Property values skyrocket 20%

For the second year in a row, local property owners are reeling from the tax appraisals they received recently from Bell County Appraisal District, some seeing increases of more than 20 percent in their home values over last year.

Salado ISD saw an increase of 21% in the preliminary taxable property values for 2020 compared to the 2019 certified taxable values. Preliminary taxable values are \$1.2 billion, compared to \$1.0 billion in 2019.

The following exemptions are applied to Salado properties: \$25,000 State Homestead, \$10,000 State Over 65, \$10,000 State Disabled and \$3,330 Local Over 65.

The total market value

for Salado ISD is \$1.73 billion, an increase from 2019 total market value \$1.57 billion. Of that, \$1.18 billion is in residential property, \$80 million in commercial, \$10 million in multi-family and \$460 million in land.

The residential average for Salado ISD increase by about 10 percent, from \$252,048 in 2019 to \$276,292 in 2020. The school district saw an addition of 190 new residential improvements in the past year, compared to 159 the year before that. Since 2017, 643 new residences have been built in Salado ISD. The average residential value has increased by more than \$65,000 in that time period. By far, most of these homes are being built outside the Village of Salado. According the BellCAD, only four new houses were built in the Village of Salado in of \$402,539.

The Village of Salado reports a dramatic increase in property values for 2020 taxation, this time of 16%. Certified taxable values in 2019 were \$244,800,086. In a spreadsheet from BellCAD showing preliminary taxable values, they are listed at \$284,089,997. However, in the six-page worksheet from BellCAD showing the preliminary values, they are reported at \$291,124,504.

freeze-adjusted values for the Village of Salado, according to the Bell CAD worksheet, are \$225,436,508. The Village loses more than \$65 million in taxable property value due to tax freezes for over 65 and disabled veterans.

An Open Exchange of Ideas

We are mirroring Recession of 1920-21, not the Great Depression of the 1930s

The week ending May 15th was another one when the negative pronouncements by the market pundits would have traditionally triggered a big move in the S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) but instead produced a very real but muted response. The Index was indeed down 2.26% for the week but was back to its slow, steady rise by the last two days of the week. That all leaves it down 11.36% year-to-date and about 15% from the top back in February but still up a very substantial 28% from its bottom in late March. It is also still a bit positive, up 0.15%, from a year ago.

One of the greater problems with valuing the stock market right now is that the normal driver of whether the market is over or under priced is the one-year forward priceto-earnings ratio. That ratio compares the price of a stock to its projected earnings over the coming four quarters. If we use that method, the market looks quite overpriced. The problem with that method is that we all agree that corporate earnings are going to look miserable as long as fear of the coronavirus is ruling the day. A more realistic view would be to compare stock prices to what their earnings are likely to be two years out when, hopefully, this pandemic is reduced to a chapter in the history books. By that method the market is fairly or even low priced. Some hedge fund managers are shrieking that this market is wildly overpriced and due for a massive fall, but there seems to be a majority of investors who think that we will have an effective and widely used vaccine in a year or so and that will be followed by a surge in buying as the pent up demand from the pandemic period will kick us into high gear.

The U.S. Treasury 10-year T-note yield, like the stock market, slid downward for the first part of the week but started back up toward the end to close at 0.642%, still well above the 0.109% annualized 90-day T-bill and thereby anchoring a positive yield curve. A surprisingly optimistic sentiment swept over the oil markets this week as West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) closed at \$29.35, up a

The Economy

We usually list what we believe to be significant indicators of where the economy is going here but this time we want to focus on the bigger picture; what this crisis is and, just as importantly, what it is

We know exactly what the cause of our problems is. In America, what we are facing is a pandemic that so far is killing about 6% of the people confirmed to have the COVID-19 disease. More, the number of cases confirmed is still growing at about 1.5% per day. So far, it has sickened at least 1.5 million Americans and killed about 86 thousand according to Bloomberg/Johns Hopkins. It appears that less than 1% of the population has been infected, but that number is doubling every six weeks or so. The low infection growth rate appears to be a result of shutting down a large portion of our economy. Based on what we are seeing in places like Sweden, where the economy was not shut down by government decree, the decline in economic activity is likely to be the same whether or not businesses are officially told to be closed. That economic decline appears to be between 25% and 30%. We also can tell when this economic constriction will end. It will go away when we have an effective vaccination program implemented and people feel secure in going about their business.

