## Country Christmas Weekend features homes tour Dec. 3-5

Salado's Country Christmas weekend Dec. 3-5, is a memorable time for everyone.

The real beginning of this weekend starts at the lighting of the **Village Tree and arrival of Mr. and Mrs. Santa, 5:30 p.m. Dec. 2**, at a location adjacent to the First State Bank on Main St. President of the Salado Chamber of Commerce Denver Mills will direct the evening with entertainment provided by Thomas Arnold Elementary students.

The dramatic effect of luminaries lining the Village streets, lighted Christmas trees at every establishment and costumed carolers is a creation of inspiring beauty.

**Two live Nativity Scenes** will be performed. The First Baptist Church members and volunteers will be located on Main St. with a live traditional performance of the nativity. Hours set for viewing are 6-9 pm. Dec. 3-4.

In addition, an authentic, live **Native American Nativity** will be performed

7-9 p.m. Dec. 4, at Mountain Mary's Tonkawa (on the access road) West side of IH35.

The many distinctive shops, galleries and restaurants offer the finest fare of holiday selections making your shopping and dining a pleasant memory.

**The Historic Homes Tour and Quilt Show** which is held in conjunction with the Christmas Stroll will open seven homes for the weekend visitors.

Included in the Historic Tour will be:

**The Old Red School House**, (recently dedicated as the Salado Civic Center located on Main St.), was built in the 1920s and recently was renovated through the generosity of magnanimous patrons, volunteer efforts and a caring community.

The freestanding **Quilt Show** exhibit will display upstairs inside the Salado Civic Center. The quilts supplied by local artisans will range from the very old to the newest contemporary designs. Each window of the exhibit will be adorned with dried indig-

enous plant arrangements created by set director Lesile Rollins, whose most recent achievements were displayed in the set of a Michael J. Fox movie *For Love of Money*.

**The Boles-Aiken Log Cabin**-built in the 1860s is thought to be the first school house in Salado. The cabin was relocated to Van Bibber Lane when threat of destruction was imminent.

**Halley House Bed & Breakfast Inn**-A Greek revival home built in the 1860s by Captain Robert Bonner Halley has been utilized as a home and early boarding house and now serves as a bed and break-

fast as well as a local gathering place.

**The Gardner's Home** located on Rock Creek is by design of early Texas style built by Salado craftsman Darwin Britt. Britt's technique and use of antique wood from Texas structures gives the home a classic warmth.

**Salado Creek Log Cabins**-Two 19th Century Log Cabins on Pace Park Rd. The smaller one was built in 1859 and the larger one's believed to be the original Bell County Court house built in 1853.

**Twelve Oaks**, located on Center Circle is the home of Bob and Sue Whistler.

The house, which was built in 1867, is a grand, limestone Greek Revival mansion.

**R.S. Farr House** which was built in 1875 was the home of Dr. R.S. Farr family for 111 years in Belton. The home was relocated to Roseway in Victorian Oaks in 1992 for complete restoration by owner George Kolb.

## Citizens outraged at rock crushing plant

### Letter expresses concerns for kids, environment

Area residents are up-in-arms about a proposed rock crushing plant to be built near Stillhouse Hollow Lake, Camp Tahuaya and the Outdoor Learning Center. Over 120 concerned citizens gathered last week at the Salado Civic Center to discuss this issue and came forth with one purpose: to stop the rock crushing plant proposed by Shallow Ford Construction Company.

The following letter has been sent to Congressman Chet Edwards and best expresses the concerns of those citizens gathered. Opposing viewpoints will be given adequate space, if needed, in future issues of the *Salado Village Voice*.

"Dear Congressman Edwards,  
We are concerned about the impending opening of a rock quarry in our community. The quarry and the associated rock crusher will be operated by Shallow Ford Construction Co. of Temple, Tx. The land upon which the quarry will be opened is

owned by Mrs. Patsy Cox Hinkle of Temple, Tx. The attached map indicates the estimated location of the quarry and rock crusher and the location of the adjacent residences and recreational areas.

The citizens of our community and the surrounding towns that use the recreational areas are outraged that the state of Texas has issued an exempt permit to operate a rock crusher for a quarry utilizing dynamite in an area sandwiched by recreational areas. These are areas that our children visit with their parents and teachers and scout leaders. In fact, the Federal Government has invested considerable money and time in developing the Outdoor Learning Center in and around the spillway area of the Stillhouse Hollow Lake. Our children will be visiting the Outdoor Learning Center at the same time that tons of limestone dust will be belching from the rock crusher and they could possibly be pelted with pebbles from a dynamite blast a couple of

hundred yards away.

