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Gov. Abbott orders schools closed until May 4

Texas Governor Greg Abbott on March 31 extended his closure of Texas public schools until May 4 in response to the coronavirus outbreak and mirroring President Donald Trump's announcement on March 29 that he was extending the Center of Disease Control guidelines for social distancing until April 30.

In the week since his previous press conference regarding coronavirus, the disease spread from 715 Texans testing positive for COV-ID-19 to 3,266 positive tests. COVID-19 has been diagnosed in 122 of 254 counties. As of March 24, Gov. Abbott reported that COVID-19 had been diagnosed in 65 counties. Gov. Abbott reported that as March 24, 11 patients had died due to the coronavirus. Coronavirus-related deaths in Texas jumped to 41 by March 31.

As of March 24, Texas had conducted about 11,000 tests. As of March 31, that number jumped to 42,900 tests being conducted. "Just over 11% of those tested are testing positive," he said.

"Now is not the time for us to let up," Gov. Abbott said during the March 31 press confernce. "We must redouble our efforts. We must make sure we do more to rid ourselves of coronovi-

With that in mind, Gov. Abbott announced that he was extending the closure of Texas public schools until

He said Texans must limit

"If at all possible, please stay at home," Gov. Abbott stated. "You are compromising your health, exposing yourself."

While Bell County Judge David Blackburn had not taken any action in response to the Governor's announcement on March 31, it is likely he will do so later this week, if the past pattern of announcements hold true to

Blackburn announced on March 27 that his Directive #3 was being replaced by Directive #4, which does only two things.

First, it adds gun shops as an essential retail business.

Second, it changes the wording of the directive to prohibit gatherings of 10 or more people. "Nothing in this Order prohibits the gathering of members of a household or living unit or for purposes of worship. However, places of worship are strongly urged to heed and follow the guidelines for limiting the number of people gathering, utilizing alternative means for worship to include livestreaming and videoconferencing, and to follow the social distancing guidelines. The demographics of many faith-based organizations comprise significant numbers of the COVID19 high risk population group and gatherings in numbers greater than 10 puts those congregating at dire risk."

Gov. Abbott reaffirmed this on March 31, adding that one of the ways that churches might be able to gather congregations is to have "drive up church."

Local couple comes home from 14-day California quarantine

It will take more than 14 days in quarantine to keep Saladoans Vic and Janice Means off of a ship.

Since they married a decade ago, the Means have taken about 23 cruises to just about everywhere in the world (except Australia and Africa).

The couple returned to Salado late at night on March 24 after being quarantined for two weeks at Marine Corps Air Station Miramar.

"We don't know where we're going next, but we know we're going" Vic told

me while we sat on the porch Facetime in mid-March. of their house on Main Street Salado.

The Means were on a Princess Cruise cruise ship that had 21 cases of coronavirus on it after 45 people were tested on board the

They spent five days in quarantine on the ship itself, which was heading back to California following a 15day cruise of the Hawaiian

All the passengers and ew of the ship were held in quarantine for two weeks, during which time they were tested.

I talked with them via

They had been tested the day before and were expecting results later in the week.

"Thank goodness for this technology!" Janice told me this week. "We were able to Facetime with our kids and grandkids so that they didn't worry about us so much."

Janice also used her iPhone for daily conference calls with medical staff from the Department of Health and Human Services during the quarantine period.

"They kept us up to and answered any questions we had for them," she said.

The couple also had meals delivered three times a day by the medical staff on base. "We had to put on our masks in order to answer the door," Janice said.

The couple boarded the Princess Cruise ship on Feb. 22 for a 15-day round trip cruise from San Francisco that stopped at all of the Hawaiian islands.

It was on the return that the virus was detected on the

'We got to know each other better in the past couple of weeks than in 10 years of marriage," Vic joked.

He says they enjoyed the time together, sleep late,

Aldermen will revisit moving election on April 16

Salado aldermen failed to follow the advice of their own legal counsel, as well as the recommendation of the Legal Director of the Texas Secretary of State office when they voted 3-2 March 26 to put off until April 16 a decision to postpone the May 2 election to November 3.

Aldermen met in emergency session March 26 to consider moving the May 2 election date to November 3 in light of the Stay Home directive #3 issued by County Judge David David Blackburn that remains in place until 11:59 a.m. April 6. Voting is not one of the essential activities that is an exception to the Stay Home directive.

The March 26 Emergency meeting followed new direction sent to local governing bodies on March 24 from the Secretary of State's Legal Director Christina Worrell Adkins.

