New principal hired

Salado I.S.D. trustees hired Marvin Agnew to serve as high school principal during a special meeting July 2.

Agnew comes to Salado from Moody High School, where he has served as principal since 1986.

He was chosen from a field of more than 50 applicants, which was narrowed to three choices interviewed by the board of trustees.

Agnew was awarded a contract for one year on a motion by Juana K. Preston, with a second from Mike Wiley. The vote was 6-1 with Donnie Jackson voting against.

"I have admired the accomplishments of the students of Salado High School for a number of years," Agnew stated in a letter to the selection committee. "In my dealings with them I have found them to be polite and very competitive. From other reports that I have seen and heard, the students there have a strong background in the fundamentals of math and English as demonstrated in their TAAS scores."

"I have, however, often pondered why a school and community with so many good qualities has such a turnover in their campus administration," Agnew stated. "I feel that this situation offers a great challenge but not an impossible one."

"When I came to Moody, one had to look back to the late 60s to find a high school principal with over two and one-half years longevity. The turnover of teachers was also great. The faculty has stabilized and I have had to hire very few teachers other than coaches. I am very proud of my faculty and staff," Agnew added.

Agnew further stated in his letter, "I feel secure in my position here at Moody but something keeps nagging at me to attempt the challenging task of becoming the principal of Salado High School. I know that many of the problems to be encountered will be different, yet similar to those that have been encountered at Moody. I believe that I have the experience and ability to become a stable principal of your school."

Agnew states that his philosophy of education is that

"school exist to help young adults develop into productive citizens within our society. We, as educators, should strive to enable our students to become responsible adults."

"In order to accomplish this task, or any other, there must be organization and planning by all concerned," he states. "Individual rights and differences must be respected. There must be variation because everyone does not want the same thing or have the ability to get where they want to be the same way. We must, however, expect that all will succeed."

In addition to 11 years as Principal of Moody High School, Agnew also served as Asst. Principal of Belton High School (1981-86); Dean of Students and Assistant Coach, BHS (1979-81); teacher and coach, BHS, (1977-79); teacher and head coach, George West High School (1973-77); teacher and coach, Rockdale High School (1967-73); teacher and coach, Reagan Junior High, Sweetwater (1964-67).

He is a member of the Texas Association of Secondary School Principals, of which he served as Asst. Director from Region 12 and is presently serving as Director from Region 12. He received two Hound Dog awards from TASSP for membership growth.

He is also a member of the National Association of Secondary School Principals.

He gave the following as his vision of a "Perfect School."

1. Teachers are knowledgeable of subject matter and present the information they have in a variety of ways so that each student will receive it in the style they learn best.

2. Teachers and students work together in harmony and mutual respect.

3. Teachers and students demonstrate responsibility in following the rules and doing their work.

4. Everyone strives to give their best effort and if not successful, try again, and again.

5. Practice the "Golden Rule." Do unto others as you would have them do unto you.

He lives in Belton with his wife Gail. Their two children are grown.

Off the Record

Those fearless souls sent the original manuscript back to Frantz and proceeded to write a "politically correct" version that is dry as dust.

For the rest of us peons and exes - Frantz' feisty version is a realistic story of the ups and downs of a great school, from the day the doors first opened September 15, 1883, to 221 students and 12 faculty members, down through today's fifty thousand young people and a staff that defies enumeration.

The regents who oversee the university are appointed by the Governor for one reason or another - mostly financial and/or political - and the story involving just these men and women deserves enshrinement in a separate series of books.

Frantz tells the story of one of the more infamous of the modern day regents - Frank Erwin, a man who was either

loved or hated, but never just acknowledged.

The prickly tempered mover and shaker is well remembered for having had a big hand in building Disch-Falk baseball field; the Texas Swimming Center, the Special Events Center (irreverently called the Superdrum) and a massive landscaping project including the serpentine re-routing of Red River Street, various fountains plus a stone fence that surrounds three fourths of the 40 acres.

Even more importantly, Erwin got the legislature to fund the university well beyond what that normally anti-education group thought possible.

Dr. Frantz' humor showed up firmly when he noted that when Erwin died the funeral was held, naturally enough in the Superdrum, that Erwin created almost single-handedly when he was the regent's chairman: "It was hugely attended, but much like Louis B. Mayer's large

With an assist, many elderly enjoy independence

SENIOR FOCUS

Assisted-living communities are helping to bridge the gap between independent living at home and the around-the-clock care provided at nursing homes.

People over 85 years of age are the fastest-growing segment of the population. In response, the assisted-living industry is booming all across the country. The communities provide a new living option for elderly people who require some level of daily assistance, but do not need the medical attention of a nursing home.

Experts at Baylor College of

Medicine's Huffington Center on Aging in Houston say assisted-living centers allow many people to enjoy a level of independence while providing them with services to make their lives easier.

Assisted-living communities range in size from single or double rooms in a private home or retirement complex to full apartments. Most provide three meals a day served in a common dining room, housekeeping and linen service and assistance with bathing and dressing. Medication management, recreational and social activities and transportation to medical care are also usually part of the support package.

One of the appeals of the assisted-living setting is that people are able to maintain individual control and privacy in their apartment or living space. Unlike in many nursing homes, residents have the

freedom to decorate and furnish their rooms, making their surroundings feel more like home.

Assisted-living communities operate under various models. Many communities rely on home-health agencies to provide skilled nursing or other health-care assistance, since most only have staff for supervision and personal care. Regulation of assisted-living communities and their personnel varies from state to state, so it is important for people considering a move to a community to visit and ask questions about the staff, services and cost. A careful assessment of current and future needs is also warranted.

