Village unveils its small business support initiative

The Village of Salado has ic impact due to the pandemunveiled a multi-faceted support initiative for small businesses in Salado impacted by COVID-19. The objective of the Salado Small Business Support Initiative ("Initiative") is to offer immediate limited financial assistance and business counseling services to affected businesses to aid in maintaining their business and workforce.

"Our local businesses have been forced to drastically alter their operations in response to this pandemic," said Salado Mayor Skip Blancett. "While the true impact of COVID-19 is largely unknown, it's imperative that we support our small businesses that employ our friends, families and neighbors."

At the forefront of the Initiative is an Economic Development Grant Program in which affected businesses can apply to receive a grant equal to the amount of their Village sales tax receipts for the months of March and April 2020. Interested businesses must complete an application and provide the following information regarding their business to help the Village determine their eligibility for a grant.

- Proof of applicant's ownership of the business.
- Three (3) months of estimated lost revenue or other documented loss evidence.
- Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts sales tax receipts for the months of March and April 2020.
- A copy of a current business license.
- A copy of driver's license or government-issued identification.
- A completed and signed

To be considered for a grant, a business must have experienced severe economic and shall:

- Be located in the corporate limits of the Village of
- Have been operating in the Village of Salado for at least six (6) months prior to the date of the application.
- Not be indebted to the Village of Salado.
- Be registered with the Texas Comptroller's Office as a sales tax revenue generating business from the Village of Salado.
- Be current on sales tax remittance.
- Be authorized to do business and be in good standing in the State of Texas and shall remain in good standing in the State of Texas and the United States of America.
- Be a business that is physically located in the Village that is open to the public and is not a home-based business, national chain, or nonprofit.

The grants will be awarded on a first-come, firstserved basis.

Grant applications can be found on the Village of Salado's website at www. saladotx.gov.

Also, applications can be picked up at the Village of Salado Municipal Building located at 301 N. Stagecoach Road. Village management will review grant applications as they are submitted. Grant funds will be released in a timely fashion. The deadline to apply for a grant is September 30, 2020.

In addition to the Economic Development Grant Program, the Village of Salado will be opening a Salado Small Business Resource Center ("Center") in late June. The Center will offer businesses free access to services from multiple agencies to help businesses

The services to be provided include, but are not

limited to the following:

- · Assistance with preparing a strategic business plan to enable the owner to identify the market potential and to clearly define its mission, niche, strategic advantage, and execution strategy.
- Assistance with creating cash flow and financial projections to help establish or improve financial books and records to control cost and improve profits. This will enable the owner, lender, or other investor to have an accurate picture of the small business' financial condition. This would also include assisting businesses with getting lender-ready for loan applications.
- Assistance with guiding potential business owners to understand legal steps needed to start a business.
- · Creation or improvement of a sales and marketing plan with prioritized action steps to increase busi-
- · Assistance with understanding the need for an accurate bookkeeping system.
- Credit counseling to assist with the repair of bad
- · General business consultation to help owners improve and grow their busi-

Services will be available by appointment only on the third Wednesday of every month, starting on June 17.

Information on how to make a reservation can be found on line at www. saladotx.gov. All business counseling services will be confidential and provided by representatives from the McLennan Small Business Development Center.



Uptown downtown lights

Salado residents got the first glimpse of the street lights that will line Main Street when crews began the installation of them last week. The streetlights are part of a \$5 million improvement project for Main Street that includes drainage improvements, sidewalks, bike lanes and reconstruction of the bridge over Campbell Branch. Stephen Kasperg will give the Board of Aldermen an update on the project during the board's meeting on June 4 at 6:30 p.m. The meeting will be held via ZOOM.

Hearing set on proposed SF7A new zoning district

Aldermen at their 6:30 p.m. June 4 meeting will conduct a public hearing and consider approval of a proposed ordinance to amend the Village of Salado's Zoning Ordinance to create the SF-7A (Single Family Residential) zoning district.

The meeting will be held via ZOOM. Meeting and log in credentials can be found on the official agenda posted at saladotx.gov.

