salado creek near Main Street by 36 members of the Darrs Creek congregation. That area is today the site of the present Baptist Church building.

Minister Stripling further noted: "Following a sermon especially prepared for our guests we will have time to visit and enjoy an old fashioned fellowship period complete with an excellent luncheon. It is our hope and prayer that many of our friends here in Salado and the surrounding area will come and be with us on this tradition-rich special day in the life of our congregation."

With big names like Hoffman, Davis and Garcia, **Hero** should be a blockbuster movie.

But it's not.

Hero is a cynical, sarcastic comedy much like *Bonfire of the Vanities*, in which the frailties and peculiarities of our society are exaggerated.

Hoffman stars as Bernie LaPlante, a two-bit hoodlum who looks out only for himself, until a plane crash makes him a hero, saving the lives of dozens of people. Yet, he goes unknown for this deed.

One of the lives he saves is TV "journalist" Gale Gayley (Davis), who seeks her savior. Her savior appears as handsome, yet homeless John Bubber (Garcia), who has the missing shoe and details of the crash.

Society quickly makes Bubber a Hero, complete with Bubber dolls, a million-dollar reward and a made-for-TV movie.

The final outcome is sweetly predictable, yet **Hero** offers many chuckles along the way, most of them coming from Hoffman's portrayal of the shiftless LaPlante. **Hero** is good for a few laughs, but not much more than that.

Despite the fact that elected politicians rank lower, in public esteem, than telephone sales pitchperson, ambulance chasers, tax collectors, money swindlers and the Mafia, there is never a dearth of candidates when it comes time to fill public offices. Case in point - the 24 worthies who have tossed their hats and bonnets in the ring for the May 1, special election to fill the U.S. Senate seat vacated by Lloyd Bentsen.

Bentsen, you will recall, dropped out to take over the federal treasury in the Clinton cabinet. Immediately after that, Governor Richards appointed Railroad Commissioner Bob Krueger, a Democrat, as interim Senator and then proceeded to knock out other leading Demos who were interested in the job while lining up support for her choice among the block-voting groups in Texas.

Notwithstanding this power play by the Guv, some 23 others signed up by the deadline and with a field of two dozen the papers and airways are becoming saturated with the heavy ads that bore most of us to tears and four letter

words.

There are ten Republicans, five Democrats, six Independents, one Socialist, one "Peoples Party" person and one Libertarian in the mob seeking votes. All paid four-grand filing fees and are now flaying about the State either in person or on TV trying to drum up name identification and a free pass to the sinecure of the senate.

One of the more humorous aspects of the race is the tone being set, by Joe Barton and Jack Fields. These two are unashamedly castigating Congress in no uncertain terms - both wanting to be sent to Washington to "teach" the lawmakers a thing or two. Why humorous? Because both of them are current members of Congress! Fields - the two-bit worker from earlier days is the Congressman from Humble, Texas, and Barton who hails from Ennis, represents District Six in the House of Representative! Both the facts

that these two are members of Congress and also Republicans are noticeably absent from their commercials. Hard to attack yourself while running for office and always better to say "conservative" than GOP since the moderate Demo vote is crucial for success.

Prediction? Sure, why not? It looks right now as if there will be a runoff between temporary incumbent Krueger and current Texas State treasurer Kay Bailey Hutchison who is a Republican. This will give voters a chance to vote along party lines as well as giving both Governor Richards and President Clinton a brief look at their Texas approval ratings since both support Democrat Krueger.

And who will win? Probably Krueger, who will have the incumbency edge, the Demo political power base, if it becomes active, and a war chest that probably will outspend the other 23 hopefuls including Hutchison.