Relocating at any age is challenging, but assisted-living communities provide a wide variety of living options that may make the transition easier later in life.

McGhee receives Kirkham Award as Lion of Year for District 2-X3

Salado's Robert "Bob" McGhee received the prestigious Tom P. Kirkham Jr. Award at the Salado Lions Club's June 25 meeting at Mill Creek Country Club.

The award is given to the Lion selected by the District Awards Committee of Past District Governors as Lion of the Year for Texas Lions District 2-X3.

The district covers 15 counties in Central Texas and has 57 Lions Clubs, three Lioness Clubs and one Leo Club. There are approximately 2,187 active Lion members in the district.

McGhee has been a Lion since 1985 and served as president of the Salado club in 1989-90. He was also the club's Lion of the Year for 1991-92.

He is past president of LEAD and QUEST and has placed the program in 74 schools within District 2-X3.

As a community leader, McGhee is a member of the Old Salado School Foundation (now called Salado Civic Center Foundation). He has chaired several other committees and currently chairs the Youth Outreach and Leo Club committees.

McGhee is a volunteer for the American Cancer Society, furnishing transportation for patients needing to go to and from Scott and White and King's Daughters hospitals in Temple. His area includes patients from Salado, Bartlett, Holland, Temple and Belton.

"The accomplishments mentioned are only examples

of what a Lion leader does, and Lion McGhee has earned the title of a leader who also does the work," wrote Jim Patterson, Salado Lions immediate past president, in a letter nominating McGhee for the Kirkham Award.

McGhee also sponsored the first two Lady Lions of the Salado club.

"It is with great honor and distinct pride that I accept the Tom P. Kirkham Award for Lions District 2-X3," McGhee said in his acceptance speech June 25. "Lion Tom Kirkham set the standards for the Lion Motto: We Serve. I shall do my very best to maintain that high standard for as long as I am a Lion."

If you're thirsty, you're dehydrating Water needed by every part of body

Thirsty? Then your body is on its way to becoming dehydrated.

The average adult has between 10 and 12 gallons of water in his or her body — accounting for 50 percent of body weight.

That water plays a critical role in nearly every bodily process. And being a quart or two low can impact how you feel.

"Water is needed by virtually every muscle or tissue cell," said David Brennan, an exercise physiologist at Baylor College of medicine in Houston. "Regulating body temperature is one of the most important roles water plays in the body. Without a plentiful sup-

ply of water, the body can have a difficult time maintaining a normal temperature."

Nearly everything you do during the day — including typing, talking, walking, and even eating — requires energy. That energy, in turn, generates heat, which escapes the body through perspiration. Perspiration is the mechanism that keeps the body cool.

"We lose about two and a half quarts of water a day through normal activity," said Brennan. "People who exercise lose even more and should drink water throughout the day to meet the demands of exercise. But don't wait until you are thirsty. Thirst is the body's way of saying your water level

is low."

Dehydration is the most serious consequence of not drinking enough water. The loss of just two to three percent of bodywater weight can impact some of the functions in the body.

To guard against dehydration, drink up.

"Drinking eight to 12 cups of water a day should keep you well hydrated," said Brennan. "Water is best for fluid replacement, but sports drinks and juices are also good options."

Brennan suggests limiting consumption of beverages containing alcohol and caffeine they cause water loss.

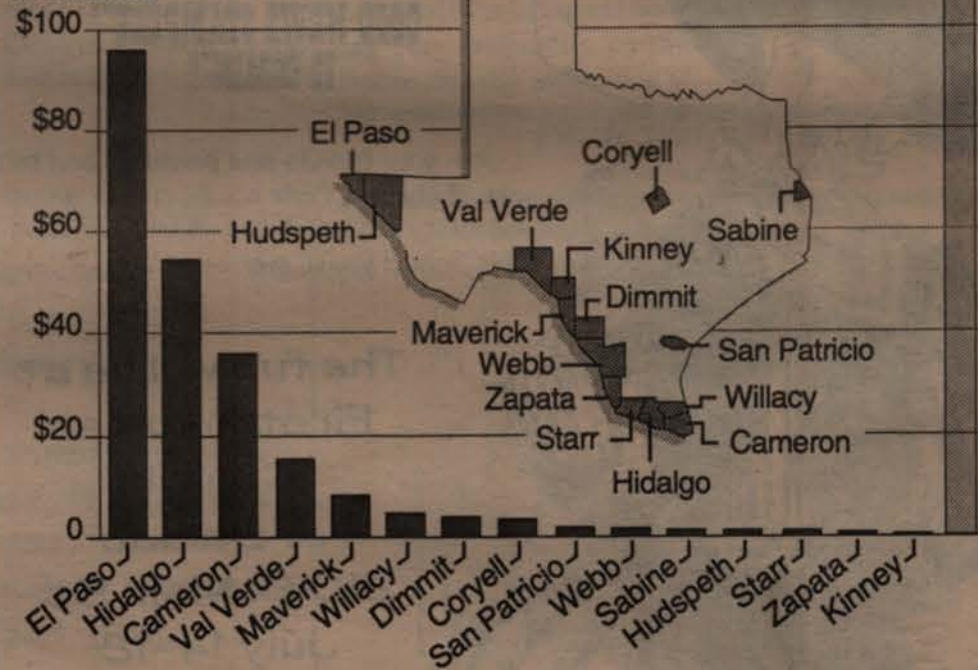

Swim Coaches program. Minimum age: 17 by completion of course, and completion of the Instructor Candidate Training (ICT) course.