What we are NOT facing is a repeat of the Great Depression of the 1930s. In fact, what is happening in the markets and in the economy looks far more like the pattern of the recession of 1920-21. The Great Depression started as a market panic that would have ordinarily triggered what we today would have called a "recession"; possibly severe but short. Economists and his-

that the would-be recession was turned into an economic catastrophe by three actions, all initiated at the federal level. First, the Federal Reserve raised interest rates to fight a non-existent threat of inflation even as deflation was taking root. Second, the Congress and the President cut federal spending at a breakneck speed to avoid running a deficit. Third, Congress passed the Smoot-Hawley Tariff Act of 1930, starting a worldwide trade war that choked off international trade. Just as importantly, in the early 1930s we did not have unemployment insurance, FDIC bank account insurance, Social Security, Medicare, large-scale military or federal pension benefits, federal bank regulation, or any of the myriad of other safety nets and federal guarantees and safety programs we have today. In this crisis, the Congress has massively increased spending with most of it directed to people who need it, the Fed has chopped interest rates to zero, and the economic safety nets and standards for banks are holding up well. There may be room for improvement, but what we are doing is the opposite of what our forefathers did in 1930. In the 1940s, the Great

Depression was defeated by massive government spending and ultra-low interest rates as we entered World War II. This time around we didn't wait for a war to do that. In the 1930s, no one had a clue as to why the economy suddenly shrank by about 30% or when it would end. This time around we know both answers and we know and are applying the medicine that cured it toward the end of that decade. We, as a nation, do learn and we are applying that lesson to today's economy. As a result, it is our opinion that the patient will be well on the road to recovery in about a year or so. Meanwhile we are in ICU and feeling poorly, but the prognosis is

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
SISD Trustees ZOOM way through agenda of 20 items

The Body of Christ Community Clinic will mark its tenth anniversary in June with a virtual video tour of both the Medical and the Dental clinics.

Donna Dunn, Executive Director of the Body of Christ Community Clinic said, "This is a milestone year for us, in spite of the pandemic, as we celebrate ten years of Hope, Health and Healing to the communities we serve." 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

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

\$67 million in taxable property value due to the generous local exemptions it gives for Homestead, Over 65 and Disabled. The Village grants homestead exemptions to 750 property owners for a total of \$45 million in property value lost. The Village grants Over 65 homestead exemptions to 438 property owners for a loss of \$21 million in property value.

The Village gives a 20% or \$5,000 minimum exemption for Homesteads. It also gives a further exemption of \$50,000 in property value for homesteads of those Over 65 or disabled vets. Property taxes are frozen at that amount for those Over 65 or disabled vets.

Further, the state grants exemptions that result in a loss of \$54 million in property value. Of that, \$37 million in property value is exempted for public property and religious property tax exemptions.

New state laws will im-

pact how the Village adopts tax rates. The rollback rate is now called the Voter Approval rate. For cities, that rate is now capped at 3.5% above the No Revenue Rate (formerly called the effective tax rate). According to the new state law, cities that adopt tax rates above the 3.5% increase will automatically face a voter approval election on the November General Election date.

However, because of the Governor's Disaster Declaration concerning COVID-19, cities will be allowed to adopt tax rates that are up to 8% higher than the New No Growth rate without requiring voter approval. This will apply to the 2020-21 tax rate only for those municipalities that adopt tax rates while the state is still under declaration of disaster. The Village of Salado typically adopts their tax rate in mid- to late-September for the coming fiscal year.

CORRECTION **Small business** support will not include utility late fees

Last week, Salado Village Voice incorrectly reported that one of the facets of a small business support program included waiving late fees for sewer. It does not. Village administrator recommended that as part of the presentation but aldermen took it out of the final program.

The program will refund local sales taxes collected by businesses from March 1-April 30 at a cost to the Village of approximately \$50,000.

The relief program will also waive commercial building permit fees during the same time.

The relief program will also establish a small business support office.

- (A) that has in place a uniform set of restrictive covenants; and
- (B) for which a county or municipality has approved a
- (2) on a public or private beach that is open to vehicular traffic; or
- (3) on a highway for which the posted speed limit is not more than 35 miles per hour, if the golf cart is operated:
- (A) during the daytime;
- (B) not more than two miles from the location where the golf cart is usually parked and for transportation to or from a golf course.

Subsection 3(A) specifically states operation during daylight hours. No where does this law allow General Law cities to operate golf carts on highways at night time hours.

Our Board of Aldermen need to correct this error immediately before a night related incident occurs and the Village is held liable.