The school buses that transport our children to the Outdoor Learning Center will compete with some of the 10,000 to 15,000 trucks that will be entering the quarry yearly. Thousands of children in the surrounding towns and their teachers have access to the Learning Center. It is our belief that the use of the Outdoor Learning Center would be greatly diminished or closed due to the danger of the land slides and rock falls caused by the dynamite blast shock waves along the vertical erosion cut of the spillway.

The Boy Scout Camp Tahuaya is used by scouts as far away as Waco. The natural springs and the wildlife on this camp are unique and are a source of pride for all in the area. The camp has horse drawn wagon tracks worn into a limestone rock slope. These tracks were made by the hundreds and thousands of river crossings of our forefathers that farmed and ranches along the Chisolm Trail

and by the pioneers that settled in this area. The camp is far enough away from I 35 as to have very little background noise. A natural quiet setting free from urban noises is a must for a scout camp experience.

The quarry will be located close to the Stillhouse Hollow Dam as indicated on the attached map. In fact the quarry could be as close as 2000 ft. which is 4/10ths of a mile. It is a known fact that there is a labyrinth of caves, crevices, and fissures throughout the underground areas adjacent to the dam and throughout an extensive area that extends along the Lampasas River past I 35 approx. 2 miles east of the proposed quarry site and approx 2 miles south to Amity Road.

The water levels in the private water wells in this area varies from 10 to 50 feet from the ground surface. Some of the well water may come from the edge of the Edwards aquifer and some of the well water may come from the Stillhouse Hollow Reser-

voir. The geologists we have talked with have indicated that our private water wells could be contaminated by the blasting and the deep cuts into the rock formation. Many of the caves and cracks adjacent to the dam were sealed during the construction of the dam. If the dynamite blast shock waves dislodges the seals and the underground caves are flooded with lake water, our wells would be contaminated and it would be expensive for the Corps of Engineers to repair the damage. It is also possible for the Edwards Aquifer to be contaminated which is the main source of drinking water for the people between Belton and Austin.

The proposed site for the quarry is

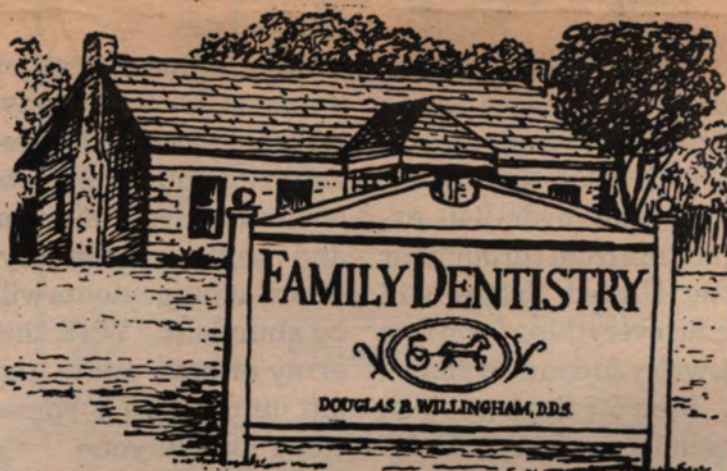

## Salado Eagle champions remembered

Some older residents of Salado are reminiscing about the day the Salado Eagles went all the way and won the championship.

The day was Dec. 2, 1967. The place was Tiger Field in Belton. The Salado Eagles soundly whipped the Wall Hawks 45 to 0 and made history.

The team members were these: Mike Grimm, Jr.; Donnie Everett, Fr.; Charlie Bunker, Jr.; Tommy Brown, Jr.; Frank Oldham, Fr.; Brad Green Fr.; Russell Mc Laughlin, Soph.; Jimmy Baker, Soph.; Freddie Fuller, Sr.; James DeWeese, Jr.; Hal Cearley, St.; Richard Mc Laughlin, Jr.; Felix Trevino, Soph.; Jimmie Cottle, Soph.; Troy

Fellers, Fr.; Cecil Cosper, Sr.; Gordon Oldhams, Sr.; Charles Evans, Sr.; Mark Peteete; Jr. Mike Adams, Sr.; and Jack Yarbrough, Soph.

The story really began in 1965 when Salado won their first district championship ever. It continued in 1966 when the Eagles won their district but lost a hard-fought bi-district game on penetrations when they tied Hutto 6-6.

