Historic bridge to be delivered this week

The July 15 delivery and placement of an historic truss bridge across Campbell Branch on Main Street has been delayed until sometime this week. An official with the Texas Department of Transportation could not confirm the exact date as of press time July 21.

North Main Street (FM 2268) in Salado is expected to be closed to through traffic between Thomas Arnold and Cardinal for a few hours, until the delivery is complete.

Access to the area businesses should not be affected as traffic can detour via Thomas Arnold, Cardinal and the IH-35 frontage roads. Local traffic will be permitted to access businesses inside the detoured area as usual.

This project is to provide a safe area for the pedestrians in Salado, including pedestrian cross-walks.

Ellis McGinnis Construction Co., of Eddy, is the contractor for this project, which is targeted to be completed by July 31.

Motorists are urged to slow down, drive with caution and observe all warning signs.

PROTECTING OUR CHILDREN FROM THOSE WHO WOULD PREY ON THEM

In June the U.S. Supreme Court made what is in this day and age a stunning decision: Society has the right to protect its children. The court ruled that states may continue to keep habitual child molesters locked up, even after they've completed their prison sentences.

Leroy Hendricks, the kind of criminal who gives parents nightmares, is at the center of this story. Over a 40-year period, Hendricks accumulated five convictions for molesting children in particularly horrible ways, and was accused of countless other crimes with which he never was charged. Hendricks told the last court to try him that the only way for him to stop molesting children when released from prison "is to die."

On completion of his last prison sentence, a court determined Hendricks is both "mentally abnormal" and dangerous. So the state of Kansas kept him confined to a mental facility under its Sexually Violent Predators Act. But a great effort was mounted on Hendricks' behalf to gain his release. This was based on the argument that the Fifth Amendment prohibition against "double jeopardy" — forbidding the government to punish a person twice for the same crime — was violated by the Kansas statute.

The Hendricks case goes to the core of the debate over what the Constitution allows our society to do to protect its most vulnerable. In 1949, U.S. Supreme Court Justice Robert Jackson wrote that Constitutional logic must be tempered with practical wisdom in such cases to avoid converting "the constitutional Bill of Rights into a suicide pact."

Unfortunately, until last month's ruling, the court has ignored Justice Jackson's warning. Previous courts have put the rights of criminals — even child molesters — ahead of the rights of children to be safe in our society.

Happily, the court has come around to the common-sense idea that preventing highly predictable crimes against children is a good idea.


Our society has begun to realize that it has a premier obligation to protect its young from predators, more than 40 percent of whom commit repeat offenses. The Supreme Court ruling is indicative of this realization. Additionally, Texas and many other states have statutes similar to New Jersey's "Megan's Law," which require community notification when a molester is released from prison and takes up residence.

Last year Congress passed legislation which I introduced that requires life imprisonment for two-time child sex offenders when their cases are heard in federal court. It also provides a nationwide system of tracking sex offenders so society can keep tabs on them if they move from one state to another.

so society can keep tabs on them if they move from one state to another.

These measures will not put an end to child molestation. But it is our responsibility to take what steps we can take to prevent it. To do less is, indeed, to turn the Constitution into a mutual suicide pact and force our children to join it.

Child molestation is a horrendous crime. Justice must serve the youngest and most vulnerable among us, as well as those who prey on them.7.18.97




Gov. George Bush learns tough lesson of reading fine print when signing bill

Governor Bush learned an important lesson concerning his part in converting legislation into law as a result of a simple stroke of the pen.

Following the conclusion of the most recent legislative session on June 2, 1997, the Guv had a grand total of 20 days to review and either sign or veto the nearly 1,500 bills that had escaped from the Legislature and were awaiting George The Younger's verdict. A total of over 5,000 pieces of legislation were introduced during the 75th session.

Bush vetoed less than 20 proposed laws, including one by fellow Republican Toby Goodman (R-Arlington) that would have restricted so called "ambulance chasers" from seeking traffic accident reports from law enforcement record centers.



The Guv killed the bill noting it was; "Too broadly drafted and unduly restricted access to information of legitimate interest to the general public." Sounds like a statement only a trial lawyer could love.

But, hold on. This minidrama isn't over yet.

