Chamber meets Oct. 11 at school

The annual meeting of the Salado Chamber of Commerce is scheduled for 7 p.m. Oct. 11, in the high school library, according to an announcement from chamber president Denver Mills.

Old Salado school well remembered by students

This scene was common in the early days of Salado and shows the two Carsten girls on their way to the old Salado School on Main Street. The younger girl (closest to the camera) is Wilhelmenia and with her is sister Josephine. The two drove their horse and trap to and from school in the late 20's from their farm north of town.

Wilhelmenia Carsten Friedrich the only student, still living in Salado, to have begun her educational career as a full fledged first grader in 1925 - the year the old school building was

built and became operational - and went on to graduate eleven years later with the class of 1936.

Wilhelmenia will be on hand, Oct. 9, when the old Main Street red brick school becomes the new Salado Civic Center and she along with the three oldest living graduates - all class of 1931 - will do the ribbon-cutting honors that will begin a new era of use as the renovated building comes on line as a multi purpose civic center. The three include Lois Sheppard, Bill Bridges and Proctor Capps.

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(Writer's Note: Our thanks to representative Layton Black and his staff for providing this column with information on the proposed 1993 amendments. Also appreciate the House Research Organization for their work in making fact available on the pros and cons of the many amendments that are spawned each session. The HRO is bi-partisan with such members as Dianne Delisi (R-Temple) and Betty Denton (D. Waco) on board. All shades and varieties of political persuasion are in this research group. As a result their work can generally be considered accurate.)

As promised, this column will explore the various amendments to our state constitution that are to be voted on Nov. 2, 1993. Texans have amended the law-of-the-state some 339 times out of over one thousand different proposals since 1876. This year 19 new ideas came from the 73rd Session of the Texas Legislature. You may recall that on May 1, 1993, voters turned down three propositions dealing with the business of equalizing the funding of the public schools. The results of this vote will be felt by every home owner in Texas since the defeat of

May's proposition one marked the end of the County Education Districts and along with them a 20 percent reduction in property value of one's homestead. The CED's were put back where they came from - in the school district's taxing authority minus the 20 percent exemption. So even if a school kept their taxes at the same rate as last year - there would still be a jump due to the 20 percent loss.

All that is said - to say this: It is important that voters know what they are voting for or against when it comes time to amend our constitution. Most of the amendments fall into the "pocketbook" category - your pocketbook, that is, and therefore deserve close attention.

Thus far we have reviewed three proposed Nov. Amendments. Two would abolish the elected office of county surveyor - Amendment 8- McLennan County and Amendment 6 Jackson County. The third amendment - number 15, if passed, would allow the Commissioner's Courts throughout the state to call a county election to abolish the county surveyor office. All three are related and should be approved since all would reduce the cost of county government.

Amendment One
This week we will tackle, this November's Amendment One - which is a sneaky proposition that is misnamed; costly; unneeded and typical of an elected body toadying to minorities.

Amendment One-if passed, would allow the state to issue some \$50 million in general obligation bonds to lend to minority businesses and/or women owned businesses to get them started. The term "Historically" in the description of the amendment (Historically Underutilized Business) is a misnomer since there is nothing to do with the State Historical Commission or local historical societies. The name comes from what is perceived to be a general reluctance over the years on the part of lending institutions to invest in undercapitalized businesses that are shaky.

There will be a typical howl from minorities as they scream "sexism" and "racism" against anyone who opposes this amendment. Truth of the matter is they are asking the taxpaying public to back commercial ventures that banks won't touch. Reason the banks shy away is that there is a good chance of failure. Banks need to protect their depositors and the state need to protect its tax-paying citizens.

Here are some more non-emotional reasons why this amendment should be solidly defeated: A total of 80