Monday-Friday, July 7-11, 8 a.m.-5 p.m. each day. Cost: \$100.

LIFEGUARD TRAINING: Teaches the skills and the knowledge needed to prevent and respond to aquatic emergencies. The course includes CPR for the Profes-

sional Rescuer and First Aid. Students must be 15 prior to course completion and pass the pre-course test.

Skin remembers tans, sun burns

Your skin remembers every time that you tanned and every time you were sun burned.

Research shows that two or more blistering sunburns as a child increases your chances of having skin cancer later in life. Too much sun over the years can cause skin cancer, wrinkles of the skin and possible cataracts of the eye.

Here are some guidelines from the American Academy of Dermatology to help you protect your children from the sun.

A baby's skin is very sensitive. It is up to the adult to protect their skin.

* Babies under 6 months should not be exposed to direct sunlight. Keep the baby in the shade of a tree, umbrella or stroller canopy.

* Child-sized sunglasses with UV protection are available to protect the eyes.

* Dress the baby in comfortable lightweight clothing that covers the body. Choose a hat with brim to shade the face.

* Clothes made of tighter weave fabric are best. Clothing held up to a lamp or win-

dow with little or no light shining give the most protection. Cotton fabrics are both cool and protective. Apply sunscreen at least 30 minutes before going out. SPF of 15 protects the skin 15 times longer than the same skin without protection. Apply sun screen more often while playing in the water.

Services held for Robert Lee Guthrie

Former Dallas attorney Robert Lee "Bob" Guthrie, 97, who was born in Salado at the turn of the century and later served as a judge in occupied Germany, died June 26 at Walnut Place nursing home in Dallas.

A private memorial service was held in Salado. Mr. Guthrie gave his body to the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School at Dallas for research.

He was an attorney for 50 years, practicing law in Dallas from 1954 until his retirement in 1978.

After graduating from high school in Waco, Mr. Guthrie earned a bachelor's degree from Baylor University.

He earned his master's degree at Brown University in Rhode Island, which he attended on a scholarship.

He also attended Princeton University in New Jersey before becoming a Rhodes Scholar. At Oxford University, Mr. Guthrie earned two degrees in law.

From 1927 to 1935, Mr. Guthrie practiced law with Thompson & Knight in Dallas. In 1930, he was elected the first president of the Texas

Young Lawyers Association.

From 1935 to 1942, Mr. Guthrie practiced law with his brother, James H. "Jim" Guthrie, who later became a Dallas County Criminal Court Judge.

During World War II, Mr. Guthrie had assignments with the U.S. Army Air Corps in England and Germany and served with British forces based in North Africa. He then served as a judge in post-war Germany.

Mr. Guthrie is survived by his wife, Martha Guthrie of Dallas.

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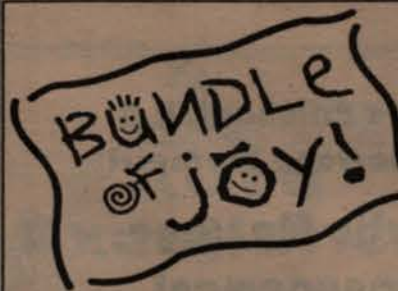

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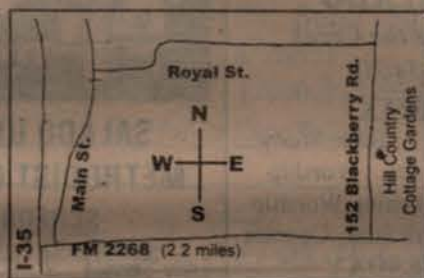
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America can depend on Farmers

"Football should be fun," Robert says, energetically. "It should be fun to coach, fun to play and fun to watch. I like to throw the football on offense. Defensively, we'll be attacking. The bottom line is you have to out-execute people to win. We won't be a finesse team. Baylor is a special place. It has so

many similarities to Notre Dame (from whence Roberts came), being a private Christian school. Both places are spiritual.

"I have a plan for Baylor that includes a high graduation rate. I'd like to be No.1 in the nation in graduating our players. I want to work closely with the faculty. More than anything I want to win. That's what they brought me here to do and that's the plan."

Roberts came to Baylor with 10 years of head coaching experience. He has directed passing-oriented offensive attacks ranked among the nation's best. He has been ranked as one of the nation's top recruiters several times.

Roberts comes to Baylor from Notre Dame, where he spent the last three years as offensive coordinator under former head coach Lou Holtz. He recently turned down the opportunity to remain at Notre Dame with new head coach Bob Davie.

While Roberts was at Notre Dame, the Irish were ranked in the top10 nationally and appeared in the Fiesta and Orange Bowls. He installed an exciting passing attack that made the Irish one of the nation's most potent offensive squads.

In both 1994 and 1995 he was rated as the Number One Recruiter in America by Football Prep Report Magazine. From 1989-93 he was the head coach at Northeast Louisiana University, compiling a record of 38-19-2. His teams went to the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs three of his last four years. His squad won the Southland Conference title in 1990.

Mahlman earns B.S. degree

From 1984-88, he served as head coach at Western Kentucky. Taking over at a school that had considered dropping football, his last two teams were nationally ranked. In 1986 Sports Illustrated rated Roberts as one of the top five recruiters in the country, along with Bo Schembechler of Michigan, Terry Donahue of UCLA, Oklahoma's Barry Switzer, and Penn State's Joe Paterno. From 1979-83 he worked on the staff at Vanderbilt, and was an assistant at Davidson and Eastern Kentucky.

