There will be a minimum of three demonstrations, ranging from still life to Hill Country landscapes. Also, weather permitting, there will be on-location paint outs.

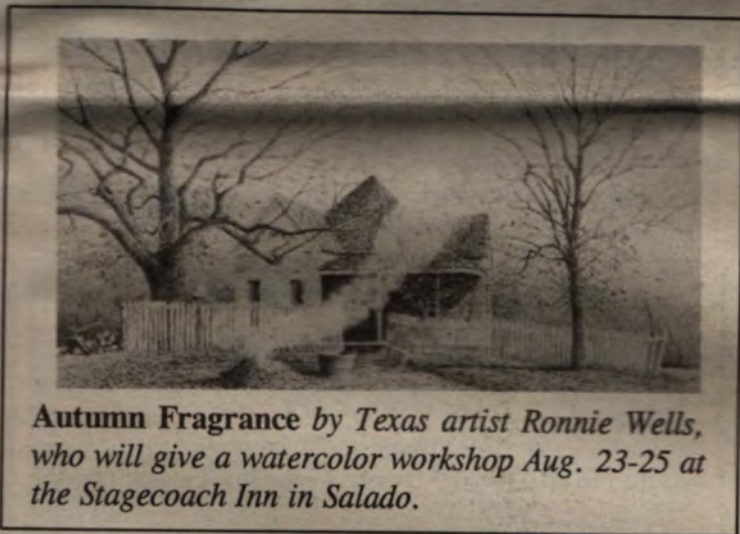

**The Vanishing** is a chilling movie, a thriller that grabs the viewer in the first 10 minutes and never lets go.

It reaches down your throat and grabs your gut-level fears: fears of being abducted, fears of being buried, fears of strangers....

Jeff Bridges is one of the scariest bad guys since Dennis Hopper in **Blue Velvet**. Bridges, who has played the good guy in movies for over two decades, from *The Last Picture Show* to *The Fabulous Baker Boys*, is un-nerving, dangerous and fascinating.

**The Vanishing** has suspense enough for a video library full of Hitchcock films (not his best films, though, like **Rear Window**).

If you like Hitchcock's movies of the 50s and 60s, you'll love **The Vanishing**, because it takes you to the edge of your fears and jumps.

## About Clinton's "landslide" in Congress

Shades of "Landslide" Lyndon's "victory" over Coke Stevenson in the 1948 Senate race. Johnson "won" by a whopping 87 votes and went on to become president. Now comes President Clinton and his "economic" package that passed last week by two congressional votes plus a tie-breaker by the vice president. So avail yourself of the opportunity to encourage the responsible ones to use this historically significant name for our new center.

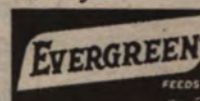

## Wildflower photographer shows at Salado Pottery

Wildflower photographer Dorothy Brown Thetford brings nature up close and in focus. Her mission closely follows her inner passion.

"I've got to share these flowers with everyone," she says. "How can we continue ignoring these gifts? We trample them, we drive on them, and we mow them before they even have a chance to re-seed." Through her art which will soon include native grasses as well as flowers, she is helping herself and others appreciate the natural beauty of our landscape.

An important part of her mission is to show the heart

and soul of a flower through exposing the intricacy of nature's design. "Most of us won't get out of the car and really look at the inside of a flower," she says. So, she brings them to us through the lens of the camera -- and her heart.

With card racks and display of her art in various locations in Louisiana, Oklahoma and Texas, Dorothy is rapidly gaining acclaim as one of Texas' foremost nature photographers. Each card is signed by the artist, is suitable for framing and each flower is identified by both the common and botanical names. All card packets include the following artist's philoso-

phy:

"Each of my photo cards is designed to show the natural beauty of our wildflowers and to help us identify, appreciate and protect these native plants. My passion is to share these botanical wonders with mankind; I hope yours is the same."

Among her inventory of more than 60 photographs that appear on the covers of her blank greeting cards are bluebonnets, paintbrush, primrose, cactus, magnolia, spiderwort and various thistles. Her unique art is available here in Salado at Salado Pottery.

As a member of the North Texas Area Art League, her

work has appeared and received awards in injured competition in the Meadows Gallery in Denton and at the Heard Natural Science Museum in McKinney. It was also displayed at the 1992 state meeting of the Native plant Society of Texas, held in Nacogdoches, at the Neil Sperry's All Garden Show in Arlington, Texas. This spring and, more recently, at the Fort Worth Nature Center, The Dallas Nature Center and Denton's Health Fair.

An active member of the NTAAL in Denton, Dorothy is president-elect of the Trinity Forks chapter

of the Native Plant Society of Texas. Her bachelor of science degree in education is from the University of North Texas and she has lived in Denton for 30 years. A business woman as well as artist, she also shares her work of Artwood Products Inc. in Denton with her husband Alan.

She and her husband own a few acres of former pasture near Denton, which they've allowed to grow "natively" and its has proven a haven of wildflower subjects for her photographs. She also travels the three state area seeking out the plants she needs (and loves) to share with the world.

