Salado Art Fair Aug. 7-8

Artists to show in many media, including clothing, metalart, pottery

The Aug. 7-8, Salado Art Fair to be held in Pace Park promises to bring highly specialized art, clothing, jewelry, and crafts in many mediums.

Ginny Welch, owner and manager of Littlefield Gallery in Austin will be in Salado featuring clothing that begins as white silk, a basic sketch and the selection of color.

Choosing from a variety of silk weaves; habotai, crepe, raw silk, boucle, and occasionally using a special fabric like silk corduroy the idea begins to take form. After stretching two or three yards of fabric on a frame, she then applies colorfast porcion dyes to the silk using brushes. For additive color she uses an ancient batik technique and for a full color spectrum a modern direct dye method

is used. The dye is then set with steam heat. Later the silk fabric is washed and pressed.

Next she cuts out and sews each garment, quilt or interior piece to design specifications. The result is a one of a kind handpainted work of art. Check out Ginny Welch's booth that will contain this refined wearable art.

Not to be worn, but to be used is the pottery by Bear Essentials of Three Acre Woods Pottery which began with Frank Bird. The trademark of Bird's pottery is small sculptural animals, particularly bears, integrated into functional stoneware pottery.

Working with his wife Suzy, they have worked to achieve a high grade of excellence in the making of the pots themselves, so that

they could stand alone even without the sculptural additions.

Each bear that is added for adornment is hand-made, one at a time taking

thirty steps to completion. Other whimsical pieces are also created.

The Bird's and their pottery was recently included in a book entitled, Teddy

Bear Artists, by Carol-Lynn Rossel Waugh.

Some newly added pieces include napkin holders, toilet paper holders, letter

Salado free shot clinic set Aug. 11 at cafeteria

The Salado Independent School District in cooperation with the Texas Department of Health will sponsor a free shot clinic at Salado Elementary School from 1:00p.m. - 6:00p.m. on August 11.

Measles, the most contagious of all childhood diseases, has re-emerged it-

self at an alarming rate here in Texas. The 3,300 cases diagnosed in 1989, and another 4,000 cases in 1990 were among the highest in the nation. Half the cases were in children under the age of five. Preliminary data for 1992 indicates Texas had more than half of the measles cases in the

nation. Complications from measles can lead to blindness and even death.

With at least one childhood disease on the rise, a new state law will try to ensure that all Texas children, especially pre-school age children receive the immunizations they so desperately need to pro-

tect themselves from potentially dangerous or disabling diseases.

A new "no - excuses" law, effective September 1, 1993, will require all hospitals and physicians to immunize individuals under age eighteen, who are not current on vaccinations, unless there were religious

objections.

Texas law requires that all children under eighteen must have a parent or guardian present to be vaccinated at the free shot clinic.

Controlled burns can cause damage

Bell County Fire Departments have responded to 110 controlled burn-related fires in the County since October 1, 1992. Of that number, 53 burns have resulted in damages to property or grazing land.

"An average of 21 percent of all rural fire responses have been to a controlled burn or a fire resulting from one. In other words, one out of every five rural fire department responses is unnecessary," said Bell County Fire Marshal Joe Bentley.

"When firefighters must respond to one of these fires, it ties up personnel and apparatus; it risks lives unnecessarily. It could mean that your house might burn down or someone in your family hurt or killed because firefighters had to go check on someone's trash pile burning and couldn't get to your real fire in time," Bentley added.

Beginning with July, Texas enters into its traditional dry season. All of spring's grass turns from

green beauty to fast burn. A spark is all it takes to turn grazing land into blackened history.

"In fact," Bentley said, "an automobile catalytic converter is sufficient to start a grass fire. You don't have to have a spark or flame."

Bell County citizens are urged to exercise extreme caution during this dry season. "Don't throw a cigarette out of your car window, even if you are driving down a wide freeway," Bentley noted. "The wind

will take it to the grass, and the fire is on."

According to state law, persons are liable for damages caused by any fire started deliberately or negligently. "If the offense is arson," according to the Fire Marshal, "A criminal offense is committed, and the guilty can be sentenced up to 20 years. If negligence is involved, the offense can wind up in civil court. The person starting the fire can be liable for any damages resulting from the controlled burn

Lorenzo's Oil

Siskel & Ebert and every other movie reviewer who loved **Lorenzo's Oil** are all eggheads. Lorenzo's Oil is little more than a sappy disease-of-the-week movie.

What is worst about Lorenzo's Oil is that it takes a tragic subject and belittles it through over-dramatization. If Nick Nolte's and Susan Sarandon's portrayals of Lorenzo Odone's parents had been honest, as opposed to being saintly and "perfect," then **Lorenzo's Oil** would have been a worthwhile story.

What else chaps my hide is Nolte's horrible Italian accent. It sounds more like one of the wrestlers who purports to be from the Motherland. It is the worst accent since Kevin Costner's Robin Hood.

In addition to overacting, **Lorenzo's Oil** is full of camera sequences and music that do not move the story, but assault and manipulate the viewer. The director is wrong for assuming the viewer must be manipulated to feel something he would already feel without the music and camera angles conspiring to tug his heartstrings.

Lorenzo's Oil could have been a great movie about the challenges and courage of one family facing a horrible, life-threatening and debilitating disease.

