Sunshine Artist

Salado Art Fair makes list of best fine art shows

The Salado Art Fair learned that it was ranked by Sunshine Artist magazine as one of the top 100 Fine Art Shows in the nation, one of just five art shows in Texas to make the listing.

Sunshine Artist is "America's premier show and festival publication" and included the Salado Art Fair in its "Fourth Annual 200 Best Fine Arts, Fine Crafts and Fine Crafts Show."

"Every 200 Best Show is a winner. From church bazaars to prestigious juried events, there are at least 10,000 events held in the United States each year that can be classified as arts or craft shows. More than 1,200 individual shows were nominated this year. From this group, we narrowed the list to only 200 events. The national scope of this endeavor resulted in some very good shows not making the list. Being on the list at all is an achievement of which each show can be proud," the magazine stated in its article.

"The 200 Best list is more than just sales figures. We also try to provide a good chunk of information about every show included on the list. That information includes past state reports, audit cars and letter in addition to the official show

materials," the magazine stated.

Of the Salado Art Fair, Sunshine Artist reported, "Attendance, quality and sales seem to be solid. Texas in August can be sweltering, but attendees take it in stride.... Let's hope they continue to focus on art and craft and continue to improve in the ratings."

Shows from Texas which made the 100 Best Fine Arts Shows list were these: #28 Artfest in Dallas, #30 Fall Westheimer Art Festival in Houston, #63 Starving Artists Art Show in San Antonio, #85 Salado Art Fair and #100 Fiesta Arts Show in San Antonio.

Other Texas shows which made the overall Top 200 List of Fine Arts, Fine Crafts and Traditional Crafts Show were Main Street Arts Festival in Ft. Worth and the Cottonwood Art Festival in Richardson.

The Salado Art Fair draws 10,000 visitors to Salado every year and draws some of Texas' finest artists in several media as exhibitors.

All styles of painting, sculpture, jewelry, wood crafts, handmade clothing and handmade toys are shown at the Art Fair each year.

Historic bridge to be delivered this week

The July 15 delivery and placement of an historic truss bridge across Campbell Branch on Main Street has been delayed until sometime this week. An official with the Texas Department of Transportation could not confirm the exact date as of press time July 21.

North Main Street (FM 2268) in Salado is expected to be closed to through traffic between Thomas Arnold and Cardinal for a few hours, until the delivery is complete.

Access to the area businesses should not be affected

as traffic can detour via Thomas Arnold, Cardinal and the IH-35 frontage roads. Local traffic will be permitted to access businesses inside the detoured area as usual.

This project is to provide a safe area for the pedestrians in Salado, including pedestrian cross-walks.

Ellis McGinnis Construction Co., of Eddy, is the contractor for this project, which is targeted to be completed by July 31.

Motorists are urged to slow down, drive with caution and observe all warning signs.

Grace period end nears for 817/254

Planning and preparation will pay off for Sprint Customers who begin using the 254 area code before the grace period ends Aug. 24. Since May, the grace period has given customers an opportunity to adjust to the new area code and dialing pattern changes. Approximately 1.3 million phone users are affected by the 817 area code split.

Although customers can complete calls using either the existing 817 area code or the new 254 area code during the grace period, callers are encouraged to use the new area code now to make the transition easier.

"I urge our customers to begin using the 254 area code and informing those who call them about the change," said Linda Green, Sprint's customer

relations manager. "When the grace period ends, these customers will be more accustomed to the new area code and will continue to place and receive calls without delays. Customers can also begin reprogramming Speed Calling or Call Forwarding options with the correct area code and dialing patterns."

While customer's telephone numbers will not change as a result of the area code split, a change in dialing patterns will occur. To place local calls within the 254 area code, callers will continue dialing the seven-digit telephone number.

Local calls to either the 817 or new 940 area codes will require 10-digit dialing (the area code plus the seven digit telephone number). These calls will remain free, local calls. Customers

should begin using 10-digit dialing now for such calls as it will become mandatory when the grace period ends Aug. 24.

Local calls from either the 817 or 940 area codes to the 254 code will also require 10-digit dialing.

Customers will continue dialing long-distance calls to communities in the 254, 940 and 817 area codes by dialing one plus the area code and the seven digit telephone number.

The new area code will not change dialing procedures for calling 9-1-1.

Callers who use Directory Assistance for telephone numbers in the 817 and 940 area codes should dial 1 + area code + 555-1212. These calls will

PROTECTING OUR CHILDREN FROM THOSE WHO WOULD PREY ON THEM

In June the U.S. Supreme Court made what is in this day and age a stunning decision: Society has the right to protect its children. The court ruled that states may continue to keep habitual child molesters locked up, even after they've completed their prison sentences.

Leroy Hendricks, the kind of criminal who gives parents nightmares, is at the center of this story. Over a 40-year period, Hendricks accumulated five convictions for molesting children in particularly horrible ways, and was accused of countless other crimes with which he never was charged. Hendricks told the last court to try him that the only way for him to stop molesting children when released from prison "is to die."