According to the agenda packet, "the proposed zoning district is intended to fill a void that currently exists in the Village's Zoning Code ("Code") for smaller residential lots where a standard single-family home has or is to be constructed rather than a townhome or zero lot line home."

The permitted and conditional uses, as well as the development requirements, set forth in the proposed zoning district are similar, if not the same, as those allowed in other residential zoning districts in the Code.

The most notable difference is the minimum lot size of 6,000 square feet for a single-family dwelling in the proposed district.

The amendment would require a minimum lot width of 60 feet and minimum lot depth of 100 feet.

The minimum front and rear setbacks are also slightly smaller than those established for zero lot line and townhome zoned properties. Minimum front yard would be 20 feet, minimum side yard would be five feet or 15 feet from the street right-ofway for corner lots and minimum rear yard would be 10 feet for the main building.

Maximum lot coverage by main buildings and accessory buildings is 70%.

The minimum floor area per dwelling unit is 1,000 sq.

According to Village Administrator Don Ferguson's guidance in the board packet, "Creation of the proposed SF-7A zoning district will allow the Village to properly zone the property in new smaller lot subdivisions, such as Drakes Landing located near the intersection of Royal Street and Smith Branch Road."

"Currently, the only option for zoning such subdivisions is to zone them for zero lot line homes or townhomes and require the property owners to seek variances for setbacks and such if they desire to build a standard single-family home," Ferguson stated in the board agenda

Planning and Zoning held a public hearing on the proposed zoning district May 26 and voted unanimously to recommend approval of the proposed zoning district.

The proposed zoning district prohibits recreational vehicles, manufactured home, travel trailers or motor homes being use for on-site dwelling purpose. It also prohibits open storage (except for materials for personal use such as firewood, garden materials, etc.) Side entry garages where lot frontage is only to on street shall have a minimum of 25 feet from the door face of the garage or carport to the side property line for maneuvering.

In other business slated for the June 4 meeting, aldermen will formally act on Frank Coachman's letter of resignation. Aldermen will

consider filling the vacancy of the Mayor Pro Tem as well as Coachman's remaining time on the Board of Aldermen. The board may consider, according to the agenda packet, calling for a special election to fill the position until the November election date.

The board will also consider spending hotel motel occupancy tax funds on the renovation of the Salado Museum, specifically the reconstruction of the balcony.

Aldermen will also be updated on the progress of the Main Street project by Stephen Kasberg, engineer for Texas Department of Transportation.

COVID-19 concerns continue to impact US, global markets

The Markets

The stalwart S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) rallied for the week on less-bad news, rising just over 3% to close at 3044.31 on Friday. That rally leaves it down only 5.77% year-to-date and down 10.1% from its top in February. It is now up a whopping 36% from its nadir in late March and an impressive 10.62% from this time last year. Importantly to us who watch such things closely, the SPX is now comfortably above its 200-day moving average, an indicator that historically has often marked the end of a bear market and the beginning of a new bull. Notably though, nothing about this particular market panic has so far followed historical norms, so remaining cautious is likely a prudent

Oddly, the driver for the big market jump at the beginning of the week appears to have been the reopening of an institution that many have condemned as being archaic, the New York Stock Exchange live auction floor. The opening of the NYSE trading floor marks a visible resumption of "normal" albeit with modifications, such as the traders maintaining a six-foot separation and wearing masks, but nonetheless, a landmark step toward a better future. Symbols do matter.

The U.S. Treasury 10year note's yield responded less enthusiastically, never having had a trading floor and unimpressed with the NYSE floor's reopening, by rising a subdued 1.66% for the shortened week to yield 0.657%, again confirming the positive slope of the Treasury yield curve. Its implied forecast continues to be that things will be better next year but "better" will be muted. West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) joined with the stock market in a relatively exuberant nearly 5% price rise to \$35.20, seeming to ignore the millions of barrels of oil

The actuality and threat of contracting COVID-19 is the single most powerful driving force in the global and domestic economy. The actuality is that about 1.7 million Americans have been officially diagnosed with the disease and officially, 102,516 of us have died from it. The mortality rate for those officially recognized as having been infected has remained at about 6% for the entire month of May. Both of those numbers continue to grow at about 1.5% per day in the U.S. While people are driving about and resuming some economic activity, the fear of infection continues to restrict economic recovery. That dynamic could not be illustrated better than the Commerce Department report for income and spending in the month of April. Household income rose an astonishing 10.5% in one month while consumer spending fell a stunning 13.6%. The difference between the two, 24%, went to savings.