The tale continues to unfold soon after Goodman's bill is decapitated. Later the same day - the Guv approved a bill, written by Senator Mike Moncrief (D-Fort Worth) that had hidden in it the same words and intent as the vetoed Goodman bill!

An embarrassed Governor's Office staff explained that the error came as a result of the high volume of bills that had to be examined in the short time slot between the end of the session and the veto/ap-

proval deadline.

Exactly who all the players

were in this enactment is a little fuzzy but apparently included the media lobby (Texas Daily Newspaper Association) who editorialized against the Goodman bill since they felt it limited access to public information. This group of influence peddlers then turned around and missed the same law lurking in Moncrief's legislation.

Also, it would not be much of a stretch to add the Texas Trial Lawyers Association who like to get their hands on anything that allows them access to accident information. Lawsuit potentials - don't you know. Hence their interest in having Bush veto the measure.

Then they belatedly discovered the hated provision had crept into another bill that was subsequently signed. Red faces! Banging on desks! Heads rolling?

So, maybe, as the great Bard himself noted in the play of the



QUESTIONS ABOUT PATERNITY

F YOU ARE a non-custodial parent, you may be concerned about a number of important issues. Although some non-custodial parents are mothers, the majority are fathers. A non-custodial parent who has never been married to his child's mother may also face issues regarding the establishment

We at the Office of the Afforney General welcome your inquiries, and we hope that the information in this article will help you. Below are some questions about paternity frequently asked by non-custodial par-

The mother of my child said she was using birth control. Since I did not agree to the pregnancy, why do I have to pay?

By law, you are responsible for supporting the child if you are the biological father. Under the law, it does not matter whether you intended to get the mother pregnant or what she may have told you about using birth control.

What if I don't think the child is

If you have doubts, you can ask for a paternity test. Based on the results of the test and other evidence presented, the judge or

jury will make the final determination about whether you are the fa-

What if I want to agree that I am the father?

You can sign a form called a statement of paternity. This is the first step in establishing that you are the father. Based on this document, an order of paternity can be entered. This will establish you as the legal father and, in most cases, will require you to pay child support. More importantly, your child vill have a chance to develop a relationship with you.

How are paternity tests done?

If paternity testing is required, you will be scheduled to have blood drawn at a site near your home. The mother and child will also be scheduled to have blood drawn. The blood is sent to a laboratory where it is tested. The results will be returned within weeks.

The test compares many different details in the mother's blood and your blood. If you are not the father, the tests will show that you and the child do not share blood elements. If you are not ruled out as the father, the report will show a probability that you are the father. A man who is not ruled out by testing is almost certainly the father.

Modern paternity testing is extremely accurate. Since all human beings are related, there is no such thing as a 100% probability of paternity. State law requires that pa-

99% of the male population. If there is no such match, then the alleged father will be excluded (proven not to be the father).

Can a mother in another state name me as her child's father?

Yes. Paternity can be established even if the mother and alleged father live in different states.

I was not married to the mother when my child was born. But I'm sure it is my child. Do I have any rights as a parent?

Under Texas law, a child born to parents who are not legally married has no legal father unless and until paternity is established.

Unless paternity is established, a father who is not married to the mother of his child:

- a has no legal relationship to the
- a has no right to visit the child
- has no right to make decisions about the child may not pass on his Social Secu-
- rity benefits to the child has no legal responsibilities to
- the child

Establishing paternity creates a legal relationship between the father and child, even though there may no be no legal relationship, such as marriage, between the mother and father. If you want to establish paternity for your child, call 1-800-252-8014 or call your local child support field office.



Forgotten family members may feel helpless

Spouses and children of hearing person." people with profound hearing loss are often "the forgotten family."

"Hearing loss affects the whole family," said Robert L. Beck, an associate professor of psychiatry at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "As with any family issue, good communication is the key.

Often, someone who is losing their hearing is so focused on their own fears and anxieties, that they are unaware of how their hearing loss is affecting their loved ones.

"Family members may feel helpless and sometimes even hopeless in not being able to communicate satisfactorily with the hard-of-hearing person," said Beck. "Frustrations are seldom expressed for fear they might hurt the hard-of

Beck adds that, if not expressed, these frustrations may be turned inward and place additional stresses on the relationship.