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

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MiddleSchool campus will be ready for first day of classes

Salado Independent School District Chief Operations Office Mike Brooks reported that the contractor is on pace for substantial completion of the Salado Middle School for opening on the first day of school on Aug. 24.

Brooks reported the following update on the bond construction to school trustees at the May 18 Zoom meeting:

- Roofing, cabinetry and flooring are complete at the academic wing.
- Door and equipment installation are ongoing and will be wrapping up soon
- Ceiling and drywall installation are nearing completion at the administration and fine arts wings.
- Roof installation is wrapping up as well.
- Overhead utilities, ceilings and walls are complete at the kitchen.
- Food service equipment installation is ongoing and will be wrapping up in the next couple of weeks.
- Interior concrete block walls are complete at the athletic areas.
- Overhead utilities, floor and wall finishes installations have begun.
- Installation of exterior veneer (metal panel, brick and stone) is ongoing around the building.
- Nearing completion at Academic, Admin, Fine Arts and Dining. Exterior veneer has started at Athletics.

He reported that the building will be substantial-

The school district will host an Open House and Dedication ceremony at 10 a.m. Aug. 15. The public is invited to the event.

The event will include a Cornerstone Ceremony conducted by the Grand Lodge of Texas Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons, assisted by members of the Salado Masonic Lodge #296.

Cornerstone ceremonies have a long history. The earliest record of a formal and official Masonic ceremony is that of the laying of the Foundation Stone of the New Royal Infirmary of Edinburgh by the Earl of Cromarty, Grand Master of Scottish Masons, on August 2, 1738.

The United States Capitol cornerstone laying was the ceremonial placement of the cornerstone of the United States Capitol on Septem-

ber 18, 1793. The cornerstone was laid by president of the United States George Washington, assisted by the Grand Master of Maryland Joseph Clark, in a Masonic ritual.

In Salado, the first cornerstone leveling ceremony was on July 4, 1860 for Salado College, conducted by the Grand Lodge of Texas assisted by the Belton Masonic Lodge #166.

The cornerstone of the Old Red Schoolhouse on Main was originally level by the Grand Lodge of Texas in 1924. The red schoolhouse was built on land donated by the surviving members of the William K. Hamblen family. Hamblen was a member of Salado Masonic Lodge before his death.

A Masonic cornerstone was also dedicated at Salado High School on Williams and FM 2484 when it was opened.

SISD OKs optional extended school year for elementary students

Salado Independent School District trustees at their May 18 Zoom meeting unanimously approved going forward with an Extended School Year program to add 40 educational halfdays to the school calendar as an extra offering to students who sign up for the program.

According to Superintendent Michael Novotny, the program would be voluntary for both students and staff. Teachers could earn additional money by volunteering to teach during the summer.

HB 3 requires participating elementary school campuses to have a minimum of both 75,600 minutes of classroom time and 180 school days. Currently, Salado ISD meets the 75,600 by squeezing 76,530 into an education calendar of 170 classroom days because Salado students attend class for more than seven hours per day.

In order to meet the challenge of having the elementary campus meet the 180day requirement, Salado ISD will code students who volunteer for the ESY program as attending a separate campus, even though they will not be physically or educationally divided from the other elementary students. The ESY students will attend the added 10 days to meet the 180 day requirement and then the 30 ESY half-days.

The school will receive half-day funding from the state for the the 30 halfdays offered. This amounts to about \$25 per half-day per student (based upon the state average ADA funding formula). According to Dr. Novotny, a grade level would have to have at least 10 students volunteer for the ESY program in order to meet the costs.

A classroom with 10 students would generate \$7,500. With a classroom at each grade level (Pre-K through fifth), this would generate \$52,500. The teacher salary (based on 10 years of experience according to Salado ISD salary guide) for 30 half-days would be \$4,050.75. This would cost \$28,355,25.

The district would not receive any additional funding for the 10 full days required to meet the 180 day minimum. The additional teacher salary cost for these 10 full days would be \$18,903.50 based on the daily rate of \$230.05 per teacher.

According to Thomas Arnold Elementary principal, the program would "close some huge gaps with out kiddoes. We have some good ideas of what we will do and how we will split up. It will consume our summers but we have decided how we will split it up."

"The curriculum will be determined by the teachers," Dr. Novotny said. "It will be differentiated to meet the needs of all students, including those trying to close learning gaps and those that are trying to advance and be challenged."

As noted in the Texas Commission on Public School Finance report, student achievement levels drop during the summer months, commonly referred to as the "summer slide".

