Teaff recalls lessons learned during speech to Salado Lions

Former Baylor Head Coach Grant Teaff announced publication of his new book, Coaching in the Classroom, at the Salado Lions Club Aug. 10.

Teaff is now executive director of the American Football Coaches Association and has traveled over 450,000 in that position.

Teaff recalled the impact of teachers on himself, his family and his players through the years. "One common denominator among those teachers considered to be the best by their students was that they coached in the classroom," Teaff said.

"By coaching in the classtook control of the classroom and created a learning environment. The way they taught the fundamentals of success far outreached others. They were able to motivate and teach lifelong skills," Teaff said.

Teaffalso spoke of teachers giving their students a work ethic and horse sense.

Teaff recalled two free." coaches who had a lifelong impact on himself, his approach to teaching and

"Speedy Moffat and Mule Kaiser were two young coaches fresh out of Texas Tech," Teaff said. "They came to coach at Snyder High School and none of us had ever been more impressed then the day we met Texas Tech football players who were now our coaches."

More impressive than their past careers were the lessons the two young coaches taught their players, lesson which Teaff has handed down to the hundreds of players he has coached.

discussed with the Salado Lions were these:

"If you want to be successful, discipline is needed both on and off the field."

"If you want to be successful, you must give your total effort on the field and off the field."

"To be successful, you

must strive to be error-

"To be successful, you must care about what you are doing."

Teaff shared anecdotes about how he learned these lessons.

On discipline: "Every game day, I would meditate and think about the ball game and how good I was going to be. After reporting to class, I would sneak off and go down to the creek where I would think about the great plays I would make and how we would win the game. It was very positive thinking. Every game day, I would show up early at the locker room at 5 o'clock

"One day, I showed up at 5 and noticed a bunch of cars around the locker room. Walking into the locker room I noticed all the other players were already suiting up. The room fell silent as I saw Mule Kaiser standing in the center of the room with a stack of wood at his feet.

"He explained that the earlier meeting time was



announced at school and that I was the only one later

because I was not in school for classes."

"Before he was finished with the stack of firewood on my backside, I understood what discipline meant. So did all the other

Teaffalso recalled a game in which his Bears were penalized three times for personal fouls during one

"In the locker room after

the game, which we won, I explained that those fouls could easily have cost the game. I also explained how they were unnecessary because they were provoked through a loss of emotiona control.

Teaff also remembered Trooper Taylor, a player who missed a year due to injury and rehabilitated through most of the final season for both himself and



The trial is being conducted by Scott & White in conjunction with the Texas A&M University Health Science Center College of Medicine.

Researchers are seeking about 50 more men to com- a pill every day. plete enrollment.

The study is part of the national Prostate Cancer Prevention Trial that will involve 18,000 men throughout the country. Researchers are especially interested in finding men of African-American or Hispanic descent.

Scott & White and the Texas A&M University Health Science Center College of Medicine are among

Men at least 55 years old, four centers in Texas to participate in the trial.

> Researchers are looking for men with the following qualifications:

> Must be at least 55 years old, in good health with no major health problems.

> Must have a Prostate Specific Antigen (PSA) score of less than 3.0 and a normal prostate upon an urologist's examination.

> Must be willing to take

Must be willing to have annual prostate exams and blood tests at the Scott & White Santa Fe Center in Temple.

Must be available for telephone calls every three months.

The research team is prepared to closely follow each man in the clinical trial for the next seven years.

Medical researchers are studying whether the drug finasteride (also known by the trade name of Proscar) can prevent prostate can-

Cancer of the prostate is the most common form of cancer and the second leading cause of cancer deaths in American men. All men over the age of 40 are at risk for prostate cancer although men between ages 55 and 75 are more commonly identified with the disease. About one in 10 men in the U.S. will develop prostate cancer. The good news is that survival rates for all stages of prostate cancer have improved over the last 50 years, increasing nearly 25 per cent in the last 20 years.

The Prostate Cancer Prevention Trial is a Scott & White team effort, led by Michael R. Hermans, M.D., principal investigator and Scott & White urologist who is also associate professor at the Texas A&M University Health Science Center College of Medicine.





