Old red school gets new name at meeting

Trustees of the Old Salado School Foundation met in called session last week to go over plans for the Oct. 9 dedication of the civic center; heard updates on the renovation work as well as the financial status of the project; officially named the building; set dates for meetings of the group for the remainder of 1993 and named a manager to operate the building during its first transitional year.

Jap Barrett presented the tentative plans for, the Oct. 9 dedication and noted he would release the completed schedule within a few days as plans are firmed up and ready for final publication.

Stewart Smith, president of the Old Salado School Foundation (OSSF), reported on the financial side of the project and indicated that the project will -- if there are no "over-runs" -- come in on-budget or slightly less than originally planned. Money to pay for the construction is on-hand, including the \$100,000 loan standing by at Salado National Bank for use as needed as the renovation nears completion. Smith noted that the note would have to be repaid within a given time period and that 1993, 1994 and 1995 pledges are all to be applied to the note as well as pro-

Salado Library to close Sept. 4, to ready for move

The Salado Public Library will close 1 p.m., September 4, to facilitate relocation to the Old Red School House.

Patrons are requested to return all books and tapes to the library prior to Sept. 4. The library board anticipates reopening at the new location in early October. Patrons should watch the *Salado Village Voice* for specific announcements concerning reopening.

ceeds from the sale of commemorative bricks and other fund-raising activities planned for later this year and early next year.

OSSF board member Denver Mills reported on the work being done inside the building, noting that the elevator is due to be installed within two weeks; sheetrocking nearly finished; painting to be completed within the next two to three weeks and the landscaping and paving are slated for completion by the end of September as scheduled so the building can be turned over to the foundation by Oct. 1.

Meeting Dates

The foundation, faced with operating the new structure, voted to set dates for regular meetings for the rest of the year due to the many details that will be coming before the board as the building goes into full operation. The foundation board will meet 9 a.m. Sept. 23 at the fellowship hall of the Salado Church of Christ. The first meeting to be held in the new civic center will be 9 a.m. Oct. 28. Remaining meetings for 1993 include 9 a.m., Nov. 18 and 9 a.m. Dec. 2 at the civic center.

Building Named

The foundation's trustees voted unanimously to officially name the building "The Salado Civic Center" and it will be known by that name starting at once in order to prepare signs and directional information to be placed throughout the village.

In final action, the trustees named director Ken Clapp to manage the civic center for the first year of its operation. Clapp will work in a non-paid volunteer status and will be in charge of the day-to-day operation of the center including supervision of employees as well as coordinating all activities within the center.

DARE to serve Salado ISD

The Bell County Sheriff's Department has established the first Drug Abuse Resistance Education (DARE) program for the department. DARE is a nationally recognized program and is present in all 50 states as well as in 14 foreign countries.

The new program will be provided to all six rural school district in Bell County, including Salado, Troy, Rogers, Little River/Academy, Holland and Bartlett. Temple and Belton school districts are served by their respective police departments. The

Killeen school district is served by the Ft. Hood Military Police DARE Officers.

Beginning this fall, a semester course will be given

one day each week to the fifth grade students. The curriculum, developed by the Bell County Deputy Specialist, will be presented by a uniformed deputy and will cover such topics as how to say no to peers, building self-esteem, assertiveness, social influences involved in the abuse of drugs and positive alternatives to drug use.

Sniper is a thrilling jungle-war movie. Set in the jungles of Panama and South America, **Sniper** is the story of a hardened assassin who eliminates unfriendly generals, drug lords and politicians for the covert U.S. government.

Tom Berenger turns in his best performance since **Platoon** as Sgt. Thomas Beckett, a U.S. Marine sniper in Panama's jungles. During a scene with Richard Miller (Billy Zane), a partner assigned to him, the viewer discovers how little hope Beckett has of ever being anything other than a gun for hire. The viewer feels pity for the gunman when watching as Sgt. Beckett files away tough skin on his trigger finger "for a softer feel."

Sniper is one of the few war movies in which the story is moved as much through dialogue and interaction of characters as it is by explosions and gunfire. **Sniper** does have terrific action sequences, but it so much more than a shoot 'em up movie.

It ranks close to the best Vietnam films, **Apocalypse Now**, **Platoon** and **Full Metal Jacket**.