He began his coaching career as a high school assistant at McCormick High School in South Carolina. He played linebacker for Western Carolina from 1965-69. He earned a Bachelor of Science in Education there in 1969 and a Master of Administration in 1971. He and his wife Pennie have two children. David is a student at Western Kentucky and Allison attends Notre Dame.

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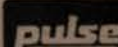
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Low-interest loans established for Texas veterans for homes

Texas veterans can apply for up to \$110,000 in special low-interest loans for the purchase of a home, land or to make home improvements.

That's the message the Texas Veterans Land Board (VLB) is bringing to Killeen on June 26, when the VLB hosts a public seminar on the special state benefits exclusively for Texas veterans.

The seminar is set for 6:30 p.m. in the ballroom of the Fort Hood Phantom Warrior Club, Building #194 on 37th Street. Registration begins at 6 p.m. It is free and open to the public.

Additional information on applying for VLB benefits can be obtained by calling 1-800-252-VETS.

The VLB recently increased the maximum amount of a VLB land loan from \$20,000 to \$40,000. This means veterans who want to buy land will now have the option of borrowing \$20,000 at 6.65 percent or \$40,000 at 7.75 percent. Both carry a 30-year term and require a 5 percent down payment.

Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro, who serves as chairman of the VLB, said the increase in benefits means veterans now have \$110,000 in special low-interest loan benefits to use.

"I want to urge every veteran and real estate professional to attend this seminar and find out more about these outstanding programs that have enabled more than 150,000 Texas veterans to buy a home, land or make needed home improvements," Mauro said.

Mauro said the VLB currently has more than \$100 million available for direct home loans at rates as low as 6.0 and 6.5 percent interest.

"The Texas veterans home loan program is far and away the best deal in today's home buying market," Mauro said. "And Texas veterans are responding in record numbers to rates that are way below the current market. These programs can offer you substantial savings on a 15 and 30-year mortgage and allow you to get more home for your money."

Mauro said there are more than 31,500 veterans in Bell, Coryell, Falls and Milam counties that are eligible for these special state benefits but many have never taken the time to get the details of these outstanding programs.

"Those attending (the seminar) will be able to get the latest information on the state's three outstanding low-interest loan programs for Texas veterans," Mauro said.

"Recent legislation which increased the maximum amount of a VLB home loan to \$45,000 greatly improved Texas veterans benefits," Mauro added. "But Texans are not limited to homes costing \$45,000 or less."

"Veterans who want to buy a home costing more can combine a VLB loan with an FHA, VA or conventional loan to get a lower interest rate."

"No other state has anything that compares with these special benefits. It's a special Texas way of saying 'thanks' to our veterans for the sacrifices they've made in the service of our country."

Bell Co. Young Lawyers Assoc. receives 2 awards from State

The Bell County Young Lawyers Association was honored June 27 with two Texas Young Lawyers Association Awards during the State Bar of Texas Annual Meeting in Houston. The awards, which recognize a lawyer organization's effort in public and professional service, were presented during the TYLA Luncheon.

The 50-member group won second place for its overall service to the community and pro-

cession. Projects included the VoTexas project aimed at educating students about their voting rights, and a Reading Power Club project designed to increase reading activity among students.

For its service to the public, the organization placed second with "Law at the Mall." This project brought together members of the legal community to educate the public about law-oriented agencies.

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Questions & Answers on children's nutrition

Questions and Answers from the Children's Nutrition Research Center.

Q: What is a nutritional comparison of Apple and Orange Juice?

A: An 8-ounce glass of orange juice provides your child with more than 100 percent of the National Research Council's Recommended Dietary Allowance for Vitamin C. It is also a good source of potassium, folic acid and Vitamin A.

Although unsweetened apple juice contains approximately the same number of calories as orange juice, its nutritional contributions are limited unless it is fortified with Vitamin C. However, giving children apple juice is better than giving them sodas or other drinks loaded with sugar.

Q: I have been told not to give my two-year-old girl popcorn because she could choke. Are there other foods that could cause a child to choke?

A: A number of foods are hard for a toddler to chew and could become lodged in the throat or windpipe. Here are some things that children under the age of 5 should not be given:

- Apple chunks and slices
- Grapes
- Hot dogs
- Peanuts
- Round candies
- Chunks of uncooked vegetables like carrot sticks

Children should never walk around or lie down while eat-

ing. They should also never be left unsupervised during meals or snacks.

Q: I want to pump breast-milk so my husband can feed our week-old daughter while I am at school. However, after pumping for 15 minutes, I only produce 2 ounces of milk. What should I do?

A: Store those two ounces and celebrate! That is a lot of milk to pump at one time when your baby is seven days old. If you nurse on demand, your milk will increase naturally over the next two to three weeks. Most breast-feeding mothers produce about 25 ounces of milk a day by the time their babies are four weeks old. If you pump once a day, your daily production will increase faster and you will have more than enough milk in your freezer within a couple of weeks.

A good time to pump is early morning when your breasts are full. Nurse on one side, then pump the other. Let your baby nurse on the pumped side when you finish to increase your milk supply even more.

After you return to school, the milk you pump in the morning can be refrigerated and fed to your baby later in the day. If you run out of stored milk, you can use formula as a backup for a day or two until you increase your milk supply by pumping more often and by relaxing and nursing very frequently on the weekends. Be aware that if

you give your baby formula and do not increase your pumping and nursing frequency, your milk production will go down even more.

Q: My six-year old son has become a finicky eater. He has narrowed his food choices to about 20 items (peanut butter, cheese, vegetable soup, apples, oranges, and bread) just to name a few. I am concerned about his growth and how he will do when he starts school. What should I do??

