### DO YOU HAVE A HOME MORTGAGE?

Are you a homeowner carrying a mortgage? If yes, do you know if you are paying for what is known as Private Mortgage Insurance (PMI)?

If you are paying for PMI, you may be paying for insurance you don't need. Here's why.

Currently, a home buyer who puts a downpayment of less than 20 percent on a house purchase is usually required to carry PMI.

The Federal Reserve estimates that every year one million home buyers are required to carry mortgage insurance. The premiums cost from \$300 to \$900 annually.

Private Mortgage Insurance is designed to protect a lender from a borrower who defaults on a loan and can't or won't continue house payments.

Once the homebuyer has 20 to 25 percent ownership in the house, then the mortgage insurance can be dropped.

Unfortunately, mortgage banks are under no requirement to notify a homeowner when they have 20 or 25 percent equity in the house and the PMI is no longer needed.

So, many homeowners continue paying for insurance they don't need and mortgage lenders keep pocketing the premium.

That's what a bill recently passed by the U.S. House of Representatives will change. Mortgage lenders will be required to automatically end the PMI payments when equity reaches the 25 percent level.

Homeowners could save, depending on the size of the mortgage, up to \$1,000 per year. Many families could use that money for monthly expenses, retirement savings or for a child's education.

The bill still has a long way to go until it becomes law. I will urge quick passage of this bill in the U.S. Senate.

Until then, I would urge Central Texas homeowners to contact their mortgage lenders to find out if they have PMI and if they are still required to pay the premiums.

In this day and age every dollar counts for hard-working families. Ending unnecessary PMI payments is one way to help keep more money in the pockets of American families.

## Legislation to allow creation of Salado Public Library District is pending

The Village of Salado would be able to create a Library District funded through a half cent increase in the local sales tax if Texas Senate Bill 1674, becomes law. Additionally, the Salado library board would also be empowered with the authority to call a bond issue to construct a new library building if they feel it appropriate to do so.

All of this subject to voter approval within the library district.

This novel idea is part of an interesting piece of legislation introduced by Senator Gonzalo Barrientos (D-Austin) that is tied to House Bill 3237, authored by Austin Republican Terry Keel.

The measure recently zipped through the Senate and is awaiting judgement in the State Affairs Committee of the House.

**If passed, this bill would allow each of six small Texas communities, including the Village of Salado, to hold an election for the purpose of setting up a Library Taxing District.**

The proposed legislation is designed only for libraries that receive no funding from either city or county budgets. The bill does not mandate a library district, only permits it to happen provided voters approve this unique plan.

In the event the library taxing district authorization bill becomes law, the Salado Library Association would need to set in motion a procedure that would outline the metes-and-bounds of a proposed library district, probably using either the current school or water district boundaries.

Once that is done, and following a public hearing or two, the library leaders would be

required to secure the required number of eligible voter's names on a petition asking the County Judge to call an election to establish the proposed library district.

The ballot would allow residents to vote for or against the creation of a library district as well as adding a half cent hike in the current sales tax levied in the village.

Should the proposed Library District and accompanying sales tax be approved by voters, the new levy would be collected by the State Comptroller and returned to the library officials for the maintenance and operation of the current public library.

**A half cent sales tax within the Salado business district would generate an estimated \$100,000 each year.**

The library board would have to conform to all state legal requirements relating to special taxing districts, probably including a new set of by-laws, election of officers, membership, budgeting, accounting and a variety of other procedures necessary to remain eligible to receive the state tax rebates.

**As noted above, it would also be possible, once the district is established, for library officials to call a bond issue election for the purpose of constructing a new library building. Income from the sales tax revenue would be used to repay the municipal type bonds, if approved by voters in a special election.**

Word out of Austin is that the library district authoriza-

tion bill will be approved at the committee level and probably pass muster when it hits the House floor, provided there is then sufficient debate time remaining in the session.

### NOT ALL LOONIES IN WEST TEXAS

If you thought all the loonies running loose in Texas had congregated near the West Texas town of Fort Davis, think again. Over in East Texas the voters in **Longview have one of their very own and naturally sent him immediately to the Legislature!**

Name is Tommy Merritt - a Republican with an idea that is not only ludicrous but slips over onto the cockamamie side of the cuckoo line.

