



Texas Gov. Abbott strongly advocates for use of masks to thwart spread of COVID-19

Gov. Greg Abbott arrived at a June 22 news conference wearing a red, white and blue mask.

He was joined by Dr. John Hellersted, his medical point person for the pandemic and head of the Texas Department of State Health Services, physician and former state Rep. John Zerwas, who is executive vice chancellor for health affairs of the University of Texas System and an Abbott adviser, and Nim Kidd, chief of the Texas Division of Emergency Management.

Behind them were large charts showing trend lines for hospitalization, daily new cases and the positivity rate. All showed a flattening until about Memorial Day. Then came spikes on all three charts.

"To state the obvious, COVID-19 is now spreading at an unacceptable rate in Texas," Abbott said, adding later "If those spikes continue, additional measures are going to be necessary."

But he said he has no immediate plans for a second shutdown of businesses, saying "Closing down Texas again will always be the last option."

Abbott aggressively endorsed the use of mask by people in public settings. He mentioned an unnamed person in the hospitality industry who did not want to wear a mask and said he told the person that doing so could make the difference between keeping his business operating or perhaps closing down. The governor said the man came away convinced.

"When you go out, you should wear a face covering or mask," Abbott said, adding later, "I also know that wearing a mask will help us

keep Texas open," he said.

He said the more aggressive tone on masks now is because of the spike. No need to push it, he said, when the trend lines were flattening.

Hellersted said the spike in cases puts Texas "at a very crucial point in time." He called on Texans "to recover what I feel is a sense of community," when people seemed more agreeable to making sacrifices to limit the virus spread. Nim Kidd, chief of the Texas Division of Emergency Management, said the state is in good shape when it comes to personal protective equipment, or PPE for short.

"We pushed out over 62 million masks to health care workers and first responders across the state. We have about 24 million in our warehouse inventory with another 96 million in route," he said. "So for PPE shortages or concerns that are out there we need to make sure we are sharing those facts. There's plenty of PPE in our inventory at this time. That's one of the few times you've heard me say that."

Some testing sites in the Houston area were forced to close because of severe weather, Kidd said. But 840 sites remain open statewide. An average of 32,000 COVID-19 tests are conducted each day in Texas.

Abbott, meanwhile, alluded to the recent mandates by some local and county officials that businesses require customers to wear mask. But he remained steady in his position that a statewide mask-wearing order is not needed in Texas, where case levels vary from one region to another.

"What may be true in Austin, Texas, is different in Austin County," he said. "And we need to have latitude for that differentiation."

Abbott said he spoke last week with several hospital officials from around the state, including the urban centers where caseloads are the highest.

"I was assured and reassured consistently by all the CEOs in all regions in the entire state of Texas they have the capability, the flexibility to ensure that anybody who tests positive for COVID-19 would have a bed available," he said.

Looking ahead to the Fourth of July holiday, Abbott said local officials have the authority to limit gatherings if they see the need. Several local officials are doing just that, he added.

"The good news is, we are already seeing responses from local officials," Abbott said.

Abbott also addressed recorded comments from staff members from the conservative advocacy group Empower Texans where they had mocked in sometimes vulgar language Abbott's disability that requires him to use a wheelchair while deriding his response to the pandemic.

"It reveals a lot about an organization whose morals and character that they would use vulgarity to talk about someone in a wheelchair," Abbott said. "I think the public should judge that organization and the positions it takes through the lens of the people who act that way."

Salado WSC enters Drought Plan Phase II

Salado Water Supply Corporation announced last week that due to excessive outside water use on lawns and landscaping, that it has entered into Phase II of its state-mandated Drought Contingency Plan.

According to SWSC General Manager Ricky Preston, Phase II initiates mandatory water restrictions for outside watering.

Odd-numbered addresses are allowed to water lawns on Tuesdays and Fridays.

Even-numbered addresses are allowed to water lawns on Mondays and Thursdays.

"We would also urge you to shorten the run time of your sprinkler system by 30%," Preston stated in a letter sent to customers.

"The excessive outside watering has put a tremendous stress on the water supply infrastructure and has pushed the water tower levels down to dangerously low levels each morning for the past few weeks," Preston said.

