Main St. work to finish in July, Salado Museum replacing balcony

Paving and striping of Main Street may be the final work for completion of the \$5.2 million Main Street project, beginning the second week of July. With that, TXDOT expects the project to be complete this summer.

Currently, work crews are installing antique-style streetlights along Main Street, as well as finishing the sidewalks and curbs in spots throughout the mile-long project. Stephen Kasberg, the new project manager for the project, reported to Salado aldermen at their June 4 Zoom meeting.

He said that 75% of the work is completed with 85% of the project days finished. "The contractor has some days coming to them because of change orders that were issued," Kasberg said.

Crews will also fix a few grading issues in front of Salado Museum and ADA issues on other areas of the project. When the sidewalks are complete and the lights installed, work will begin on an overlay and striping the automobile travel lanes and bicycle lanes. Landscaping will be done in the right-of-way and watered until it "is established."

"We are doing the best we

can to give you guys a good product, to be safe and to get out of your hair," said engineer Mark Baumann.

Once the project is completed, the Village will be responsible for the lighting costs as well as the landscaping costs for the right-of-way.

Salado aldermen, later in the meeting, voted to give Salado Museum \$8,000 toward the replacement of the balcony in front of the south Main Street building.

"On behalf of the Salado Museum and College Park Board, I would like to Thank the Village Board of Alderman for the Village's contribution toward the replacement of the museum balcony," stated Dave Swarthout, Director of the Salado Museum and College Park. "With this contribution, we are close to having the necessary funds to replace the old balcony. This improvement will enhance this historic building which is home to the Visitor Center, Tourism Department and the Chamber of Commerce offices. It also esthetically helps to complete the Main St. Project and the renovation of the Stagecoach Inn."

The project is estimated at \$22,000. "We are continuing to raise funds for this," Swarthout said, "so that we

do not have to deplete reserves for this project."

Salado Museum and College Park recently reopened its doors May 1 with the temporary display Vaquero: Genesis of the Cowboy. Despite reopening on May 1, a number of fund-raising events had to be rescheduled for dates yet to be determined.

"Fortunately, even with this loss of revenue, our Capital Campaign is still active and we have seen a small but steady stream of donations coming in over the past few months," Swarthout says. "To date we have raised enough money to replace all six air conditioning units and do much needed maintenance to the museum building and College Hill. Now we need to focus on replacing the balcony that runs across the front of the building."

Time has caught up with the balcony which is sagging, unattractive and unsafe. Additions made in the 1970s to the museum's original 19th Century stone building created the larger structure with balcony as it appears today. Close examination of the balcony's structure has revealed that one section is sagging because during initial installation the footings, the piers that anchor the sup-

port beams, weren't installed correctly.

"Funds from the postponed events would have helped defray the cost of replacing the balcony and resetting the stone walkway beneath it. Now we are asking the public for their support to finish this essential project," Swarthout says.

Replacing the balcony will complete a restoration of the South Main Street district that includes installation of new sidewalks and period lamp posts by the TxDOT Main Street Project and recent renovations of the Stagecoach Inn.

"The museum building and its balcony is the first thing visitors see as they drive in from the south. Improving its appearance and safety will benefit the entire community," Swarthout adds. "A facelift for the building becomes a 'Welcome to Salado' beacon for travelers as they crest that final hill coming into the village."

Coggin named Mayor Pro Tem, BoA seeks nominees to fill vacancy on board

Salado aldermen will accept applications until June 12 to fill the unexpired term of Frank Coachman, which ends following the Nov. 3 election. Coachman's resignation, which was submitted by letter to his fellow aldermen May 21, was accepted "with regret" on a motion by Rodney Bell.

Aldermen will review the applications received and decide if they want to fill the remaining months of the unexpired term at the June 18 meeting. Aldermen may

also interview the applicants at the June 18 meeting. Applications can be found at saladotx.gov or picked up at the Municipal Building, 301 N. Stagecoach Rd.

Aldermen Bell, before voting against the motion to receive applications to fill the position on the board of aldermen, asked what the board would do if they did not want to appoint any of the applicants.

Coachman also resigned as Mayor Pro Tem, which aldermen appointed Michael

Coggin to serve until the board reorganizes following the Nov. 3 election. The Mayor Pro Tem position is generally filled by the board after each election.