A: It is not uncommon for children to go on food jags. Fortunately, many of your son's choices are healthy ones and represent all of the food groups. If you expect your son to try new foods, make sure you set a good example and eat a variety of foods. Help him by offering small portions of new delicacies at each meal. Be patient, but consistent.

Involve your son in meal planning, grocery shopping and other food planning tasks. He will be more likely to eat foods he helped prepare. Let him help pack his own school lunch. Include a few of his favorites and throw in a couple of new items each time. If he eats at the school cafeteria, peer pressure will sometimes push a child to try new foods.

You should have your child's growth monitored by your pediatrician. He or she will let you know if there are any problems.

PRIME TIME WITH KIDS

When's the last time you ate a board game? Set Beethoven to chattering on your teeth? Made your own magnetic poetry? Dusted off a philodendron to give it a new lease on life? Today's the day to start!

These aren't off-kilter inventions, but rather fun stuff that can be tied to things you do at various turns in the day's events whether you're waiting for the muffins to rise, combing your hair, or trimming your sideburns.

They are a way of weaving our children's lives in and out of our daily rounds to make everyday activities more meaningful and an occasion for lifelong memories.

• Pause between chores and play edible checkers together. Instead of using typical game pieces, substitute small crackers, raisins, peanuts, grapes, etc. When you capture a person's marker, you get a snack! Crown the king with special treats such as chocolate candies or jelly beans.

• Learn how to play the harmonica and have a family jam session. Or, improvise with a homemade version: Fold a piece of waxed paper over

the teeth side of a plastic comb, tape in place on the opposite side, place the teeth side between your lips and hum a favorite song.

• Cover an obsolete refrigerator magnet (business card style and size) with your child's picture glued on top. Hang the child's art, poems or sports schedule from the photo magnet. Or, cut out words from a newspaper article and glue onto the magnet. Cut out the mini magnetic words to use for sentence-building on the fridge.

• Gather your houseplants and take them outside for a breath of fresh air and a cleansing shower with a garden hose.

• Start a cookbook filled with family favorites from your summer menus. Use a loose-leaf notebook and add to it as you try new recipes together. Make a "just for kids" section with fare the children can prepare with minimal assistance.