Enforcement measures for the plan includes the following steps:

First Violation: Customer is notified of specific violation and a penalty may be assessed depending on severity of violation.

Second Violation: A penalty may be assessed by Salado WSC installing a flow restricting device for 7 days. Customer will be charged for that device.

Third Violation: Water may be disconnected to the customer for 7 days and a reconnection fee will be

charged.

The plan is available on the SWSC website or can be seen at the SWSC office at 410 Salado Plaza Drive.

"Please do your part so we will be able to avoid the next more stringent stages of the Drought Contingency Plan.

According to the SWSC Water Conservation Plan, the Drought Contingency Plan is triggered by demand.

When water storage tank levels reach 60% of capacity, the supervisory control and data acquisition (SCADA) system sends an alert to Salado WSC operators and triggers a notification program to ask customers to reduce water usage.

Preston told *Salado Village Voice* that at one point last week, SWSC storage tanks hit 30% of capacity. "It got on us really quickly," he said of the usage of water.

SWSC had 1 million gallons of storage capacity, with half of it for the western portion of the service area and half for the eastern portion of the service area. Preston said that of the 2,800 customers, 1,260 are west of Williams Road and receive surface water from Stillhouse Hollow Lake and 1,540 are east of Williams Road and receive groundwater from the system wells.

The highest daily usage on the system was on June 18, when 2.7 million gallons of water were used. Of that, a million gallons was from the western portion of the service area and 1.7 million was from the eastern portion of the service area.

The Drought Contingency

Plan states that the use of water for landscape irrigation shall be only performed between midnight and 10 a.m. and from 8 p.m. to midnight.

Water-use restrictions applicable to aesthetic water features and the washing of vehicles, structures, or impervious surfaces are applicable to each successively higher stage. Irrigation between 10 a.m. and 8 p.m. is considered water waste and is enforceable as a violation at all times.

Salado WSC outdoor water-use schedule for the various stages of the Drought Contingency Plan is as follows:

Stage 1: Voluntary. Odd-numbered addresses on Tuesdays and Fridays. Even-numbered addresses on Mondays and Thursdays. Watering between 8 p.m. at night and 10 a.m. the following morning.

Stage 2: Mandatory. Odd-numbered addresses on Tuesdays and Fridays. Even-numbered addresses on Mondays and Thursdays. Watering between 8 p.m. at night and 10 a.m. the following morning.

Stage 3: Mandatory. Odd Addresses on Tuesdays. Even Addresses on Thursdays. Watering between 8 p.m. at night and 10 a.m. the following morning. Use of water to wash vehicles, impervious structures limited to watering days only.

Stage 4: Mandatory. Watering by can or bucket only on the days allowed above. All watering before 10 a.m.

Stage 5: No Watering. All outdoor water uses prohibited.

US adds back 2.5 mil jobs of 30 mil lost since Feb

The Markets

The S&P 500 stock index (SPX) turned in a reasonable week, closing Friday at 3097.74, up 1.86%. That leaves the SPX down 3.85% year-to-date, and down 8.52% from its high in February. It is up 38.45% from its low in March. It is also up 4.99% from where it was this time last year. The Index seems to have entered a zone where it rises and falls a bit but seems to be comfortable above 3000 and below 3200. If we take those numbers as the consensus of investors, it appears to say that the coronavirus pandemic is expected to shave about 10% off corporate earnings a year from now. The numbers also seem to suggest that the recovery surge we have seen since the end of March

is largely over. Now we wait and see if the market is correct in its predictions.

The 10-year U.S. treasury note yield fell to 0.695%. It, like the stock market, seems to have entered a narrow zone between about 0.675% and 0.750% in its estimate of what interest rates will be at the 10-year mark over the next year or so. West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) crept upward all week to close at \$39.57 per barrel. It too seems to have entered a trading range, moving between about \$34 per barrel and just under \$40 per barrel. WTI remains down about 30% from where it was a year ago and at the beginning of the year, a strong indication of lower demand globally. The Economy

The United States added about 2.5 million jobs in May from April. In other times that would be news we can get excited about and the headlines look good, but the reality is not so pleasant. That 2.5 million jobs is pretty small change seen in light of the fact that the United States economy has lost 20 to 30 million jobs since February. The number of workers receiving unemployment benefits has stabilized at around 20.5 million. New applications for unemployment benefits last week totaled 1.5 million, which works out to be good news because it is a stable number. The dark side to that number is that people are still being laid off at a rate about eight times that which we saw before the pandemic. Overall, it appears that about 10% of the people laid off because of the coronavirus pandemic have been rehired. That is good but it is a long way from a recovery.

