Gunter, Wiley elected to serve as SISD trustees

Early balloting proved the difference in the election of Mike Gunter and Mike Wiley to the Salado school board in the May 3 election.

The duo beat out three other candidates, including incumbent Jerry Adams, for the two contested seats on the sevenmember board.

The two were sworn in during the May 5 school board meeting. Each will serve a three-year term.

Gunter received a total of

382 votes, including 139 in early voting. Wiley received 341 votes, 118 of which were cast early.

Wiley had nine more votes than third-place finisher Carse Williams, who received 332

Williams actually tallied more votes (262) during May 3 balloting than either Gunter or Wiley, but received just 70 early votes.

Gunter had 243 votes cast in his favor on May 3, while Wiley received 223 that day.

"I'm very happy with the

results and want to thank all the voters who turned out," Gunter said. "I promise to work very hard to meet the challenges head on that we face as a board."

Asked about his advantage in early voting, Gunter said, "Hard work by some volunteers had something to do with it."

Like Gunter, Wiley was looking forward to the future. "I just want to work with the rest of the board to become a team and do what's right for our children," he said.

Adams, a board member the past 10 years, received a total of 271 votes, including 54 in early balloting.

Tom Berrier received 48 votes. Eleven were cast early.

Salado man given probation by Bell jury in fatal shooting

A Bell County jury delibered for five hours May 1 beprobated sentence for a 21year-old Salado man who was convicted a day earlier of mur-

Michael Angel Sierra, a 1995 graduate of Salado High School, could have received up to life in prison.

The 169th District Court jury had convicted Sierra April 30 of murder in the shooting death of a Fort Hood soldier, Michael McDonald, in Temple on July 19, 1996.

The eight-man, four-woman jury deliberated for nearly 9 1/ 2 hours before returning a guilty verdict.

Judge Oliver Kelley of the McDonald. 169th District Court ordered a pre-sentence investigation by the adult probation department and set formal sentencing for May 30. The conditions of Sierra's probation will be set at that time. He had been working as a painter.

"I absolutely prefer probation for any client, to having him locked up," defense attorney Jim Kreimeyer told the Salado Village Voice. "I wish he (Sierra) had been acquitted, but I'm happy with probation."

Sierra testified he shot McDonald, 22, in self defense. He feared McDonald and two of his friends were going to beat him up after an earlier altercation at a Temple night-

McDonald was shot five times -- twice in the chest. twice in the back and once in the mouth -- shortly after midnight on Kegley Lane in west Temple.

Kreimeyer told jurors in closing arguments to view the encounter from the defendant's perspective.

"Michael Sierra was not pursuring them," Kreimeyer said. "They were pursuring

Assistant district attorney Nelson Barnes, though, told jurors that while he did not condone the trio pursuing Sierra, McDonald had not brought any. deadly force against Sierra that would justify the shooting of

Among those who testified on Sierra's behalf in the punishment phase of the trial were former Salado head football coach Dan Wasik.

"I think he was a good guy who got caught in a bad situation," Wasik told the jury.

Sierra was named to the Class 2A first-team all-state team as a junior at noseguard, a position on the defensive line. Wasik said Sierra broke both of his arms in the first round of the playoffs his senior year and was upset because he wouldn't be able to play the



Writer predicts Special Session to solve property tax impasse

With less than a month remaining in the 75th Texas Legislative Session, it is beginning to look a lot like deadlock on the school property tax reform measure that is currently being hacked to pieces in the Republican controlled Senate.

When the pro-business boys get through with the House version of the tax relief legislation not even the sponsors will recognize their hard won product, thus forcing both the House and Senate renderings to a conference committee.

Smart money is now being bet that the two sides will fail to come up with a compromise acceptable to the Governor or the House and the entire session's major legislative work will go down like the Titanic.

Word from inside the Governor's Office as well as tips from the House side indicate that plans are being very quietly discussed to call a special session of the law-makers starting June 3, the day after the current session ends.

This is the first time the two hated words "special session" have surfaced and only from sources that have pleaded for unanimity. These same inside informants have provided this writer with correct information in the past.

