Construction set to begin in Salado Sept. 20 on sections of Interstate 35

Construction begins next week on a project to resurface a 1.7-mile section of Interstate 35 near Salado, according to Area Engineer Jim Cowan with the Texas Department of Transportation.

Young Brothers Inc. Contractors of Waco will begin setting barricades. Actual construction could begin as early as Sept. 20, according to the contractor's schedule.

The contractor will pave IH35 from FM 1670 north of Salado to three-tenths of a mile south of Salado Creek. In addition to the paving, the project includes widening the bridge at

Salado Creek.

The existing guardrail barrier, which separates the main lane traffic through Salado, will be replaced with concrete barrier walls. As part of the project, the deceleration and acceleration lanes at the Salado Creek access ramps will be lengthened.

Some closures of travel lanes and access ramps will be required during daylight hours. Motorists traveling in the area are urged to slow down, drive with caution and observe all flaggers and warning signs.

Work on this \$3.7 million project could be completed by the end of 1994.

Dedication of Civic Center nears for Saladoans, alumni

October 9, 10 o'clock, in the morning are the time and date for the long awaited and much heralded dedication ceremony that will transform the 69 year old red school house on Main Street in Salado into a newly renovated civic center that will be the new home for the Salado Library, Salado Historical Society and the Salado Chamber of Commerce.

Jap Barrett, chairman of the dedication proceedings noted that invitations had been sent to hundreds of former students, staff and administrators of the old school. The first class to graduate was in 1925 and the school continued to educate villagers through 1979 when the new high school campus on Thomas Arnold Road was opened.

Barrett also reported that a crowd of nearly 300 is expected including officials from all levels of government and the military, plus the many Saladoans who have had a hand in the massive renovation project that began several years ago.

Prior to the start of the dedication ceremony a high school band ensemble will entertain those present.

The concert and opening ceremony will both take place in the second floor auditorium.

Invocation will be given

The first Tuesday after the first Monday in November each year is designated Election Day. Some years we have gubernatorial elections; sometimes we vote for President, but just as surely as day follows night odd numbered years bring the same things for us to ponder on Election Day - namely a number of amendments to our Texas Constitution.

This year is no exception. We will have presented, for our consideration, some 16 new chances to add to our already overburdened constitution - it having been amended some 339 times since 1876.

This column will, over the next few week's, try to present each of these amendments - in English - rather than the gobbledygook the State uses when they "officially" print the proposed changes in the newspapers as they did last week and will do again before election day.

There is at least one amendment that merits passage and that is Number 15, which, if approved, would allow county voters, at an election called by the Commissioner's Court, to vote out of existence the office of county surveyor. If we could do this at the county level we would not

be fooling with the current amendment six and eight which do the same thing for Jackson and McLennan Counties at the state level.

As a general rule anything that would do away with an elected office at any level is worthy of consideration. More on all this later.

Civic Center

by Kenneth Townsend, Class of 1941 and will be followed by the Pledge of Allegiance led by Truett Williams, also Class of 1941.

Master of Ceremonies will be Denver Mills, currently serving his second year as president of the Chamber of Commerce. He will introduce the special guests plus a number of individuals and groups who have made significant contributions in time and money to make the dream of restoring the unused school building come true.

According to Chairman Mills: "This will be an unusual dedication ceremony in that we do not plan to have a major speech or a series of speeches. Only a few brief remarks from the three special benefactors that put us over the top in funds needed to complete the project."

The three benefactors include: Morris Foster,

Class of 1961, and currently the chairman and CEO of Esso International; Paul J. Meyer and family and the Meadows Foundation for their grant of over \$100,000.

Mills will introduce the members of the Salado School Board who agreed to lease the old building to the School Foundation group that will be operating the civic center. Also the board of the Salado National Bank which provided a loan to assist in the renovation and the Chamber of Commerce board of directors which has worked ceaselessly this year and last to direct a project that will provide a much needed center for activities within the village as well as for visitors seeking rest and information.

President Mills will turn over a symbolic "key to the building" to Stewart Smith, president of the Old Salado School Foundation to indi-

cate the passing of responsibility for the operation of the building from the Chamber to the Foundation. Smith will introduce his board and then ask four very special graduates of the old school to do the ribbon cutting honors. This group includes: Bill Bridges, Lois Sheppard and Proctor Capps who are the oldest graduates of the old high school, having graduated in 1931, and who have lived in Salado all their lives. The fourth ribbon cutter will be Wilhelmina Carsten Friedrich, Class of 1936, who is the first person to compete all eleven grades in the school having started as a first grader in 1925 and graduating in 1936.