According to the Texas Education Agency, summer slide "may create a gap of up to three grade levels for low income students by fifth grade."

Because the students will be coded as separate campuses. Salado will have accountability ratings for these separate campuses.

The motion to approve the program was made by Jim Hodgin, receiving a second from Nate Self.

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
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
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Senior Parade set May 23

Trustees proposed \$19.3 mil 2020-21 M&O budget

Salado school trustees approved adding the fifth golden penny to the tax rate when they proposed the M&O tax rate of \$0.9264 per \$100 evaluation, which is the maximum M&O tax rate allowable by state law. The tax rate represents a decrease from last year's M&O rate \$0.94 per \$100 valuation.

The board also approved

a proposed 2020-2021 operating budget of \$19.3 million and set a public hearing for the budget for June 29 for final adoption of the

The proposed budget is \$2 million more than the 2019-20 budget of \$17.3 million and \$4.1 million more than the 2018-19 budget of \$15.1 million. Student enrollment in 2018-19 was anticipated at 1,964, while actual enrollment in May 2019 was 1,956. Enrollment ership increases by \$76,000

in 2019-2020 was budgeted at 2,055, while actual enrollment for May 2020 was 2,056. Enrollment in 2020-21 is budgeted at 2,160.

The proposed budget will have an increase of \$1.4 million in state funds to \$9.1 million and a \$470,000 increase in local funds to \$10.1 million.

The largest increase in expenditures is in Instruction, from \$9 million to \$10.7 million. School leadwhile guidance and counseling increases \$298,000. Instructional leadership will double in cost to \$280,000 from \$130,500 last year. Extra curricular will increase almost \$100,000 to \$1.4 million. Plant Maintenance will increase substantially with the opening of the Middle School to \$2 million from \$1.6 million.

The district will not have a one time facilities acquisition cost of \$1 million that was on the books of the

2019-2020 budget. The operating budget has

grown from \$12.7 million in 2015-16 with 1,622 enrollment to the \$19.3 million propose dbudget for 2020-

The board also approved the Child Nutrition budget (now separate from the M&O budget. The nutrition budget for 2020-2021 is \$642,911, or \$297.64 per student enrolled. In 2015-16, nutrition costs were \$534,973, or \$329.82 per student enrolled. The 2020-2021 is budgeted on \$300,000 in local revenues, \$21,296 in state revenues, \$241,761 in federal revenues and \$79,854 transferred from the M&O bud-

The proposed budget includes a debt service budget of \$5.8 million for 2020-

2021, an increase of almost \$900,000 from 2019-20. Since 2015-16, the debt service budget has increased from \$1.4 million to the proposed \$5.8 million. Of that debt service, \$1.7 million is designated as operating transfers out for the early payoff of an existing bond.

Trustees will propose a total tax rate of \$1.4264 per \$100 valuation for the 2020-2021. The board will formally adopt the tax rate at a meeting in late August, after valuations are finalized by the Bell County Appraisal District and certified by state Comptroller.

The final tax rate may be lower than the proposed due to increased local funds as a result of the growth in property values. See related story this edition on property values.

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
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The little engine that couldn't Or, how Salado almost became a railroad town

Editor's Note: Saladoan Jay Ritch last week discovered an old railroad spike on Salado's Main Street that sparked a discussion about Salado's history and whether a Trolley or Railroad ever ran through Salado. We wanted to share this piece written by Chris McGregor in 2003. We hope our newer residents enjoy this piece of Salado history.

Anyone with the good sense of a stump knows that war, in its fashion, has a peculiar way of disrupting even the most princely of aspirations. Take Salado for instance, and in particular, Salado around the outbreak of that historical melee. World War I.

The roses, to paraphrase the poet, were not fattensmall community. The old

Austin to Waco stageline, its heyday a thing of memory, had removed with it much of the traffic and esteem garnered some decades before. Gone were the cattle drives, the days when the great bovine herds fed, watered, and hooved their way down what is now Main Street on the trail to Abilene and the northern stockyards.

And that same path, the old military road, which had heard in its day the pounding of Union drums after the capitulation of Southern rebels, a presence that perturbed locals to the point of Judge George W. Tyler writing that "for a time there was no law but military law," was now itself in disuse.

Dignitaries no longer made pilgrimages to the Shady Villa, as Sam Houston once had, and the oft-romanticized college closed for good in 1885. The grand ing on the vine for the old building, the physical embodiment of what boast-

ful Saladoan's pointed to when they dubbed their village the "Athens of Texas," had burned to the ground twice already, in 1901 and '02, and would flame-up again in the 20s, never to be rebuilt, the same skeleton the town was becoming.