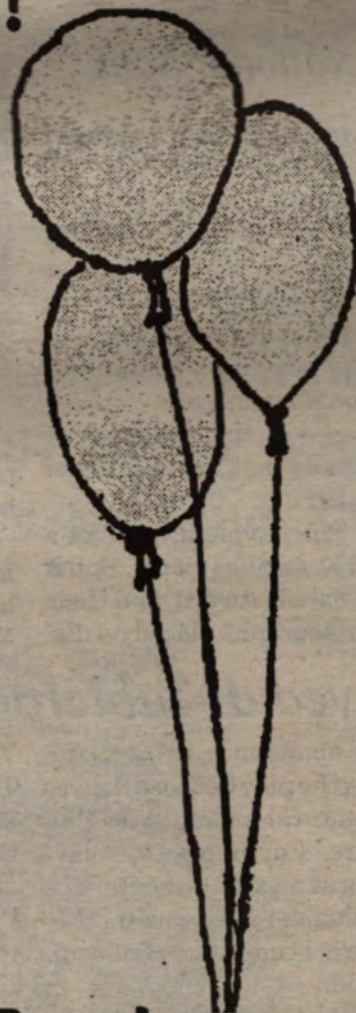

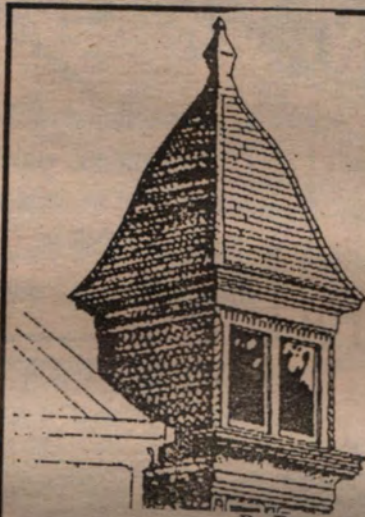

Women take control of their financial futures

Salado golf teams take District

Both the Salado boys and girls golf teams took home District 26AA Championships last week.

The Salado boys golf team won the 26AA District Championship by 31 April 5 at Sammons Park in Temple. The team score was 336; Liberty Hill was second with a team score of 367, Thorndale was third with a score of 378.

Salado boys also won all three individual medalist honors with Danny Light, first place medalist with a score of 79; Monte Sands was second place medalist with a score of 80 and Mark Thompson was third place medalist, scoring 81. Cortney Renfro was the fourth man and Zack Sands fifth man on the Salado team. Justin Hodge, Rudy Kelley and Tony Mashburn also competed for Salado.

The boys will compete at the Regional Tournament in San Marcos April 26-27 at Quail Creek Country Club.

"This is the fifth straight year Salado boys have won the district championship," said Coach Tommy Hood. "If we score as we should, we have a good chance to advance to the State Tournament."

The Salado girls golf team won the District 26-AA Championship at Sammons Park in Temple April 5 by 16 strokes. The team score was 459, followed by Liberty Hill with 475.

Salado girls finished first and second. Kelli Hood was the district first place medalist with a score of 106, followed by Marie Grigsby with a score of 111 for second place medalist.

Bertha Berumen, Nora Nelson and Michelle Martinez make the rest of the girls team.

The girls will play at the Regional Tournament in San Marcos April 26-27 at Aquarena Springs Golf Course.

"This is the first girls team since 1987, with one senior and four freshmen," said Coach Tommy Hood. "I feel the girls program is beginning to develop and hope to have a total program like Salado had a few years ago."

Salado High School Drill/Dance Team will be hosting their annual talent show the "Spring Review April 24.

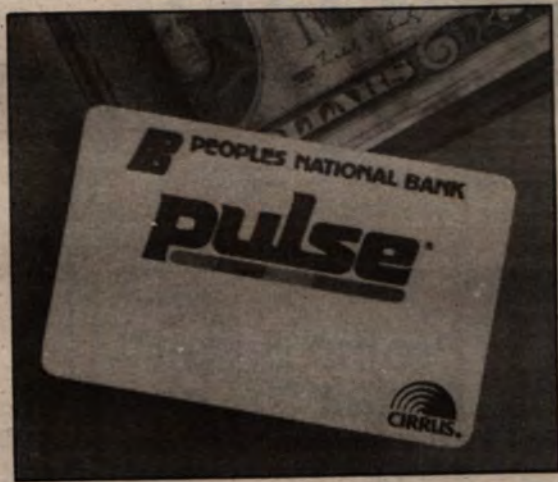

All attempts to help were failing, including returning it to a brush pile. My daughter was crushed. The whole family in the car, we drove to the vet clinic. We watched as Dr. Kendall tended a very sick cow, then treated a horse with a terrible cut on his foot. The expert handling of the injured and frightened large farm animals was amazing enough, but the gentle handling of the little cottontail and the gracious concern for both

the rabbit's injuries and my daughter's feelings was more than gratifying. I saw that all life, human and otherwise, was given the highest respect by this true gentleman.

