Bell County Sheriff Dan Smith said he is optimistic about solving a Sept. 20 robbery of Bo's Barn in Salado in which a man and two women took an undetermined amount of money and jewelry from the establishment and its customers.

Sheriff's Department responded to the call at 5:42 p.m. Sept. 20.

According to witnesses, a man and two women entered Bo's Barn bearing shotguns and pistols. They were wearing Halloween masks and other clothing


to disguise themselves. A shot was fired when the robbers left the scene as a warning to the victims not to follow them.

After the robbery, wallets of three of the victims were found along the road at Loop 360 and Highway

"Initially, we thought this might be related to the robbery of the bank in Walburg," said Sheriff Smith. "We have determined that they are not related."

Smith added that he felt that the robbery is "an isolated incident."



Letter to Editor

Dear Editor:

The guest editorial by Commissioner Brown in the Aug. 30 issue of this newspaper deserves careful study by all readers. The issue is water quality and is, for the most part, unrelated to the incorporation debate. Whatever happens in regard to that possibility, we need good water to drink and a creek free of contamination.

The points made by Commissioner Brown are both accurate and commendable. The Commissioner has stated, publicly and privately, that he is neutral on the issue. That stance could be an invitation to our citizens to register opinions with him. If so, a bit of background may be in order.

For some years before mid-1991, Saladoans had detected what turned out to be gasoline fumes in a small building on the Salado Methodist Church site. The problem was solved in 1991, when it was discovered that the underground petroleum storage tanks at the closed service station across the highway were leaking. The (then) Texas Water Commission was notified. The Aquifer was found to be contaminated and cleanup was begun. Cleanup continues today. So far, this project has cost \$325,000, state money. OUR money. Expenses continue.

Many people in Salado may recall the great concern about a potential rock quarry which was viewed as a threat to the village. One fear was the possibility that the Edwards Aquifer beneath us could be damaged or contaminated or both. Accordingly, in a search for legal recourse, it was suggested that an application of the Edwards Aquifer Rules to the Bell County section of the aquifer could be useful, because whether that quarry project is dead or just slumbering is not known.

As the County Court did not, could not or would not take action, a petition to apply these rules to Bell County was widely circulated. Over 500 names were inscribed which has led to the consideration of the issue by the Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission, as clearly described by Commissioner Brown.

Some irrefutable facts: The Edwards Aquifer is the source of our drinking water and of the several springs that feed Salado Creek.

Threats to that water are real. Contamination has occurred.

Prevention of contamination is ALWAYS cheaper than correction.

EVERY OTHER COUNTY in Texas under which the aquifer exists has adopted the rules to protect the water from contamination.

Neither the aquifer nor contamination risk stops at the Williamson County line. But the Rules DO.

The TNRCC has considered this matter twice this summer of 1995, during which a fair amount of testimony was recorded. Meanwhile Commissioner Brown's editorial concluded with one remarkably accurate prediction. He anticipated that the petition would be denied (it was) and that the Commission would direct that more facts be collected by the TNRCC staff. Saladoans may wish to participate in

Meanwhile, some of the testimony was quite interesting. As Commissioner Brown advised: "Stay tuned".

Welfare Reform Needed

Result? Nearly 10,000 top flight technicians to be canned.

Colgate-Palmolive, IBM, the airline industry, huge industrial-military companies, the giant car makers and others-all plan to drop tens of thousands of skilled workers this year and next and the list grows by the week.

What happens to these newly unemployed men and women? They will, naturally enough, try to find equal paying jobs.

Failing in that they will drop down on the labor pay scale. Bills must be paid and even a reduced standard of living maintained.

As this movement of workers down the salary ladder continues, one cannot help but wonder what will happen if there are no jobs available when we get these post-welfare folks ready to be inserted into the world of work?

Will we create positions for them at state-federal expense? And won't that cost be as great as what we are faced with now?

We need to shift our thinking from just the philosophical, albeit correct, outlook that welfare is bad and working is good, to the practical side that requires creating jobs to make this back-to-work engine run smoothly, as we all get on board the bullettrain designed to whisk us into a better social and economic future as we close out the final years of this great century and prepare for the 21st.

It costs an average of \$126,000 to remove a single leaking petroleum storage tank and clean up the soil that surrounds the tank. Tank owners and operators who are required to remediate a site are eligible to apply for reimbursement from the Texas Natural Resource Conser-Commission's (TNRCC) Petroleum Storage Tank Remediation Fund.

But petroleum storage tank owners who have not registered their tanks with the TNRCC by December 31, 1995, will be ineligible for reimbursement in the event a spill or a leak occurs. Owners of unregistered tanks will be responsible for all costs of corrective action.

In addition, since deductibles on reimbursement claims will begin rising Dec. 23, 1996, storage tank leaks should be reported as soon as possible to avoid additional costs and possible penalties. Also, any leaks reported after December 22, 1998, will not be eligible for reimbursement and the PST reimbursement program ends on Sept. 1, 2001. House Bill 2587, passed by the Texas Legislature this year, was intended to provide tank owners and operators with an incentive to quickly address their leaking petroleum storage

This fall the TNRCC will offer a series of 31 free seminars across the state to help tank owners determine whether they have tanks that should be registered. how to register them and how to apply for reimbursement for corrective action expenses. TNRCC staff also will answer questions about the Petroleum Storage Tank Program.

The TNRCC is targeting groups which may not know they will be affected.

These include small businesses with abandoned gas stations, investment companies or banks which have foreclosed on property with abandoned storage tanks, and school districts which store gasoline for their bus fleet. Gasoline and other hazardous substances that can leak from these tanks can pollute water resources. More than 17,500 spills and leaks have been reported to TNRCC and there are five to seven new reports every day. More than 11,000 tank owners have submitted claims for reimbursement for clean up costs associated these releases. Claims totaling \$281 million have already been paid.