Merritt's plan is to sell official State of Texas coupons to drivers who like to exceed the posted speed limit. The certificate would allow speeders to drive up to 80 miles per hour - ten over the legal barrier.

And get away ticketless when stopped by harried state highway troopers.

National Safety Council and Highway Institute leaders termed the plan "foolish". **Fellow legislators were less charitable with comments that came close to being unprintable.**

Perhaps the lawmakers, under the leadership of this East Texas fruitcake can come up with some even **more innovative ideas** on bringing new dollars into the state treasury.

**We might see coupons sold that would allow a felon to have one free arrest for a home burglary.**

Or even permission to rob a bank; hold up a 7-11 store; write a hot check or possibly secure a Monopoly type "get

**Athletes honored with banquet**

A heaping helping of accolades were dished out at the 1996-97 Salado High School Sports Banquet May 8 at the elementary school cafeteria.

Coaches recognized more than a hundred athletes from nine sports: football, cross country, volleyball, basketball, track, golf, tennis, baseball and softball -- varsity and junior varsity teams alike.

Cheerleaders, managers, parents and supporters were also singled out during the three-and-a-half hour affair, which featured roast beef and mashed potatoes as the main course.

Guest speaker Dennis Alexander, head football coach at Henderson High School in east Texas, gave a motivational speech of sorts to the approximately 250 in attendance.

Quoting from renowned basketball coach Rick Pitino's book, "Success Is A Choice," Henderson said, "Persistence is what keeps us great."

He also quoted from a card on his desk at work, entitled "Press On" by former President Calvin Coolidge, the first line of which states, "Nothing in the world can take the place of persistence ..."

Henderson told of a time many years ago when he and Joe Mullins, Salado boys athletic director and head football coach, were working a summer job in the mountains of Tennessee.

With their boss keeping an eye on them through binoculars, "fear of getting fired was a great motivator," he recalled.

Henderson wrapped up his remarks with a bit of advice: For a school of Salado's size to be successful in all sports, there has to be "the best participation you can have. And you got to have unity. Great participation, and all of you pulling together."

Mullins, who had intro-

duced Henderson, then proceeded to recognize the football teams. He said the seniors accomplished a feat no other senior class can top, but only tie: the football team went to the playoffs in each of their four years in high school.

Near the end of the banquet, the football team presented a special award to outgoing head football coach Dan Wasik, who had coached the team the past eight seasons. Wasik strode toward the head table from his seat near the back of the cafeteria and bid a brief but emotional farewell.

The senior baseballers, led by Chris Frazier, also recognized baseball coach Melvin Bates for his influence on them from as far back as their Little League days.

Frazier was among five seniors who were presented \$400 scholarships from the Athletic Booster Club.

The others were Liz Boyd, Carrie Puckett, Cody Hall and Kurt Salisbury.

## SHS boys golf team places 4th in state

The Salado boys golf team finished fourth at the Class 2A state tournament in Austin May 6, despite an improved second-round showing at Lions Municipal Golf Course.

The Eagles recorded a two-day total of 659, seven strokes behind third-place Memphis' 652. Hamilton won with a 623, followed by Cisco's 651.

Salado was in third place after the first day, with a one-stroke lead over Memphis. But the Panhandle school sliced 20 strokes off its first-day total of 336 to earn a medal.

Memphis' Gunnar Roberts and Edgar Bailey shot the second and third-best scores of the second round, 70 and 72, respectively.

Roberts' 13-stroke improvement from the first day was the second-best among all golfers.

Salado's Ryan Morris led his team with a two-day total of 161, 12th best overall. His second-round total of 79 was three strokes better than the day before.

Morris was followed by Blake Cameron's 162 (tied for

13th with two others) and Shawn Mitchell's 163 (tied for 16th with two others). Rounding out Salado's scores were Neal Holtzclaw (173) and Kurt Salisbury (183).

Salisbury's seven-stroke improvement from the first round was the team's best, followed by Cameron's six-stroke improvement.

"After the first day, I felt we could get second or at least get a medal (by finishing third)," Salado coach Larry Salisbury said. "But the two Memphis kids improved by about 25 strokes."

Salisbury said the last time the golf team advanced to the state tournament was four years ago when the team finished either sixth or seventh.