In another glimmer of good news, industrial production rose 1.4% in May, the first uptick since February, after dropping a cumulative 20% in March and April. Again, this is an indication that the economy probably hit bottom sometime in May, but it has a long, long way to go before we see anything like normal again. In addition to the simple issue that people are not buying, manufacturers and retailers have a huge backlog of inventory that will have to be unloaded before new industrial orders pick up. Retail sales may have surged by 7.9% in May, but we will have to wait and see

if that is sustainable. Retail remains nearly 8% below the pre-COVID level.

Speaking of the coronavirus pandemic, it is very much still growing. Nationally, we are still seeing about a 1.28% increase in diagnosed infections per day, well down from the 3.75% per day rate we were seeing at the end of April, but still a fast growth rate. Here in Bell county, our reported infection growth rate is about 3.7% per day, about where it was early in the event nationally. More critically, since the end of May we have gone from three deaths to ten in the county. Those numbers are still small, but the compound growth rate is something we should pay attention to. The current growth rate in the county would double the number of infections and deaths about every twenty days. Presuming that occurs, by the end of July, the deaths would have risen to 40 and the diagnosed infections to nearly 3,000. More, this type of growth seems to be occurring across the southern tier of states that largely missed the early impact. If this infection growth rate continues, even with the governmental restrictions relaxed, we can expect to see a reduction in retail activity as people self-isolate.

We continue to believe the economic confusion and high levels of uncertainty will continue until we have an effective treatment and vaccine and they are widely used. The major threats at this point are a second wave of the pandemic, which history would suggest might come in the fall, or that further fiscal stimulus is blocked in Congress. The economy seems to have stabilized, but it is still in intensive care and in need of support. Our estimate is that a significant degree of recovery will arrive in about a year as vaccinations are effective but full recovery will take about another two years. Business failures are not over, and it will take years for many of those who lost their jobs this year to find new employment. We also continue to believe that the end of this crisis will mark the beginning of one of the greater economic booms in our country's history. Now is when the hard part starts as we must have patience to wait this out.