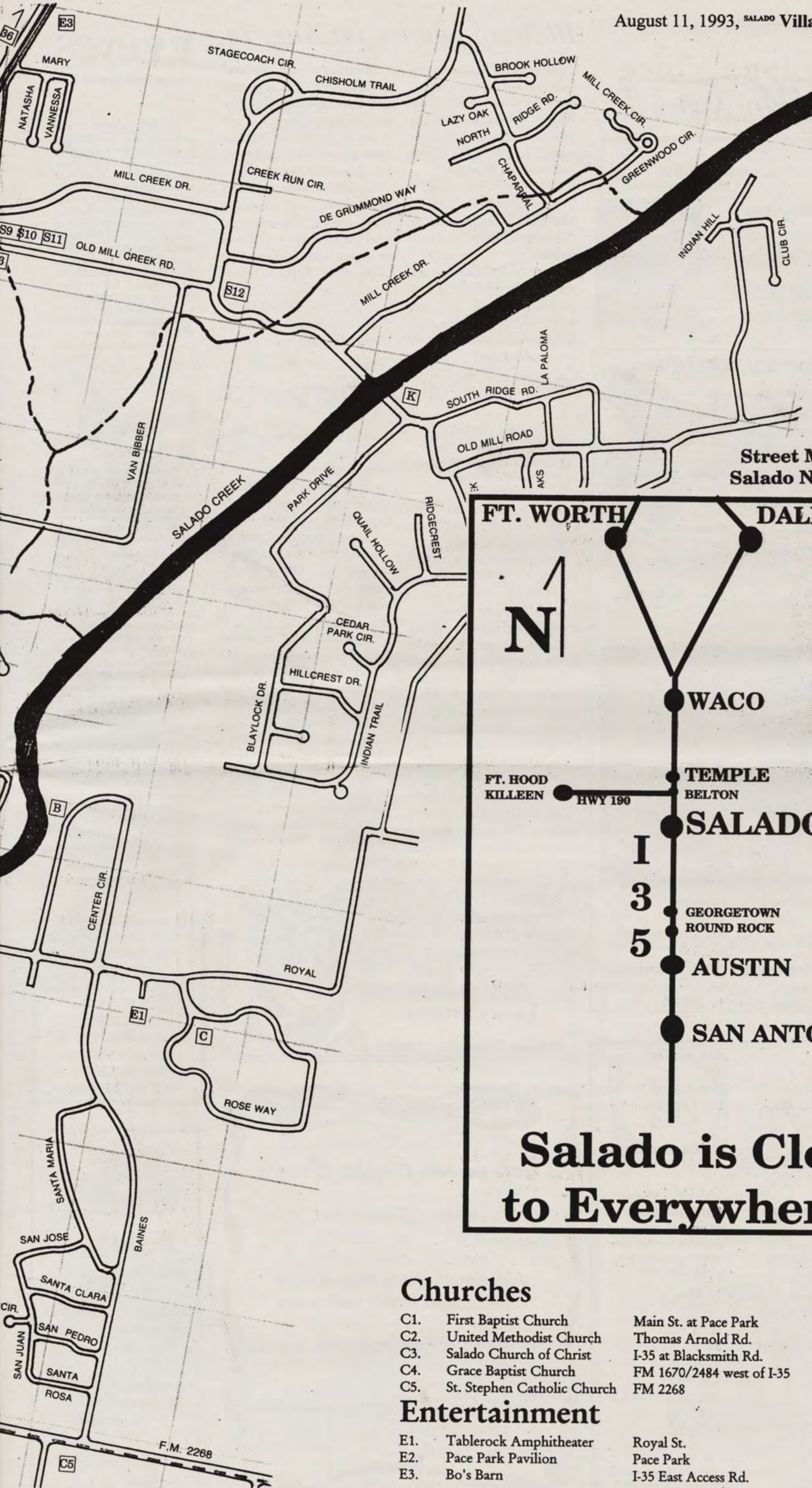

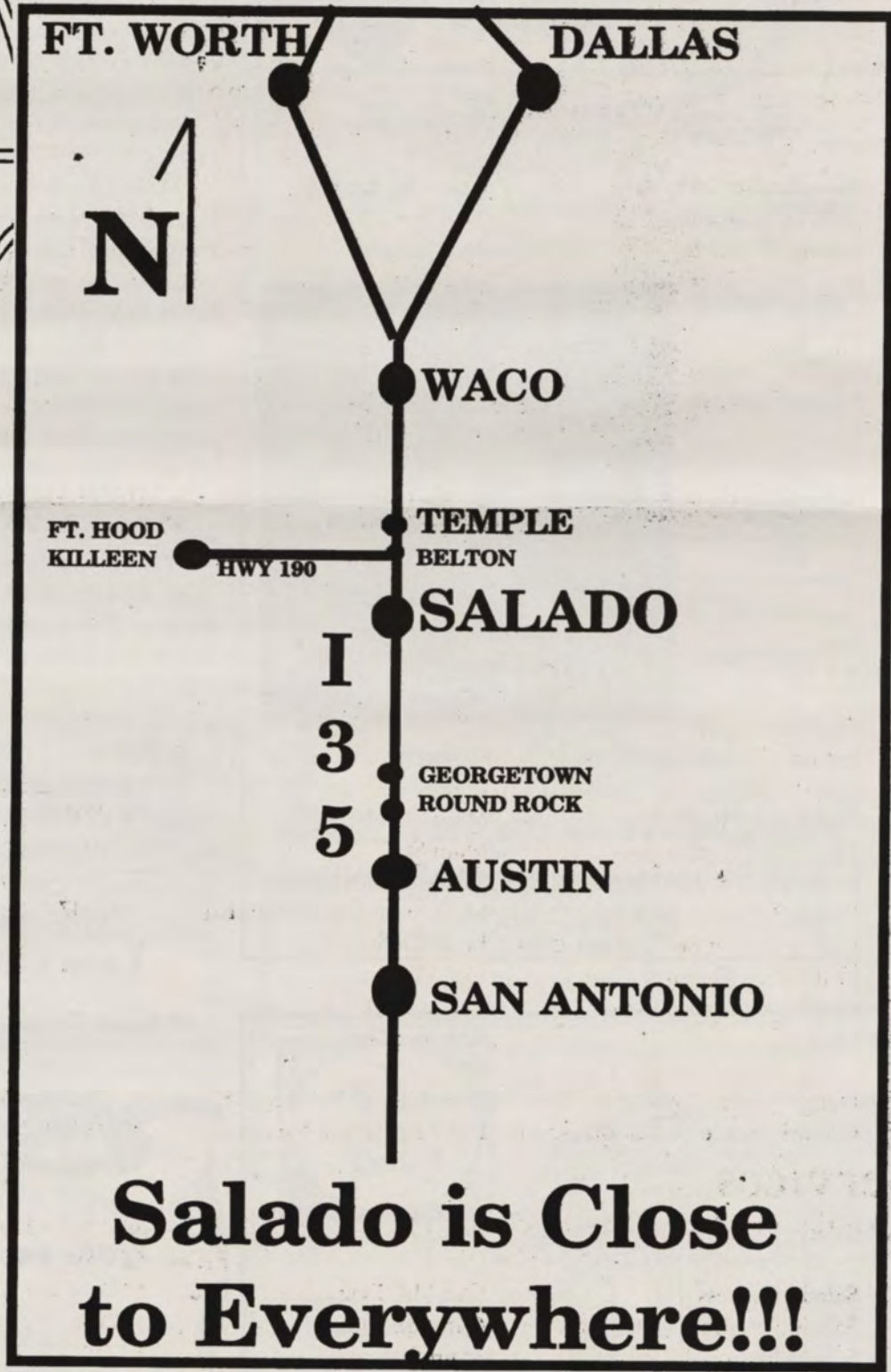

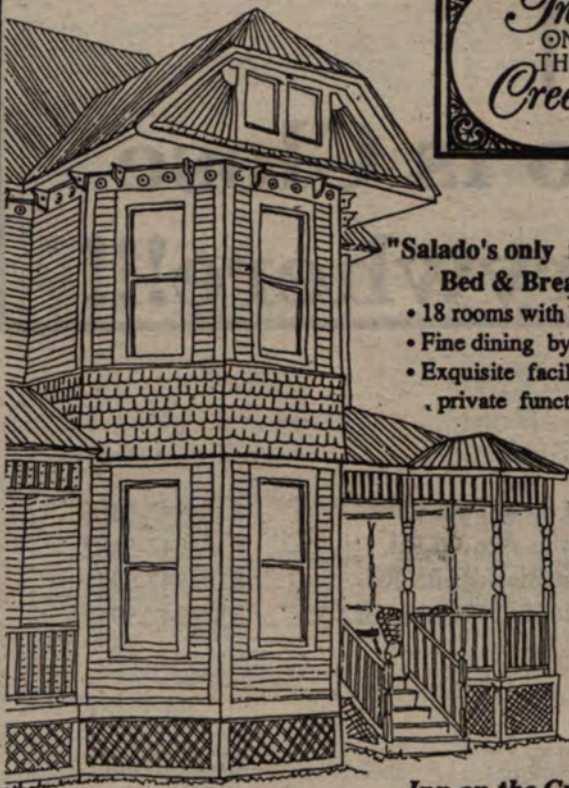

Our effort will ever be to gain by intensive rather than by extensive study and insight into those literatures which will ever constitute "The basis for modern culture."

\*Methods and subjects have changed in many ways this century; and as we have sometimes opted for other than in-depth study of Literatures have we lost touch with those cultural maps that brought us through several wars, a Great Depression, and day-to-day coping. Perhaps the Greeks had a good idea: intellectual stimulus leads us upward.