Following the formalities there will be light refreshments and tours of the building, hosted by supporters of the renovation project.

Chairman Barrett commended all those who are working to make the Oct. 9, dedication a success including: Andy Phair, who is handling the detail work of preparing the registration of guests, and the myriad of details needed to put on a dedication of the size and scope planned.

Others singled out for special credit by Barrett are: The Village Artists, Salado Lions Club, Carl McQueary, programs; Village Artists, hosts and hostesses; Salado High School Band; Laura McQueary, Chamber secretary; Pat Barton, history of the old school plus many unsung workers from the school, the chamber and the community who have put in hundreds of hours getting things ready for the big day.

Artco-Bell, headquartered in Temple, was also highlighted for their contribution in donating a

large number of the new chairs for the auditorium and for a reduction in price for other chairs purchased. The Indeco Company of Belton was similarly mentioned by the leaders of the restoration movement for their contribution in helping provide well over half the cost of a stage that will be used in the auditorium not only for the dedication but for all future activities in the building.

Subsequent issues of the *Salado Village Voice* leading up to the dedication will feature a history of the old building, the work leading up to the renovation plus the actual planning done and the final touch that put the building on line for use by the village. A feature on some early graduates will also be included plus a final news wrap-up just prior to the opening and dedication that will include any last minute changes or additions.

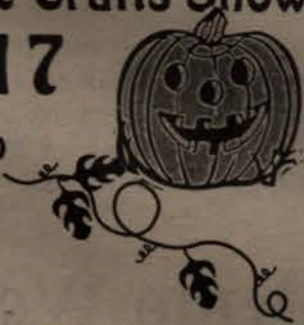
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Higher individual tax rates increase benefit of long-term capital gains

Part 3 of 4 in a Series

Investors hoping that the new tax law would provide further relief from taxation of capital gains didn't find many provisions written into the law to fulfill those hopes. But if they read between the lines, investors who have seen their tax rates increasing may find that the status quo on the capital gains rate will make long-term gains more attractive.

Under the new law, the maximum tax rate on long-term capital gains (i.e., gains resulting from the sale of securities that have been held for at least one year and one day) will remain 28 percent. On this type of gain, investors in the 31 percent bracket will continue to enjoy a break of three percentage points compared to the rate they pay on ordinary income. But individuals who suddenly find themselves subject to a 36 percent or 39.6 percent rate will now reap savings of eight or nearly 12 percentage points, respectively. Although higher-income investors will ultimately pay more tax under the new law, the

increased disparity between the rates at which ordinary income versus capital gains are taxed dramatically increases the value of capital gains for this group.

To prevent upper-income investors from abusing the new appeal of the 28 percent capital gains rate, Congress has enacted new provisions designed to discourage investors from converting ordinary income into capital gains. For instance, under the new law, capital gains can no longer be used to offset investment interest expense unless the taxpayer elects to forfeit using the lower 28 percent rate on his or her long-term capital gains. In addition, under the new law, gains from the sale or maturity of "market discount" bonds, (i.e. bonds purchased at a price less than the stated redemption price) will no longer be taxed strictly as capital gains. Instead, an allocation between capital gains and ordinary income will be required.

The only item resembling a break on capital gains is a limited provision permitting investors to exclude 50 percent of the gains generated from the sale of certain qualified small business stocks acquired after Aug. 10, 1993. Investors interested in taking advantage of this exclusion should approach with caution. This provision is subject to many restrictions. Further, not all industries will be qualified for the exclusion and many of the stocks will be from smaller start-up companies whose stocks will not be publicly traded.

Although no substantial direct relief from capital gains is included in the new tax law, investors who face higher marginal tax rates enjoy the new disparity between those rates and the 28 percent cap on long-term gains. The result is that many investors may want to adjust their investment strategies to include more long-term growth vehicles, such as stocks, over investments that generate income subject to ordinary income tax rates.

Bartlett revitalizing downtown area with shops & more

The year was 1890 and Bartlett was a prosperous frontier town. It was a time when cotton was king and the Katy Railroad was laying down tracks smack dab in the middle of the little town of Bartlett just south-east of Salado.