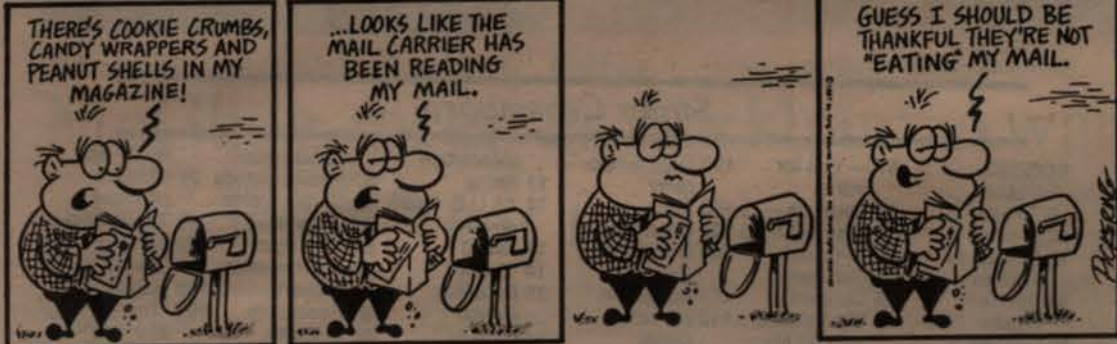

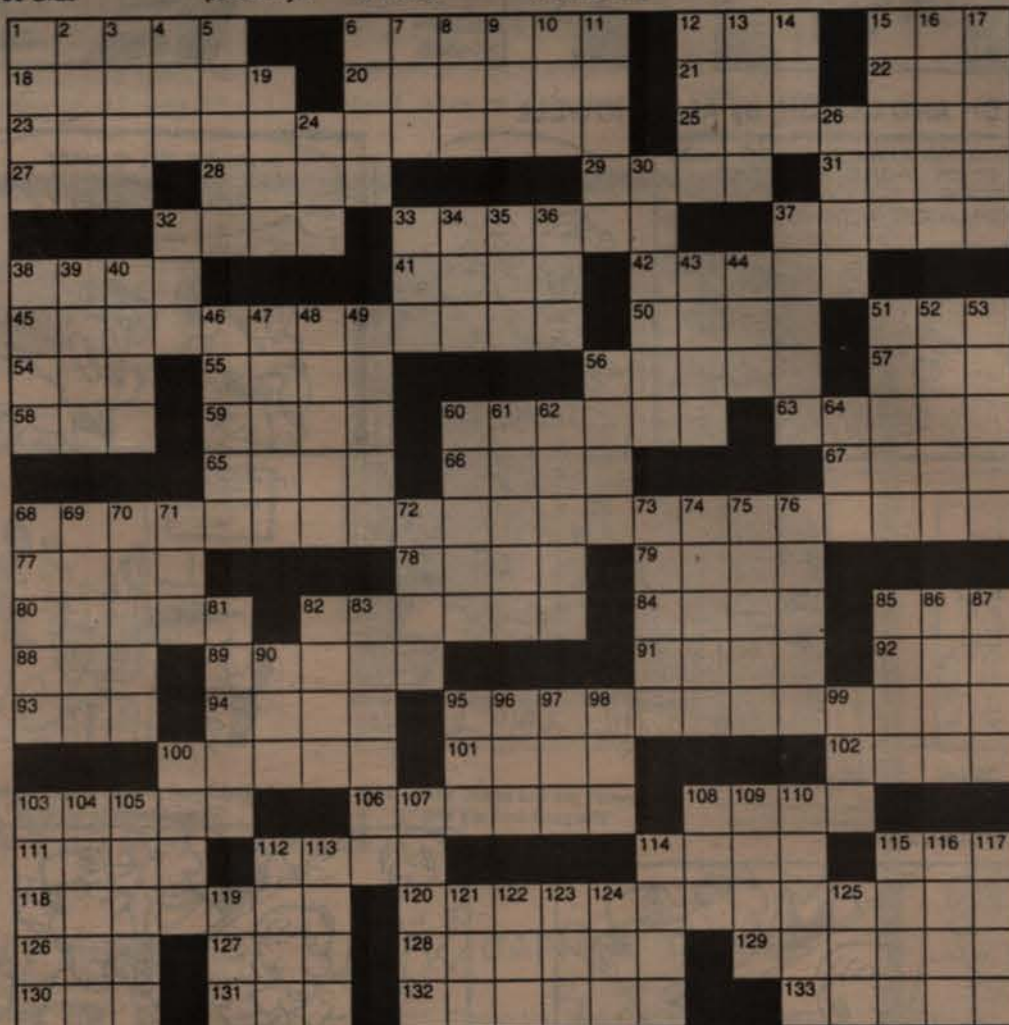

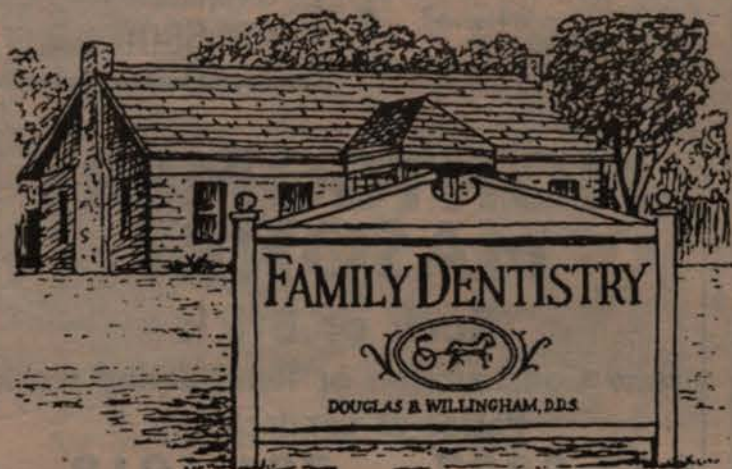

Results are in on Bell Co. wheat variety and fungicide plots, very revealing

The results of the 1997 Bell County wheat variety and fungicide plots is quite revealing as to how much leaf rust can decrease yields.

On Oct. 5, 1996 we planted 12 varieties, two of which were soft wheats, for the county plots. At early flag leaf stage the plots were sprayed with two experimental fungicides for leaf rust. The two chemicals used, Quadris® and Folicur® are not yet cleared for use on wheat, but were used to gather additional data.

On June 4, Dr. Travis Miller, Extension Small Grain Specialist harvested the plots with a plot combine. The plots were replicated three times for accuracy.

The following is a listing of the variety, untreated check yield (bu/ac), Folicur® treated yield and Quadris® treated yield in that order:

Coker 9543 - 48.6, 57.8, 54.9; Coker 9474 - 51.8, 56.4, 53.7; Caster - 38.3, 51.9, 55.1; 2163 - 22.3, 28.7, 43.7; Jagger - 47.2, 54.1, 61.4; 814 - 36.1, 45.4, 54.2; Hickok - 39.5, 49.1, 54.5; 822 - 24.7, 32.3, 38.3; Tomahawk - 25.2, 34.3, 43.2; Ogalalla - 42.6, 52.8, 62.1; 2180 - 37.1, 41.1, 45.9; TAM 3 01 - 22.2, 29.8, 36.0.

The 12 varieties averaged 36.3 bushels per acre in the untreated check, 44.5 bu/ac in the Folicur treated plots and 50.3 bu/ac in the Quadris (& treated plots.

The Folicur® ranged from a low 8.9% increase in yield in the Coker 9474 which had

little rust to a high of 36.1 yield increase in the Tomahawk.

The Quadris® ranged from a 3.7% yield increase in Coker 9474 to a high of 96.0% yield increase in 2163 which had one of the highest rust ratings in the check plots.

The fungicides were applied by ground application. The results are a reflection of two factors, level of rust present on the variety and yield potential of the variety. If there is little or no rust present you would not expect a yield increase by applications of a fungicide. If the variety does not have a high yield potential, the application of a fungicide would not give as great of an increase in yield.

If the Folicur® and Quadris® get their EPA label for wheat it will be interesting to see if we can repeat these results on a field basis. At this point the new fungicides look very promising.

The white, frothy mass created by spittlebugs is especially abundant on pecan trees in some areas of Central Texas this season. Although often more of a curiosity than a pest, large numbers are a concern as feeding can cause nut drop and injury to the terminal.

However, there is little research on the economic importance of this pest. Past experience suggests that when 15 percent or more of the terminals are infected, treatment with a labeled insecticide should be considered. Where nut load is average to excellent, larger infestations of spittlebugs may be tolerated. The decision to treat should also consider that insecticides applied during July and August

may kill beneficial insects that help keep yellow aphid numbers low. In such cases, yellow aphid numbers can increase.