Mayor Skip Blancett, in a video posted to Salado Local at 9:36 p.m. March 24, stated that "a telephone call came about noon to our Village administrator Don Ferguson and it simply said 'an order has been given for 3 November. All elections,

federal, state and local will be 3 November. And so, our election, our local election for Mayor and two aldermen will not be 2 May but will be 3 November." Salado Local is a public Facebook group of 491 members with Gayle Blancett and HB Davis as Administrators.

Don Ferguson told *Salado* Village Voice March 25 that "I did not get a phone call from the state. I got an email from the state."

The March 24 email from Adkins, Legal Director of the Election Division of the Texas Secretary of State, refers to Governor Greg Abbott's March 18 proclamation "to allow political subdivisions that would otherwise hold elections on May 2, 2020, to move their general and special elections for 2020 only to the next uniform election date, occurring on November 3, 2020, without otherwise adjusting the term of office."

Adkins further states in the email that "many local political subdivisions are enacting shelter-in-place orders, this has a significant impact on elections. If your entity or your county has issued such an order, you need to move your election; otherwise you are putting your election at risk of an election contest due to voters not being able to exercise their right to vote."

Adkins further states that "some political subdivisions have enacted fines for violating their local ordinances; if your order does so and there is no specific exemption for voting or conducting elections, you put your voters at risk of criminal penalty for leaving their homes to vote."

On March 23 County Judge David Blackburn issued Directive #3, a Stay Home Stay Safe order. However, the order did not include a criminal penalty in it. County Commissioner Bobby Whitson said this "was inadvertently left out" of Directive #3 but added that the Judge "is making changes to the directive that will put the same penalties in place similar to the 2nd Directive and a few other modifications for clarity." However, Bell County Directive #2 states: "Failure to comply with this Directive is an offense punishable by a fine of up to \$1,000 per day or confinement in jail for a term not to exceed 180 days."

The Shelter in Place Directive #3 ends at 11:59 a.m. April 6. In-person early voting for a May 2 election begins on April 20.

The Secretary of State email reconfirms that "The Governor's proclamation only authorized a move to November 3, 2020. There is no authority for a local political subdivision, on its own order, to move an election to any other date."

However, if an entity would like to move to a date other than November 3, there are "likely only two ways to do so," according to the Secretary of State office.

The first way — a direct request to the Governor would not apply to the Village General Election. It only applies to Special Elections.

The second would be for the Village to seek a Court Order for an alternative date.

Some have questioned why the Village general election cannot be held concurrently with the Primary Election Run-off, which was postponed by Gov. Abbott until July 14, 2020 — the same date as the special election for Texas State Senate District 14. Sec. 41.007.d of the Election code states that "No other election may be held on the date of a primary election."

Governor Greg Abbott on March 18 issued a proclamation suspending provisions of the Texas Election Code to

allow political subdivisions to postpone their May 2 local elections until Nov. 3.

"I strongly encourage local election officials to take advantage of these waivers and postpone their elections until November," said Governor Abbott. "Right now, the state's focus is responding to COVID-19 - including social distancing and avoiding large gatherings. By delaying this election, our local election officials can assist in that effort."

After that proclamation, the Village added an emergency addendum to its March 19 meeting agenda, but because the addendum referred to a September election, rather than a May election, the board could take no action at that time. Instead, aldermen met on March 22 and voted

During the March 26 meeting, Ferguson told aldermen that he contacted Salado ISD, which moved its election to Nov. 3. "They are not interested in staffing the May election," he told alder-

He also informed aldermen that the County asked that the Village inform them by not later than April 13 if the Village is going to move the election.

"There has not been edict that moves our election by the state. The Board sets the election. The Board has to move the election. The Governor says it is a local decision. He has said that from the beginning. It is before you today because of the legal memo we got that is pressing," Ferguson told aldermen.

"The Governor's action empowers the Board of Aldermen to move the election from May to November," Alan Bojorquez told aldermen during the March 26 meeting, calling in to the meeting. "They are clearly recommending, suggesting and advising that you move it to November. Not requiring it."

"How valid is a May election going to be if people are afraid to leave their homes," Bojorquez added. "Well-intended people are scared and are not going to stand in line, get near people or touch anything."