Coggin will be elected Mayor in November because Coachman has withdrawn his name from the race, although it will remain on the ballot.

Aldermen also discussed, but took no action, on moving the annual election from May to November.

Trustees hire new teachers

Salado ISD in a June 5 meeting approved the hiring of teachers for the 2020-2021 school year and approved a Memorandum of Understanding with Temple College to offer Dual Credit Courses to Salado High School students.

Alexandria Dryden-Wirt was hired to teach fifth grade ELAR. She has five years of teaching experience.

Hannah Doty was hired to teach fourth grade ELAR. She has 19 years of experience teaching.

Chanette Carroll was hired as the High School Life Skills Special Educa-

tion teacher. She has 13 years experience as a special education teacher.

Salado ISD Trustees unanimously approved a MOU with Temple College by which Temple College will provide Dual Credit courses to Salado High School students.

Dual Credit students are eligible to receive a tuition discount of \$43 per semester hour for In-District and \$73 per semester hour for Out-of-District. For the 2020-2021 Academic Year: In-district tuition at Temple College before discount is applied is \$114 per SCH.

Out-of-district tuition at Temple College before discount is applied is \$188 per SCH. Nonresident is \$350 per SCH.

Dual credit classes may be taught on the college campus, on the high school campus, or via distance online learning.

School trustees also approved a change order for additional renovation work at Thomas Arnold Elementary, totaling \$325,886., and work at the Middle School, baseball and softball fields totaling \$109,518.

Hard to understand upswing of market in these times

The Markets

The stock market, represented by the S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) got excited, even a bit exuberant about the Friday jobs report and leaped like a deer headed up a mountain to close out the week at 3193.93, up an astonishing 4.91% from last week's close. The

week's close is down a mere 1.14% year to date, and only 5.68% from its high in February. The rise from its bottom in March remains stunning to our minds; up 42.75% in about two and a half months! The market driving news was that unemployment in the United States is "only" 13.5%. Prior to today, had

anyone said in the nearly four decades we have been closely observing the markets that a 13.5% unemployment report would cause a nearly 5% positive move in the stock market, we would have quickly concluded that the speaker was either insane or inebriated. The SPX is now up 11.16% from this time last year.

It is hard to understand how the market could be up so much as we churn through a quarter that looks more and more like it will be the

one that reports the greatest GDP contraction since the 1930s and are experiencing a distressing social upheaval. Looking deeper into the market, it becomes apparent that there are companies that are clear winners and are up sometimes triple digit percentages while there are others that are still trying to find bottom. The winners have some big bets riding on them and as they rise, the money comes pouring in. They are relatively few in number but have come to dominate the

SPX. It reminds us of the high concentration in large growth stocks we saw in late 2000 but this time there is a rationale behind the high prices; those are the companies that are appearing to thrive in the midst of a pandemic and social strife and show signs of doing even better on the other side.

Although the numbers were small, the percentage gain in yield on the ten-year U.S. Treasury note was even more astounding. The T-note yield rose a whopping 39.2% to end the week's trading at 0.902%, up 24/100 from last Friday's 0.648%. That rise in yield steepened the Treasury yield curve to one of its more pronounced positive slopes in decades. Even the previously seriously depressed yield on the 30-year Treasury bond soared to 1.64%. The rises in rates is good news for the bond market's prediction of where the economy may be in a year or two, but also increases the longer-term borrowing costs for the Treasury to a level that roughly equals long-term inflation expectations. In short, the end of free money for the Treasury may be nearer than many thought. Not to be left out of the celebration, West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) apparently found room to swig a few more barrels and surged to \$38.97 as of 5:00 PM Eastern Time, a five day rise of 10.33%.

The Economy

The market shaking news for the week was that the official unemployment rate fell to a mere 13.3%, down from 14.7% in May, one of the highest percentages since the Great Depression, but still much lower than the expected rate of 19.5%. More, employment actually grew by 2% from last month. If indeed the bottom was hit in the last 30 days as the jobs data suggests, this was both the most severe and shortest economic contraction since the 1930s. 19.6 million Americans remain unemployed but the good news is that the ma-

majority of those unemployed workers are reporting they are temporarily furloughed rather than laid off. They fully hope and expect to be rehired at some point. The numbers may be misleading though. If we count in those who were employed and have dropped out of the job market because of illness or need to take care of family members or fear of going back to work and becoming ill, the unemployment rate jumps to 19.2%. This is still a very fluid situation, but we at least see some evidence that we have turned the corner.