Instead, it makes a farce of what it tries to endear.

Doublespeak in school, politics

If you thought the financing of education on an equal basis was puzzling and near impossible to solve - at least with the brains we brought to bear on the problem in recent meetings of the State Legislature, then you should peek at what is going on in the classrooms of our fair state these days. Here we have more movement with less results than a Chinese fire drill during a Keystone Kops movie.

For example - pity the poor parents who are trying to support their offspring and the schools: who insist on homework being complete when and if assigned; who attend school and parent-teacher meetings; who read all the current and appropriate literature as well as trying to pay attention to all that is going on in the field of education- curriculum testing - etc.

These well intentioned parents then pick up the July 14, 1993, issue of the Temple Telegram and suddenly confusion reigns. On page one there is a complete expose' of the school administration's position on the subject of student failures. Latest thinking, according to those in the ivory tower, is that students should not be failed, rather they should be moved along with their peers to avoid

having failure harm their psyches and cause them to drop out - regardless of how much effort they may or may not have assigned to school work. Stay with their peer groups say these leaders of educational thinking. You all know what a peer group is don't you?

The gang that keep you and your kids in hot water most of the time!

In the very same edition of the Telegram -(see what passes for an editorial - think page) - and lo and behold we find an article written by Professor Jeffrey Hart, late of Columbia and Dartmouth. An English teacher by trade- Hart bemoans the fact that kids in college don't know enough to come in out of the rain and they learned all this thanks to poor preparation in the public schools of our land. He cites Allan Blooms' best seller "Closing of the American Mind" as proof that the product of the nation's public and higher education schools are ignorant, know-nothing incompetents.

What is a poor parent to

do? Believe what one group of educators say- "passing them all despite the fact that many have not learned enough to move from grade to grade" - as they promote in Temple and elsewhere or subscribe to the theory that, "teachers should teach; students should learn; and others either be in apprentice programs or the excellent on-the-job-training used in the military"? Either way we go - the cost is staggering, so why not go the way that does not coddle kids into thinking that failing is passing; that laziness is discipline and that accomplishment means food stamps, welfare and having a ton of kids that cannot be supported or loved. Procreating is one thing many drop-outs appear to be doing quite well thanks to a society that accepts illegitimacy as the norm and abstinence as an aberation!

It is time the debate ends and folks go back to work. Discipline, hard work, ambition and a parent-teacher covenant that prohibits passing-at-any-price. Enhance the belief that learning is important and teaching is a profession - a respected one that come coments.



Salado Board to accept bids July 27 after regular session July 13

The Salado I.S.D. Board of Trustees will meet in special session 7 p.m. July 27 in the high school computer room to approve bids for the 1993-94 school year.

The board will approve the bank depository bid and the worker's compensation insurance bid.

The board will also approve bids on athletic supplies, cafeteria supplies, gas and oil products and instructional/office supplies.

The board will go into executive session to discuss employment of personnel and other legal matters.

The board met in regular session July 13. It approved the low bid of \$38,469 from Industrial Laminates for a 24'X64' portable classroom. Other bids were \$39,365 and \$44,194.

Doreen McMinn resigned her position as computer teacher and Grail

Curry resigned as third grade teacher.

Domina Paffie was hired by the board as third grade teacher and Sara Lewis was hired to teach first grade.

Buddy Thomas addressed the board about the need for a city government in Salado, the need for effective planning of city services such as sewer and water and the role of the Salado I.S.D. Board in these matters.

holders, whimsical lamps, boxes and vegetable steamers. All with Frank Bird's specialized motifs.

The work of Chuck Brush sculpture in the past 18 years has been in metal: welded, brazed and cast. At the present, he is constructing functional sculpture in copper and bronze on marble.

These pieces are Prickly Pear and Cereus Cactus in the form of furniture. He also constructs self-contained botanical fountains in varying materials such as copper, brass, bronze, titanium and ceramic. He completes the pieces with a blue-green patina to enhance the natural beauty of the metals.

These artists will be at the Salado Art Fair August 7-8 in Pace Park.

Salado has long been known for its health giving Mineral Waters.

In the 'teens (1917-1919) the Junior Red Cross met at the old Bath House. At that time I think Dr. Rudolph may have had his office in the "bath" part of the building, but the octagon shaped screened area was where we met. I'm pretty sure there were no baths being offered at that time, but the No. 2 well was the one that had furnished the rich mineral water for the baths.

This well was largely in disuse at the time of the Red Cross meetings and I'm of the opinion that the pipes

perhaps had frozen and the project had been abandoned.

Well No. 1. was the one by Shady Villa. (now Stagecoach Inn) beneath about where the Log Cabin now stands. It had served many a gallon of "healthy drink", and had been a point of news-gathering before and during WWI. Before sundown folks would come by wagon, buggy, and some few by car to get their gallon or more. The "slow flow" gave time to visit and catch up on the latest information from our boys in the service. There had at one time - probably 1900-1920-

been a nice fountain at that well, given to Salado by a Temple group of ladies, a literary club, I believe... probably led by Louzelle Rose Barclay (who was reared in Salado, a daughter of Major A.J. Rose.), and who was active in all the cultural activities in Temple.

Perhaps one day someone will drill again for that "Wonder-Water" and Saladoans will again be treated to those "beautiful baths."

So I'll just keep my tickets, in case!