On completion of his last prison sentence, a court determined Hendricks is both "mentally abnormal" and dangerous. So the state of Kansas kept him confined to a mental facility under its Sexually Violent Predators Act. But a great effort was mounted on Hendricks' behalf to gain his release. This was based on the argument that the Fifth Amendment prohibition against "double jeopardy" — forbidding the government to punish a person twice for the same crime — was violated by the Kansas statute.

The Hendricks case goes to the core of the debate over what the Constitution allows our society to do to protect its most vulnerable. In 1949, U.S. Supreme Court Justice Robert Jackson wrote that Constitutional logic must be tempered with practical wisdom in such cases to avoid converting "the constitutional Bill of Rights into a suicide pact."

Unfortunately, until last month's ruling, the court has ignored Justice Jackson's warning. Previous courts have put the rights of criminals — even child molesters — ahead of the rights of children to be safe in our society.

Happily, the court has come around to the common-sense idea that preventing highly predictable crimes against children is a good idea. Our society has begun to realize that it has a premier obligation to protect its young from predators, more than 40 percent of whom commit repeat offenses. The Supreme Court ruling is indicative of this realization. Additionally, Texas and many other states have statutes similar to New Jersey's "Megan's Law," which require community notification when a molester is released from prison and takes up residence.

Last year Congress passed legislation which I introduced that requires life imprisonment for two-time child sex offenders when their cases are heard in federal court. It also provides a nationwide system of tracking sex offenders so society can keep tabs on them if they move from one state to another.

These measures will not put an end to child molestation. But it is our responsibility to take what steps we can take to prevent it. To do less is, indeed, to turn the Constitution into a mutual suicide pact and force our children to join it.

Child molestation is a horrendous crime. Justice must serve the youngest and most vulnerable among us, as well as those who prey on them. 7.18.97



Gov. George Bush learns tough lesson of reading fine print when signing bill

Governor Bush learned an important lesson concerning his part in converting legislation into law as a result of a simple stroke of the pen.

Following the conclusion of the most recent legislative session on June 2, 1997, the Guv had a grand total of 20 days to review and either sign or veto the nearly 1,500 bills that had escaped from the Legislature and were awaiting George The Younger's verdict. A total of over 5,000 pieces of legislation were introduced during the 75th session.

Bush vetoed less than 20 proposed laws, including one by fellow Republican Toby Goodman (R-Arlington) that would have restricted so called "ambulance chasers" from seeking traffic accident reports from law enforcement record centers.

proval deadline.

This group of influence peddlers then turned around and missed the same law lurking in Moncrief's legislation.

Also, it would not be much of a stretch to add the Texas Trial Lawyers Association who like to get their hands on anything that allows them access to accident information. Lawsuit potentials - don't you know. Hence their interest in having Bush veto the measure.

Then they belatedly discovered the hated provision had crept into another bill that was subsequently signed. Red faces! Banging on desks! Heads rolling?

So, maybe, as the great Bard himself noted in the play of the

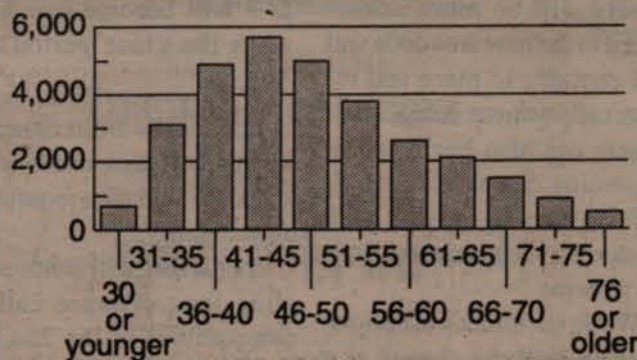

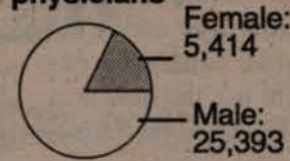
Anatomy of Texas health care providers

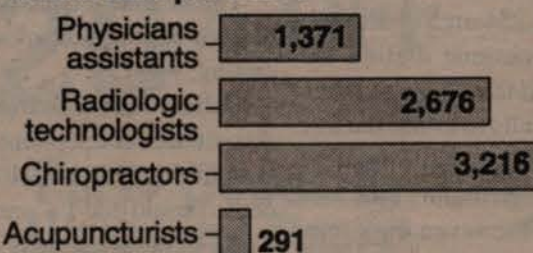
Number of physicians, by age group

LEGAL MATTERS

QUESTIONS ABOUT PATERNITY

IF YOU ARE a non-custodial parent, you may be concerned about a number of important issues. Although some non-custodial parents are mothers, the majority are fathers. A non-custodial parent who has never been married to his child's mother may also face issues regarding the establishment of paternity.

We at the Office of the Attorney General welcome your inquiries, and we hope that the information in this article will help you. Below are some questions about paternity frequently asked by non-custodial parents:

The mother of my child said she was using birth control. Since I did not agree to the pregnancy, why do I have to pay?