Salado 4-H will be meeting at 2:30 p.m. May 18 in the elementary school cafeteria.

This meeting will be for enrollment into 4-H for the upcoming year. Past members as well as any new youth interested, must fill out a new enrollment form.

Salado advanced to the state tournament by winning its regional tournament. Weimar, which placed second behind Salado at regionals, also finished behind Salado at state. Weimar shot a 677, 18 strokes behind Salado.

Michael Pruitt of Idalou, near Lubbock, won medalist honors with a 136. His second-day score of 65 was best among the field.

## Eagles to play Valley Mills

The Salado Eagles baseball team wrapped up district play with an unbeaten record and will advance to the first round of the Class 2A state playoffs.

The Eagles, who finished the regular season with records of 14-4 overall and 12-0 in District 26-2A, will meet the Valley Mills Eagles in the bi-district playoffs at 1 p.m. May 17 at the University of Mary Hardin-Baylor in Belton.

Valley Mills finished second in District 27-2A behind district champ Riesel.

After three weeks of knowing they were in the playoffs, Salado's Eagles can finally focus their attention on the playoffs. The Eagles disposed of their last two district foes last week, beating Lago Vista 9-2 and Holland 6-0.

The win over Holland marked the final game at Salado Eagle field for senior pitcher Chris Frazier, who pitched a complete game shut-out to run his record to 9-1.

At Lago Vista, the Eagles fell behind for the first time in district play. The game was scoreless through three-and-a-half innings before Lago Vista scored two runs in the bottom of the fourth.

Lago's lead was short-lived as Salado scored four runs in

the fifth to gain control of the game. Paul Mashburn drew a walk to start the Eagles' offense.

David Berumen followed with a single, and Frazier was walked intentionally to load the bases. David Kirk then delivered a single to left that rolled all the way to the fence and brought home three runs.

Eric Lopez then hit a single to score Salado's fourth run of the inning.

The Eagles added to the lead with two more runs in the sixth inning. Mashburn drew another walk and Frazier hit his eighth home run of the season to make the score 6-2.

Salado continued its scoring spree in the top of the seventh. Clint Carroll, Chris McGregor and Drew Oldham all had successive doubles to produce two runs. Mashburn and Daniel Palmer followed with singles to add another run.

Roger Buckley pitched an outstanding five innings to pick up his fifth district win. He allowed only three hits and struck out seven. Frazier pitched the final two innings, striking out three.

Mashburn and Palmer both collected two hits on the night.

Four days later on May 10, the Eagles beat Holland in a

game rescheduled from the previous day because of rain.

The Eagles scored the first run of the game in the bottom of the second. Chris Michna doubled and stole third base. The throw from the catcher got away from the third baseman and allowed Michna to score.

Salado got a little breathing room with four runs in the fourth inning. David Kirk and Michna singled to open the inning. Drew Oldham, running for Kirk, scored on Clint Carroll's fielder's choice.

Michna scored on a passed ball. Carroll stole second and scored on Jon Phelps' single. Phelps stole second and eventually scored on Palmer's groundout.

The Eagles pushed one more run across in the sixth inning. Frazier opened the inning with a walk. He was replaced by courtesy runner Marcus Williams. Williams moved to second on a walk to Kirk. Two passed balls allowed Williams to move on to third and home, giving Salado a 6-0 lead.

Kirk and Michna slapped two hits each to lead the Eagles offensively. Frazier allowed four hits and struck out 10.