According to Mayor Bobby Hill those were the good old days of Bartlett. Although those good old days may be gone, the

Bartlett pep squad is changing it's image from the land of cotton and grain growers to a mecca for travelers and shoppers.

"We've got a little jewel here," Mayor Hill said of his city. The northeastern Williamson County town has been home to three generations of Hills.

The plan for polishing this undiscovered jewel is simple but will take some doing according to Bartlett

Chamber of Commerce president, Charles Spiller. Phase one is to develop magnets for attracting tourists.

"Tourism is a \$21 billion industry in the state. It's an obvious approach for us right now," says historic district project director Harry O' Bryant.

Other magnets included

in the plan will be a Christmas shop, tea room and bakery and the renovation of a 1913 two-story grammar school by the Bartlett Activity Center Inc.

Residents in Bartlett want to turn their town into something unique.

"We can't compete with Salado or Georgetown, we want to complement them,"

said Spiller. "We've already got tourists coming here—we just don't have anybody to take their money."

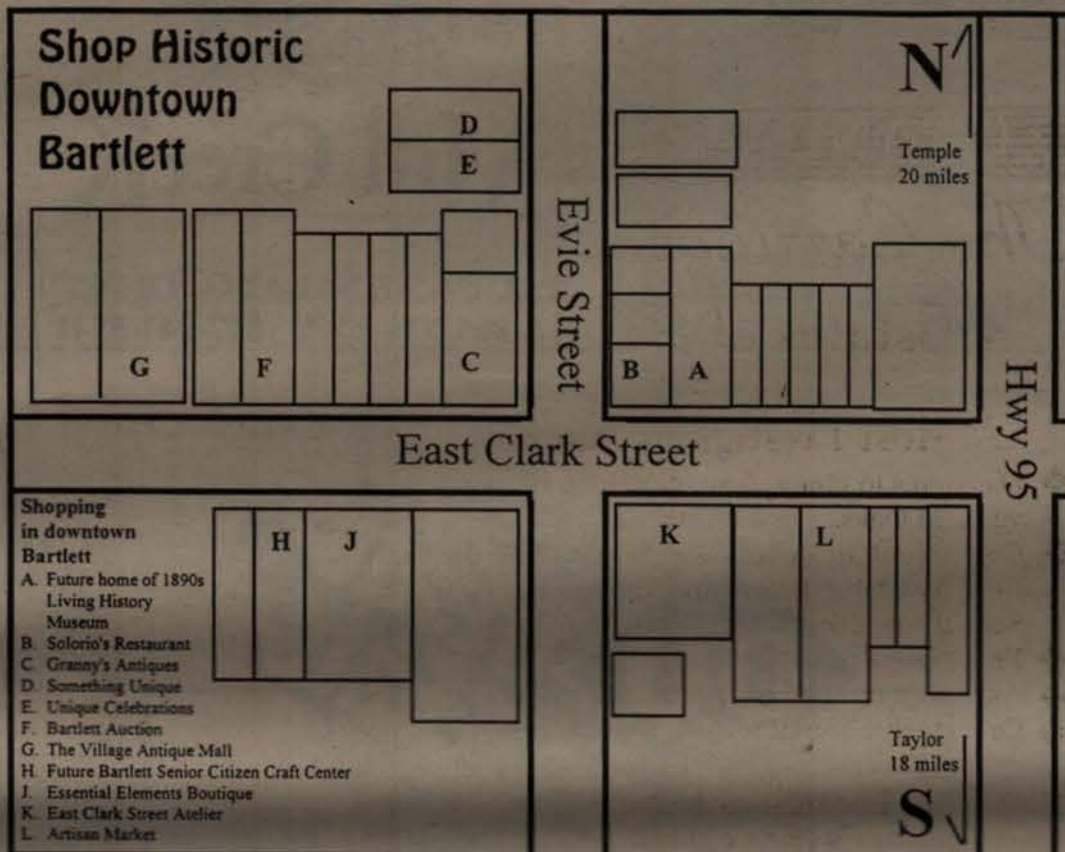
The little town of Bartlett may no longer be the "king of cotton," but they do have the right ingredients to become a booming tourist attraction and just a great place to visit.

Execution is essential in Salado's blow-out

Execution.