Pace Park and Salado Creek are two of the brightest jewels in the village crown that attracts thousands of visitors monthly. Some of these visitors have been damaging the park and creek which is why it is necessary to seek ways and means of changing the direction the park is currently heading.

Reports of misbehavior in the park by those who have decided to trash our area and who travel miles to do so are commonplace as reported by those citizens who live on both sides of the park and creek. Some build cook fires and toss garbage on the grounds; work on their cars and leave tires and parts strewn around as if this were a personal junkyard; others leave beer, wine and whiskey bottles after they party and some misbegotten visitors even leave soiled diapers behind, if you can imagine that!

Loud noises, horrible music, trashy talk and lascivious behavior are but a few of the complaints by those living nearby and who have to call the law nearly every night. The weekends are especially bad as these untrained animal-like folks invade the park. Few, if any obey the park curfew, and, when challenged, sometimes turn dangerous.

Recently a state district judge appointed new trustees for Pace Park due to the fact that the former leaders had all died. It will be up to these new overseers to change the course the park is taking.

It may be that armed and off-duty law enforcement officers will have to be hired to patrol the park. Or, the park may have to be fenced off provided upstream owners cooperate. As a last resort it may be that a charge will have to be made to use the park in order to pay for the extra personnel needed to keep order.

Pace Park is not a public recreational area. It does not belong to any governmental agency or unit of government. It is a private parkland given to the village by the Pace family for villager use only! As such, it can be closed anytime the trustees see fit in order to allow only local access to

this once lovely area.

The new Pace Park trustees will again contract care and operation of the area to the Salado Chamber of Commerce as has been the case for many years. The Chamber spends nearly \$15,000 a year to take care of Pace Park, including maintenance and operation and providing a public restroom facility.

Trustees may close down the restrooms after the school renovation project is completed and toilets in that facility come on line. There will be personnel available to monitor that entire civic center building, thus cutting down, hopefully, on vandalism.

All in all it is not a pretty picture for this once lovely area. The Pace trustees and the Chamber have pledged their time and effort to restore the park even if it takes armed guards and gates to do so.

It is a pity that the public is so insensitive as to make all this necessary. Someday we may learn the value of taking care of our parks and lakes. In the meantime, they will be jailed and fined if plans go forward that are now in the talking stage.

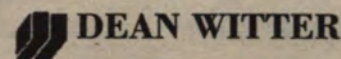

Homework

Doctors say it's a good idea to start young with routine for kids

For young children, settling in to a good homework routine is the best lesson they can learn.

"Homework begins as early as kindergarten and first grade," said Dr. Florence Eddins, a child psychiatrist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "These early years are the time for parents to lay the foundation for good study habits."

Eddins believes children's experiences in learning basic skills taught in the early grades will set the tone for how they perceive the rest of school.

To begin a homework routine, she recommends that parents teach by example.

"When it is time to do homework, sit nearby with some work of your own," Eddins said. "This way, you give your child an idea of how to do homework."

Flexibility is the next key in creating the right home-

work environment. Eddins cautions parents to remember that what works for them may not be right for their child.

"A child's attention span is much shorter," she said. "You may need uninterrupted quiet to get work done, but your child may need short breaks."

Eddins warns parents not to let struggles arise over these differences.

"Some children may like music or television in the background or may need a play period before settling down to work," Eddins said. "The important thing is to experiment and learn what works best for your child."

As homework guidelines are established, Eddins encourages parents to let the child play a key role in the decision-making process.

For example, if a parent feels that listening to music is becoming detrimental, Eddins suggests talking it over with the child

and trying homework without music for a week to see how it goes.

"If your child has trouble establishing a good routine, help them set time limits for completion," Eddins said. "Gradually you and your child will find what works best."

Homework success also depends on good communication between the parents and teacher. Parents should learn what the school expects of the child and of the parents.

Teachers can establish a system for sending home written notices of homework assignments if a child is having difficulty remembering to do homework or failing to tell the parents about homework.

As grades begin to come in, Eddins urges parents to acknowledge both the successes and the failures.

"The best reward is that parents take notice and admire their child's efforts in school," Eddins said.