Since spittlebugs rarely require control, there is also little information on the effectiveness of insecticides. For commercial growers, chlorpyrifos (Lorsban 4E) is labeled for use on spittlebugs but treated orchards can not be grazed. Carbaryl (Sevin 80S) is also labeled for control of spittlebugs and treated orchards can be grazed. Chlorpyrifos and carbaryl, under different brand names, are also available in small containers at garden supply stores and nurseries. Look for products labeled for use on pecans and read and follow label directions.

Immature spittlebugs, called nymphs, produce the white frothy materials which appears as a mass of spittle. It is thought that the spittle mass provides high humidity for the insect's development and protects them from predators. The adult spittlebugs look much like the nymphs but are larger and have wings. There may be 3-4 generations per season.

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Soybean midge hits Cen-Tex fields

Soybean midge have hit many fields across Central Texas. Normally midge will hit early blooming areas of fields as the insect comes out of Johnson grass. Once the entire field starts blooming, the midge will spread out over the

entire field and fall below the economic threshold of one midge per head.

During a normal year, midge are not a problem in fields that complete blooming by the 15th-20th of June. This year, because of the delayed planting and excessive amounts of Johnson grass, we could be fighting midge until all of the sorghum completes blooming.

The sorghum midge is one of the most damaging insects to sorghum in Texas. The adult sorghum midge is a tiny, fragile looking, orange fly. Larvae hatch from eggs deposited by a female midge in

spikelets of flowering sorghum heads. Each female deposits about 50 tiny, yellowish-white eggs during her short lifetime of less than 24 hours. An orange maggot hatches from the egg and feeds on the newly fertilized ovary, thereby preventing kernel development.

Effective sorghum midge control reaches the integration of several practices that reduce midge population density. Planting hybrids of uniform maturity early enough to avoid late heading is strongly recommended. This practice allows sorghum to complete flower-

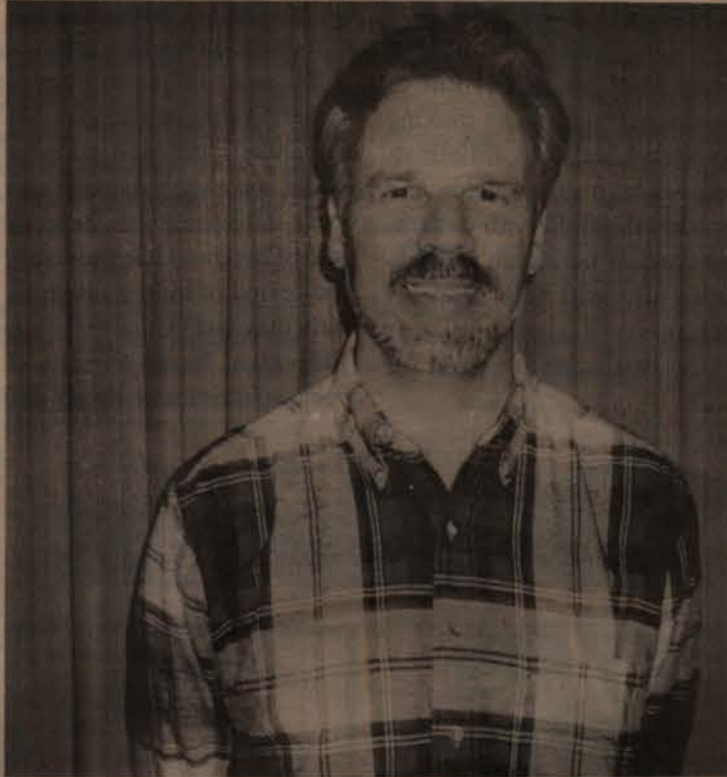

ing before damaging midge densities build up. Cultural practices that promote uniform heading and flowering in a field also are important in midge control and in making treatment decisions. Eliminating Johnson grass inside and outside the field with cultivation and/or herbicide applications also will help suppress midge.

chemical control, crop development, yield potential and midge density should be evaluated daily during flowering.

Because midges lay eggs in flowering sorghum heads (yellow anthers exposed on individual spikelets), damage can occur until the entire head or field of sorghum has flowered. The period of midge susceptibility may last from 7 to 9 days (individual head) to several weeks (individual field) de-

pending on the uniformity of flowering.

To determine the presence of sorghum midges, fields should be inspected mid-morning to shortly after noon when midges are most abundant on flowering heads. Each day a new midge brood appears, so inspect fields daily. Midge adults can be seen crawling on or flying about flowering heads. The simplest and most efficient technique for detecting and counting sorghum midges is careful, close-range inspection of all sides of a randomly selected flowering head. Panicles should be handled carefully during inspection to avoid disturbing the ovipositing midges. Other methods, such as placing a clear plastic bag or jar over the panicle as a trapping device, appear to be less accurate than direct inspection of the panicle.

Because they are relatively weak fliers and rely on wind currents to aid their dispersal, adult sorghum midges usually are most abundant along field borders. For this reason, field scouts should first inspect plants along field borders, particularly those upwind. If few midges are found in these areas, there should be little need to sample the entire field. However, if sorghum midge numbers in upwind border areas equal or exceed the economic threshold, at least 40 additional heads from the whole field (avoiding plants within 150 feet of field borders) should be inspected. Average sorghum midge abundance should then be calculated based only on these additional samples. A sample area should be no larger than 80 acres; larger fields should be divided.

The need for insecticide is based upon average number of midge per head and the stage of development of the sorghum. Normally one midge per head and yellow blooms present justifies the need to spray.

Remember, once the blooms turns amber color, it is past midge susceptibility. Most people are using either Baythroid® or Karate® for midge control.