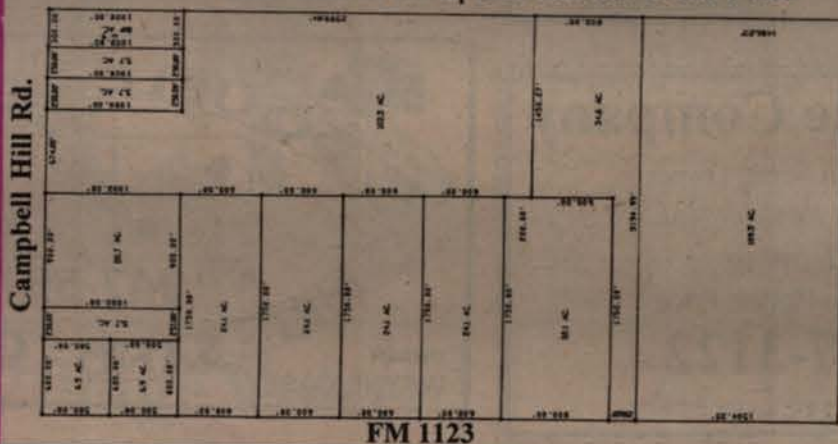

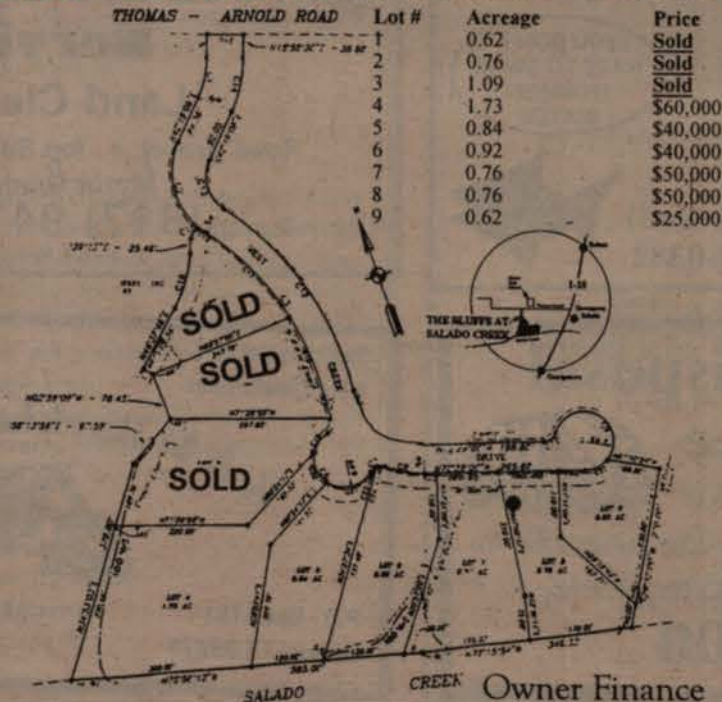

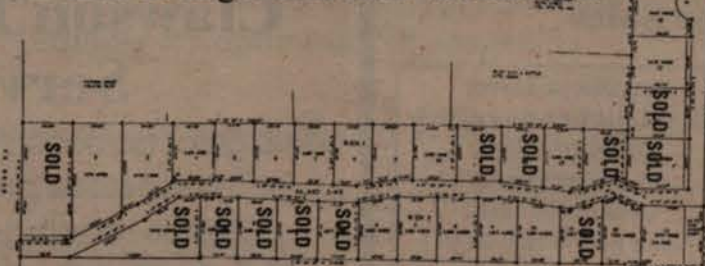

# Pecan Field Day May 17 at Stewart's Pecan Orchard

Two hours of continuing education credits will be given at the Pecan Field Day on May 17. The field day will be held at Rob Stewart's Pecan Orchard on the Little River south of Academy.

The Field Day will begin with registration from 8:30-9:00 a.m. The program will run from 9-11 a.m. Bill McCutchen, retired county Extension agent from Milam County, will be with us to discuss scouting casebearer, spray programs, and general orchard maintenance.

The Stewart orchard is a relatively young, irrigated pecan orchard that is located on the banks of the Little River on the east side of the long bridge on Highway 95. The young trees should provide an excellent site for growers to learn how to scout their trees for pecan casebearer. We wish to thank the Stewarts for allowing us to use their orchard for the field day.

To get to the orchard, take

Highway 95 south from Little River-Academy and just before you get to the long bridge, veer to the right, go down beside the bridge. Take the second gate to the left, go underneath the bridge and you are in the orchard. The flood we had on April 4 washed the road out quite a bit and you will need to take it real slow getting down to the orchard.

The CEU credits will be good for private, commercial, and noncommercial license and certifications.

Applications are now being accepted for the first class of Bell County Master Gardeners. The 50 hour course will be taught on Wednesdays from 1-5 p.m., June 11 through Sept. 3.