Let us not forget that we still have a pandemic underway. The good news and improved outlook are based on the assumption that the infection rate will not accelerate again and that is an unknown factor. We also do not know what structural damage to the economy will be revealed as things get rolling again.

The U.S. trade deficit rose 16.7% in May as imports fell 13.7% but exports fell a depressing 20.5%, the largest declines since records have been kept on those numbers. While specific numbers were not being tracked in the early 1930s, this drop seems to be about the same, but has occurred much faster. A big factor in the export decline appears to have been the shutdown of U.S. automobile factories as COVID-19 was discovered to be spreading on the factory floor. As the factories restart, expect to see imports rise first as parts are needed to get manufacturing started. If all goes well and we do not see a second surge of the virus, exports should follow a month or so behind.

We may have hit bottom or there may be a second bottom ahead, but it does appear we are turning the corner to better times, presuming we keep our guard up and remember that the virus is still out there and the vast, vast majority of us have no defense other than to avoid infection.

Medicaid expansion could soften pandemic blow for Texas families

AUSTIN, Texas -- A new analysis shows Texas can prevent a looming health care crisis if the state

expands Medicaid and steps up efforts to enroll the newly jobless in health plans through the Affordable Care Act.

Since the pandemic hit, more than 1.2 million Texans have lost their health

insurance due to job loss. Dr. Shao-Chee Sim, vice president of research and evaluation at the Episcopal Health Foundation, said those folks are currently eligible for coverage through the ACA or Texas Medicaid plans. But without state policy changes, they could lose their insurance next year.

"Before COVID, Texas already has the highest uninsured rate, and the most number of uninsured residents," Sim said. "Our uninsured rate is double the national average."

The Texas uninsured rate was 18% in January - compared with the national average of 9%. Texas is one of 14 states that has not expanded Medicaid eligibility.

The findings of Texas job losses and health-insurance eligibility were compiled by the Episcopal Health Foundation and Kaiser Family Foundation.

Sim said before COVID, 2.3 million Americans fell into the health-insurance coverage gap - one third of them in Texas. He added without a change in policy, by next year, many more residents will be unable to afford health insurance because they earn too much to qualify for Medicaid in Texas, or because they earn too little to qualify for subsidized health insurance offered through ACA plans.

Sims said that would put many more Texans in a vulnerable position.

"For people who are uninsured, they usually won't rely on health care until and unless it's the absolute last option or resort for them," he said.

The U.S. Supreme Court is scheduled to hear arguments this year that could render the ACA invalid. Should the court side with the Trump administration's effort to dismantle the health care law, those with pre-existing conditions could lose coverage, college students would be removed from their parents' health insurance plans, and millions of Americans would pay significantly more for coverage.

Bridge is a game with lots of rules, but it is important to remember that just about all of them have their exceptions. When a player's common sense tells him that following a general principle can't gain and might lose, he should abandon normal procedure on that occasion.

Consider this case where South arrived at three notrump on the bidding shown. Since hearts was the only unbid suit, West led a heart, on which declarer played low from dummy.

The outcome now hinged on what card East chose to play to the first trick. Had he mechanically followed the general rule of "third hand high" and played the queen, declarer would have made the contract. But East, after thinking the matter over, decided to play the ten, forcing South to win with the jack.

Declarer had only seven tricks available at this point and could not make any more without tackling clubs. When he did, West took the ace and played the A-7 of hearts, whereupon East won with the queen and ran his suit for a one-trick set.

East's play of the ten on the first trick was well reasoned. If South had both the ace and jack of hearts, it didn't matter whether East played the ten or queen. And if declarer had just the ace, the ten would be equally as effective as the queen.

But if declarer had the jack and West the ace, the play of the ten was vital in order to preserve the queen as a subsequent entry to the rest of the suit. If the queen were played first, East would effectively kill any chance of scoring his remaining hearts.

It is certainly true that playing the queen would have won the first trick instead of losing it. But that is not the issue, since East's aim is to defeat the contract. To that end, who won the opening trick was an insignificant consideration.