What has caused this pending impasse after the property tax relief measure passed out of the House following a hard fought debate, was a major shift of the tax burden from individual property owners to a vast array of business levies. This caused loud screams of anguish from the commercial sector and their hired hatchetpersons, coupled with pledges to dismember the plan when it

arrived in the Senate.

What had shaken the business community was \$3.8 billion in new sales taxes, business income/franchise taxes, new general taxes on activities of certain professional groups plus the removal of nearly 75 exemptions from business activities statewide.

Even this large influx of new tax dollars was not enough to cap the school property tax rate at the original 50 cents per hundred dollar evaluation goal. It had to go to 70 cents to make ends meet. When Senators get through it may hit \$1.10 or higher which would give such minor relief that the whole reform effort becomes ludicrous.

The House swallowed hard and passed the relief measure coupled with the new taxes but not without arm twisting by Governor Bush and Speaker Pete Laney.

George the Younger could only get 32 of his 68 GOP House buddies to go along with the new tax scheme. Of the 81 Demos, 63 went for the plan, 15 voted nay, three stepped outside for fresh air and of course there is still one vacancy - that of San Antonio's legislator Ciro D. Rodriquez (D-District 118) who recently resigned after winning a congressional seat following the death of Congressman Frank Tejeda.

SENATE IN CUT AND SLASH MOOD

The Texas Senate, now in Republican hands, is not about to foist billions of new tax dollars on their basic backers - the big-buck business interests. Cases in point: ITEM - The basic linchpin in the House tax reform measure is a statewide property tax on business holdings. That is destined to die at the hands of the Upper-Housemen. This in turn knocks out most of the reform package and could lead easily to deadlock when both bills reach the conference table.

ITEM - The new tax on some 75 goods and services that is in the lower house plan amounts to \$1.1 billion. Senators plan to reduce this with a modest hit on business somewhere in the shoddy neighborhood of \$125 million - all of which means considerably less in the way of lower property taxes.

ITEM - No sharing of any reduction in property taxes with renters in the Senate's idea of what is reform. This was a critical part of the House plan and was included to placate liberals who will not back off this item should it come back to them as a compromise.

All in all, there is going to be very little agreement between the House and Senate versions of the tax reform legislation. The work of the conference committee will be monumental if not impossible, hence the fear that the session will end with nothing done and the need for the Guy to call a special session.

GUV'S NECK ON LINE

Speaking of the Governor, it should be noted that for the past two years he has done nothing but beat the drum for school property tax reform. This was a wise political move at the time since homeowning

Carving away special interest tax exemptions; creating a business income tax and hiking the sales tax are all part of the initial bill created by the House including a cap of the local homeowner's tax at 70 cents per hundred dollars of value.

These anti-tax forces need not worry much about the Bush tax plan that emerged from the House last week. They have allies within the Senate that will take the proposal apart and eventually come up with something more pleasing to the "public be damned" business interests and their paid goons that hang out in the outer halls of the capitol building's ro-




Gallery Announces Print Release







Believe it or not, some fat ing, they are also high in satuin your diet is good for you.

"Certain dietary fats are essential to maintaining life," said Lynne W. Scott, a registered dietitian and director of The DeBakey Heart Center's Diet Modification Clinic at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Fat has several important functions in the body, according to Scott. It is the most dense source of calories, providing more than twice the calories of carbohydrates or protein. Fat spares protein so that protein can be used to build and repair tissue instead of being used for energy. Fat also helps with absorption of vitamins like A, D, E and K.

Fats comes in three types saturated, monounsaturated, and polyunsaturated. Saturated fats are found in meat with fat and whole-milk dairy products and vegetable fats such as coconut and palm oils.

Common oils such as canola, safflower, corn, and olive oil contain all three types of fat. These oils all have the same amount of fat and calories. Canola oil has the lowest amount of saturated fat.

Besides its health benefits, fat helps satisfy your appetite, Scott says.

"People like the taste of fat. It adds to the palatability of food," she said. "Fat slows down the rate at which food leaves the stomach and produces a feeling of fullness after a meal."

Although ingredients such as egg yolk, sour cream, and cream cheese may be satisfyrated fat. The key is modera-

The American Heart Association recommends a diet with no more than 30 percent of calories from fat. For example, an adult requiring 2,500 calories a day should get no more than 80 grams of fat a day.