Cost of the 13 week course is \$50.00 per person. Classes will cover sessions on plant selection and propagation, vegetable and fruit production, ornamentals, annuals and perennials, lawn care, soils and composting. Other topics will be: herbs, insect identification and control, plant diseases, and environmentally sensitive

landscapes.

The Master Gardener program is an intense training program for volunteers through the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Once volunteers complete their 50 hours of classroom training they pledge 50 hours of their time for educational and community service projects to complete their certification as a Master Gardener.

If you are interested in applying for the Master Gardener program or need more information, contact the Bell County Extension Office at 933-5305 or City of Temple Recycling Coordinator at 298-5725 for an application form. June 1 is the deadline for registering for the class.

The course will be limited to 25 to 30 applicants.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, national origin or disability.

### Texas Angler

Sometimes you come across a fishing technique that is so off the wall and different that you just have to try it. One such technique that I have found is called "eel jigging" and it involves catching speckled trout on Sabine Lake.

Sabine Lake is filled with small eels and during the Spring and Summer, they congregate on reefs and heavy structure. Trout and redfish alike will gorge themselves on eels, especially when the shad and shrimp are scarce.

Diehard Sabine-area trout fishermen have known about this phenomena for years and have been catching fish up to 7 and 8 pounds on bass worms, Bass Assassins and little imitation eels. As impressive catches were weighed in at local tournaments, the secret got out of the bag and "eel jigging" became common practice in southeast Texas and southwest Louisiana. This is more akin to barge fishing than the trout fishing that most of us are familiar with, but it works.

To "eel jig", you simply take an 8 inch curl-tailed worm and rig it on a 1/2 ounce jig head and fish it on 15 to 17 pound test line. Heavy line is important since you will be fishing reefs and will likely lose a number of baits. Check your line for frays often and retie when necessary. Let your bait hit the bottom, then work it like you would a Texas-rigged worm, but slower, taking time to feel every little bump.

When a trout hits, it will hit hard. These eels are fast and trout think that they will have to work fast to dispose of your "impostor." Set the hook hard once the trout hits.

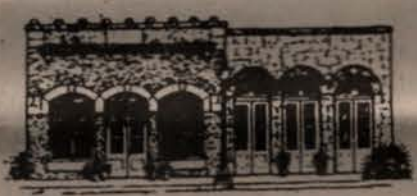

# Health insurance

*Non-profits, charities are ways  
for uninsured to get health care*

**I**T IS A SAD FACT, but many of our fellow Texans have no health insurance. Many of these people are your neighbors, typical working people who have good jobs but do not get insurance benefits from their employer. Many are children who are not covered by their parents' insurance.

Regardless of the reason, these people are forced to rely on overburdened hospital emergency rooms and a shrinking public health system for their most basic health care needs. We at the Office of the Attorney General want to be sure that you understand the kinds of charity health care that are available if you don't have insurance.

**Non-profits must give back**  
Several years ago, a state law was passed which requires

tax-exempt, nonprofit hospitals to spend about 4 percent of their annual revenue on community benefits, including charity care for the citizens in their communities. For the first time, these hospitals are accountable to the public for the millions of dollars they receive in tax exemptions each year and are required to return something back to the communities they serve.

Each nonprofit hospital is required to post information about its charity care program in the emergency room, general waiting areas, the business office, and other areas commonly used by the public. Also, nonprofit hospitals are required by law to tell you about their charity care programs and how you can apply for assistance. You can apply for help even if you don't find out about the program until after you have received your bill.

This service applies to both emergency room and non-emergency hospital care. It also applies to outpatient care you receive at clinics sponsored by the hospital. Ask your hospital about coverage for the cost of preventive care, such as prenatal visits, vaccinations, and health screening. In addition to helping you and your loved ones stay healthy, these programs are very cost-effective and help the hospital keep down health care costs for all of us.

**Charity care:  
rights and requirements**

The hospital has a right to ask questions about your ability to pay to determine if you qualify for help. Each hospital sets its own eligibility requirements within limits set by state law, so you may not qualify for assistance at every nonprofit hospital. You are responsible for providing necessary financial information to the hospi-

tal so that it can assess your eligibility for assistance.

Nonprofit hospitals are also required to conduct an assessment of health care needs in their communities, and to develop a plan to meet these needs. The hospital is required to ask for input from you and your neighbors in the community when doing this assessment. You can obtain a copy of the community assessment from the hospital or from the Texas Department of Health.

