Following graduation from Samford University in Birmingham, Alabama and further studies at the Art Center College of Design in Los Angeles, Jay Hester began his career with Lockheed Aircraft

Corporation in Georgia. Later, he established a studio/gallery in Atlanta and pursued his love of portraiture. Broadening his talent led him to commission along the East Coast. When he relocated to Santa Fe, New Mexico, a new dimension was added to his creativity, the flavor of the Southwest. After operating a gallery in Lubbock for several years, he recently moved to Boerne, in the Texas Hill Country. His commission work in both sculpture and painting has established him as a multi-talented artist.

According to Hester commission work requires an extra facet of the creative process. "I work with the client creating and resolving problems for a given space or environment." An example of this would be a 7 foot by 37 foot fired clay wall that was designed and constructed for Marshall

Bricks will pay-ve the way

Saladoans, alumni of the Old Salado School and others will have an opportunity to perpetuate their names in printed bricks to be laid in a patio area in front of the old school. Cathy Sands, chairman of the brick sales, says the patio was designed by the architects to conform with the style of the old school structure. It will be an attractive area with bench seating and landscaping as an inviting place for visi-

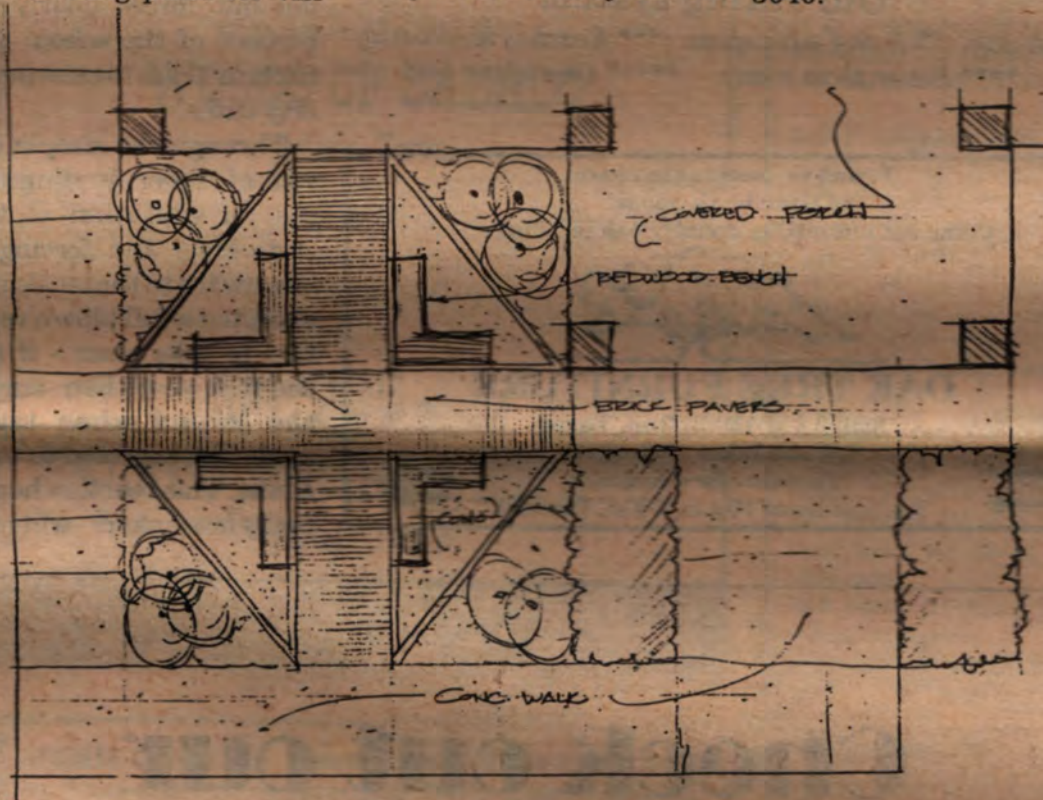
tors to relax.