Back in 1967, Salado was a Class B school. Class B schools did not go to state finals but ended their fight for the championship in regional play-offs.

In 1967, the Eagles started their season with a vengeance determined to succeed. They finished their season unbeaten, then beat out Leander 28-14 in a

bi-district game before 2,000 screaming fans in Georgetown. Then one week later on Tiger Field the story ended with the confrontation with the Hawks.

After struggling to an 11-0 half time lead, Salado re-charged its batteries, and backs Tommy Brown, Jack Yarbrough, Mike Grimm and Charlie Bunker along with Mike Adams took charge of things and ran up



five touchdowns in the point-happy second half.

Brown, who went over 2,000 yards rushing for the season found ample running room in the second half and gobbled up 183 yards while scoring touchdown on runs of 76 and 19 yards.

Grimm passed for two touchdowns to Bunker and Adams. Bunker got another score on a seven yard scamper while Cearley fell on a fumble in the end zone. Russell McLaughlin also got in on the act with a 27 yard field goal and four extra points.

Defensively, Salado was just as fierce, as Cearley, Grimm, Adams, DeWeese, Gordon Oldham, Coper and Russell McLaughlin helped Salado intercept two passes and recover two fumbles. Wall only managed 97 yards total offense.

The Eagles were unable to puncture Wall's defense during the second quarter while the Hawks knocked on the Eagle's goal line once. But that drive which began on Wall's 32 yard line ended when Grimm intercepted a pass and Wall's threat ended.

In the fading seconds of the second quarter, Brown and Adams combined talents by completing a 40 yard pass on Wall's 20-yard line. A personal foul moved it to the 10 yard line and McLaughlin kicked a 27 yard field goal to end the half at 11-0.

The fireworks didn't really get started until the last two minutes of the third quarter when the Eagles completed an 80 yard march with Grimm passing to Bunker. Yarbrough replaced Brown and forged ahead for most of the yardage in the third quarter.

With all the incentive flowing their way, Brown broke for 76 yards around left end the next time the Eagles got the ball, the kick for the extra point was good, and the third quarter ended with the score 25-0.

But Salado was not through for the evening as they drove 63 yards on their next possession with Grimm passing to Adams for 11 yards and the touchdown with 7:40 remaining in the game.

A poor Wall punt set the Eagles up for a scoring position one minute later. A six yard kick gave the Eagles the ball on the Hawks' 19 yard line and Brown scored on first down from there. The run on the

PAT try failed but the score board showed the Eagles to have a score of 38-0 with 6:50 remaining.

Salado later drove 54 yards for Bunker to on a 7 yard dash. McLaughlin kicked the extra point and the game ended with score of 45-0.

The story does not end here however.

In the aftermath, Salado placed nine men with three honorable mentions on the Coaches All District team. Brown and Adams made the *Temple Telegram's* All-Cen-Tex Team, Brown on the first team with Adams on the 3rd team. Brown also made the *Austin Statesman's* Super Centex Team and was listed as All-State Class B.

Brown won this honor the following year also.

During the champion-

ship year, Brown scored a yardage of 2143 on 273 carries making 20 touchdowns. He had a career total of 5,323 yards rushing breaking all high school records at that time. In 1969, he was listed as one of 10 "Blue Chip" high school players by Texas sports writers.

An interesting final chapter to this story was that Mike Adams was invited to play in the High

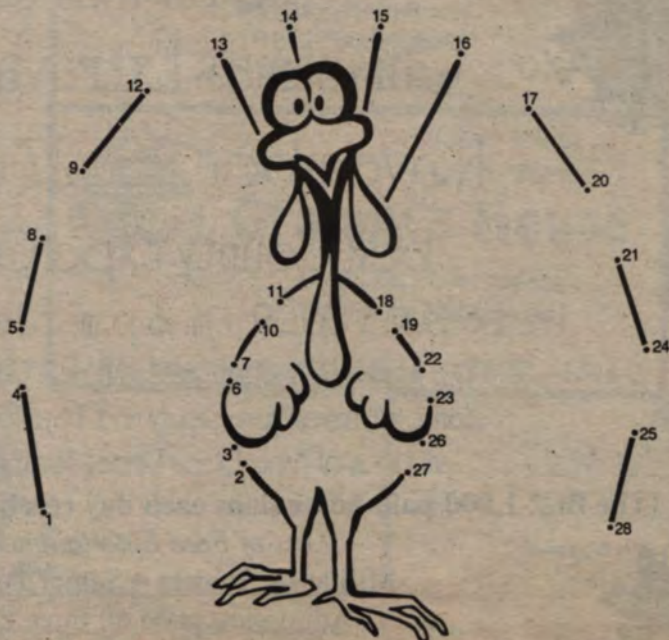
## The Story... The First Thanksgiving

Hectic holiday meal preparations can increase the chances for food poisoning especially among young children, said an expert at the USDA's Children's Nutrition Research Center.