For hearing members of the family, Beck suggests you:

*Express your feelings. Tell the hard-of-hearing family member how you feel about their hearing loss. Are you frightened, concerned about the family's future, or even angry at the hearing loss? Share it, don't keep it to yourself.

Don't tiptoe around the hearing loss. Avoiding talking about the hearing loss can lead to more discomfort. It could also lead the hard-of hearing family member to think that you don't

*If you are the hearing parents, do not serve as a


"gatekeeper" between your hard-of-hearing spouse and your children. This promotes an artificial realtionship that is damaging to the children and to the hard-of-hearing parent. Children must learn that nothing has changed when it comes to relating to their parents.

For the family member who has hearing loss, Beck says it's important not to use the hearing loss as an excuse to "tune out" but rather stay involved with your family, career and friends.

There is a vast difference between existing and living. Living demands participation. As difficult as the hearing loss may be to cope with. It must not result in a diminished life. Life does go on."

It takes special driving skills and knowledge to drive safely around big rigs along 1-35 or other highways. You cannot drive around the big rigs the way you drive around other vehicles. The most important tip is to give a wide berth to the

Statistics show that collisions between large trucks and lighter vehicles frequently results in death to the driver or occupants of the "other vehicle." In 80 percent of fatal accidents involving big trucks and lighter vehicles, it is not an occupant of the big truck who dies.

Those big rigs are different because they have a much longer stopping distance than other vehicles, and longer still on wet roads. The ability of the rig driver to control their rig during emergency braking

is very limited. Also, truck drivers cannot see you nearly as well as you can see the truck, and if there is a crash, you lose.

Drivers of smaller vehicles need to practice the following safety tips-

- * As a general rule, keep as much space as possible between your vehicle and large
- * Do not cut in front of a truck just because you see open space there. That space is the truck's cushion of safety because of its longer stopping distance. If you have to stop suddenly, it will be very difficult for the truck to avoid hitting you. Also, if the truck has a long hood the driver may not be able to see you at all.

Do not linger alongside a truck. You may be in the trucker's blind spot. The size and configuration of many trucks, especially those with trailers, create large blind spots for truck drivers. If you cannot see a truck driver's face in one of his mirrors, he cannot see you and probably does not know that you are there.

* If you are following a truck and cannot see the truck's side mirrors, you are driving too close. The driver cannot see you, so back off.

* Always give trucks plenty of room when they are turning. The relationship between the cab, mirrors and trailer change constantly during a turn, creating varying blind spots. Also, trucks need extra space to turn because of their size.

A collision with a large truck can have tragic consequences for the occupants of the smaller vehicle. Always adjust your driving around the

At least two house pets in the Mill Creek area have been poisoned to death in recent months.









Texas A&M University Health Science Center now has the wheels to hit the Texas highways in an effort to increase access to health education and screenings for rural

Officials from Texas A&M's Health Science Center joined state and local officials July 14 to dedicate a new 40foot van that will help deliver health education and outreach programs to rural Texans as part of the developing School of Rural Public Health's Health Education and Rural Outreach (HERO) program.

Dr. Michael L. Friedland, Texas A&M vice president for health affairs and dean of Texas A&M's College of Medicine, presided at the informal ceremony, which took place at the northwest corner of the Scott and White Memorial Hospital parking lot on 31st Street in Temple.

"We see the outreach and educational programs this van will carry as a vital part of meeting our traditional land grant mission of improving the lives of the citizens of Texas," Friedland says.

"We have 254 counties in Texas and 203 of these counties are designated 'rural.' With physician, the services provided by this van are particulurly important," says John Montgomery, M.D., president of Scott & White Clinic.

Studies have shown healthrelated issues ranging from substance abuse to family violence are top concerns of rural Texans, says Barbara J. director Quiram, administative services for the Rural Health Initiative at Texas A&M Health Science Center.

'This van will allow us to work with communities to bring educational programs and health screenings to residents who might otherwise not have access to them," Quiram says. The van has three seperate rooms that will be used for dental screening, health education and health

Health educations specialist already in place in rural areas throughout Texas will work with health professionals and volunteers in the communities, along with other members of The Texas A&M University System to coordinate health education programs and health screenings as appropriate for each community. Initial plans call for the van to visit rural areas in Central Texas, but the van will also deliver health education programs in the other areas of the state, especially south Texas and the Rio Grande Valley.