The dramatic reduction in consumer spending, or as economists put it, demand, resulted in the PCE Deflater, the Federal Reserve's preferred inflation indicator, coming in at a negative 0.5% for April as prices fell. That consumer behavior was reflected in the University of Michigan's Consumer Sentiment Index decline of 27.7% this year, the largest decline on record. Perhaps more importantly, their Index of Consumer Expectations fell even more, 29.5%. When people are concerned that not only are things bad now, but are like-

ly to get worse in the future, they, quite rationally, reduce spending and increase savings. On a more objective level the same evidence can be seen as the money supply (M2) in America has increased by \$2.5 trillion, 16.61% since February, another all-time record, even as prices of goods and services fell about 1%.

Economic growth requires both a healthy money supply and a reasonable velocity of that money supply. We certainly have plenty of money in the economy, but it is not moving at anything like a reasonable rate. Every indicator suggests that money movement will remain subdued until there is a return of consumer confidence. Consumer confidence is largely driven by the potential for jobs with good pay. Unfortunately, that condition is still down the road somewhere on the other side of the end of this pandemic. The Congressional Budget Office is estimating it will take three years from the end of the infection threat until something like a healthy employment rate re-

The good news in all of this is that the money is there, waiting to be used. That situation is the exact opposite of the early years of the Great Depression when the Federal Reserve and Congress strove to reduce the money supply, fearing inflation, even as the economy contracted and prices fell. \$2.5 trillion extra, sitting on the sidelines waiting to be spent and invested, goes a long way toward explaining the optimism in the stock market. All we need now is for the pandemic to be defeated, consumer confidence to be restored, and the boom may begin.

UMHB announces COVID-1 **Student** Relief Fund

Belton, Texas - During quarantine, staff members of the University of Mary Hardin-Baylor called all UMHB students to see how they were coping. One of the things callers heard repeatedly was that students had been affected economically by the pandemic and were not sure they could afford to return in the fall. To address this need the university has launched the COVID-19 Student Relief Fund.

"As we were asking students how we could pray for them, many mentioned parents who had lost jobs or that they themselves had lost their jobs. Many of them mentioned that finances were going to be a struggle," said Dr. Rebecca O'Banion, vice president for development at UMHB. "As a result of that, we started thinking about how we could help these students who had been affected financially."

The COVID-19 Student Relief Fund will assist UMHB students by providing financial support to those who have suffered losses due to COVID-19. The fund's website will officially go live on Monday, June 1 at umhb.edu/studentrelief. The site allows visitors to make donations of any size and share the campaign via their own social media platforms.

While the COVID-19 Student Relief Fund has not been widely publicized, by the end of May, the fund will have already received gifts totaling more than \$30,000.

"We are going to help as many students as we can. We are constantly amazed by the generosity of our alumni and people in our community towards Mary Hardin-Baylor," O'Banion said. "During this time, we appreciate more than ever those, who are still giving in the midst of these uncertain times."

Long Gray Line becomesFamily Tradition for Selfs

As commander of the Continental Army, George Washington considered West Point to be the most important strategic position in America.

The first fortifications were built in 1778 and Washington headquartered at the fortress along the banks of the Hudson River. It became the centerpoint of the most famous tale of treason in America. Had Benedict Arnold's treason been successful, the rebellion of the American colonies against the British Crown may have had a completely different ending.

Instead, West Point was never captured by the British. It is the oldest continuously occupied military post in America.

In 1802, President Thomas Jefferson signed legislation creating the United States Military Academy. Since then, graduates of West Point have led troops into battle.

