Three teens killed in weekend crash

Three Harker Heights teenagers were killed and two other persons were critically injured in a two-car accident on IH-35 south of the rest stop approximately 11:25 p.m. Jan. 28.

According to police reports, a 1991 Plymouth Laser was south-bound on I-35 at a high rate of speed when it lost control, crossed the median into the north and collided with a 1983 Chevrolet pick-up.

The Salado Volunteer Fire Department responded to the accident, assisted by Belton Fire Department EMS units. Upon arrival Salado firefighters found three dead at the scene and one critical condition teen-

ager in one vehicle. The driver of the pickup was also critically injured.

Found were Bridgette Dulac, 18, and Daniel Dulac, 17, brother and sister from Harker Heights and Johnathan Denham, 17, of Nolanville. All were pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Don Svadlenak.

Robert Hossfield traveling in the vehicle driven by Bridgette Dulac was found trapped in the back seat. Salado firefighters used the Jaws of Life to free the passenger from the wreckage. Hossfield was transported to Scott and White Hospital by U.S. Army M.A.S.T. (Military Assistance to Safety and

Traffic) helicopter.

At presstime Jan. 31 Hossfield was still listed as critical condition in the Surgical Intensive Care Unit.

Darrell Byrd, 32, of Waco was transported by Belton EMS to Scott & White Hospital. Mr. Byrd was placed in the ICU, but was released Jan. 31.

This is the first fatal accident in 1994 that the Salado Volunteer Fire Department has responded to. Alcohol may have been a contributing factor.

Historical Society hosts general membership meeting Feb. 17

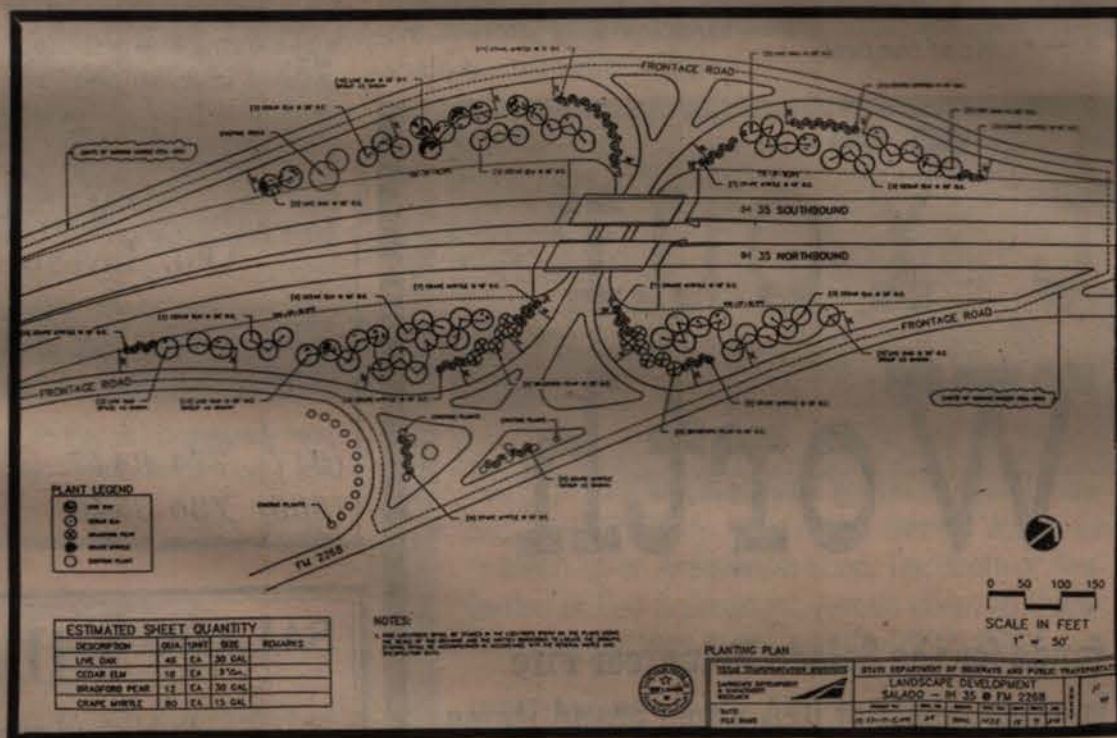
The Salado Historical Society Covered Dish Supper and General Meeting is 6 p.m. Feb. 17 in the Salado school cafeteria.