Bojorquez advised aldermen that with the virus and stay home advisories in place, "there is clear vulnerability in the law for election contests under the Federal Voting Act and the Texas

Big negatives & big positives abound in tumultuous week

Reversing its recent trend, our preferred stock market indicator, the S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) rose what would have been in other times a startling 10.26% to close at 2,541.47 for the week ending on March 27. That otherwise impressive rise is far from a recovery as the SPX is still down over 21% so far this year and almost 25% from its high last month. While a 25% decline is still a bear market, we will take what we can get. Anecdotal reports suggest that at least part of the panicked selling that took the Index down well over 30% at several points came as a result of highly leveraged hedge funds rushing to unload stocks to cover their loans. On the brighter side, corporate insiders, executives of publicly traded companies, appeared to be purchasing their own companies' stock at a near record rate during the week. Comments in the Wall Street Journal article included statements like, "This doesn't justify a 30% fall in stock prices."

At least so far in this event,

the yield on the benchmark 10-year U.S. Treasury note appears to have hit its lowest point on March 9 when it closed at 0.569%. It closed this week at 0.72% but that yield was down well over 30% from a week ago. Because the 90day T-bill was yielding 0.03% at the close of the week, the Treasury yield curve is showing a healthy positive slope, forecasting better times ahead in 12 to 18 months. The President has been asking for negative rates here in the U.S. for some time and he got his wish on Wednesday and Thursday as the 90-day T-bill annualized rate dropped to -0.05%. Looking back one year, it was about this time in 2019 that the Treasury yield curve inverted, and we warned that the inversion was forecasting a recession in 2020. West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) prices made a valiant effort to rise during the week and actually rose 9.93% but the closing price on Friday was still only \$21.82 per barrel. Futures contracts for August of this year only have it priced at \$30.33 and prices like that spell doom for many

Market & Economic Update

Big negatives and big positives abounded during the week. Goldman Sachs forecast a 25% reduction in U.S. business activity for the second quarter and a record 3.38 million workers applied for unemployment compensation for the week ending March 21. Economists appeared to universally warn that the record unemployment claims rate was only the tip of the iceberg and the totals would go into the millions, dwarfing the total layoffs we saw in the financial crisis of 2008-2009. The positives included the U.S. Senate setting aside partisan animosity and passing a coronavirus relief act unanimously. The House of Representatives almost did the same as leaders from both parties agreed that they should unite to send the bill to the President even though at least one representative threatened to stop the show. The passing of the \$2.2 trillion CARES Act, signed by the President late Friday, was like a breath of pure oxygen to the economy and demonstrated that our lawmakers were, at least for the moment, nearly all willing to work together for the good of the nation.

Meanwhile, the IRS delayed the income tax filing deadline to July 15, and the CARES Act allows people who would otherwise have to take required minimum distributions from their IRAs to not do so for 2020 and to reinvest an amount equal to what they had taken already this year. If it is coronavirus related, IRA owners can take up to \$100,000 from their accounts without penalty and spread the tax due over three years. They also have the right to reinvest what they took out and get the taxes waived! Any time the IRS and Congress decide to work together to make life easier for the public is a time to rejoice!

In the midst of all of this,

the SEC waived rules that would have prohibited companies that managed mutual funds from injecting money into the funds to stabilize them. Goldman Sachs and others quickly shored up the reserves of money market funds and stabilized them at their standard price of \$1.00 per share. Adding to the positive moves at the highest levels of the U.S. financial system, the Federal Reserve created a backstop for money market funds and first pledged and then took action to buy municipal bonds, mortgage bonds, and other debt securities when there was evidence of a lock-up in a market that suddenly had a host of sellers and no buyers. In short, the federal government and the Federal Reserve (No, they are not the same thing!) have taken substantial and vigorous actions early in this crisis to limit the economic damage.

All of the positive moves are a good start, but the worst of what we are to face is still in the future as an economy and as a national community. Frankly, despite surpassing the number of diagnosed coronavirus of China, we are still woefully ignorant of the actual number of people infected. Unemployment, infection, and deaths are far from their peaks. Historical examples strongly suggest that it will be August at the earliest before the infection rates drop to a level that will allow some degree of normalcy to return. Then, epidemics and pandemics have historically had a second wave that hits, often as hard as the first, once society lets its guard down.

This crisis is far from over, but we are working together more than at any time since 9-11. We will survive this, and we believe that the rebound on the other side will be at least as impressive as the shock on this side. Stay well and keep your distance and wash your hands. If you have the ability, contribute to your local food

Moscow 1981. My late husband and I and our two small children were assigned to the American Embassy in Moscow for a two year tour. As diplomats we were lucky. Toilet paper and canned goods came from our military bases in Germany. But for locals, the long lines for goods and bare shelves were a way of life. You would see shoppers with rolls of toilet paper, threaded and carried across their chests like bandoliers, as smug in their haul as a Costco shopper.

Our movements were restricted. We were only allowed to travel within a 35km zone, had to live in an apartment for foreigners only and were not allowed to socialize with the locals,

The big difference, of course, is that we were allowed to socialize with each other in the apartment complex, and that made all the difference. Our health wasn't threatened and we did not live in fear of contagion. Sure, I would wait in line to buy bread. We had no Netflix, videos or TV shows

(unless you counted a Soviet worked), kept us in shape.

It is the social connection, family, the friends, the link to our humanity that keeps us going. The more compliant we are with the government restrictions, the more patient and supportive of each other, the sooner we can get back to something we have surely taken for granted. I know. I was back two days in Salado when the travel ban was announced for the UK and Ireland. My present husband is Irish and back in Ireland and I am here. I was supposed to go back in April but who knows when flights will resume. So, like most Americans, I am texting, Skyping and What's Apping daily. Amazingly, I feel the closest to my husband when we are just on the phone. (There is something unnerving about a closeup shot of my husband's frozen face, eyes closed and mouth twisted when the video chat freezes and our conversations sound like a badly dubbed movie) it is our 20th wedding anniversary next month. I would love a hug but I'll accept a roll of toilet paper...

Election Code. Whoever loses probably has an automatic lawsuit on their side."

Ferguson told aldermen that on March 24, the Village had a call about the emergency powers of the Mayor. Later in the day, the Village received the email from the Secretary of State's Legal Division.

"Let me say, to set this record straight. I misheard what Don said," Mayor Blancett said of the March 24 communications. "When I hung up the phone with Don, at the same time I was dealing with this, I was dealing with Ft. Hood closing. I thought that it had come through the legal team that we were not, we couldn't do May."

Blancett questioned Coggin. "Do you have numbers or a survey? Do you have anything to back up what you just said?"

"Absolutely," Coggin responded that he started receiving phone calls at 7 a.m. about the Mayor's video. "They thought they were being misled."

"Did you call me," Blancett asked Coggin.

"No, sir. Did you call me before you posted it?" Coggin replied asked the Mayor.

"If you didn't call me, how did you know what I was thinking?" Blancett said.

"I saw your video. It was pretty straightforward," Coggin said.

"It was very straightforward," Blancett replied.

"I called Don. He said the information was incorrect," Coggin said.

"I know, Don called me. He had the courtesy to call me," Blancett said.

"Well, Mayor, have you ever called me on anything?" Coggin said.

"No," Blancett replied. "Nor will I."

Coggin gave the motion to postpone the ordinance until April 16. Alderman Amber Preston-Dankert gave the second.

"April 16 will give us an idea of whether we will be in shelter-in-place. If we will be in shelter-in-place I will be one of the first ones to vote in favor of moving the election," Coggin said.

In the 2018 Village of Salado Mayoral election, 794 total ballots were cast. Of that, 609 were cast in early voting.

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Gov. ratches up travel restrictions

Gov. Greg Abbott ratcheted up travel restrictions into Texas March 29 during the new coronavirus pandemic, while announcing the state's first pop-up hospital to deal with the crisis. He also said he was moving to "stop the release of dangerous felons" amid the outbreak.

Abbott said he was dramatically expanding a previous executive order that requires a 14-day self-quarantine for anyone flying into Texas from New York, New Jersey, Connecticut or New Orleans. Now, the state is also mandating a 14-day self-quarantine for anyone driving into Texas from anywhere in Louisiana and for those flying in from Miami,

Atlanta, Detroit and Chicago, as well as anywhere in California and Washington.

In Texas, Abbott said the state's first ad hoc health care facility to respond to the pandemic will be the Kay Bailey Hutchison Convention Center in Dallas, an original hotspot for the outbreak at the state level. The convention center has the capacity for 250 beds "with plenty of room to massively expand that number if needed," Abbott said.

At the same time, Abbott said there is "plenty of hospital capacity" to deal with the outbreak statewide and existing hospitals remain the "primary location" for treatment. He said the number of hospital beds available for coronavirus patients statewide more than doubled in the past week, with over 16,000 beds free as of Thursday. Most of those beds became available after he issued an executive order a week ago banning non essential surgeries in the state.

Elaborating on the new Louisiana travel restrictions, Abbott said they will be enforced by the Texas Department of Public Safety "at and near entry points from Louisiana." The restrictions do "not apply to travel related to commercial activities, military service, emergency response, health response or critical infrastructure functions," Abbott said.

Abbott's order comes as state and local officials continue to battle over whether it. to release as many as thousands of inmates awaiting trial from the Harris County Jail, where at least one inmate has tested positive for the new coronavirus and some 30 others are showing symptoms.

Advocates have fought for as many inmates as possible to be released from county jails, citing the increased risk of spread giv-

and Texas Attorney General Paxton on Sunday asked to intervene in a federal lawsuit in Harris County in which a federal judge is weighing whether and how to release Harris County Jail According to the Houston Chronicle, Harris Coun-

ty Judge Lina Hidalgo had been drafting an executive order for compassionate releases of inmates on nocost bonds before trial, but shelved it over concerns that Paxton's office would halt

There are, as of March 29, at least 2,552 coronavirus cases in Texas, including 34 deaths, according to the latest figures from Texas Department of State Health Services. Almost half of Texas' 254 counties — 118 — are reporting cases.

There have been 25,483 tests done in the state, according to the DSHS num-

Abbott said 176 Texans have been hospitalized due to the coronavirus, which Abbott emphasized is still a small fraction of those who have contracted the disease.

The growing spread of coronavirus throughout Texas comes as Abbott continues to resist calls to issue a statewide shelter-in-place order, a move that many of the state's biggest counties and cities have already taken. Asked Sunday about the possibility of further statewide action, Abbott said he was waiting to see new federal guidance that is expected to be issued this week. Later in the afternoon, President Donald Trump announced that national social distancing guidelines would extend through April 30.

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
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UIL releases final alignments for 2020-2022

be disrupted, the virus can't do its job. For those having trouble finding well-known cleaning agents, these alternatives may suffice.

HOT WATER AND SOAP

The reason hand-washing is at the top of the list of sanitizing methods is because it is so effective at washing away viruses and bacteria. Friction from scrubbing with soap and water can help break the protective envelope, states the EPA. Soap and water can clean all surfaces in a home, especially when applying a little extra elbow grease.

HYDROGEN PEROXIDE

As people clear isopropyl (rubbing alcohol) off the

shelves, do not discount hydrogen peroxide. The CDC says household hydrogen peroxide at 3 percent concentration can deactivate rhinovirus, the virus that causes the common cold, within six to eight minutes of contact. Coronavirus is easier to destroy than rhinovirus, so hydrogen peroxide may be effective at combat-

ting that virus as well. Natural items can be used for general cleaning, but have not been endorsed for use on COVID-19 disinfection. In lieu of shortages, white vinegar, baking soda pastes and citrus oils and juices could fill the void of chemically-based cleansers for other home tasks.



The bidding: South West North East Pass 1 NT Pass 3 🏚 Pass Opening lead — jack of diamonds.

At the outset of play, a defender often finds himself in the dark, trying to guess how to proceed. Once the play begins, however, much of the guesswork can frequently be eliminated if the defenders communicate properly with each other.

Here is a case in point. South reached four spades as shown, and West led his singleton diamond, taken by dummy's ace. Since it was not likely that he would ever reach dummy again, South continued with the diamond king and discarded a club. East in the meantime had followed to the A-K of diamonds with first the seven

and then the deuce. West ruffed the second diamond but was at a loss as to what to do next. Forced to lead away from one of his kings, and influenced by South's club discard, he shifted to a club, and that was that. Declarer took the jack with the queen, drew trump and conceded

two heart tricks to make the contract. Of course, if West had shifted to a heart at trick three, the defense would have collected the A-K of hearts and a heart ruff, and West's king of clubs would eventually have put South down two. The question, therefore, is whether there was any way for West to know

he should shift to a heart at trick three. The answer is yes, but it wasn't West who was at fault. The blame lay entirely with East, who gave his partner no help whatsoever on the first two tricks. When the second diamond was led from dummy, East knew full well that his partner would ruff. He should therefore have availed himself of the opportunity to steer West in the right direction by means of a suit-preference signal.

Instead of following mechanically with the deuce at trick two, East should have played a much higher diamond — preferably the queen. West could hardly have mistaken this vociferous signal as anything but a request to shift to the higher-ranking suit side — namely, hearts — and the defenders would have enjoyed a much more satisfying ending.