It's what the Salado Eagles showed Sept. 10 when they romped the Bruceville-Eddy Eagles 43-6 at Eagle Field.

The Salado offense combined for over 300 yards on six scoring drives. Richard Jackson showed maturity as his offensive line protected him enough to complete seven passes for 100 yards, three touchdowns and a point-after. Jackson threw a 16 yard TD pass to Jason Hosch, a 50-yard TD pass to Brandon McGregor, and an 11 yard TD pass to Billy Wilson. Jackson also ran for a 29-yard touchdown. It was the best game in Jackson's career.

Behind the blocking of Jerry Soto, Nathan Daniel, Mark Tubbs, Brian Hill and Steven Dunlap, the Salado offense tallied over 300 yards.

The defense was pretty impressive, holding Bruceville-Eddy to just over 100 yards total offense. Richard Berumen and Jason Hosch win the Big Hits awards this week.

Berumen knocked Rob Krueger senseless when Bruceville-Eddy Eagle reached out for a mid-field pass. Apparently the hit had some effect on the officials as they senselessly called an obviously incomplete pass as caught for three yards.

No matter, though, as the Salado defense held, forcing a punt, which led to the best play of the game. Jason Hosch caught the

punt at the Salado 30 yard line and blasted his way through the Bruceville-Eddy defenders for a 70-yard touchdown. The officials, still feeling the effect of Berumen's earlier hit on Krueger, wrongly called Hosch down at the Salado 46-yard-line, where Hosch caught his balance during the run.

But this did not matter either as the Eagles drove 54-yards for a touchdown with three minutes left in the third quarter to take a commanding 22-0 lead.

Bruceville almost embarrassed Salado by scoring on their next possession on a 12 yard pass from Dominic Floyd to Anthony Deleon. This was immediately after Jason Hosch's Big Hit on his counterpart, #22 James Roberts. Roberts left the game.

Salado scored three touchdowns in the final quarter of play in answer to Bruceville's earlier score.

Jackson hit McGregor for a 50-yard TD on the first play of the final quarter. He threw for 11 yard to Wilson with 5:34 left in the game.

With 1:19 left to play, Jimmy Deaton scored on a one-yard dive to bring the final score to 43-6.

The Eagles of Salado were nearly flawless on both sides of the ball during their contest.

Hopefully, they will repeat this performance in their contest Sept. 17 as they travel to Holland to face the Hornets, coming off a win against Florence. Kick-off is at 8 p.m.