Beautification begins here on N. Main St., I-35 access

As announced by the Texas Highway Department in previous weeks and obvious to everyone who lives in Salado the highway beautification project is underway.

In the Line of Fire is a doozy of a movie. It takes a premise I find uncomfortable, the possible assassination of a U.S. President, but does a very good job with it. In the Line of Fire is somewhat reminiscent of **Three Days of the Condor**.

Clint Eastwood stars in this blockbuster thriller as Secret Service agent Frank Horrigan. Horrigan was assigned to guard President Kennedy when he was assassinated. An anonymous killer reminds him of this again and again as he toys with the elder agent.

John Malkovich is chilling as the killer. It is his best role since **Of Mice and Men**.

Rene Russo plays alongside Eastwood as a young Secret Service agent. Predictably, Russo and Eastwood become romantic interests, but it doesn't detract from the real meat of the movie, the conflict between Eastwood and Malkovich.

In the Line of Fire promises to keep you on the edge of your seat from beginning to the explosive conclusion. It will be available on videocassette Feb. 9 at IGA Village Foods Videos in Salado Plaza.

It is hard to be a moderate Democrat these days at the national level, what with Dole-The-Terrible and Gingrich-The-Slasher running amuck on the right and Brother "Slippery" Moynihan skulking to the left as his worthies man the "progressive" barricades. Clinton may find leading the way through the legislative maze, to secure what middle or main stream voters want, an impossible chore - what with both sides pot-shooting his every move!

What will probably happen is token reform on all three issues. Health care may be directed to just those without protection thus leaving the rest alone - a good idea; some movement away from non-work-

ing welfare recipients through job creation and a limit on number of years a person can remain on the rolls - also a good plan if the jobs materialize and lastly - as much crime fighting as the budget can stand. At least 10,000 more police officers and plenty of prison beds using perhaps some unusual sites - like former military bases, also not a bad idea. The war on drugs will continue to be a losing cause with token bucks being thrown at this root cause of crime - that and the helplessness of no work, no family ties and no homes.

Clinton has energy and a deep desire to do the right thing. Problem is he thinks the right thing is more government to solve more of the nation's ills. This has never worked and never will - but the beat goes on in both parties to one degree or another. Each of the major political groups wants to stay in office and the way you do that is by keeping government big - not reduced! Despite the GOP counter rhetoric.

If Clinton's personal problems don't sink him - he will win reelection on the sheer force of his drive and ambition and youth. Folks appreciate those who

500 kids attend Jay Novacek Football Camp

Five hundred campers ages 8-18, in helmets and pads on a summer afternoon, are dispersing after an awards ceremony on closing day. Many wear T-shirts that read "I Survived the Jay Novacek Football Camp." The kids, and their parents, head to countless cars. The scene is perfect camp chaos—siblings and dirty laundry, trophies and high-fives and a few tears

of good-bye. Standing in the midst of the chaos, leaning against his pickup on the campus of East Texas State University, is serene Jay Novacek, talking softly and earnestly with a father.

The boys have come to Novacek's camp for a week to learn football from Jay and his Dallas Cowboy teammates. While he's had them in what might be called a weakened state—infatuated with Troy Aikman's arm, Ken Norton's muscle, and Michael Irving's speed—Novacek has tried to give the kids some life-advice when they weren't expecting it. "It isn't enough for pro athletes to be good role models," Novacek tells the man. "Winning the Super Bowl was a great feeling, but if we can help one kid turn his life around through my camp, it is better than winning the Super Bowl."

"The main theme behind the camp is for each player to have a great time, meet a lot of Dallas Cowboys and to learn a lot of football," Camp Director, Chuck Bollweg said. "But our main goal is to instill a positive attitude through football in every camper. We instruct our coaches very heavily to make sure that no matter what the players skill level, they will leave camp feeling good about themselves."

This June, Novacek will again head a teaching team of 50 coaches and 10 to 15 of his Dallas Cowboy teammates to teach young players football. "Jay's camp is not a figurehead camp," Bollweg says. "Jay stays at the camp 24 hours a day and the Dallas Cowboys come to camp to work with the athletes. They get right down in the dirt with the young players every practice." The campers range in ability from novices to All-American high school players, and are divided into groups according to age, size and ability. Information on the top 30 high school players is mailed to over 500 college coaches in hopes of finding them a scholarship. Salado FFA members to show in Houston

Several Salado High School FFA members will join other 4-H and FFA members from throughout Texas for show ring competition at the upcoming Houston Livestock Show, Feb. 19 through March 6 at the Astrohall.