The Old Cadet Chapel was the first chapel building on West Point built in 1836. It was disassembled in 1910 and moved brick by brick to its location at the entrance to the cemetery. Marble plaques line the walls to commemorate all of the Continental Army generals. Benedict Arnold's plaque contains only the words, "Brigadier General, born 1740."

Few institutions are infused with the deep history and tradition of West Point.

given this nation the best men and women to lead its Army. During the Civil War, the best and brightest of West Point's alumni fought each other on battlefields soaked in the blood of its own countrymen: Ulysses S. Grant, Robert E. Lee, Jefferson Davis, George G. Meade, George McClellan, James E. B. Stuart, William T. Sherman and many more who were once classmates then faced each other in a war to decide the future of the American experiment.

Later, in the World Wars, West Point gave us Generals John J. Pershing, William S. Graves, George S. Patton, Dwight D. Eisenhower, Douglas B. MacArthur, Omar Bradley and more.

This is the briefest of summaries of the richest of histories of the institution that has given us The Long Gray Line.

In mid-July, Salado High School graduate Caleb Self will be adding his name to that list as he goes in for Beast summer training as a Plebe. During the grueling weeks of Beast training, Self will train physically and mentally for the demands of USMA. He will be receive weapons, land navigation and field training, as well as physical training... a lot of physical training.

Beast was originally scheduled to begin at the end of June, but COVID-19 has caused even the oldest of institutions to adapt and change. His class will be brought in for orientation

Fewer institutions still have in thirds, rather than all at given this nation the best once.

"I knew that I would go into the Army after high school," Caleb says with an amount of self-deflection, "I didn't know it would be going to West Point, though."

Caleb was nominated by U.S. Rep. John Carter, Dist. 31. He is one of 1,100 accepted into the USMA Class of 2024. Fewer than 1,000 of those accepted will make it through the four years to graduate. When they graduate, they are commissioned as Second Lieutenants in the U.S. Army.

Caleb said he will study Defense and Strategy, specializing in counter-terrorism, national defense and terrorism response.

As a member of the Class of 2024, he is slated to graduate 26 years after his father Nate Self graduated from West Point.

Nate is also a small town Texas schoolboy who earned a nomination to the Military Academy. His came from Rep. Chet Edwards. Nate grew up in China Spring, arriving there in second grade. His wife Julie got to China Spring in fourth grade. They were sweethearts in school and got married the summer after Nate graduated from West Point. Caleb is the oldest of their four children. Noah is a sophomore at Salado, Elliot is their 13-yearold daughter and Griffin is their 11-year-old son.

The Self family came to Salado in 2009, when Caleb was in second grade. They SEE WEST POINT, PAGE 2B





came here after Nate left the Army following seven years of service. He launched his own private consulting business Praevius, which provides leadership and intelligence training to the military and resilience programs for health care professionals. Self and fellow West Point graduate Jason Torczynski headquarter Paevius in downtown Salado at Salado Civic Square.

"We wanted a small school like we grew up in," Julie said. "We loved what we found in Salado."

Caleb echoes that sentiment and points to Salado schools for his success in being accepted into West Point. "I learned to be a part of a team here and to inspire others," he said. "I hope to continue doing that at West Point."

He will get a chance to do that when he plays Men's Sprint Football for the Army Cadets. Sprint Football was formerly called 150 lb. football. The West Point Sprint team, according to the West Point website, has one of the highest winning percentages of any team at the Academy. "Since 1957, the Sprint football program has been a dominant force in what is now known as the Collegiate Sprint Football League, winning 34 League titles and producing 16 teams with perfect records, including the 2012, '13, and '15 teams," the website touts.

"The team takes enormous pride in being the model athletic program at the Academy and consistently thrives not only on the fields of friendly strife," the website states, "but also

in the academic arena, and in the military program, ultimately developing not only great football players, but great leaders of character for our nation's Army."

Nate played quarterback for 150 lb. football team while attending West Point, so the father and son will share this tradition with each other.