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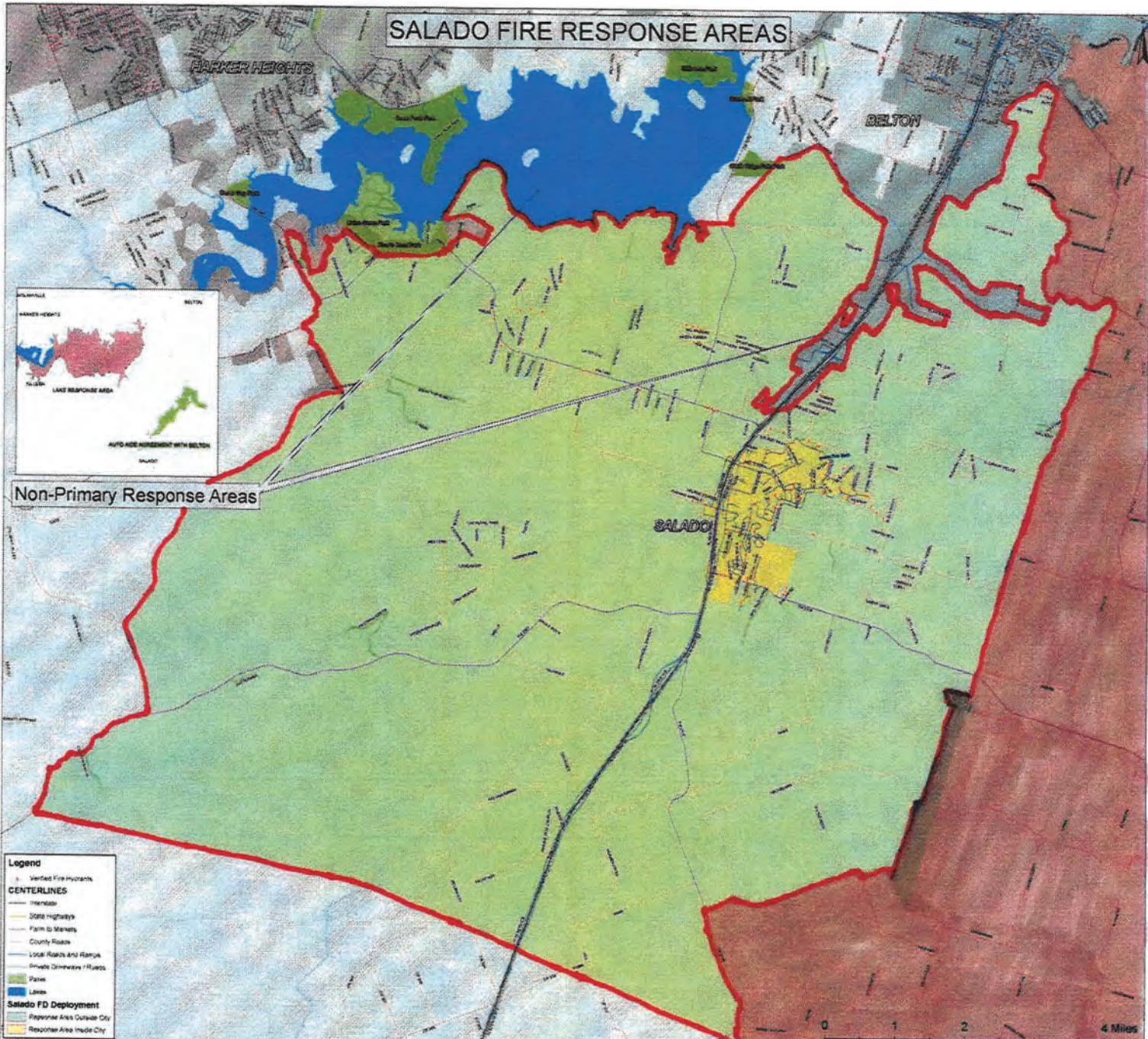