Charity care is not a substitute for private health insurance or for government-sponsored health assistance programs. Hospitals will usually require insurance, Medicare, or Medicaid payment first. They provide charity care only if you have no insurance, are ineligible for other assistance, and cannot afford to pay for your treatment.

**Your rights as a patient**

Remember, the law requiring charity care and community needs assessments does not apply to all hospitals. Public hospitals were already required to provide charity care. Private sector for-profit hospitals have no such legal obligation, although some provide indigent care on a limited basis. However, all hospital emergency rooms are required to provide emergency care regardless of your ability to pay. If you are not sure whether your local hospital has a charity program, ask at the admissions desk.

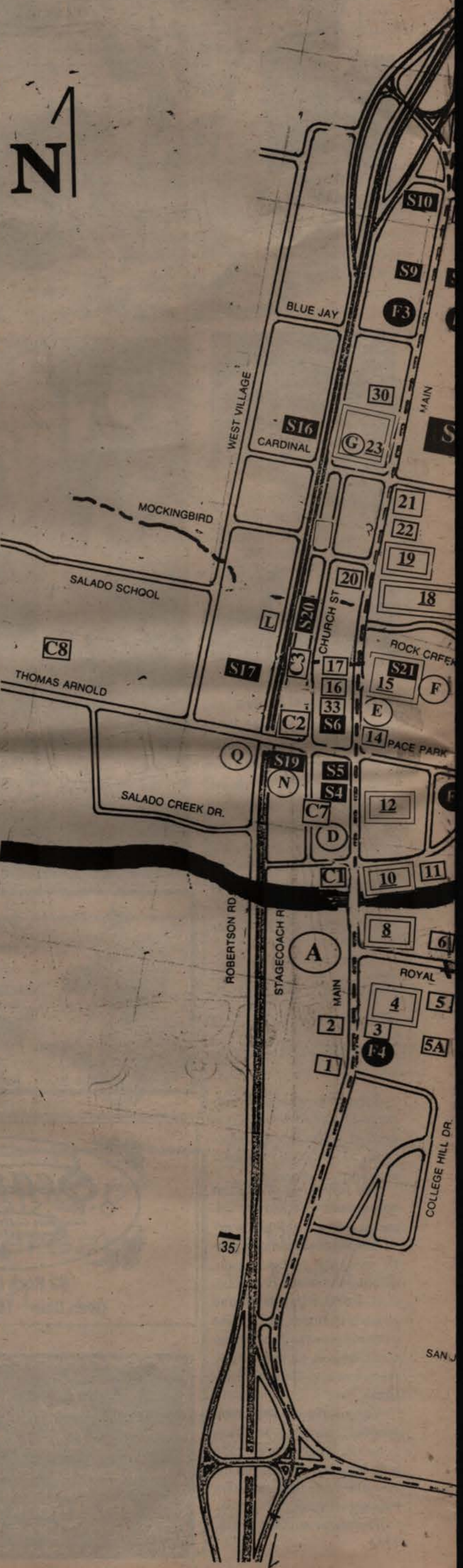

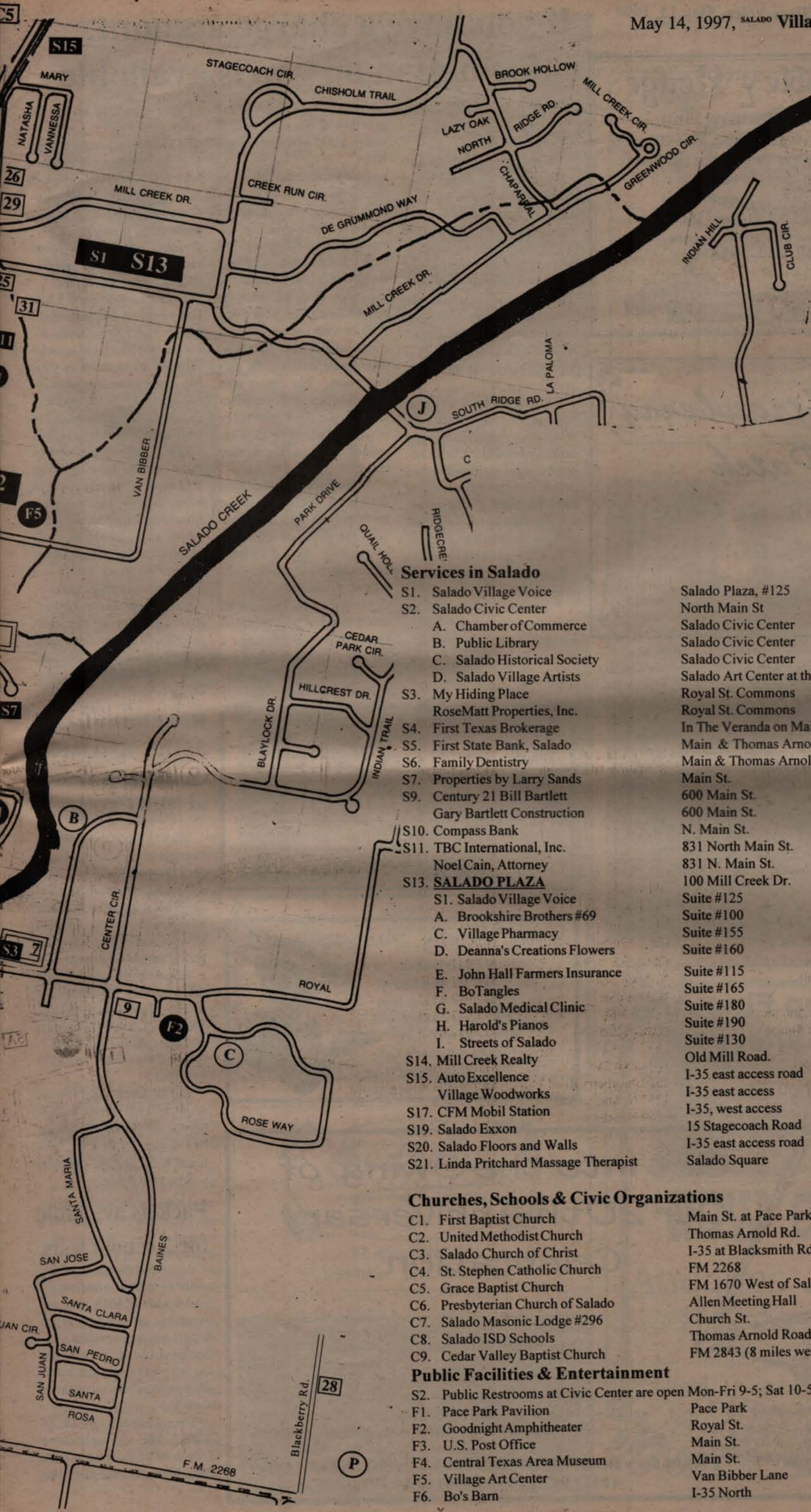

# If you have a charge account, information on you is available

If you are one of the 180 million people in the United States with a charge account, car loan, student loan or home mortgage, then information about you is probably stored in at least one of several major consumer credit databases. The companies that maintain these databases are commonly referred to as "credit bureaus." Your file in these databases is referred to as your "credit report."

Most of the information in your credit report comes directly from the companies you do business with. Credit bureaus compile the data and then provide it to lenders when you apply for credit. Credit reports are also used by landlords and potential employers.

The typical consumer credit report includes four types of information:

- \* Identifying information such as your name, nicknames, current and previous addresses, Social Security num-

ber, year of birth, current and previous employers, and, if applicable, your spouse's name.

Credit information such as the credit accounts you have with banks, retailers, credit card issuers and other lenders. For each account, your credit report will list the type of loan (revolving credit, student loan, mortgage, etc.), the date you opened the account, your credit limit or loan amount, the account balance, and your payment -pattern during the past two years. The report also states whether anyone else besides you (your spouse or cosigner, for example) is responsible for paying the account.

- \* Public record information from state and county court records related to bankruptcies, tax liens, or monetary judgements. In some states, credit reports list overdue child support payments.

- \* Inquiries -the names of all credit grantors and potential employers who obtained a copy of your credit report for any reason. This section lists everyone who obtained a copy

of your report for up to two years.

