## Salado Art Fair will feature 183 artists in many media

The 28th Annual Salado Art Fair, Aug. 6-7, held in Pace Park offers oil paintings, watercolors, sculpture and a variety of crafts.

Round-trip bus transportation is provided from the free parking area while handicap parking is located at the fair grounds in the park. Salado civic organizations provide food and drinks to be enjoyed in the nearby hospitality tent.

Admission to the Salado Art Fair is \$3 for adults, free to children under 12.

Included in the fair is the Public Library "Friends" book sale and the Salado Chamber of Commerce Auxiliary drawing for a handmade quilt. Tickets for the drawing are available at the Auxiliary booth.

A free booklet containing a map charting the location of each of the 180 artists booths is issued at the gate.

Participating for the first time in the Salado Art Fair is Jim and Judy Dodson.

The Oklahoma couple share studios adjacent to their country home. Jim is a traditional bronze sculptor of the old American West and wildlife. However, he does not limit himself to these areas, believing a true artist knows no boundaries. He was raised in the rustic surroundings of Lake Murray State Park, Ardmore Oklahoma.

His love for wildlife and the American Indians is shared through his Art. Telling a story and giving attention to realism are some of his strongest qualities.

Judy was raised in New Mexico which she credits for the strong Southwest influence which can be seen in her watercolors, capturing the mystical shades of the desert.

Like many artist she has chosen to express herself in several media, watercolor, sculpture and writing.

The verses that accompany her paintings are written to give a better understanding of the piece of work. According to Judy, "...one should not confine the mind when studying a painting, only guide it in the right direction."

Although she spends much of her time with her Art, she still finds the time to conduct workshops, give private lessons and lectures to various clubs and civic organizations.

## SISD hires Ed Thomas as new high school principal

The Salado I.S.D. Board of Trustees hired Charlie Ed Thomas, of Joaquin, as high school principal during special session June 28. The board also accepted the resignation of trustee Grant Critchfield, to be effective immediately.

Ed Thomas served one year as principal of Joaquin High School and Junior High School.

Prior to that, he served in Beckville I.S.D. for 10 years as athletic director, teacher and head coach (1983-1986) and as principal of Beckville Elementary School (1986-1993).

He was also an instructor in weightlifting and racquetball during the sum-

mer at Panola College in Carthage (1985-1993).

He was athletic director, head coach and teacher at Parkview Christian Academy in 1980-1983. He coached junior high school and varsity athletics at China Spring High School 1976-1978 in addition to his teaching duties.

He managed Quality Care Nursing Service in Waco from 1978 to 1980.

A graduate of Robinson High School in Waco, he attended Tarleton State University and McLennan Community College. He earned a B.S. Degree in secondary education, physical education and biology from Baylor University in 1976.

He earned a Master of Education degree in 1985 from Stephen F. Austin University as well as being certified in mid-management and superintendent.

Beckville Elementary campus was awarded a Governor's Educational Excellence Award for test scores consistently above the state average while Thomas was principal of the school.

The elementary school also received commendations during a visit to the school by Texas Education Agency in the following areas: Gifted and Talented program, Dyslexia program, ESL program, Volunteer program, faculty and staff, and facilities.

After discussing the proposed building program, trustee Roger Hunter requested BLGY be present at the next meeting July 5 to address the board. The results of that meeting were not available at presstime.

If **In the Name of the Father** had been produced in any other year than PC-93 (that's politically correct 1993), it would have mopped the floors at the Academy Awards. With the exception of **Schindler's List**, **In the Name of the Father** was the best movie of 1993.

Daniel Day-Lewis was robbed of the Best Actor award, as it was given to Tom Hanks by the politically correct Hollywood crowd. Day-Lewis already has an Oscar for Best Actor, though, for his performance in **My Left Foot**. He is, in my opinion, the best actor in movies today.