"Children are vulnerable because their intestinal tract and immune system are not fully developed," said Dr. Kathleen Motil, an assistant professor of pediatrics at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "They may have less resistance to the bacteria that causes food-borne illnesses."

The severity of the illness varies from person to person. Symptoms include stomach cramps, nausea,

diarrhea and vomiting and, in some cases, fever. Symptoms can appear anywhere from two to 36 hours after eating and last several days.

When children become ill, parents should make sure they are given plenty to drink to prevent dehydration.

"Oral rehydrating solutions, available in most pharmacies, are better for toddlers and preschool age children because they contain appropriate concentrations of salts (electrolytes) that maintain their body fluids," she said.

Alert your physician if you suspect that your child may be suffering from food

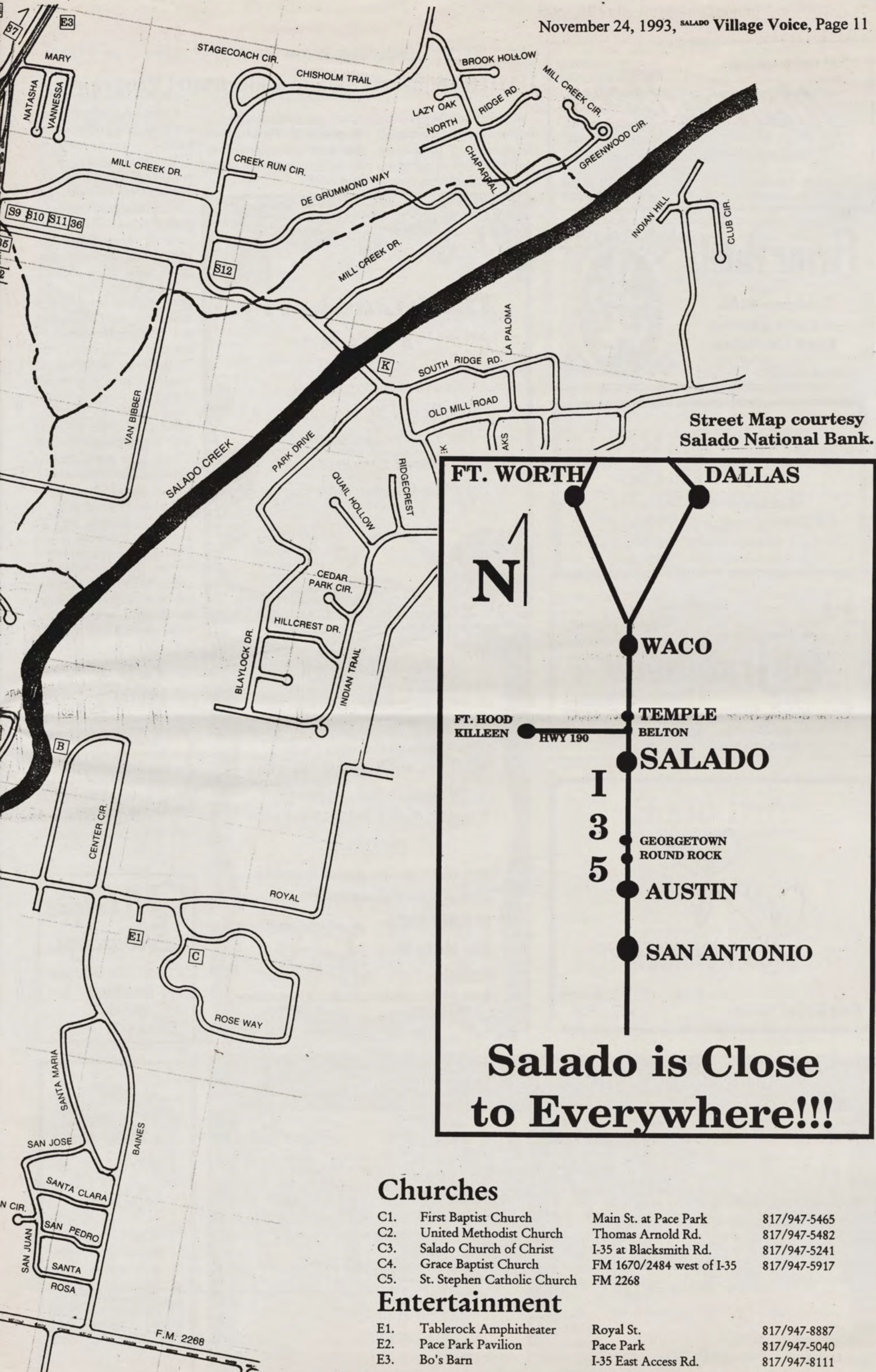

## UMHB sponsors Salado Elderhostel Program

University of Mary Hardin Baylor officials have signed an agreement to sponsor the Elderhostel program being conducted at Stagecoach Inn in Salado, beginning fall 1993. The program was previously sponsored by the University of Texas at Austin.

Elderhostel is an international, non-profit educational organization. Elderhostel consists of a network of more than 1,800 universities, colleges and other educational institutes that offer non-credit, short term (typically one week), residential academic program as for elder adults.

poisoning since a young child's condition can deteriorate quickly.

To safeguard holiday feasts, Dr. Corinne Montandon, CNRC nutritionist and assistant professor of pediatrics at Baylor provides the following food safety tips:

\* Buy quality foods. Check expiration dates carefully.