Almost as important as what is in your credit report is what isn't in it. Your credit report does not contain any information about your race, religious preference, medical history, personal life-style, personal background, political preference or criminal record.

Credit bureaus enter 2 billion pieces of data into credit reports each month. While every precaution is taken to make sure the information in your file is accurate, mistakes do happen. Financial advisors recommend that consumers review their credit reports once a year. This allows you to make sure the information in your report is accurate and to have mistakes corrected. Checking your credit report before major purchases, such as a house or car, can avoid unpleasant surprises.



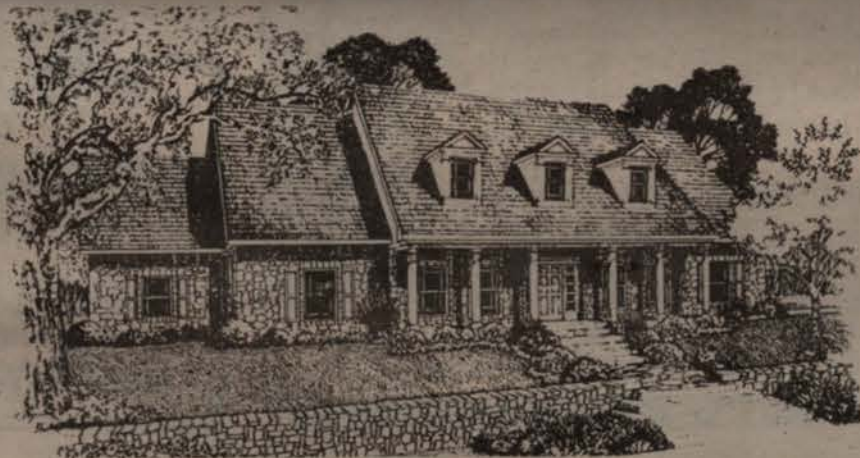

# Texans own \$700m in state coffers

The state's coffers currently hold more than \$700 million in cash, jewelry, stocks, and other valuables that belong to individual Texans -and I'd like to reunite these families with their money.

When voters chose to abolish the State Treasury and transfer its remaining duties to the Comptroller, I inherited responsibility for the Unclaimed Property program. Under this program, the state collects forgotten assets held by Texas businesses, banks, and other financial institutions, and then attempts to return these valuables to their rightful owners.

In fact, the state returned nearly \$33 million in abandoned assets to Texans last year. That's a lot of money-but I think we can still do better.

With that in mind, I have now tried to make it easier for folks to find out if they have cash or other valuables sitting in an abandoned bank account. Anyone with access to the Internet may now search for their lost property 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Unclaimed property may include checks that have gone uncashed for more than three years or bank accounts that have shown no activity for five years. Uncashed dividend checks, forgotten stocks and

bonds, insurance policy proceeds, mineral royalties, credit balances on charge accounts—all of these are personal assets that may have been designated as unclaimed property.

Texas banks and businesses holding such property are required, after making good faith efforts to find the true owners, to forward it to the Comptroller. The value of these assets may be made available for public education and other state programs.

But the trail doesn't end there. Unclaimed property is never lost forever, and there is no time limit on owners or their heirs for filing claims.

That's why I encourage you to visit my new on-line data base at <http://www.window.state.tx.us> to see if you're on the list of individuals and businesses that have been reported during the past five years as having unclaimed property valued at \$50 or more. You may search the data base by name, address, Social Security number, or Federal Employer Identification number.

The computer site also features a communications "hot link" to help you file a preliminary claim for your missing property. And, in addition, to general information about the Unclaimed Property program and instructions on how to conduct an on-line search, the new service includes links to un-

claimed property sites in other states, as well as related federal programs.

Each year, Texas newspapers do a great job of helping us spread the word about unclaimed property by publishing a list of those who have been newly reported as having missing assets held by the state. This year's list will be published in the fall. Texans can also find out about their lost assets by calling my toll-free hotline at 1-800-654-3463 year round. Now we are using the latest technology to make it easier for Texans to find their missing property.

In today's mobile society, it's easy to lose track of utility deposits, the contents of safe deposit boxes, and other relatively minor assets. If the state is holding property that belongs to you, I want to help you get it back.