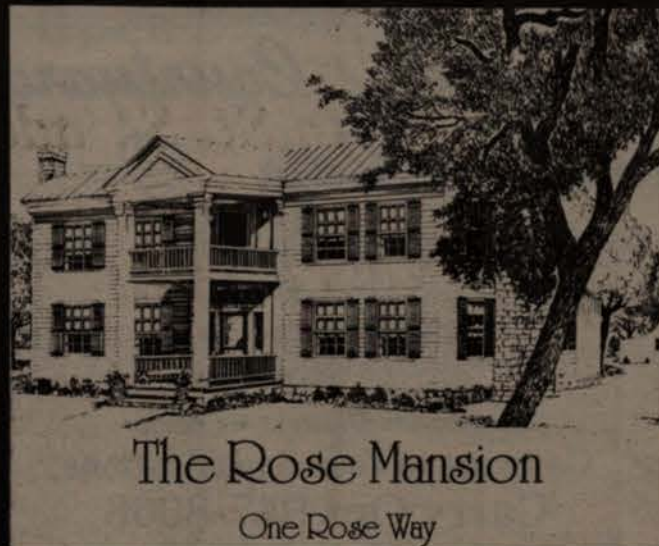

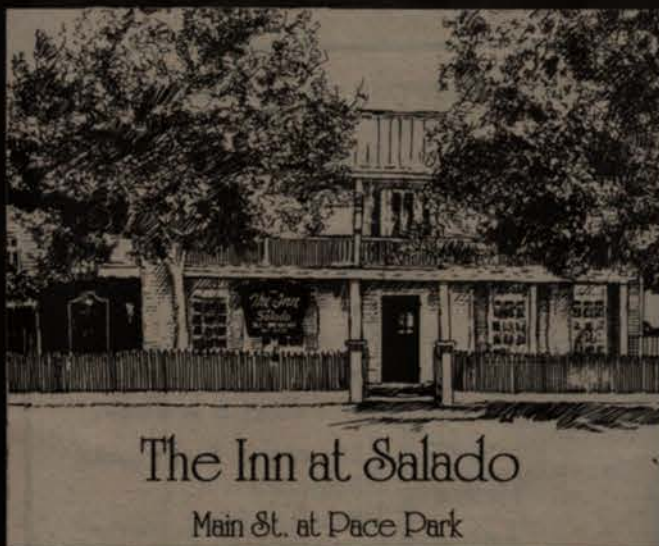

Sprint changes Salado phone rates

Sprint/Centel - Texas customers should notice new basic local phone service rates on their September bills. As of Sept. 1, 1993 new rates went into effect as a result of the company's ongoing earnings proceedings (Docket 9981) with the Public Utility Commission (PUC).

Sprint/Centel - Texas has eliminated the charge for Touch Call service which was one dollar for residential customers and \$1.50 for single-line business customers. Touch Call provides customers quicker connections when placing calls, the option to obtain Custom Call Features and the capability to access services requiring push-button phones.

Charges for Custom Call Features have been reduced by about 15 percent.

Another change involved customers with extended area service (EAS). EAS charges have been removed

as an individual charge from the customers' phone bill and is now rolled into the basic monthly service rate.

Harold Miller, Sprint/Centel-Texas' district manager in Killeen, noted individual monthly service rates for basic local residential and business customers may decrease or increase depending on the customer's location. "Our structure is currently be-

ing divided into six rate groups and everyone in a particular rate group will pay the same rate," he explained.

"For example some residential customers in Salado were paying \$7.85 a month for basic service. Now they will pay \$7.45 a month."

The rate changes are retroactive to May 17, 1993 and are reflected on the customers September bill.

Sprint/Centel-Texas previously reduced rates by \$7.4 million in 1989.