Dear Editor:

Whether we realize it or not every week we make decisions that directly affect the environment of our planet. The choices we make are a never-ending series of votes for or against the environment. When we buy or use something, we are consuming, and we are creating waste.

The waste in our garbage cans is trash only when it is mixed together. When trash is separated into its components, it provides many resources than can be reused or recycled into new products.

Every year we employ 10,000 garbage trucks to dump the 19.7 million tons of garbage we generate in Texas.


About 60% of that garbage is recyclable. Currently in Texas, we bury about six million tons of paper each year. Americans throw away enough office and writing paper annually to build a wall 12 feet high stretching from Los Angeles to New York City. We discard enough glass containers to fill the 1350 foot twin towers of New York's World Trade Center every two weeks. Texans receive, and usually discard 300,000 tons of junk mail every year.

A4 foot stack of newspaper saves a 40 foot pine tree. Recycling glass saves up to 32% of the energy used to make glass. Recycling one aluminum can saves enough energy-to run-a TV forthree hours. Steel cans are 100% recyclable.

We all generate garbage: thus every citizen has a responsibility for its disposal. Every time we throw something away, we make a decision regarding solid

We can change our habits by reducing, reusing and recycling. Now is the time for a recycling center in Salado. Are you ready to become involved in recycling? This is a project for communityhomeowners, businesses, schools and churches. Come one, come all to our first meeting on Monday, August 22nd at 7 p.m. at our New Recycling Center, in the parking lot west of the IGA. 

Saladoans learn it's an emu nation when they attend convention in Nashville

Mr. and Mrs. Bobby Ricks and Coach and Louann Smith of Salado may have thought they were raising emus in isolation until they attended the American Emu Association Convention and Exhibition in Nashville Tenn. this past week. More than 3,000 persons attended the fifth annual gathering!

They discovered that

10,000 U.S. families now pen raise about 400,000 of the tall, flightless birds known as "the new American livestock," according to the first-ever national emu census conducted by Southern Methodist University in Dallas.

The Ricks, who have about 400 birds on 77 acres, have been in the emu-raising business for 6 years.

"The emu is one of the fastest growing, most dynamic alternative agribusinesses in the nation, with remarkable interest being shown internationally," said Betty Odle, president of the 5,500 member Dallasbased organization.

Summer of Salado

The emu breeders attended seminars and presentations on product development and marketing, biosecurity and management techniques, financial planning, tax issues and global interest in the bird as a potential source of low fat meat and an environmentally compatible animal.

Doug Atkinson, trainer for the Dallas Mavericks, spoke about the use of emu oil by NBA players to treat and heal bruises, strains and stiffness. Researchers

on the content and composition of emu oil addressed the convention along with veterinarians.

But it was not "all work and no play," as the conventioneers cruised the Cumberland River on the General Jackson Riverboat, kicked up their heels to tunes played by the Music City Country Club, and enjoyed the sights and sound of the famous Opryland Hotel with its sparkling atrium gardens, live bands and dancing waters music.

"Emus are the new frontier in ranching and these men and women are the pioneers of a young industry offering a whole new range of opportunity," Odle said. "Emus may prove to be the range of opportunity," Odle said. Emus may prove to be the salvation of the small farmer and rancher and lead to improved diets and health for millions of Americans, if not the world."

In 1993, FIC provided 1,018 residents space in the shelter including 602 children. The average daily population was 23 person. Meals served during the year were 24, 843. Total cases of domestic violence that crossed their doorstep was 2,154. New

sexual assault cases counted 344 including 70 children.

There were 129 volunteers donating their time

to total 18,803 volunteer hours.

The May 23, 1994 issue of Time magazine featured the FIC Killeen shelter in an article on family violence in the military. However, FIC serves a significant civilian population as well, noting this

"military problem", it is a community problem. FIC operates on a bud-

get of slightly over \$400,000 annually. Of

this, only six percent of the revenues are allocated for administrative expenses. FIC also relies heavily on its volunteers and operates a continuous volunteer training program.

While family violence and sexual assault are not pleasant topics to discuss, these are real issues in our local and national community.