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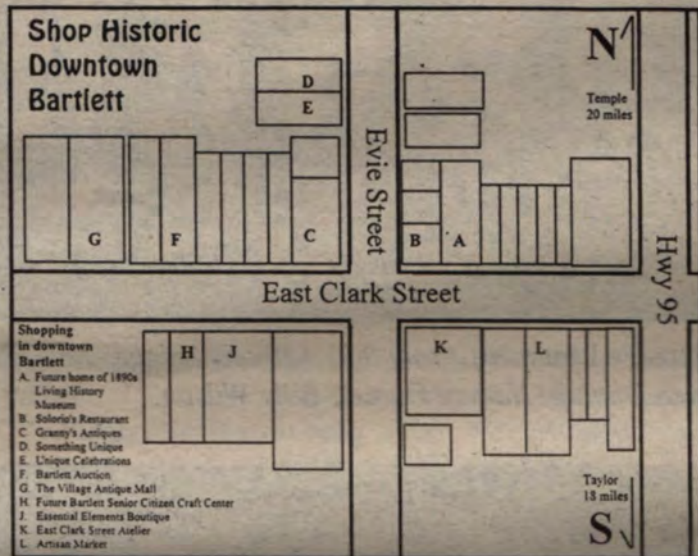

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What NAFTA means for investors

Last summer, before the presidential election, President Bush signed the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA), removing trade barriers between Mexico, Canada and the United States. The treaty's intent was to simplify and encourage trade between the three countries. However, there has been some speculation on the effect that NAFTA would have on certain U.S. industries and thus, on those who invest in companies within those industries. Although Bush had hoped to move NAFTA through Congress without changes, the treaty is now being closely scrutinized by the new Clinton administration. Many investors are curious to see whether NAFTA will become a reality, and, if so, what effect it may have on U.S. markets and industries.

One school of thought suggests that the countries engaged in the NAFTA Treaty would fare better with free trade than without it. Free trade with Mexico, for example, would help both large and small companies with the latter helped by the removal of barriers that currently deter many small businesses from Mexican activity.

Mexico ignore the fact that there are currently no major barriers to U.S. companies moving there. Companies that locate abroad don't focus solely on labor cost, but rather on issues such as access to markets, proximity to customers and sources of raw materials, and a desire to be immune to foreign currency exchange risks.

In recent years, some U.S. companies have moved part of their manufacturing operations to Mexican areas along the U.S. border. This created jobs in Mexico, but it also helped dissuade these firms from moving operations to the Far East. Passage of NAFTA would actually reduce this trend, rather than increase it. That's because Mexico's existing tariffs and trade barriers inspired some firms to move operations to Mexico. With these barriers removed, the incentive to move across the border would be reduced.

There is a good possibility that the treaty will be defeated by Congress. President Clinton has said he favors it, but with reservations. Although many Republicans support that basic treaty, they do not like amendments that the president has proposed pertaining to labor and the environment. The treaty's defeat should not have a major impact on the United State or its markets. Although it could result in a loss of credibility with regard to the United States' ability to negotiate trade agreements with foreign governments. The reaction in Mexico to the treaty's failure might be more noticeable. It is estimated that Mexico's economic growth rate could more than double if the treaty passes.

If NAFTA is passed, some jobs will be lost in industries that depend heavily on labor. But many more jobs in other industries are likely to be gained. All of the major studies on NAFTA indicate that the treaty would produce a net gain of jobs in the United States. It is estimated that increasing trade with Mexico has created more than 400,000 jobs in the last six years.

If NAFTA passes, U.S. industries such as computers, petrochemicals, financial services, grain producers, manufacturers of telecommunications equipment, paper, steel products, pharmaceuticals and consumer goods should benefit. Industries such as apparel, electronics, toys, furniture, sugar refining, fruits and vegetables, tobacco manufacturing and lumber could be negatively affected.

Arguments that NAFTA would open the door to U.S. job losses to

It's important to note, however, that regardless of a positive or negative outcome with NAFTA, the affected industries would not experience a dramatic impact. Some estimates have put the effect at plus or minus 1 percent of industry output. Investors should be wary of buying specific industry groups or securities solely on the basis of the prospects for NAFTA.

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Eagles nuke Rosebud-Lott, 38-0

In the trenches, the Salado Eagles line beat up Rosebud-Lott.

The superiority of the Eagle offensive and defensive lines was a key factor in Salado's 38-0 spanking of the undefeated Rosebud-Lott Cougars.

The defense completely shutdown quarterback James Jones, whose explosive speed was for naught. Jones was forced to run laterally to the sidelines as the defensive line allowed no holes for the speedster.

In fact, the Cougars could only garner 99 yards total offense.

The stingy Salado defense also forced four turnovers. Jerome Peoples intercepted two Cougar passes and fell on a Cougar fumble while Shane Johnston recovered another fumble.

Richard Berumen tallied 15 tackles and Chris Duzich had 12 tackles for the Eagle defense.