Individuals, couples, and families can purchase the bricks at \$100 each with one name or a Mr. and Mrs. combination. They may also be purchased for entire families with each member's name on a brick or they may be bought as memorials to family members or friends. Set as brick pavers, the patio area will be at the north entrance of the old Salado School so they will be seen by all who

enter the building.

"We are hoping everyone in Salado will purchase at least one brick or several bricks for members of their families or friends and the proceeds will be used to defray the remaining indebtedness on the school," said Cathy.

Garth addresses local Lions

County Judge John Garth discussed the state of the County during his recent address to the Salado Lions Club.

"We are going to have to build more beds at our juvenile center," Garth told the Lions.

In 1979, Bell County built an 11-bed juvenile

detention facility behind the old jail in Belton. Bell County has seen a 57% increase in juvenile crime in recent years, according to Garth.

The average stay at the juvenile center is one week, which means "serious offenders are being released early," Garth said.

Garth estimates that Bell County will need 50 new juvenile beds at a cost of \$30,000-90,000 per bed.

This news comes on the heels of \$1 million in lost revenue for the county. Because the county is housing additional state prisoners, it cannot lease as much space for federal prisoners.

These factors have caused the County Court to consider an increase in property taxes of 2 cents, Garth said.

Good news for Bell County is the fact that the County has contracts for water until 2040.

Also, legislation sponsored by Dianne White Delisi will stop additional discharges into Stillhouse Lake making it "the cleanest body of water in Texas," Garth said.

School registration set Aug. 2

Registration for new students to the Salado I.S.D. will begin Aug. 2 to the beginning of school for both the elementary and Jr./Sr. High schools. The first day of school is Aug. 18. Students should bring shot records, birth certificate, and social security number for registering. Salado ISD

is expecting an increase in enrollment for the 93/94 school term. Currently there are 615 students enrolled for grade PK-12.

New teachers to the district are Larry Salisbury, Girls Coach and math teacher; Marilyn Salisbury, Reading and At-Risk teacher; Shawn Miller,

Boys coach and Social Studies teacher; Sara Lewis, first grade; and Domina Paffie, third grade. There are 24 teachers at the elementary and 25 teachers at the high school. New curriculum offered at the Salado High school for 93/94 will be psychology, sociology and calculus.

In what amounts to a true Machiavellian move by state and legislative leaders to introduce a personal and corporate income tax, we discover these leaders of ours going about shouting to the high heavens how they deplore such an outrage as a tax on income even while they plot for just such a levy for their fellow Texans.

It goes something like this - first there are public pronouncements against the income tax even to the point of having it placed on the ballot for citizens to be "allowed" to vote it into the constitution as a prohibited tax. At the same time the legislature, with the blessing of the Governor and Speaker, brought forth an equity spending bill for education that not only does not provide equity relief but forces nearly 90 percent of the school districts in Texas to raise property taxes.

Through the simple device of under-funding the cost of education at the state level and forcing it downward to the locals it is expected a full blown reaction to take place - if not the first year then surely the second when taxes again are expected to take a hike. This reaction hoped for by lawmakers - will take

the cry for help by the embattled property owners to a level demanding an income tax that would replace the ad valorem tax. Thus the elected folks could say on the one hand "We oppose an income tax" and on the other "The public has spoken and demanded an income tax - so be it!" All this with a straight face as they seek reelection!

This hypocritical move will probably work and in the end prove to be better for all concerned in that the property owner will receive relief, for once, and everyone in the state will have a chance to participate in funding education. The state will in turn pay most of the cost of education with a dedicated income tax that will start off small. The growth of this type tax is what worries the thinking person and the spectre of the national income tax ogre looms large in everyone's mind.

There is no happy solution to the problem of funding public education that, like the drum-playing bunny on TV - it just keeps on going - up: more Kids,

more special needs; more teachers; more administrators and more facilities. And they all cost money. This should be our most enjoyable tax contribution - education - since it is through this medium that our nation grows. The reason we complain so bitterly right now is due to the games our state leaders play with our minds and our money to get what they want. And right now - they really want an income tax with its unlimited potential for raising and spending money!

Rule of Law?