Caleb hopes to keep playing at the linebacker position. He lettered in varsity football for three years. baseball for four years and basketball for two years.

"We were 5-0 in football on the new turf field," Caleb says with a smile, adding that the Eagles were also undefeated on the new turf baseball field. "Well, we only got to play two games there but we won them both," Caleb said with a laugh. Midway through a tournament, Dr. Michael Novotny called the coach to tell him UIL events were immediately canceled.

"I really missed playing the rest of the baseball season," Caleb says, "I think we had a really good team this year. I will miss that, I know."

But he will have a chance for new memories, on and off the field, during his time at West Point.

And he will have a chance to add to the family tradition of service. Nate served six years in the Army. He was part of the team that was sent to Afghanistan to search for bin Laden in late 2001. "I

shipped off in December," Nate said. Caleb was two months old. Nate's grandfather and Julie's grandfather both served in World War II, Nate's was Army and Julie's was Marine. Julie's dad was in the National Guard.

Some of the tradition and memories that Caleb sats ge looks forward to sharing with his dad include "not being able to talk outside. Chewing food a certain number of times when at chow. And becoming part of the Army."

The leadership skills he will build at West Point will have a strong foundation from his years in Salado High School. In addition to being a team leader on the field, Caleb was also a member of the National Honor Society, Salado Youth Leadership, Astra community service group and UIL Current Events. He was Class President in the shortened Senior Year.

Last summer, he took advantage of two great opportunities to further hone his leadership skills by attending the West Point's Summer Leaders Experience. A day after getting back from that, he headed to the State Capital and the University of Texas Campus for Boys State, sponsored by the American Legion.

"He had a busy summer last year, but it was really good for him," Nate said.

This summer is shaping up to be busy as well as the Salado graduate joins The Long Gray Line.

Dead men tell no tales, part 2:

Baker's testimony from the grave sends two to prison

Part II: The Conclusion of John Baker's testimony from the grave. What happened when the men went outside. Dead man's testimony sends two men to Huntsville, including Sam Hamblen now buried in Hamblen-Aiken Cemetery.

James "Ellzey" Easterwood and Samuel Barton Hamblen met John Baker in a bar in Merkel, Texas. From that meeting, one would die and the other two would go to jail.

Starting with the point in which Hamblen and Easterwood got Baker to go outside.

From Baker's sworn statement: "I told Hamblen to let me go home as the others boys I was with had gone home. I told him I wanted to catch up to them." When Baker finally walked to the door to leave, Hamblen and Easterwood went out with

J. W. Brooks described their exit in greater detail, saying Hamblen "had hold" of Baker as they left. Within a very few minutes of leaving, Hamblen came back into the saloon, demanded a pint of whiskey, which he told Brooks to add to Baker's bill, and left. Brooks gave him the pint but locked the door behind him. Hamblen rejoined Easterwood and Baker, suggesting the men go into the alley and share the bottle. Baker resisted, still insisting he needed to head home.

Bob Martin, Baker's friend, was still in town but oblivious to the abuse his friend was suffering. After the dance he had gone into the lobby of the Corrigan Hotel where he talked with a friend. As Baker was trying to break away from Hamblen and Easterwood in the alley, Martin was looking for him. Martin walked around until he spied three figures in the dark alley. He testified that he was at first unsure of their identity and had called out, "Is that you Johnnie?" When Baker answered yes, Martin asked if he was ready to leave and Baker again answered yes. As Martin drew nearer and the men walked toward him, he could see that the others

were Hamblen and Easterwood. The four men began walking back toward the hotel when Hamblen stopped and insisted they have another drink. Martin stepped inside the lobby to get his coat. Grant Harris, another of Bob Martin's friends, was in the lobby and asked Martin to accompany him to Warren's store to get something to eat. Warren had agreed to open the store so that the men could get some canned goods. Bob Martin and Grant Harris had no idea that John Baker was in danger as they turned to leave. Walking away, Martin told Baker that he would

be back in a minute. From Baker's sworn statement: "Then I said boys, I must pull home," and I started off. I heard Hamblen cock his pistol and as I looked around, he shot. Hamblen was about five steps from me when he shot. Easterwood was standing beside Hamblen when Hamblen shot me. I am positive Hamblen shot me. He shot me with a pistol. He shot me twice. He only hit me once, the first shot. He walked to my right, shot at me again, and then went through a gate at the corner of the hotel and that was the last I saw of him."