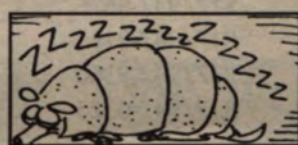

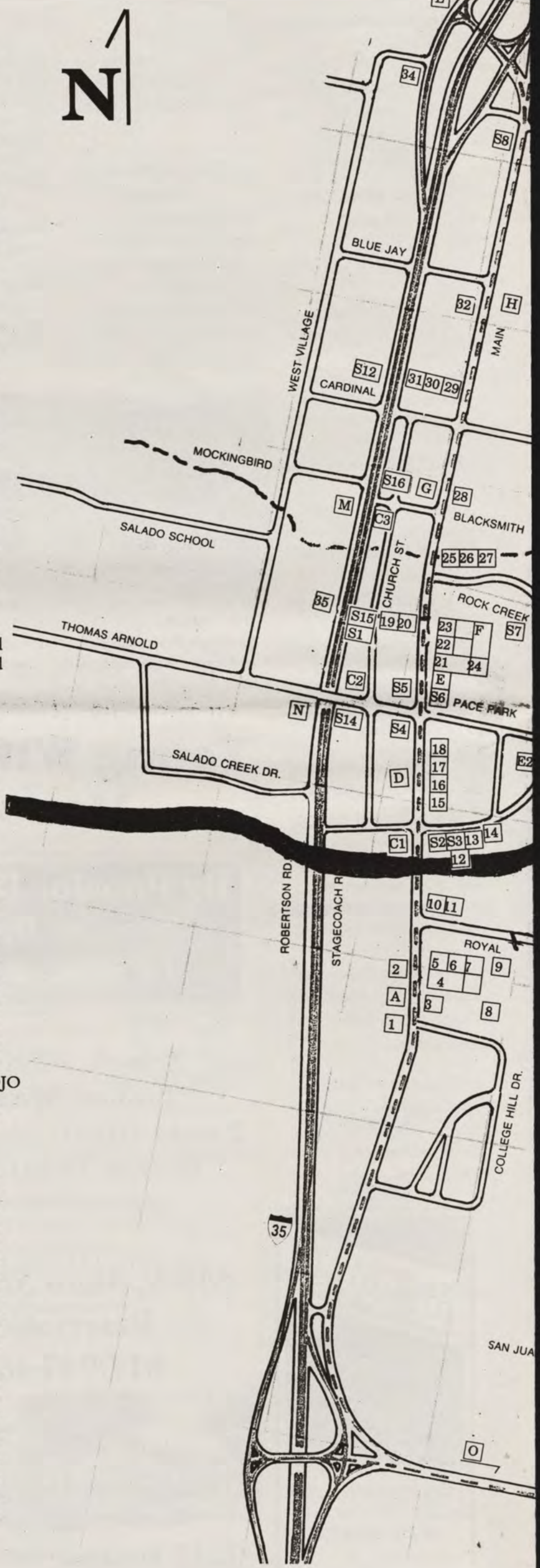

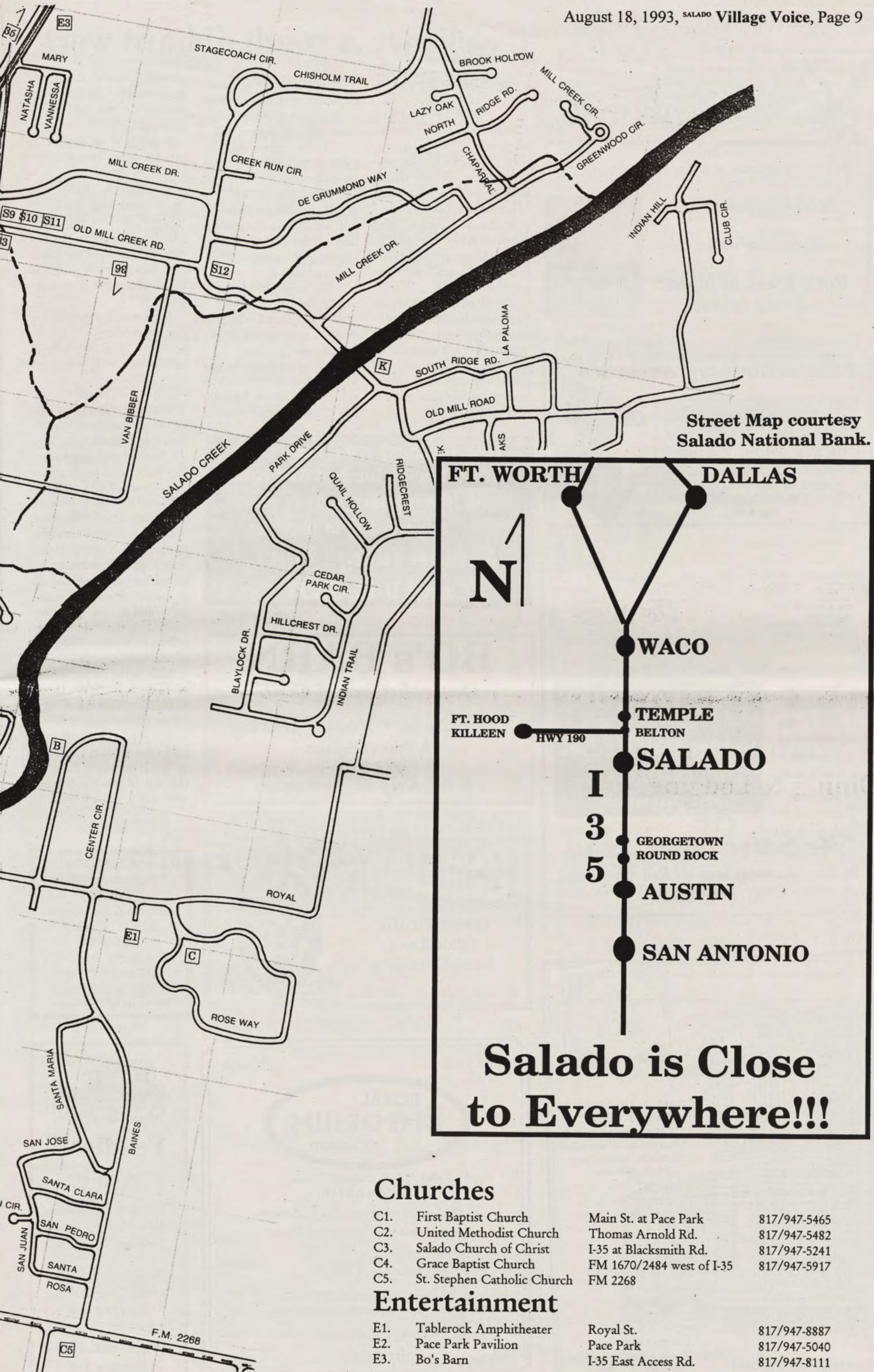

Excellence is result of hard work

Success does not simply happen. Excellence, whether perfected in professional or personal achievement, is the result of hard work, planning and preparation. People who succeed have learned to apply themselves, their time, talent, and resources to achieve goals.

The time to begin applying yourself and efficiently and effectively focusing your efforts is today. Like the longest journey, the path towards any established goal begins with a single step.

The process for efficient application of one's effort is simple; beginning is the most difficult task of all.

8. Reward yourself for the attainment of goals. Balance hard work with activities meant solely for your pleasure.

In pursuit of your goals, don't underestimate the value of the most important things in life: your family, friends and associates. Try to become more aware of how you utilize your time. While charting a week of your daily time utilization may be cumbersome, through such methods you may find it possible to reduce time used inefficiently or on activities you do not value and increase the time used constructively towards achievement of goals which reflect your values.

Make a list each evening of things you want to accomplish the next day. Cross off tasks as they are completed. If there are tasks remaining at the end of the day, place them at the top of the list for the next day.

Drop by level 1/3 cup measures onto greased cookie sheet; spread to 3-inch diameter. Bake at 350°F 15 to 20 minutes or until golden brown. Makes about 10 large cookies.

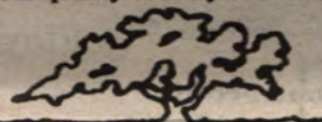

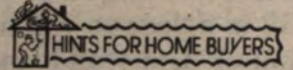

ers. Classroom visitations will take place for children in grades K-4. The deputy teaching this class will also be available to present drug education classes to parent groups and will work in cooperation with parents to ensure that children are well informed regarding the dangers of drug abuse.

Funding for this new program has been provided through the Performance Award Monies allocated by the state to counties which exhibited innovation in developing punishment alternatives to sentencing inmates to TDJC-ID. Bell County received a total of \$270,000 from the state for its' diversionary programs. A portion of these funds will be used to fund the DARE program.