In short, a shadow hung over the once lustrous pall of Salado. Times were bleak, and bleaker still, if future prospects be gauged. "Basically, the town leaders were scared to death Salado would die," said Fred Springer, long-time Salado resident and railroad authority-in-residence.

There seemed only one course of action, only one contrivance of gallant enough import, which of course, was to somehow finagle a railroad to come through Salado. Bartlett and Holland had one, and the Gulf Coast and Santa Fe literally put Temple on the

map. By 1910, Temple was no longer derisively known as "Ratsville" but rather, enjoyed a bustling economy with a population exceeding 10,000.

Salado's was no more than a few hundred, and that brass ring Temple waved looked mighty tempting. And it just so happened that little Salado had a big brother on its side, for Belton, the county seat, still bristled over losing its prominence amongst Central Texas towns, especially to Temple, and Belton's pockets ran much deeper than Salado's. And it was precisely that, the lure of big money, that enticed railroad investors to lay track.

Then came a gentleman of uncertain origins by the name of Col. L.E. Walker, and things got interesting. He was president of the proposed Quanah, Seymour, Dublin and Rockport Railway Company, and in him rested Salado's iron horse salvation. At the time, Rockport was tussling with its neighbors, Aransas Pass and Corpus Christi, for the designation of deep water port, which, if and when applied, would translate into oceans of money. The other three towns in the company name, Seymour, Quanah and Dublin, lay in opposing corners of the state, and this rail line intended on con-

the heart of Texas, hence its rather burly sobriquet, "Middle Buster."

So where does Salado enter the equation? Tyler writes in his definitive History of Bell County that the "charter did not call for the line to run through Belton but...Belton businessmen did not intend to be left off the line." The Belton Commercial Club, counting Tyler as one of its hardcharging members, invited Walker to come and meet with them, which he did, and shortly thereafter an agreement was established, one that, had it reached fruition, would have forever altered the development and history of Salado.

Walker agreed to not only bring the line through Belton, but to actually headquarter the company there, and build a hospital. All locals had to do was raise a paltry hundred grand. The Commercial Club accepted Walker's bid in under a minute, and Tyler notes that many Salado citizens

eagerly hopped on the bandwagon with cash in hand to help speed the process, for Salado, with its handful of mills and gins, would have been worth the stop for the train company. It's almost certain a depot would have been constructed. "It definitely would have caused an economic boom of sorts," says Springer.

Its original charter was dated April 13, 1910, and preparations for its construction were quickly undertaken. Had it succeeded, its track would've crossed Royal Street, paralleled Main, and hammered smack-dab through Mill Creek. But it didn't. It didn't even come close.

While surveying and initial construction, such as grading, were being done in Salado and Belton, Col. Walker was away in Europe securing the final, crucial investors in London and Brussels. Then, 1912 came and hit the enterprise, well, like a locomotive. The Balkan War broke out,

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which threw the European market into a tailspin. Animosities from that conflict helped to precipitate World War I, which in turn, effectively ended all financial help from stateside and abroad. Without it, the railroad had no chance of being completed. And so ended Salado's short but eventful tryst with those "magic carpets made of steel," as Willie Nelson sang.

Believe it or not, a few backyards in Mill Creek still clearly bear the mark of that ambitious, but aborted, rail line, identified by the unnaturally large lumps of earth that served as the grade. Parts are still visible near Sue Whistler's Twelve Oaks Mansion on Center Circle, as well. Most remains have been long since levelled off, however. The best example, though, is found just north of town, on the archaic Old Toll Bridge Road which crosses the Lampasas River. On the river's north bank, an unaltered grade section stretches nearly 100 yards on private property, a tangible reminder of what might have been.

All this for a town whose present is so clearly a result of not having a railroad. If life is, as we've been told, but a poor player, strutting and fretting about, it seems that, occasionally, something fortunate emerges from all that posturing. Like Salado never getting a railroad, for example. The town, for sure, has had its ups and downs, one curtain closing while another one opens. A century ago, missing out on that railroad probably seemed the nearest thing to catastrophe the townspeople could imagine.

Now, we can say, unlike the walls of Verdun or the dense forests of the Somme, Salado was actually preserved because of the war. An irony, true enough, that blasts like the horn of a distant train, only passing through, on its way to some place else.