Knowing what kind of fat to choose is important in making wise fat choices.

Scott, who has authored a book, "The New Living Heart Diet," offers the following tips on choosing low-fat, yet nutritious foods:

* Read the food label and check for calorie and fat content. A low-fat food has three

grams of fat or less per serv-

* Choose lean types of meat

like chicken breast without skin, fish, and the leanest cuts of beef and pork.

* Prepare foods with little or no added fat. Cook vegetables with fresh herbs, spices, garlic, and onions. "Paint" your cooking pan using a paper towel with a small amount of canola oil or olive oil, or use a nonfat cooking

* Don't mistake fat-free foods for calorie-free foods. Some brands of fat-free cookies, for example, are higher in calories than their regular counterparts.

Where there's smoke, there's fire

Grilling meats carefully can prevent excessive smoke and charring that may be unhealthy. To keep your cookouts both safe and fun, follow these simple tips in proper food preparation and grilling:

Choose meats for cookouts that are low in fat to avoid flare ups from dripping fat. Trim excess fat from the meat before grilling.

- * Avoid marinades or basting sauces that contain a lot of fat.
- * Cover the grill with aluminum foil. Punch holes between the grids to let juice drip

* Learn to control the fire. Cook meat until it is done, but without charring it. Remove any charred or burned material that forms on the food's surface. Do not eat it.

* Wrap foods such as fish and vegetables in foil to protect them from smoke while grilling.

Reduce grilling time by precooking many foods, including poultry and ribs, by boiling or cooking in the microwave. However, immediately place precooked foods on the grill to complete cooking and give it

* If dripping fat causes that grilled flavor. Partiallycooked foods may develop bacterial growth that causes foodborne illness.

Wells was named the Texas State Sculptor for 1990-91 by the 71st Legislature.





Spring brings calls of swarms of 'Killer Bees'

Every spring we get many calls about swarms of bees in yards, playgrounds, barns, sheds and all sorts of other areas around the county. It's just that time of year.

Before the Africanized honey bee moved into Bell County, and we became a federally quarantined county for bee movement, many local bee keepers would go out and collect these swarms at no charge.

Now that the Africanized bee is in the county and we are quarantined the beekeepers don't want nor will they deal with any of the swarms.

A lot of people call our office thinking that the Extension Service will come out and "Take care" of their bee problems. Our office is not equipped nor staffed to deal with honey bees. Also, due to liability, I am directed not to do so. The Extension Service's role is to provide educational assistance to help people deal with unwanted bees.

Despite their value as pollinator and producers of honey and wax, honey bees are generally unwelcome in and around homes because of the possibility they may sting people and animals. With the movement of Africanized honey bees, or so-called "killer bees," into an area, it becomes even more important to reduce this hazard by removing

swarms and colonies of bees ucts labeled for this use. Hownear homes.

Africanized and European honey bees are the same species and cannot be distinguished in the field. Africanized bees can only be identified in the laboratory. In an area such as Bell County where Africanized bees are known to exist, any unknown colony of honey bees should be considered Africanized and all necessary precautions should be taken to protect people and

A swarm of honey bees may cluster temporarily on almost any object such as a tree branch, mail box or fence. The swarm may remain for a few hours or, at times, for several days while scout bees search for a suitable nesting site. Although a swarm is not dangerous and will generally move within a few days, this is the best time to eliminate bees if they are in an area where they are not wanted. Swarms near homes often move into wall voids, attics or chimneys if not

If a swarm of bees is in your area you have two choices. One, deal with the problem yourself or two, call a commercial pest control operator even though you will be charged for this service. If you choose to kill the bees yourself, you need to wear protective clothing.

Honey bees are susceptible to a wide variety of insecticides, and can be killed with any of the commercial prod-


ever, when a swarm of bees is in an exposed location, soapy water can control them very effectively with less likelihood of disturbing the bees and triggering the defensive response. A mixture of 1 cup of liquid soap or detergent in a gallon of water will kill bees if they are completely soaked with the solution. The soap spreads the water over the bees and causes . them to drown. Apply the soapy water with a hand pump sprayer or, if the swarm is too high, with a hose-end applicator designed for spraying trees and shrubbery. If the bees are in a protected area and can not be thoroughly covered, soapy water should not be used. If a swarm is sprayed during the day, it may be necessary to spray again at night to kill bees that were away from the swarm during the earlier treatment.

Finally, a swarm indicates that a colony may be nearby. Usually a swarm will gather near the colony it left shortly after it emerges. The area should be carefully searched while wearing protective clothing to locate the colony so that it, too, can be eliminated.



State Comptroller attends Summit for

America's Future by John Sharp Texas Comptroller

I recently returned from the "Summit For America's Future" in Philadelphia, where thousands of officials, corporate partners, and ordinary citizens gathered to reaffirm their commitment to a tradition we know quite a bit about back here in Texas: volunteerism.

The summit, designed to promote volunteerism and community service, drew people from around the nation to learn how to build on the momentum of public or private programs to help children. Cosponsored by President Clinton's Corporation for National Service and former President Bush's Points of Light Foundation, the emphasis was on providing mentors and role models for our nation's young people.

And, once again, Texas was front and center.

In fact, Texas has always been front and center when it comes to volunteerism. From the men and women who settled Texas and built closeknit communities to the young people from across the state who gave their time to VISTA in the 1960s to the many private groups and individuals who regularly give their time to a wide range of worthwhile community service, the Lone Star State has long been a lodestar for volunteers.

That's why I was pleased to accept General Colin L. Powell's invitation to Philadelphia, because today we're building on that Texas tradition with a new project Family Pathfinders.

Not quite a year old, Family Pathfinders is already successful in more than 80 Texas communities. It links local civic clubs, congregations, and businesses with needy neighbors on public assistance who want to make the transition from welfare to the work force. Families can count on at least one full year of help from their sponsoring groups to get around the obstacles littering their paths toward independence. One of the most critical components of the program is the involvement of responsible adults in the lives of children whose single mothers face the challenge of becoming self-sufficient.

By the turn of the centuryjust two-and-a-half short years away-we will have helped no fewer than 1,000 Texas families find jobs and leave the quiet isolation of their welfare dependency behind. That's our commitment.

Fat-free may not be the best for your kids

Parents should study the label carefully before buying "fat-free" foods for growing children.

"In some cases, even where the dietary fat has been reduced, the serving size may have a considerable amount of

calories," says Dr. Janice Stuff at the USDA's Children's Nutrition Research Center. "Children may tend to eat more servgain more weight."

Stuff reminds parents that fruits and vegetables are fat-

free snacks. Carrots, apples, celery and bananas all make good healthy snacks. Products like reduced-fat yogurt and ings, which may cause them to skim and 2 percent milk are also good.

> However, Stuff says, children need fat in their diets, especially during growth spurts. The energy fat provides them helps them maintain normal bodily functions and supports the increased growth in muscle, skin and bone

Based on present knowledge, 30 percent of a child's caloric intake should come from fat. Fat satisfies a child's appetite," said Stuff, an assistant professor of pediatrics at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "Fat also helps the body absorb fat-soluble vitamins like A, D, and E. Some of the fat-free offerings may not be as balanced in these vitamins."





The key to Family Pathfinder's success was highlighted by Gen. Powell in Philadelphia volunteerism. Civic and church groups volunteer to sponsor needy families, and those families volunteer to participate. There's no big government office to administer, no 500-page manual of complex rules and regulations, no taxpayer dollars disappearing into the black hole of the bureaucracy. Just goodhearted Texans reaching out to those among us who find themselves in need of a little hand.

Of the 160 families we've matched with sponsors so far, a number of success stories have emerged. Lions Club members in Houston made sure a child got to his soccer practice and even came out to cheer him on during games, while his mother went back to school. A welfare mom found a supervisory job in San Anto-

nio and has pledged to hire other welfare mothers at the first opportunity. A Houston civic club and a local church joined together to find a dentist for a mother with severe dental problems, literally restoring her smile so she could look for a job-which she found almost immediately.

Across Texas, Family Pathfinder participants are receiving computer training, working on their degrees, or learning how to prepare job resumes. Others are getting tips on how to budget their household expenses, locate community resources, or plan for emergencies. Still others are finding help with child care arrangements. And all of them are plugging into the networks their neighbors have long used to involve themselves in their communities.