State and federal lawmakers pass a bill. The chief executive at the state and/or nation signs the bill into law. The Supreme Courts at both levels may or may not have a constitutional say in the matter. And the citizens begin obeying the new law. Right? Well maybe!

Take a look at two recent cases. First came about two years ago when the Texas Supreme Court declared that the County educational Districts were unconstitutional in the way they were organized and the way they collected and distributed money. The law creating them was struck down. That should have

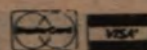

Salado Legends premieres to 180

Salado Legends premiered to an excited crowd of 180 folks July 24 at Tablerock Amphitheater off Royal St. in Salado. Performances will continue July 31 and August 7.

The epic story of early Salado, Salado Legends focuses on the McDougal family (one of the early families forgotten by historians, or a family playwright Jackie Mills made up) during the settling of Salado in the 1850s and the Civil War period.

Dave Jackson gives an outstanding American In-

dian dance performance to open the show with the legend of Tonkawa Indians, followed by Cara Fuhs dance of the Sirena legend. Wayne Garner narrates the Tonkawa legend.

The story continues with Scottish settlers arriving in Salado in horse-drawn wagons and on foot, including the McDougal family.

My favorite line of the whole play belonged to Angus McDougal, played by Gary Askins, on his arrival home from the Texas Legislature: "Democracy is once again safe, the Texas Legislature is out of session!"

Truer words were never spoken! They apply even

more today.

Theron Palmer delivers the most powerful performance as Sam Houston delivering an anti-secession speech from the second floor of the Shady Villa. His performance alone is reason enough to see Salado Legends.

But there are plenty of other reasons, too, including a dance by the Creekside Cloggers, a battle scene re-enacted by the Texas Volunteer Militia and good music by local songwriters.

Salado Legends is an epic play, using the grounds of Tablerock Amphitheater, as well as the stage for its three-hour presentation.

Tickets are available for \$15 to upcoming performances of the play from Fletcher's Books & Antiques, 947-5414, on Main St. Salado.

An all-you-can-eat fajita dinner at 7:30 p.m. precedes each performance of Salado Legends at 7 p.m.

But, I am also concerned with formal aesthetic elements --the balance between composition, color and the variety of texture achievable through the aquatint process."

Rick Loudermilk

Rick Loudermilk creates copperplate etchings of unusual clarity and warmth. He does so by combining technical abilities, an eye for lyrical design and subject matter that celebrates the details of life. In realistic still lifes, Loudermilk presents flowers, fruit and

both human and animal figures in compositions that endow the subjects with dignity and grace. Contributing to these etchings are Loudermilk's sensitive line, his subtle modulations of tonal aquatints, and his delicately applied watercolor.

Loudermilk's dedication to the art and craft of printmaking grew out of his training at Louisiana State University and the University of Southwestern Louisiana, where he studied both painting and printmaking earning the Bachelor of Fine Arts degree, cum laude, in 1982. During 1983 he completed an intensive internship with the master printer, Lucius Dubose, in Nashville, Tennessee. deter-

mined to perfect his technique even further, he traveled in 1985-86 to France, where he visited the finest ateliers in that country and worked for two months at a private Parisian atelier.

Since 1984, Loudermilk has worked in his own printmaking studios in McDade and in Austin, Texas. He continues to perfect technical abilities and to clarify his vision of beauty and serenity. During his career he has developed an audience of private and corporate collectors in the U.S., Europe, and Japan.

Mill Creek bridge to undergo work

Bell County Commissioner Bob Shoemaker and County Engineer Richard Macchi met with representatives from Mill Creek and Salado to discuss proposed improvements to the low-water crossing near the Mill Creek Clubhouse. Representing Mill Creek and the Salado Community were Don Mackie, Jack Hardin and Denver Mills.

Beginning on Aug. 9, the low-water crossing will be closed to traffic for approximately five days, during which time, Bell County Road and Bridge Department employees will remove approximately 25 feet of roadway to install a series of culverts and an inlet device. The objective of the project is to increase the outflow capacity in order to reduce the number of days that the roadway is underwater.