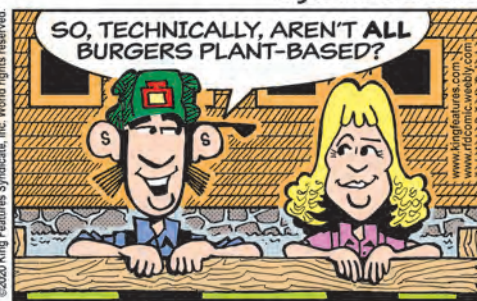

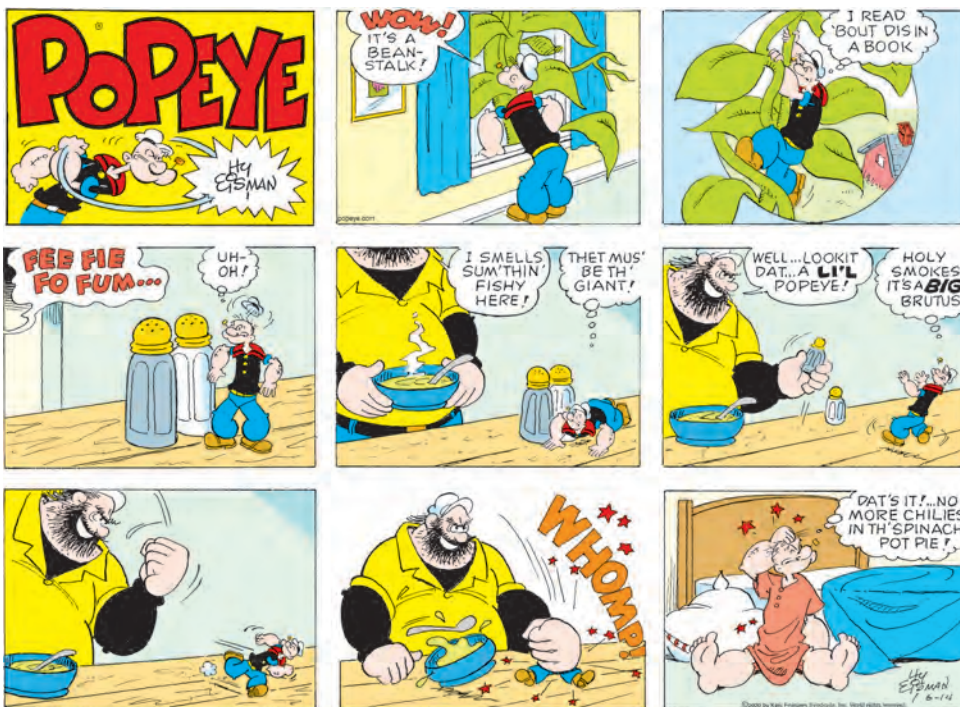

Opening lead — jack of spades.

A declarer who panics in the face of unexpected adversity, and who bemoans his bad luck instead of trying to overcome it, is bound to lose many contracts that can be rescued. Consider this deal played in a team contest many years ago by Harry Fishbein. He won West's spade lead with the queen and played the ten of hearts to dummy's ace, disclosing the 3-0 trump division. Never one to give up, although it seemed he'd have to go down one, "Fishy" proceeded to make his con-

tract. At trick three, he led a low diamond from dummy and played the eight after East followed low, losing to the queen. Back came a spade, won by South, and another diamond was led. East won and returned the trump queen, taken by the king. Fishbein then ruffed his last diamond, played a spade to the ace and exited with a trump to East's jack.

It was the third trick for the defense, but also the last. East had no safe return. A low club would allow dummy's queen to win the trick, while a diamond return would yield a ruff-and-discard.

Thus Fishbein scored 10 tricks, and there was no way to stop him. Even if East had put up the king of diamonds at trick three, he could not have avoided the eventual endplay.

When the same hand was played in four hearts at the other table, declarer won the spade lead and cashed the heart king. This seemingly innocuous play proved fatal.

South next played a low diamond to East's ten. When East returned the heart queen to dummy's ace, declarer led a second diamond. East went up with the king, cashed his jack of trump and exited with a spade to South's ace. There was no way for declarer to avoid a club loser, and he finished down one.

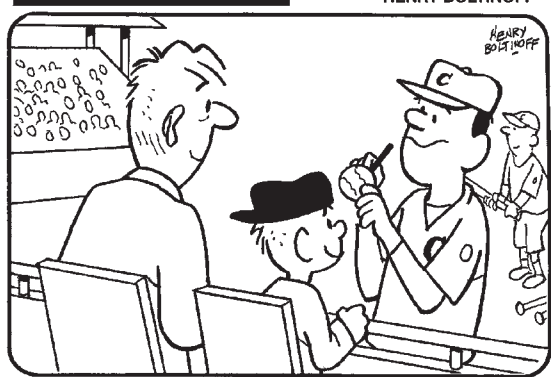
Fishbein's play of a heart to the ace at trick two proved decisive. It was a very delicate triumph for good technique.

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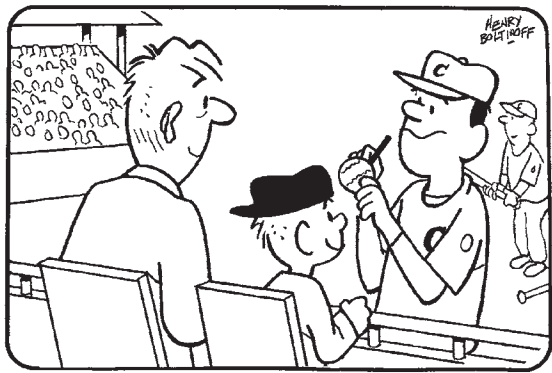

Due to excessive outside water use on lawns and landscaping and extremely high water demand, the Salado Water Supply Corporation has gone into Stage II of the state mandated Drought Contingency Plan.

Stage II initiates mandatory water restrictions. **Odd** addresses are allowed to water lawns on **Tuesdays and Fridays** and **even** addresses are allowed to water lawns on **Mondays and Thursdays**. We would also urge you to shorten the run time of your sprinkler system by 30%.

The excessive outside watering has put a tremendous stress on the water supply infrastructure and has pushed the water tower levels down to dangerously low levels each morning for the past few weeks.

Enforcement of this plan includes:
