# Peaceable Kingdom retreat making tracks (dinosaur tracks)

Children who come to the Peaceable Kingdom Retreat for Children may not have their own Jurassic Park, but they do have a good beginning.

The retreat is a free retreat for chronically ill children, located on the Lampasas River in West Bell County.

Reproduced in limestoneappearing concrete, the refreat has casts of the tracks of a 3 ton meat-eater (a raptor-type of dinosaur), chasing and leaping upon a 30 ton plant eater.

In 1940, the original section of these tracks was cut out of the Paluxy River at Glen Rose, and shipped to the American Museum of Natural History in New York. They are still there, but the State of Texas later got casts of them and reproduced them as an Exhibit at the Dinosaur State Park, alongside of

many original tracks still in the river or on the banks.

Several years ago, the Peaceable Kingdom Retreat for Children rented the casts from the State and had Peggy Maceo, the same artist who prepared the Glen Rose Exhibit, reproduce them at the

"We did it as an introduction of the children's study of birds," says Jim D. Bowmer, President of the Retreat. "Scientists increasingly believe that our modern birds are the sole surviving dinosaurs. We've made this the theme of our bird study booklet we're preparing for the children at the retreat. We hope to translate their natural interest in dinosaurs to an interest in birds.





While Sharp is licking his chops over a possible move to the cat-bird seat in the Senate, Bush and his fellow conservatives are looking for their own candidate who can win the Lt. Governor's position and give Texas a potent one-two punch with the top two leaders from the same party and in all probability a Senate full of GOPers to boot.

Right now Agriculture ter. Commissioner Rick Perry is the leading Republican contender provided Texas voters are willing to turn all of the executive branch and most of the legislature over to the GOP. There currently being a new and growing fear of unproduc-







The meat-eater's tracks look like enormous turkey tracks. The vegetarian's look more like huge elephant tracks."

The Glen Rose tracks have indirectly influenced such things as Jurassic Park. Bowmer says, "The Glen Rose tracks are among the first to indicate to scientists that meateating raptors hunted in packs."

Technically, the name of the retreat's vegetarian is Pleurocoelus (or a sauropod, which means a plant eater), while the smaller (6,000 pound) meat eater (a theropod, which means meat eater) is Acrocanthosaurus.

The retreat also has plastic single full-sized reproductions of tracks found on the San Gabriel River in Williamson County and from the Blanco River.

"We have heard there are some real tracks in the Lampasas River, which flows by the retreat, upriver at

Kempner, but we have never seen them," Bowmer states. "At any rate, these are exact reproductions of tracks of dinosaurs which once lived in this area."

An artist's drawing of the actual event is shown on a Parks and Wildlife poster hanging in the main building of the retreat.

Small plastic reproductions of various kinds of dinosaurs are distributed to the children at the summer sessions of the retreat.

# What does it mean to be a dad

THIS FATHER'S DAY, as in years past, children will send cards, give gifts or place phone calls to their fathers. Many children will simply say, "Happy Father's Day." What they mean is: "Thank you and I love you for being an active and positive part of my life."

On June 15, Father's Day, this scenario will play out with millions of children and their fathers. And many men will feel their efforts to raise their children have meant something to their children.

### What Does it Mean to Be a Dad?

For children whose fathers take the time to provide for, talk to, play with, advise, discipline, help, listen, defend, encourage and sacrifice for their children, this kind of participation can be summed up in one word - commitment.

# Frazier turns down Braves' offer after being drafted in 14th round

It appears that recent Salado High graduate Chris Frazier will not sign a baseball contract with the Atlanta Braves and will instead attend TCU in the fall.

The Braves selected Frazier, a power-hitting pitcher, in the 14th round of the Major League Baseball Draft June 3.

The money offered by the Braves was apparently not enough to entice Frazier to sign. "That had a lot to do with it," he said June 9.

Frazier is believed to be the first baseball player from Salado to be drafted since the draft was instituted some 30 years ago. Salado baseball coach Melvin Bates said he knows of no other player from here to be drafted.

Frazier said he was pleased to be selected in the 14th round, Thirty Major League teams, including two expansion teams, participated in the 100-round draft.

By attending a four-year college, Frazier will not be eligible for the draft until after his junior season of 2000.

The 6-1, 185-pound righthanded pitcher signed last fall to play baseball at Texas Christian University, where pitching legend Nolan Ryan serves as an assistant coach. The Braves have the rights to Frazier until the day he attends classes at TCU.

Frazier was asked the day after the draft if it would be hard passing up college life and working with Ryan. "I've thought about it a long time now, but I think I can do it," he said.

Bates, commenting before Frazier turned down the Braves, said it's a tough decision to make for an 18-year-old, especially since the Braves would pay for Frazier's college education if he signs with them.

Bates said Frazier has the potential to become a Major League pitcher, because of his ability and desire.

"I see him as a Greg Maddux control-type pitcher," Bates said, referring to the Atlanta pitcher considered one of the best in the business.

"He won't overpower Major Leaguers. His mental approach will aid him greatly, though."

Asked if Atlanta had expressed interest in him before the draft, Frazier said, "I've talked to them a lot in the last couple of months."

Other teams expressed interest in him as well, but as Frazier said, "I think most of them were probably pretty sure I would go to college."

Some teams mentioned the idea of him attending junior

### college, where players are eligible for the draft after their freshman and sophomore years. Players attending a fouryear college are not eligible to be drafted until after their jun-

Instead of contemplating an offer to turn pro, Frazier will be playing summer baseball with a league in Austin.