Ellzey Easterwood walked to the gate with Hamblen but in a moment came back and stood over Baker. "I asked him to carry me to the hotel but he picked me up and dragged me the other way, behind the old house." Baker testified.

It was soon clear that Easterwood was there to finish the job. He pulled out a small pocketknife and tried to slash Baker's throat. Finding that difficult, he jabbed and sliced at the wounded man's face. From Baker grim account: "He never said a word while he was cutting me."

Bob Martin and Grant Harris were eating from their tin cans when they heard two gunshots. Martin ran back to the hotel but Baker was not where he had left him. Then he heard a voice calling from behind the vacant house. "Oh, Bob, Bob, they have killed me."

During the trial, there was testimony from many witnesses but none so compelling as that of the victim. Dr. J. T. Hensley testified that he had been summoned and found John Baker on the floor of the hotel where Bob Martin had carried him. It was obvious Baker had been slashed about the neck and face. What was less obvious immediately was the gunshot wound to the back that had damaged the spinal cord and lodged in the young man's abdominal cavity. The deadly ball, later removed at autopsy and determined to be a 44 or 45 caliber, was presented as evidence.

The jury took little time in finding Sam Hamblen guilty of murder.

Based on the evidence that had rather easily convicted Sam Hamblen, how had Easterwood's trial ended with a hung jury? Easterwood's lawyers had presented several witnesses who testified that Easterwood, who they admitted had gone to the saloon, had then gone home and was in bed at the time the two shots were fired. One of those witnesses was Bill Barbee, the defendant in the cattle theft case that had raised Hamblen's ire. He was also Easterwood's brother in law. Lawyers for the defense also contended that John Baker had made some irrational statements while in a state of delirium. They claimed that this called into question the validity of his sworn statement. It had been enough to cause two jurors concern in the first trial, but in his second trial, Ellzey Easterwood was convicted and sentenced to life. Both he and Hamblen appealed but lost those battles and were sent to Huntsville.

Little is written about Sam Hamblen. But the scraps of information that are available paint the picture of a nonconformist who grew up in a home where conformity was the rule. Sam grew up in a loving environment among many siblings in a home that was the envy of many of the Hamblen neighbors. His father, William K. Hamblen, had accumulated a large investment in land, much of it in Milam County. In a family filled with overachievers, Sam Hamblen, who appears to have been impulsive and unfocused, may have felt intimidated or resentful of the achievements of his siblings. Whatever the case, at a young age, he unmoored himself from the family home, moving to Milam County where he lived on a farm. He married Miss Dadie Bowers on January

20, 1887. Judging from the many changes he made in the space of just five years, it seems that Sam was restless in nature. During that span of time, Sam and his wife had two children and moved three times. Sam had little patience (or success) with farming or raising stock. He lived for a short time in Hardeman County (north Texas) but soon tired of the cattle business there. In 1889, he moved to Jones County, where he made another attempt at farming. Again, after only a few months, Sam sold his stock and moved, this time to Merkel. He established a grocery store but before long sold the store and opened a saloon. At the time of his arrest, he was attempting to earn a living by trading in real estate.

By contrast, the Hamblen family of Salado was an exemplary one in every respect. Sam's father, William K. Hamblen was a farmer and minister in the Church of Christ and his mother, Alice, was a saintly lady. Little is known about Sam or about the family's reaction to this tragedy. An Abilene newspaper reported that one of Sam's brothers, who they failed to name, had arrived in Abilene on January 5 with the required four thousand dollars in bail money. The county attorney had subsequently added a conspiracy charge and thus refused the bond. The same newspaper reported that Dadie Hamblen, Sam's wife, was traveling to Salado to the home of her in laws with her two young children. Once Sam was convicted she and the children lived with her fa-

William Hamblen died in 1902. In January of 1903, Governor Joseph Sayers pardoned Sam Hamblen and Ellzey Easterwood. Alice Hamblen paid her son's attorney fees. Dadie reunited with Sam after his release and the couple had another son they named Curtis.