These FFA and 4-H exhibitors compete in one of two divisions of the Houston Livestock Show - the junior show division. The other division, the open show, attracts its exhibitors from the world's agricultural industry, who are primarily professional breeders and ranchers.

Entries in both the open and junior shows combine with horse show entries to make the Houston Livestock Show the world's largest.

Representing 878 Texas 4-H clubs and FFA chapters, the junior show is expected to draw more than 11,000 entries this year. A variety of animals are shown in the junior show division: market steers, market swine, market sheep, market poultry, beef and dairy heifers, breeding

sheep, goats, commercial steers and breeding rabbits.

The four market animal categories (steers, lambs, barrows and poultry) represent animals raised by the exhibitor as food sources. Top animals in each of these categories are eligible for their individual market auctions. Total money paid in 1993 at the four junior show auctions exceeded \$3.5 million.

"The most significant part of our livestock show is the junior show," said Steve Woodley, Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo manager. "It represents Texas youth and their commitment to education, discipline and agricultural development."

The 1994 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo begins with horse show competition, Wednesday, Feb. 16, followed by other livestock competition beginning Saturday, Feb. 19. The first rodeo performance will be held at 7 p.m. Saturday, Feb. 19. All events conclude March 6.

Saturday matinee performances begin at 11 a.m. All Sunday performances will be held at 4 p.m., while all evening performances begin at 7.

Ticket prices are \$10 and include admission to the horse show (excluding National Cutting Horse Association sponsored events), the livestock show, the carnival and the rodeo. Tickets can be purchased at all Ticketmaster outlets, including the Astrodome box office. Tickets also can be charged by phone at 1-800-726-1313.

Bartlett receives \$142,913 grant from Parks Dept.

The city of Bartlett has been awarded a grant for the amount of \$142,913 from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission on Jan. 20.

Mayor Bobby Hill of Bartlett and Doyle Sebesta of Sebesta and Associates attended the meeting to accept the grant. The application for the grant was prepared by Sebesta and Associates of Georgetown.

A total of 44 applications were submitted, and 25 projects were funded. Bartlett's application ranked 17th and represents the first submittal to the state park agency in the City's history.

The project will consist of 3 baseball fields, a jogging trail, a tennis court, 2 playscapes, picnic facilities, horseshoe pits, parking and landscaping. The park will be constructed using a combination of city forces, local youth, league volunteers and contract labor. The project is designed to serve the needs of a variety of age groups. The new park will be located on a ten acre tract on the north side of Bartlett.



Exercise in later years

Age is no excuse for avoiding Exercise says an expert in physical conditioning at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

In fact, some common health problems related to aging can be reversed with simple exercise says Dr. Alan Herd, a professor of medicine at Baylor.

Simple activities, such as walking, can prevent and lessen the effects of heart disease, stiff joints and low energy.

"Walking is economical, easy and usually does not require a medical clearance," said Herd.

Herd also recommends "chair" exercises for people over age 65. He says a daily routine of these simple calisthenics can improve range of motion in most joints and make getting around easier.

"Chair exercises are easy and can be done at home," Herd said, "neither while seated or while standing with the hands on the chair back for support, slowly rotate and flex all the major joints and the torso."

Books about chair exercises are available at many book stores and libraries.

Other ways to work the joints while improving cardiovascular health and

muscle tone are swimming and water aerobics,

Herd says exercise should be stopped any time there is pain. Angina (chest pain) should be taken seriously, but does not necessarily mean there is a heart attack. If it occurs, stop the activity and stand or lean against something for a few minutes — then call your doctor.

Many stressful exercises such as running, tennis or rowing can put a strain on the cardiovascular systems of people who do not exercise regularly. Anything other than simple calisthenics, walking or chair exercises should be discussed with a physician.

Herd is living proof that exercise can benefit people of all ages. He is 62 years old and runs about 30 miles each week, a level of exercise he reached by gradually increasing his effort over many months.

"I know that most people my age have not exercised all their lives and cannot jump into a heavy workout schedule," Herd said. "Still, that is no excuse to put off exercise. Simple exercises will improve mobility, health and frame of mind in the elderly."