\* Do not defrost a frozen turkey at room temperature. Bacteria can multiply to disease-causing levels before the turkey is completely thawed. Instead, place it in its original wrapper on a tray or in a pan, and let it gradually defrost in the refrigerator. Follow manufacturer's instructions if meat or poultry is to be thawed in the micro-

wave.

\* Be aware of the dangers of "cross contamination." Avoid transferring bacteria by washing hands, utensils and work surfaces with hot soapy water. Uncooked poultry or meat should not come into contact with other foods.

\* Cook turkey until thermometer inserted into bird registers 180 F to 185 F. Juices should run clear.

\* Consider cooking the stuffing separately. Flavor the cavity with onion, celery and herbs. If you prefer to cook the dressing in the bird, mix dressing and stuff turkey loosely just before putting it in the oven. As soon as the turkey is cooked, remove the dressing.

\* To prevent bacterial growth, keep hot foods

above 140 F and cold foods below 40 F.

\* Foods containing dairy products, mayonnaise, or eggs should be refrigerated until served. That includes salads, pumpkin or cream-type pies, cakes with cream cheese or cooked icings and eggnog.

\* If children help out in the kitchen, discourage them from tasting cookie dough or other goodies that contain raw eggs.

The risk of food poisoning does not end after food is cooked, so treat leftovers with care.

Never leave perishable food out on the table or counter for more than 2 hours. It is best to promptly refrigerate or freeze leftovers in small, shallow containers for quick cooling.

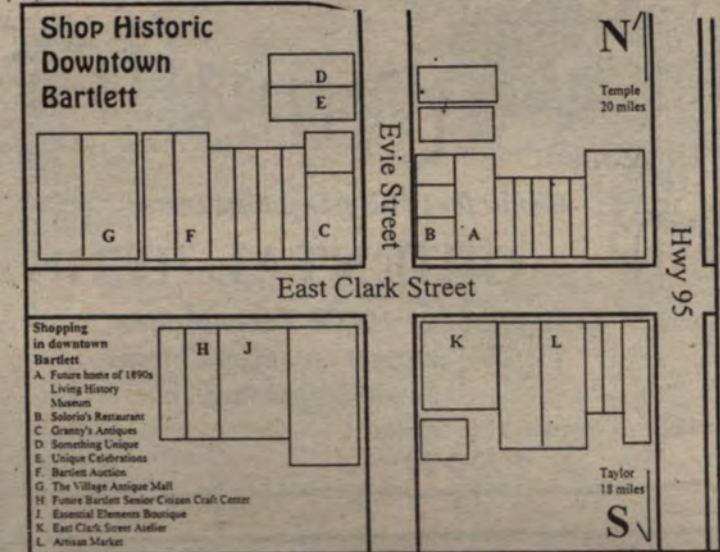
Use leftover turkey within three to four days or freeze for up to one month. Do not keep dressing and gravy for longer than two days and bring gravy to a boil before serving.

Food harboring harmful bacteria does not necessarily have an odor or spoiled appearance. Remember the adage: "When in doubt, throw it out."