Sam Hamblen died in 1942, age 74, the victim of stomach cancer. During his post-incarceration years, he alternated between living with his brother Henry and his adult children. Dadie disappeared from the picture. At the time of his death, he lived in Dallas with son Curtis. Sam and Curtis are buried in the Hamblen-Aiken cemetery behind the old red brick schoolhouse in Salado.

There is no doubt that the Hamblen family suffered greatly from this sad event. Chances are, they were deeply sympathetic to John Baker's family. This was surely the case because they were compassionate people, but there was a more compelling reason for the Hamblens to have identified with Baker's. They too had lost a child to murder. By the strangest of coincidences, a Hamblen family member had been the victim of murder during the Christmas season of 1891, exactly one year earlier.

The trouble began at a party. The slaying of Bush Hamblen will be the topic of a future article.





The bidding: North East South West $1 \blacklozenge$ Pass 2 ♥ Pass **4 ♥** 3 ♦ Pass Pass 6♥ **5** ♥ Pass Opening lead — jack of diamonds.

Not all deals played in tournaments are models of efficiency. The plain fact is that some deals serve better as examples of inefficiency, as demonstrated by this case from the World Pair Championship in 1966.

The final contract at most tables was four hearts, which was virtually a laydown. But our story concerns itself with the table where — believe it or

not — the bidding went as shown, and

lead was the jack of diamonds rather than a club. Seizing this golden opportunity, South played dummy's queen, which won, and continued with the ace, discarding the 10-8 of clubs from his hand. Declarer now could have made the slam, but he fell from grace when he led the jack of spades from dummy and finessed.

West won with the king and returned the king of diamonds, allowing East to shed his remaining spade, and there was now no way for declarer to make the slam. When South ruffed the diamond return and played the ace of spades, planning to trump the eight of spades with the ace on the next round, East ruffed to put the contract down one.

Perhaps justice was served by the outcome, but it is nevertheless clear that South should have made the slam after the opening diamond lead. The spade finesse at trick three was totally unnecessary. Instead, declarer should have led the nine of spades to the ace and returned a low spade to dummy's jack. West would win with the king, but regardless of his return, declarer could not be stopped from ruffing the spade eight with dummy's ace and scoring the rest of the tricks.





Pandemic drives record unemployment

Businesses across Texas and the nation have been forced to curtail or cease operations in the face of the coronavirus pandemic, throwing millions out of work and prompting a record increase in unemployment claims that is straining the safety net for workers. Nearly 2 million people in Texas filed for unemployment insurance benefits from March 14 through May 9, triple the number of claims filed in all of 2019.

In this issue of Fiscal Notes, we take an early look at the economic pressures now gripping the state. We also examine early impacts on employment and several other measures that can shed some light on current conditions.

"It's far too early to say how long these conditions will last — and how deep the trough will go," Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar said. "Many economic measures are only beginning to reflect the crisis. It will be months before we can chart its full dimensions. Fortunately, our state's fiscal position is strong enough to support vital programs for the remainder of this year, and our state's "Rainy Day Fund" remains healthy. But the legislative session that begins in January 2021 will face significant and perhaps

work will no doubt be one of the bigger challenges. A record 315,167 Texans filed initial jobless claims during the week ending April 4; a comparable week in 2019 saw about 13,000 claims. The spiraling unemployment rate has forced the Texas Workforce Commission to ramp up its web-based and telephone systems, boost staffing and extend operating hours to ensure claimants get the benefits due them.

The May issue of Fiscal Notes also considers the history of previous recessions and their effect on tax revenues. The current situation is unprecedented in the speed with which it took effect, but the past does provide some important clues for our future