Coordination with the Mill Creek Golf and Country Club will ensure that golf carts can still make the crossing and that impounded waters will not interfere with construction. Asked what effect this construction would have on the number of days the crossing is closed each year, Mr. Macchi answered that it would depend on rainfall. Recent events in the Midwest have shown that we cannot control Mother Nature.

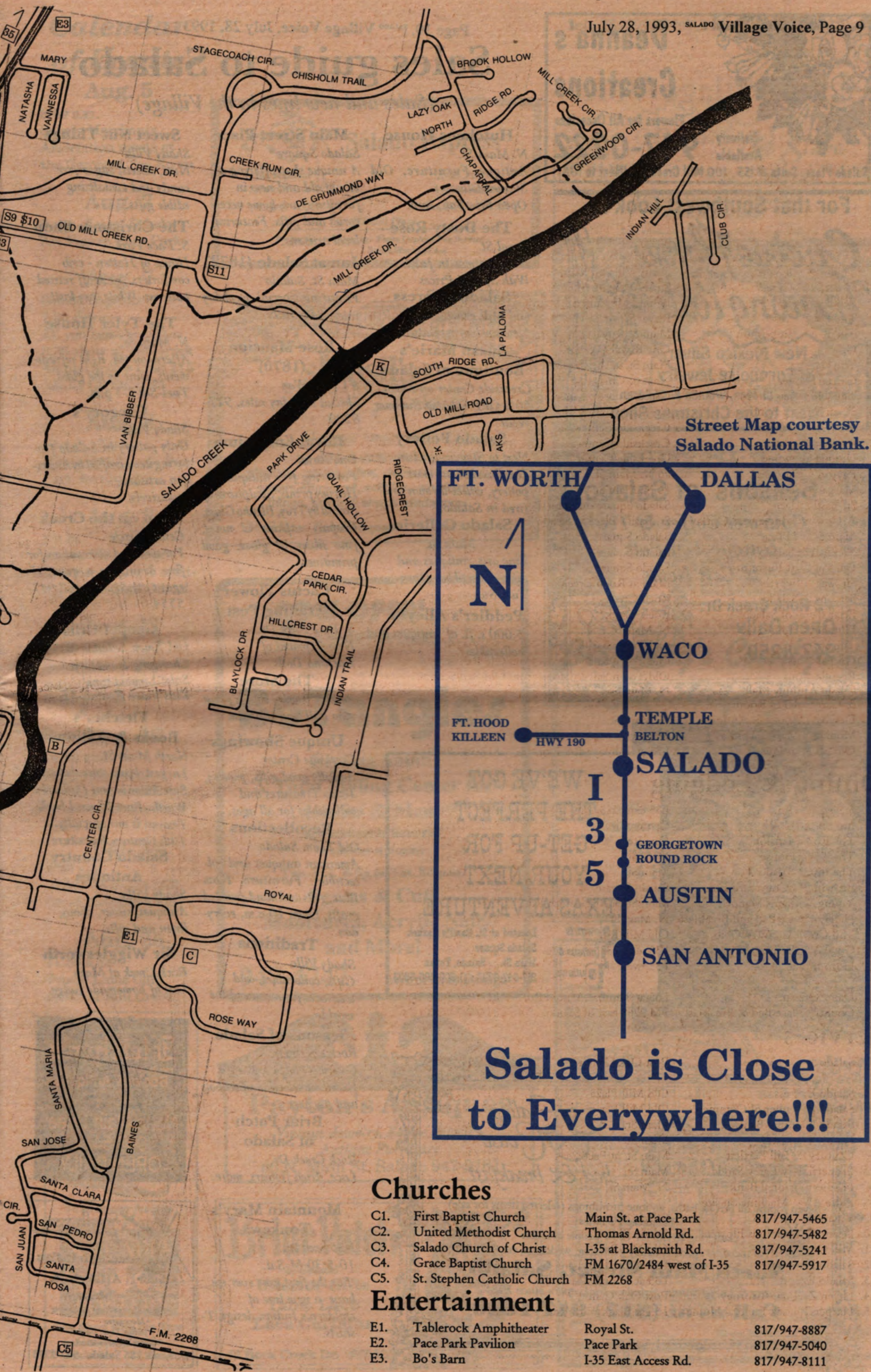

Of all the questions that high schools today (1899??1993??) are called upon to answer the curriculum of the English course to be both constructive and combative may be the most difficult.