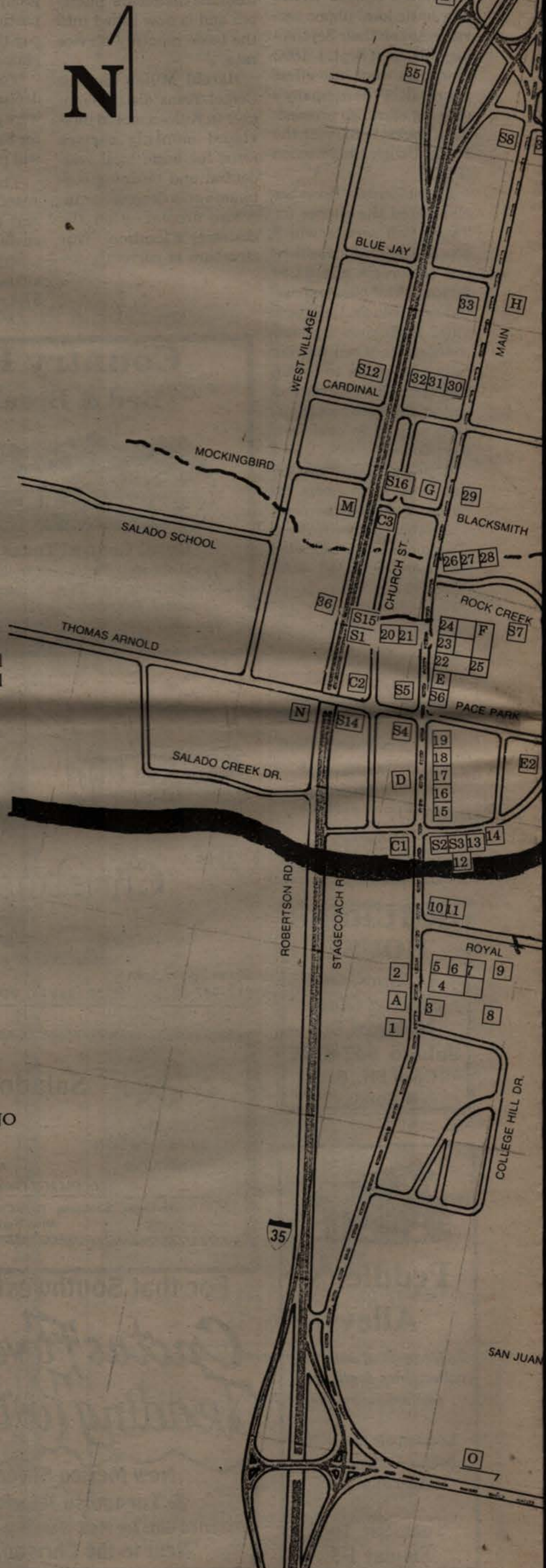

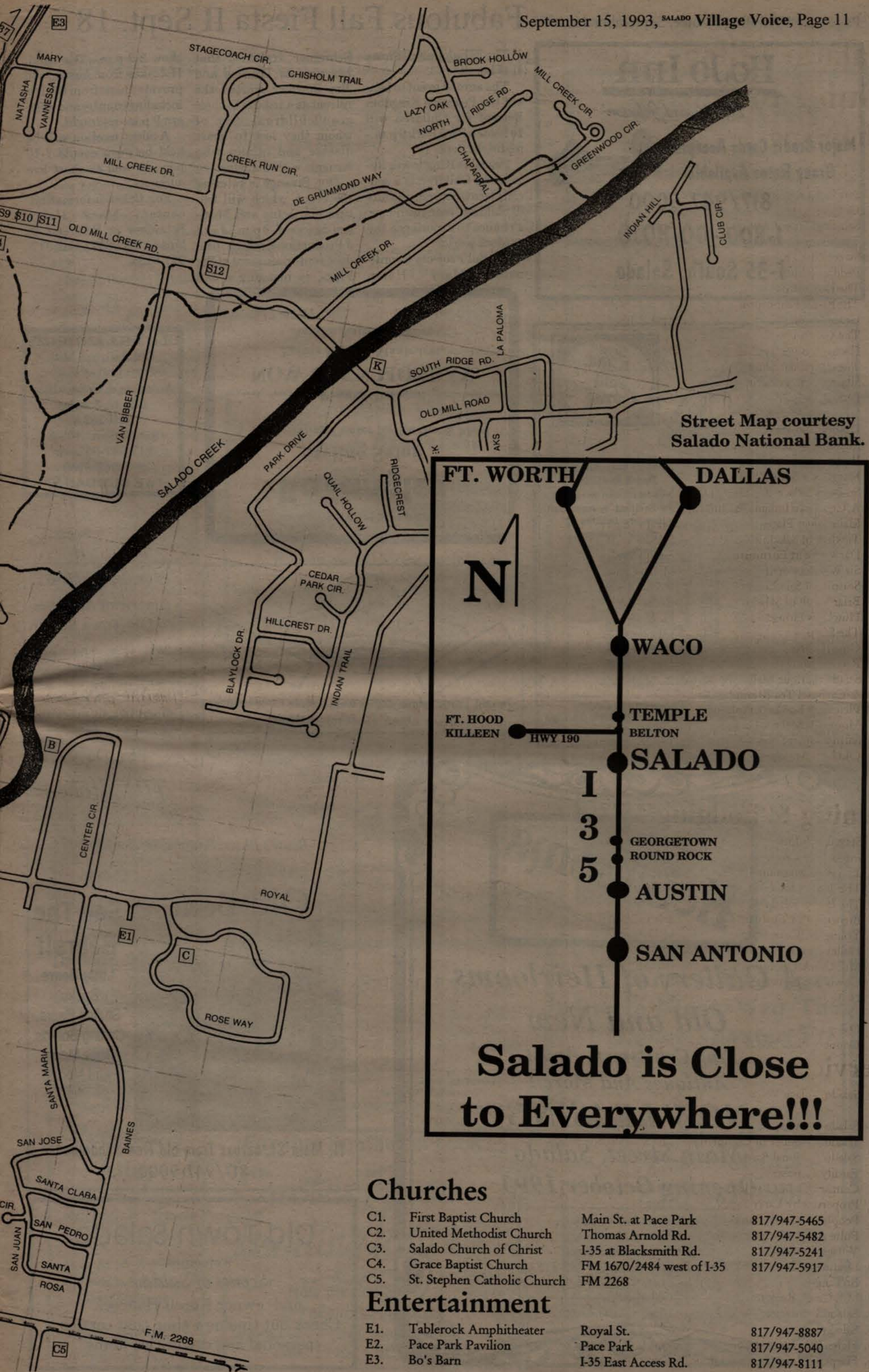