Winning rights for crime victims

In a 1995 court ruling, the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles was forbidden to consider letters from citizens protesting an inmate's release on parole, unless the inmate had the opportunity to investigate and rebut the letters. This decision meant that the letter writer's identity would be revealed to the inmate. The Office of the Attorney General

appealed the 1995 decision and obtained a stay of the ruling.

In April 1997, a circuit court affirmed the right of crime victims to submit confidential letters protesting an inmate's potential release on parole. The decision in *Daniel Johnson v. Victor Rodriguez* is a clear-cut victory for crime victims and their families.

Court decision empowers crime victims

As your Attorney General,

I am glad I could obtain a favorable court decision in the Daniel Johnson case. Protest letters empower the crime victims. Many people might fear writing letters to the parole board if prisoners could read them.

Throughout my career as a prosecutor, legislator and Attorney General, I have always been committed to restoring balance in our justice system. My goal is to assure that no crime victim is forgotten after law enforcement officials leave the crime scene. Instead, the crime victim should continue to be involved in all phases of the criminal justice process.

Due process and the constitutional protections for the accused are fundamental to our society and to our justice system. However, these rights should never take precedence over the rights of innocent victims and law-abiding citizens. It is not too much to ask that the Parole Board give citizens the opportunity to protest the early release of a prison inmate without fear of retribution.

Crime victims' rights guaranteed by law

The U.S. Constitution's Sixth Amendment guarantees that "in all criminal prosecutions the accused shall enjoy the right ... to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; (and) to be confronted with the witnesses against him." This ancient principle, a foundation of English common law for centuries, is fundamental to our justice system.

We all believe in a justice system that presumes an accused person to be innocent until he or she is found guilty. During a trial the person should be able to hear everything his

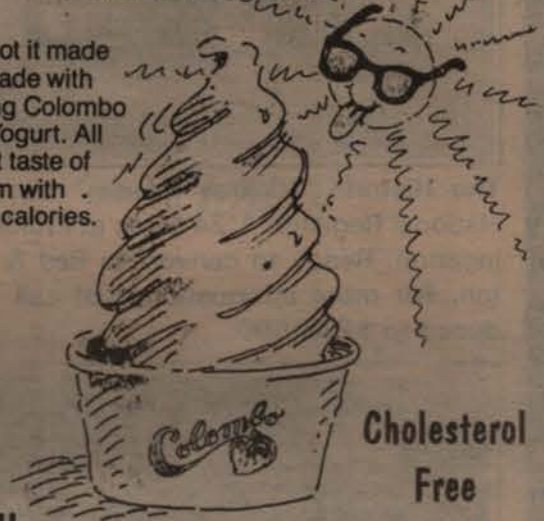

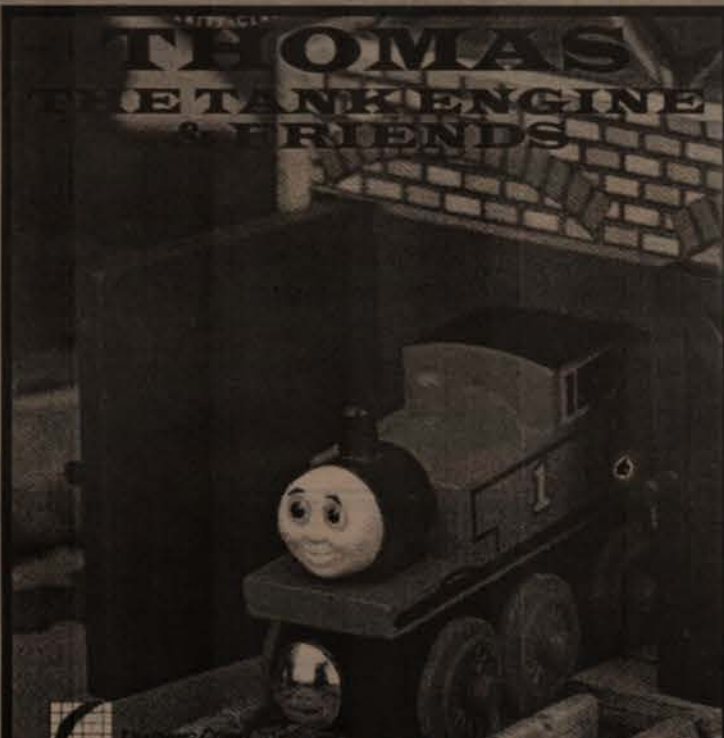

or her accusers have to say.

However, in a parole hearing, we do not presume that the "accused" is innocent. On the contrary, we have already proven with due process in a court of law that a person eligible for parole has committed a crime. Let us not forget the bedrock principle of the Texas Crime Victims' Rights Act. Stated in the Constitution, this Act says a crime victim has the

right to privacy throughout the criminal justice process. This includes, but is not limited to, parole proceedings. (The Texas Constitution also says that crime victim may be present at all phases of the trial.)

Crime victims' rights take precedence

Once we convict a person of a crime and sentence the lawbreaker to a term in the peni-

tentiary, that person should expect to serve the full amount of time. We should grant parole sparingly, and only where truly warranted. Nothing in either the Texas or United States Constitution grants convicted criminals the "right" to get out of prison early.

Victim assistance programs in criminal justice agencies can help swing the balance back toward victims. Law enforcement officers, prosecutors, judges, parole officers and probation officials all have a part to play in assuring that we do not forget crime victims in the criminal justice process. And there is no reason to increase their anguish by discarding their constitutional right of privacy when they protest the parole process. After all, victims are law-abiding citizens of the state of Texas.