Constructive instruction is certainly demanded. The broadening of literary conceptions, revealing and developing the students own oral and written power of experience, and the acquirement of accuracy, grace and elegance, shall make that expression of force and pleasure to himself and his associates.

But that the course must be combative is a necessity growing out of those circumstances which have fixed among us a habit of carelessness in regard to the proper use language. If these elements of accuracy, grace and elegance, for some reason been overlooked or not applied in the grammar grades, the high school must take upon itself the extra burden of uprooting a long formed habit. With the earnest student we cheerfully set about the task of encouraging a desire for impeccable English and its proper usage. The high school hears the responsibility of insisting upon proper care in its application.

But the habit of correct English cannot be formed in a day, even though its formation is our first objective. As the student grows, so should grow his/her care

for our powerful language: Line upon line, precept up precept...by constant drill and watchfulness in every department there is always the goal of pure expression in written as well as spoken class response.

Thus the English Course is decidedly practical.

Grammar, word analysis, punctuation, figures of speech, poetry and verification are studied in detail along with many of the fine classics of the English language.

Most students of Thomas Arnold High school will graduate with a comfortable command of the English language and the wide variety of literature available in that language. Hopefully other high schools in Texas will follow our lead.

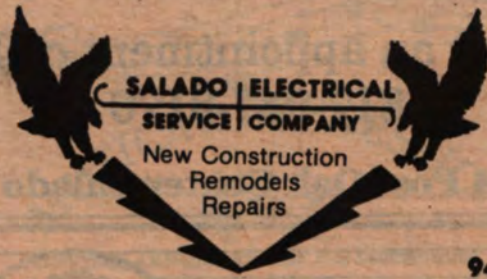

killed them then and there - but what happened? The Court went on to say that even though they were unconstitutional (illegal) they would stay in place for another year and a half despite their illegality!

Case in point number two. The 73rd Legislative session that mercifully died this past Spring passed into law a measure that would have expanded the veteran's free college tuition-fees program to cover children whose parents were missing in action or died as a result of military service. So far - so good. At the last second Rep. Warren Chisum, (D-Pampa) attached an amendment to require these new non-veteran aid recipients to prove financial need.

Only problem was that the amendment was so poorly drawn that it knocked out many current veterans attending school who did not have a need requirement to qualify.

Bad piece of legislative work. Bad amendment. Bad staff work by the legislature and the Governor's office who did not catch the

problem. The bill was duly signed by the Guv and then someone in the college coordinating board caught the mistake and it hit the fan. Such moaning and groaning and wringing of hands. What to do - what to do? Result? Disregard the new law! So says the coordinating board with the permission of the governor and the legislative leaders. Think of this now. A law is passed and citizens are told to "disregard".

Now folks, this may be the answer to a lot of poorly drawn laws. For example the recently passed educational equity law that is going to raise everyone's taxes. Why not just "disregard it" as well?

Can you imagine how teachers of government are going to handle this when it comes up in class? Yes students - we decided, in Texas, that if we pass a bad bill into law (and we do this by the hundreds each biennial session) then we will just pretend it is not the law of the land and we will go on and "disregard it". Thus endeth the one foundational corner-stone, in

the house we call Democracy, that has held us together for over 200 years - the "Rule of Law" - and with this demise we lose control of all other icons that go to make up the great experiment we have here in the United States of America.

All this can be put back together with logic and common sense quickly by the courts who can and should reach down and put this law squarely on the books and then change it legislatively next time around. And next time take more care in how laws are written. It might also behoove the supreme court to be a little less generous when they allow us to live under "illegal laws they have determined to be unconstitutional."

To achieve all this we need a little more thought by our state leaders and lawmakers. An ingredient sorely missing for several sessions down in Austin. We really can and should do better when it comes time to select folks to act on our behalf in the legislature and the congress.