## Addressing efficiently

The hand addressing of Christmas Cards and packages has become an iron-clad tradition. I'd like you to consider breaking it this year. If you're a personal computer user, why not use your machine to print peel-and-stick labels? A printed address - in the proper format - speeds through our automated equipment.

Peel-and-stick labels are a real time saver and allow you to spend more time on the sentiments insider. They are far easier to read on red or green envelopes.

The Postal Service doesn't want you to throw away those colorful envelopes, just put computer-printed or typed address labels on - and break the hand-written address tradition.

If you don't use computer-printed labels, here a few tips on hand addressing to improve the ability of our machines and people to read the addresses and speed your holiday greetings through the mail:

\*Print the address; black ink on a light colored envelope is best

lope is best

\*Keep a uniform left margin. Use all capital letters, and make sure they don't touch each other.

\*Eliminate all punctuation except the hyphen when you use ZIP + 4 codes.

\*Make sure the city/state/ZIP Code line is at least one inch above the bottom edge. If you use address labels, place them one inch above the bottom edge.

\*Spell out the city name, but use the two-letter abbreviations for states. Use a single space between words and between the state abbreviations and the ZIP Code.

\*Do not use the name of a building in place of the street address. In rural addresses, the route number should precede the box number.

\*Use the abbreviations AVE, ST, LN and RD for Avenue, street, Lane and Road, and use N,S, E, and W for North, South East and West.

These tips are not just for the Christmas season. Proper addressing should be used on every piece of mail, every day of the year.

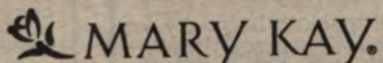

in the middle of one of the most environmentally sensitive areas in Texas. The federally protected Golden Cheeked Warbler has been sighted in the Outdoor Learning Center adjacent to the proposed quarry site. Hundreds of trees for the habitat for this warbler will be destroyed with the construction of a quarry. In fact, the fallout of dust from the crusher will drive these warblers from the Outdoor Learning Center.

As you can see from the above, we have real concerns for the safety of our children, for our environment, and for the quality of life for the immediate residents of the community. The noise and pollution of the operating quarry and crusher will certainly cause a decreased atten-

dance at the Outdoor Learning Center and the Boy Scout Camp.

Mr. Speegle of Shallow Ford Construction Co. will tell you that there is a real need for the grade 1 aggregate that he hopes will come from the quarry. Almost 99.9% of all road base crushed stone required by cities, private developments, and State of Texas road and parking lot construction is specified to be Type A, Grade 2 or 3. This aggregate is readily available in the quarries located on state highway 439. The haul distance would be approximately the same distance depending upon the construction project location.

Therefore, there is a readily available source of crushed rock for the Temple area for the road and parking lot construction that Shallow Ford Construction is involved with.

The harder rock that Mr. Speegle hopes to find on the Hinkle property would be used for concrete aggregate and the few projects that would require the harder aggregate for road base. We recognize that our local concrete suppliers are hauling aggregates from Georgetown, Copperas Cove, Nolanville, Gatesville etc. because of the building boom in the area due to the buildup at Fort Hood. However, any significant reduction in the troop population at Fort Hood could stop the building boom dead in its tracks as we have seen in the recent past. The concrete suppliers would then be able to be more selective about their aggregate sources. The insatiable demand they are feeling by the housing boom, service business expansions, and the construction of projects at Fort Hood will not go on forever.

It is also a recognized fact that significant quantities of hard rock needed for concrete aggregate is not available in significant quantities in Bell County. The pit north of Belton on 317 did not have a concrete type quality aggregate. The pit operated by Bandas on 439 near Nolanville has a limited quantity of hard aggregate suitable for concrete. Historically, the harder rock comes from areas southwest of Bell County. It is highly unlikely that a significant amount of hard rock will be found on the Hinkle property.

We have been told by knowledgeable sources and by local residents of the damage and dangers of living by a quarry. The dynamite explosions on the quarry near 439 have sent rocks flying one half mile to come to rest on 439. At least one house near the quarry had all the windows shattered by the shock wave of a blast. Similar stories have been told concerning the quarry recently closed on 317 north of Belton.

Congressman Edwards, the citizens of this community and the Salado-Belton area need your support in assuring that this quarry is not located by our Boy Scout Camp and by our Outdoor Learning Center and on our water supply. We ask that you contact the U S Army Corps of Engineers, the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, The Environmental Protection Agency, and the Mine Safety and Health Administration concerning this issue.