On the other side of the ball, the Eagle offensive line of Mark Tubbs, Jerry Soto, Steven Dunlap, Nathan Daniel, and Marshall Adams pushed around the Cougar defense, opening up running lanes large enough for a small truck to go through.

Speaking of trucking, Richard Berumen carried 12 times for 106 yard, followed by Jason Hosch, with 13 carries for 94 yards.

Shawn Easley did his share of traveling, carrying 8 times for 81 yards.

Salado was able to tally just 10 points in the first

half. On their second possession, the Eagles drove 42 yards to score on a 1 yard dive by Jereme Hosch.

With 13 ticks left on the first half clock, Andrew Voelter showed nerves and

5. Adjust to your resources.

6. Adjust to those around you. It is extremely stressful to work or live with a person who is so blinded by their ideals and goals that they do not take into consideration the needs and agendas of those around them.

7. Develop secondary goals. A secondary goal allows you to succeed to accomplishing something from the experience, both in terms of real progress and emotional feedback, when the primary goal cannot be realized.

8. If successes are coming too easy, it may be necessary to raise your level of expectation. Likewise, if you never realize a challenge in meeting the goals you set for yourself you may be underestimating your capacity and selling yourself short of your potential.

Helpful Hints and Guidelines in Addressing Your Mail

When addressing outgoing mail, the suggested format is as follows:

Please note that account numbers, attention lines and similar type information should be the first line of the address.

The guidelines for correct addressing require that you use all CAPS, align the

address block flush to the left, include the floor (FL), suite (STE) and apartment (APT) numbers and directional, such as North (N), South (S), etc. If the suite or apartment number cannot fit on the mailing address line, it goes on the line above the address. Include the ZIP code (or better still) the ZIP+4 Code after the city and state.

If there's no room, place the ZIP Code on a separate line (flush left). You should use black ink against a white background and characters should be clear and sharp without touching or overlapping. The address must be

clearly visible in window envelopes, even when the insert shifts.

If a company you are corresponding with has two addresses, a physical address and a P.O. Box, the U.S. Postal Service will deliver the mail to the address shown on the line above the city,

Insured Mail: This type of service is used when you mail an item with value. When you insure an item for at least \$50, the item will be assigned a number and you will receive a notice of the mailing.

Hold Mail: This type of service is used when you are out of town on business or pleasure. You complete a form indicating the days you will be out of town and your mail will be held until you return. When you return, your mail will be available at the post office. You also need to let your letter carrier know that you want delivery of your mail resumed.

Postage Due: If you receive mail that does not have sufficient postage, you may refuse the piece of mail and it will be returned to the sender. You will usually receive notice of postage due.

General Information:

Mail is picked up at the outside boxes at the Salado Post Office at 4:50 p.m. Monday through Saturday.

Mail placed in the inside slots at the Salado Post Office, local mail, will be processed the first thing the next working day. The **SALADO ONLY** mail outside box is picked up the first thing the next working day.

Mail deposited in the inside slots at the Salado Post Office for out of town destinations is picked up at 4 p.m. Monday through Friday and placed in a container that is picked up by the mail truck at 4:50 p.m. and carried to Waco for processing.

If you have mail with an out of town destination and are mailing between 4 p.m. and 4:50 p.m. and you are interested in your mail leaving Salado as soon as possible, place your mail in the outside box (out of town box.)

percent of all small businesses fail in Texas during the first five years. Banks know this and yet the state legislature feels the state should become the lender of last resort, using your taxes as capital. Another factual reason for deep-sixing this measure is that there is already in place a federally funded Small and Minority Business Administration that can help those who the state wants to add to their list of hand-outs plus the fact that

all state agencies have been asked by the Governor and the legislature to give at least 30 percent of their business to small minority and /or women owned businesses. That is far and away more than the \$50 million that is up for grabs in this amendment. And last but far from least - why should voters approve an amendment that has no implementing law to go with it? Yessir folks, the legislature wants you to vote on an amendment while they

in turn failed to pass a law telling us how the amendment would be administered. Another "pig in a poke" type deal from our elected officials who must think we are all a bunch of rubes just arrived in town on a load of turnips.

Suggest this amendment - Number One on the Nov. 2, ballot be defeated. And defeated strongly so it will not come back to haunt us another day.