He has also been selected to play in the Texas High School Coaches Association All-Star Game June 27 at The Ballpark in Arlington, the homefield of the Texas Rangers.

Had he signed before then, he would have likely missed out on the opportunity to play in the game.

This past season, Frazier posted an 11-1 pitching record while striking out 165 batters in 81 innings. The switch-hitting Frazier also batted .442 and led the team in home runs (9), runs batted in (30) and runs scored (27).

He was the MVP of Salado's district as the Eagles won the league title and posted a 16-5 record.

"He's been outstanding,"
Bates said, adding that he would have supported any decision Frazier would have made on his future. "You couldn't ask for anything more. He was a team player, just a coach's dream."





# Wet spring causes farmers trouble

weather that has plagued farmers throughout the South will continue to cause problems yield increase over cultivation especially with weed control. But farmers using reduced tillage production systems and a special type of sprayer should be able to compensate for wet conditions that would otherwise hamper some field opera-

"The biggest problems farmers currently face are late a good hedge against the yield planting, increased weed pressure and getting into soggy fields to run equipment," says Lyle Gingerich, technical development manager for Monsanto Company, maker of Roundup Ultra™ herbicide. "Farmers producing crops under no-till, reduced- or striptillage systems will be able to get into fields the quickest following rain due to improved soil structure and crop residue cover."

According to Gingerich, late planting will make weed control crucial, and wet field conditions will make mechanical cultivation to control weeds difficult. "An excellent alternative to cultivation is use of hooded sprayers, which allow in-crop applications of nonselective herbicides such as Roundup Ultra to keep row middles clean," he says.

Running a cultivator down crop rows several times per season to control weeds is a tradition in many crops, especially cotton. But this traditional thinking is being challenged by research documenting yield losses from root pruning following cultivation, and by new farming techniques that make cultivation less desirable, Gingerich says.

Since 1994, both university and private research studies have confirmed cotton yield increases when hooded spray-

The excessively wet spring ers are used in place of cultivation. "Hooded sprayer applications gave an average well into the growing season, of 158 pounds of lint per acre for one treatment, and 123 pounds of lint per acre for two treatments, when compared to cultivation," Gingerich says. These studies were conducted in Georgia, Alabama, Arkansas, Texas and north Florida.

> Gingerich also says that these yield increases might be losses associated with lateplanted crops.

> "When you cultivate, you prune roots that would otherwise get at nutrients and moisture more effectively," says Dr. Lowell Zelinski, director of agronomic services for Delta & Pine Land Company, a major producer of cotton and soybean seed, in Scott, Mississippi. Dr. Zelinski and his staff recently reviewed many years of research studies examining the pros and cons of cultivation. These studies encompassed all major, cotton-producing regions of the U.S.

"It is important to note that injury to root systems from cultivation occurs in the cotton root zone section with the highest fertility and moisture levels," Dr. Zelinski stresses. "Root pruning forces cotton roots to reach deeper into the

soil to satisfy the plants' needs.'

Hooded sprayers are fast becoming an attractive alternative to cultivation for many growers, especially in the Southeast. "They allow farmers to effectively and economically control weeds without disturbing the soil surface and cotton root systems," Dr. Zelinski says. "Hooded sprayers help prevent yield losses associated with root pruning."

According to Gingerich at Monsanto, farmers can get into wet fields much sooner with a hooded sprayer than with a cultivator. Sprayers also require less horsepower to pull, so smaller and lighter tractors can be used.

'Spraying is faster and provides better weed control than cultivation," he says. "And, unlike cultivation, hooded sprayers don't bring up fresh weed seed to germinate or spread perennial weeds throughout fields."

Hooded sprayer rigs are manufactured by both Custom Ag Products under the name Redball® and John Deere & Company. Over 2,000 farmers across the South and Southwest currently own these sprayers, which can be used in cotton, corn, soybeans and







"I joke and tell people we are Salado's department store. We try to have a varied inventory," Becky said.







Becky was used to helping people after working as a registered nurse for over 20 years. She entered the profession after earning a B.S. degree in nursing from Texas Woman's University.



### Alcoa gives \$50,000 to Jarrell victims

The Alcoa Foundation has given \$50,000 to help victims of the Jarrell storm that left 27 people dead, scores more injured and hundreds homeless.

Hal Reagan, Alcoa spokesman, said the Pittsburgh-based foundation gave \$25,000 each to the Salvation Army and American Red Cross Disaster Relief Fund to help surviving families of the May 27 tornadoes that struck the small community north of Georgetown.

"Alcoa came to Central Texas -- at Rockdale-- 46 years ago, and we have many employees and retirees in Williamson County," Reagan said. "We consider it part of our plant community and are pleased that the Alcoa Foundation elected to help with the storm relief and cleanup in Jarrell."

Reagan presented the donations to Maj. John Jordan, Austin area commander of the Salvation Army, and Steve Crisman, director of the American Red Cross of Central Texas, both with Austin headquarters.

The two agencies have been at the storm-ravaged site since the disaster occurred, providing food, clothing, personal necessities, household furnishings and multiple other needs, including an information center.

"The Salvation Army's round-the-clock relief efforts are made possible only through the generosity of people who care about the less fortunate," said Maj. Jordan, "The Alcoa Foundation has more than stepped up to the plate with its very kind contribution to ease the pain and hardship of victims of this tragedy."

Both agencies said money is the chief need at this point.

Alcoa, the world's largest aluminum producer, operates its biggest smelter at Rockdale in adjacent Milam County.