As a street thug in Ireland, Day-Lewis is accosted, arrested and wrongly imprisoned for a crime he did not commit. What is honest and best about this film is that it does not portray him as an angel. He is a thug and is guilty, but not of the crimes he is accused of committing.

Question? What do you do in Salado when citizens perceive a problem is developing? Answer? Call a meeting! And that is exactly what was done this past week by Chamber of Commerce president Jap Barrett. The problem that surfaced dealt with the increased growth of certain visitors to Pace Park and Salado Creek. Visitors who treat the park and creek area with harshness these days unlike our yesteryears when it was pleasant and safe to take children to play in the water. Back when Salado had not been "discovered" by the hordes who are not interested in the village, the shops, the historic homes and other attractions that bring the type folks all of us appreciate.

The meeting was held this past Thursday at the Civic Center. Attendance was sparse with 16 showing up to express opinions and suggestions. The extent of the problem was divided among those present but one thing became apparent - if nothing is done to curb the slovenly enthusiasm of some visitors, the park and creek will become permanently trashed and eventually de-

stroyed by fire, junk and reputation to the point that the crown jewel of Salado will be lost, thus removing one of the key elements that draws welcome guests to the village.

Paid-for security in the park and along the creek was discussed with the "who will pay" a major question. A curfew for the young people of Salado who the group said appear to have a hand in some of the problems both in and out of the park was set on the table, but again, there was the cost of enforcement plus the question of who can legally set such a curfew.

Closing the park at 10 p.m. by putting up gates at entrances was fancied and will be discussed with highway officials since closing off a county road may not be legal.

President Barrett explained to the group that the Chamber of Commerce manages the park through a contractual agreement with the Pace Park Trustees and the high cost of operating and maintaining the park is derived through rentals of the pavilion plus

a grant from the general revenue fund of the chamber.

The group asked Barrett and several others to visit with the county sheriff to see if increased patrols out of Belton can be assigned to the area in question to help enforce the rules of the park as they now exist. Also, the chamber board will be asked to consider increasing the cost of renting the pavilion and reinstating the rule that provides that groups using the pavilion have a local resident as sponsor. The merchants committee of the chamber will discuss with member shop keepers the possibility of assessing members sufficient funds to put an off duty law enforcement official in place during holidays and weekends to see if this will curb the appetites of destruction bent visitors.

It appears that the "discovery" of Salado Creek and Pace Park came about several years back when rains closed the Stillhouse and Belton Dam lakes. This year both parks charge an entry fee which also turns park and water enthusiasts towards Salado.

It would seem that a concerted effort by merchants,

## When Cotton was King exhibit receives award from Commission

"When Cotton was King," an exhibit currently at the Bell County Museum, has been selected to receive a Texas Historical Commission Museum Award. This award recognizes outstanding achievement in exhibit design and interpretation. The museum's exhibit is one of only four throughout the state in its category to receive the prestigious award.

The exhibit, designed and implemented by former curator Krista Hartsell and former director Alice Sutton-Burbank, also involved the efforts of many volunteers who assisted in the construction of the exhibit.

"When Cotton was King" explores Bell County's role in this important aspect of Texas' agricultural history.

In 1913, the town of Rogers shipped out more cotton than any other community in the United States. Every family in the county was affected by some aspect of the cotton industry; this exhibit brings together many diverse members of the community in telling a story of a common history. In addition, volunteers who helped with the exhibit came from Belton, Temple, Killeen, Rogers, Troy, Bartlett, Little River-Academy, and Pendleton.

The exhibit uses historic photos, maps, and cotton equipment to tell the story of the cotton industry in Bell County. One aspect of the exhibit's appeal to the Texas Historical Commission is its "hands-on" areas in which museum visitors

can actively participate in the many processes of cotton production.

"Our goal was to make this a county-wide project," says former director Sutton-Burbank. "The exhibit is also successful, however, because it bridges the gap between older generations, many of whom have vivid memories of the cotton industry, and younger generations who can gain an appreciation and knowledge of this important aspect of county and state history."

The exhibit continues at the Bell County Museum through August 1994. The museum is located at 201 N. Main St., Belton. Museum hours are Tuesday through Saturday, 1-5 p.m. Admission is free.

He coached at high schools in Georgia and Florida before joining the Clemson staff in 1978. Clemson won the NCAA 1-A national football championship in 1981 while Reedy was an assistant coach for running backs. He has coached in nine bowl games and has coached six conference champions. Thirteen of his former players went on to play in the NFL. He is credited with being an innovator of the triple stack formation and option offensive alignment. Coach Reedy will lead the Bears into the Big 12 Conference.

Reedy and his wife, the former Janet Dobson, have four children: Kris, Brooke, Blaine, and Brienne.

**Sunburn Relief**

(NAPS)—Although sunburn can be both a major discomfort and a major health hazard, there are steps you can take to alleviate some of the risks associated with this painful skin condition.

Try to stay out of the sun between the hours of 10 am and 2 pm. That's when the sun's rays are the strongest and you are at greatest risk for sunburn.

When you do venture out into the sun, use a sunscreen with a Sun Protection Factor (SPF) of at least 15, preferably. That means the lotion will keep your skin from burning for 15 times as long as it would take your skin to burn normally.

Apply the sunscreen at least 15 minutes before you go outside. That will allow the protective ingredients enough time to uniformly coat your skin.

If your skin does get burned slightly, the best

When my father was young, smoking was supposed to be cool, something that everyone did. About thirty years ago is when I'm talking about. When someone is a chin smoker, they always have chronic bronchitis. Both of my father's parents smoked since they were young children. I guess that basically since my father was brought up around it, he used it just as his father. My father had two brothers, one older and one young. The older started, then my father and then the youngest. The three weren't only brother but also friends. When I say that I mean that they didn't just love each other, but they also liked each other and that is pretty special.

When I was young and my father and uncles were adults, they still felt the same way about each other, like they had some kind of bond or something. Years passed and not a whole lot changed. All three

were still smoking but they still had the bond.

As I became older, every summer at one time or another, the three would get together and have a small gathering with just them and there families. At these gatherings, we would go to a park or something and barbecue, swim, play volleyball and just be around each other. There were some times when the three would have problems and have some trouble getting along. But it always seemed they would forgive each other and they always had the bond. I'll always remember... I was 11 years old and the phone rang. It was my father's older brother. "He has lung cancer," my father said with a look of surprise on his face. Six short months after that, my uncle passed away and it seemed as though the bond died.

About two months after that, my father threw away his cigarettes and stopped. That put a smile on my face because after my uncle died, I was scared he would die, too. But after he stopped, in some strange way it brought back the bond.

Next year, the Social Security Administration will automatically issue Earning and Benefit Estimates to every worker over 60, detailing how much he or she has contributed and what retirement benefits he or she can expect. Currently, a worker has to request such an analysis.

The death of Richard Nixon has focused more attention on so-called living wills. Surveys show that 90 percent of Americans support the idea of a living will to specify what medical treatment they desire. But strangely, only 10-20 percent of people have actually written a living will.

Authorities in several states have warned elderly consumers about salesmen selling nursing home insurance and living trusts under company names that may resemble those of respected organizations, like the AARP.

Nursing home insurance sales have grown dramatically since the policies were introduced a decade ago. Sales increased from 815,000 in 1987 to 2,930,00 in 1992. The number of companies selling the insurance grew from 75 to 135.

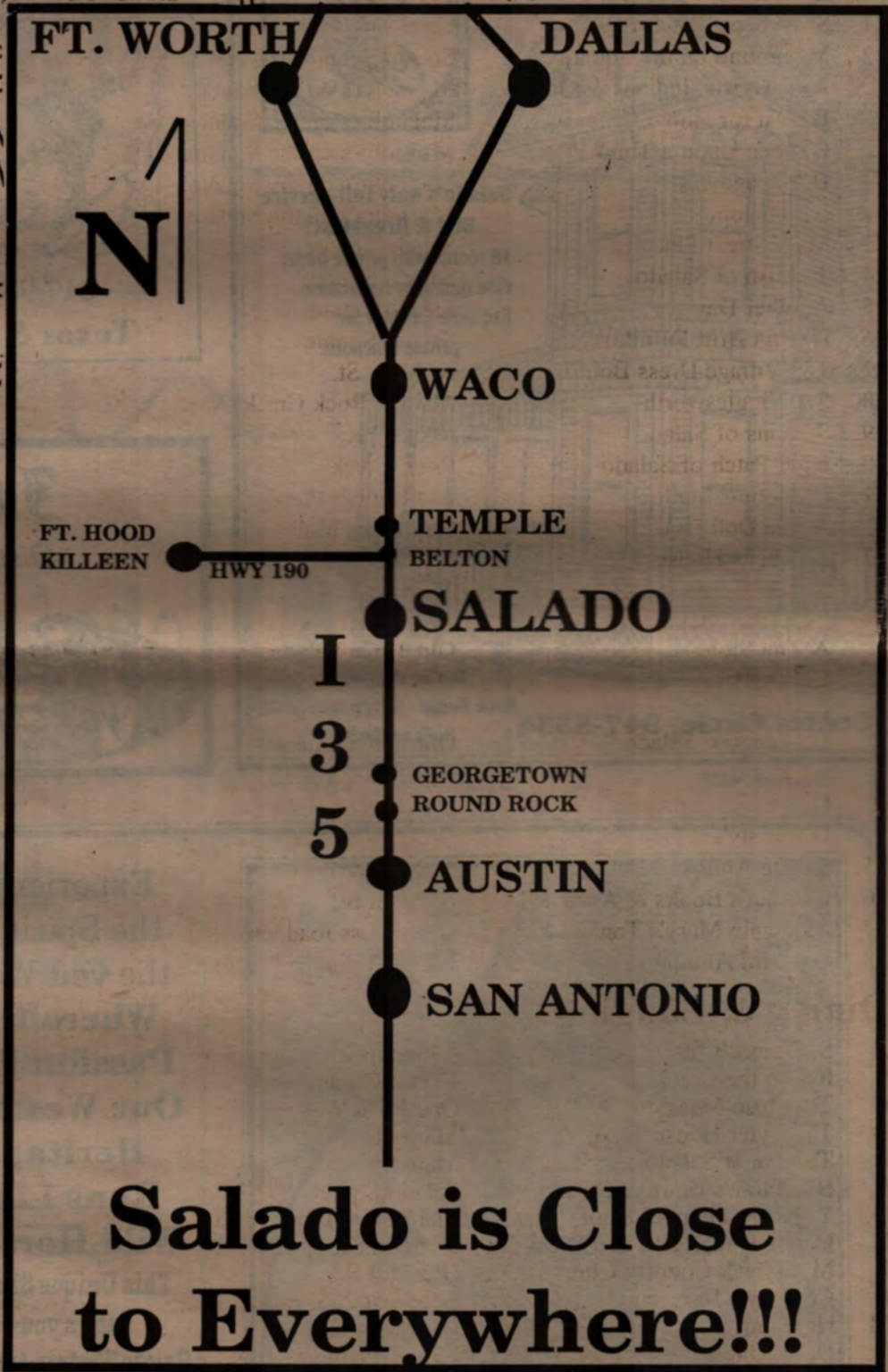
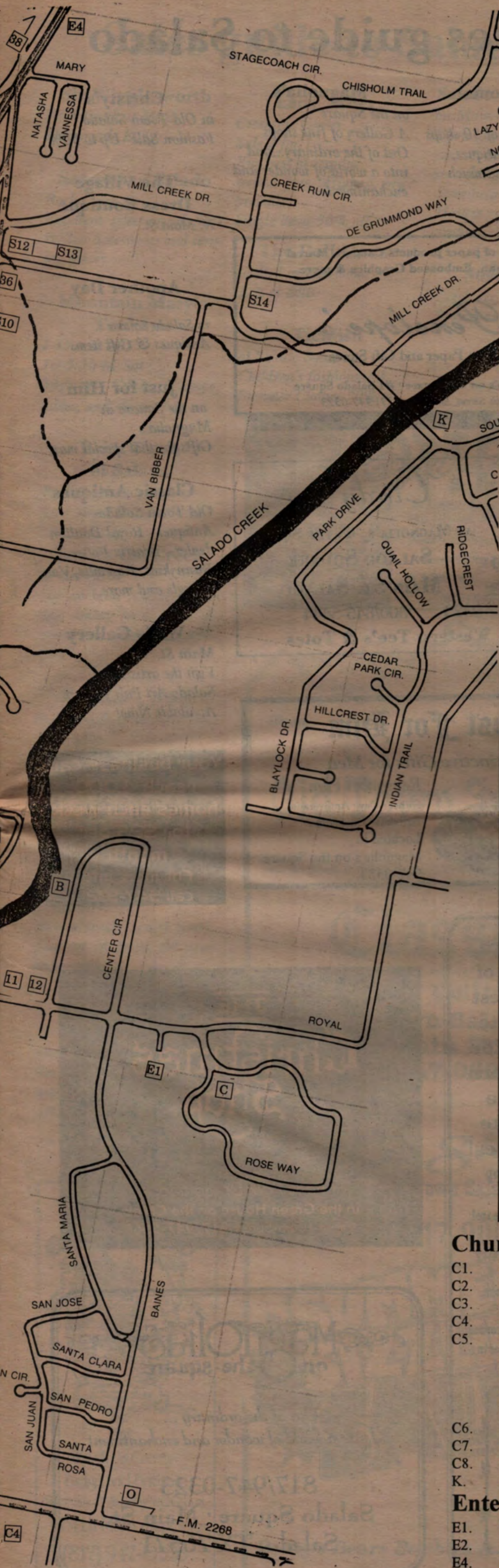

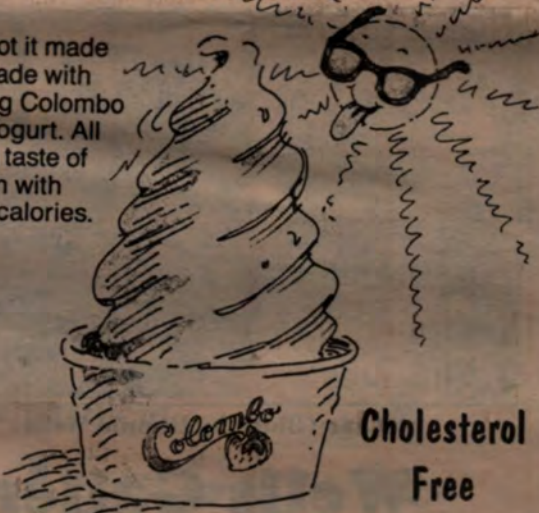

In small bowl beat cheese, orange juice concentrate and honey to blend thoroughly; mix in nuts. Cut cake into 12 equal slices. Slice 1 basket of the strawberries. Spread 4 slices of cake, on one side, with some of the cheese mixture. Top with half of the strawberry slices, dividing equally. Spread 4 more cake slices, on both sides, with more cheese mixture; place on first 4 cake slices. Cover with remaining sliced strawberries. Spread remaining cake slices, on one side, with remaining cheese mixture; place cheese-sides down on sandwiches. Cut diagonally into halves; skewer each with a sandwich pick. Serve sandwiches with remaining strawberries, halved. Dollop with whipped cream; garnish with mint sprigs.