On behalf of my entire family, and especially Camille, I wish to gratefully acknowledge this kindness that some may consider trivial, but meant a great deal to us. Our community is fortunate to have people like Jon Kendall in business here.

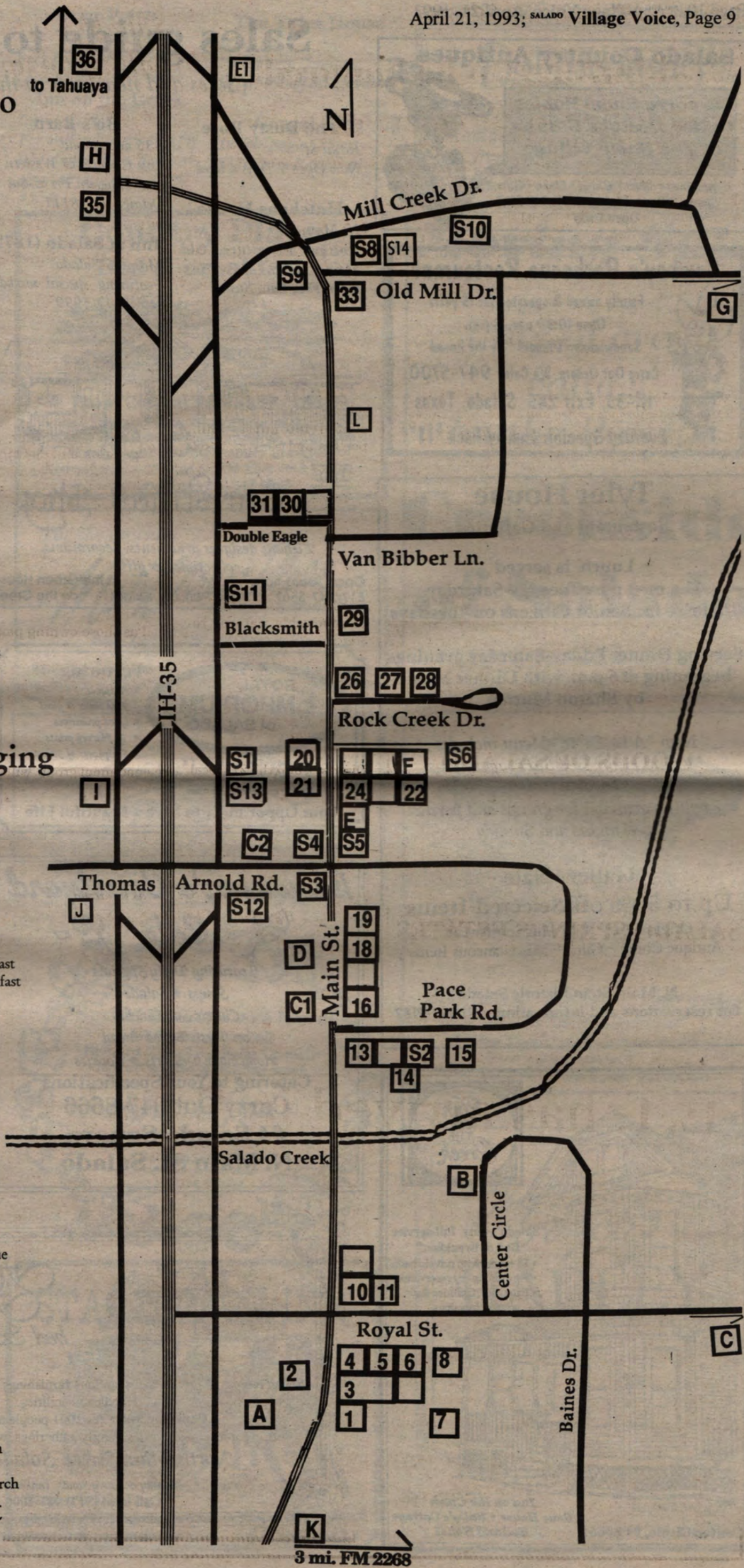

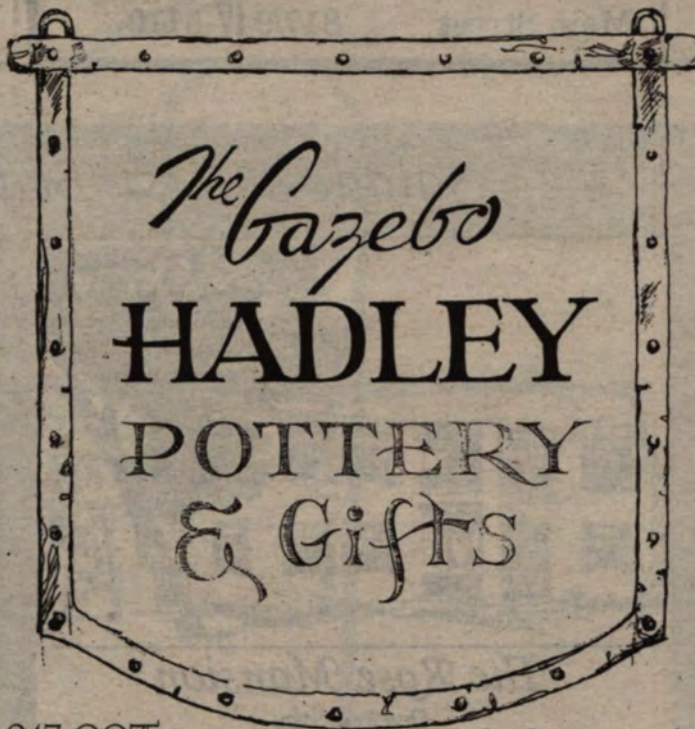



Southwestern summer stage set

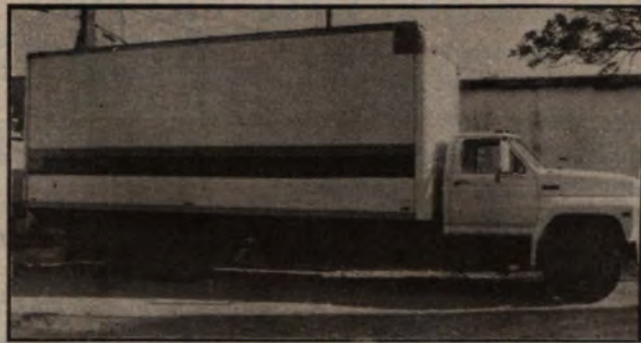
of-mouth about the play spreads and the reviews turnout favorably. How the brow-beaten playwright gets even with his temperamental associates is the pivot point of the play.

Teens should get message of AIDS

It is a crisis that is already upon us.

Sadly, teenagers are one of the fastest growing age groups for new AIDS cases.

The toll has been proportionately greater in the African American community, adding to the urgency for black teens to learn to decrease their risk of becoming infected with HIV, the virus that causes AIDS.

Startling data based on a Baylor College of Medicine study dramatizes this urgent need.

In a study following 565 females ages 12 to 20, the majority of black teens showed a greater fear of contracting AIDS than their Hispanic or white counterparts. They also felt they were more likely to be the kind of person to get AIDS than Hispanics or whites.

The Baylor study further revealed that black teens have higher rates of sexually transmitted diseases, and that approximately 20 percent of AIDS patients

are in their 20s. This suggests that they acquired HIV as teenagers, since HIV typically has an incubation period of several years.

Other studies have shown that seven out of every 10 females and eight out of every 10 males in the United States have sexual intercourse by age 20. A Center for Disease Control survey says 21 percent of high school students report they had sex with four or more partners, making the chances of contracting HIV great.

People are infected with the HIV virus through contact with infected body fluids or tissue. Most commonly, the infection is acquired through unprotected sex or by use of a contaminated needle when abusing intravenous drugs.

Effective strategies must be developed to instill responsible behavior in elementary school-aged children to ensure that they make responsible decisions and choices as adolescents.

When teens are confronted by their peers, they should keep in mind the following:

- * Look at all the reasons to say "Yes" or "No."

- * Consider the consequences.

- * Make your own decision.

- * Use common sense to avoid situations where you have to say no, such as spending time with people who participate in unhealthy behaviors (like using drugs), or being alone with someone you cannot trust.

- * Say what you mean. Say "No" quickly, directly, firmly and clearly.

- * Do not apologize for protecting yourself.

Straight-forward, factual information about HIV and AIDS must be provided to middle school-aged children so that decisions made by them are informed ones. Scare tactics with exaggerated or non-factual information is ineffective at best and counterproductive at worst.

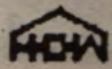