By law, you are responsible for supporting the child if you are the biological father. Under the law, it does not matter whether you intended to get the mother pregnant or what she may have told you about using birth control.

What if I don't think the child is mine?

If you have doubts, you can ask for a paternity test. Based on the results of the test and other evidence presented, the judge or

jury will make the final determination about whether you are the father.

What if I want to agree that I am the father?

You can sign a form called a statement of paternity. This is the first step in establishing that you are the father. Based on this document, an order of paternity can be entered. This will establish you as the legal father and, in most cases, will require you to pay child support. More importantly, your child will have a chance to develop a relationship with you.

How are paternity tests done?

If paternity testing is required, you will be scheduled to have blood drawn at a site near your home. The mother and child will also be scheduled to have blood drawn. The blood is sent to a laboratory where it is tested. The results will be returned within weeks.

The test compares many different details in the mother's blood and your blood. If you are not the father, the tests will show that you and the child do not share blood elements. If you are not ruled out as the father, the report will show a probability that you are the father. A man who is not ruled out by testing is almost certainly the father.

Modern paternity testing is extremely accurate. Since all human beings are related, there is no such thing as a 100% probability of paternity. State law requires that pa-

ternity testing is required for 99% of the male population. If there is no such match, then the alleged father will be excluded (proven not to be the father).

Can a mother in another state name me as her child's father?

Yes. Paternity can be established even if the mother and alleged father live in different states.

I was not married to the mother when my child was born. But I'm sure it is my child. Do I have any rights as a parent?

Under Texas law, a child born to parents who are not legally married has no legal father unless and until paternity is established.

Unless paternity is established, a father who is not married to the mother of his child:

- has no legal relationship to the child
- has no right to visit the child
- has no right to make decisions about the child
- may not pass on his Social Security benefits to the child
- has no legal responsibilities to the child

Establishing paternity creates a legal relationship between the father and child, even though there may be no legal relationship, such as marriage, between the mother and father. If you want to establish paternity for your child, call 1-800-252-8014 or call your local child support field office.

This year, 150 juried artists, from a list of over 600 applicants, will show their work at the Art Fair.

subject to the Directory assistance rates of the long distance company who provides Directory Assistance service for that area.

"Advance preparation is especially important for our business customers," said Green. "Business customers who use specialized telecommunications equipment such as Private Branch exchanges (PBX), key systems and electronic telephone sets should call Sprint or their equipment vendor to ensure their system is programmed to process calls to and from the new area codes."

Business customers can contact Sprint at 1-800-800-

8494. Customers who own coin-operated telephones are also urged to contact their equipment vendors.

July and August monthly telephone bills for Sprint customers will include information reminding customers about the end of the grace period for the area code changes. Once the grace period ends Aug. 24, it will become mandatory to use the new area codes for long-distance calls to the communities in either the 254 or 940 area code and correct dialing pattern for local calls to the 940 or 817 area codes.



Forgotten family members may feel helpless

Spouses and children of people with profound hearing loss are often "the forgotten family."

"Hearing loss affects the whole family," said Robert L. Beck, an associate professor of psychiatry at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "As with any family issue, good communication is the key."

Often, someone who is losing their hearing is so focused on their own fears and anxieties, that they are unaware of how their hearing loss is affecting their loved ones.

"Family members may feel helpless and sometimes even hopeless in not being able to communicate satisfactorily with the hard-of-hearing person," said Beck. "Frustrations are seldom expressed for fear they might hurt the hard-of-

hearing person." Beck adds that, if not expressed, these frustrations may be turned inward and place additional stresses on the relationship.

For hearing members of the family, Beck suggests you:

*Express your feelings. Tell the hard-of-hearing family member how you feel about their hearing loss. Are you frightened, concerned about the family's future, or even angry at the hearing loss? Share it, don't keep it to yourself.

Don't tiptoe around the hearing loss. Avoiding talking about the hearing loss can lead to more discomfort. It could also lead the hard-of-hearing family member to think that you don't care.

*If you are the hearing parents, do not serve as a

"gatekeeper" between your hard-of-hearing spouse and your children. This promotes an artificial relationship that is damaging to the children and to the hard-of-hearing parent. Children must learn that nothing has changed when it comes to relating to their parents.

For the family member who has hearing loss, Beck says it's important not to use the hearing loss as an excuse to "tune out" but rather stay involved with your family, career and friends.

"There is a vast difference between existing and living. Living demands participation. As difficult as the hearing loss may be to cope with. It must not result in a diminished life. Life does go on."

The Central Texas State Fair, which will be held Aug. 28 - Sept. 1, has announced the new deadline of Aug. 18 for the Creative Arts Division.

The deadline was moved forward several weeks to allow time for judging since the Central Texas State Fair moved its date up to Labor Day weekend. Entry forms can be obtained at the Expo Center or the Bell County Extension Offices. Entry fees and forms are due by Aug. 18 to the Extension office at 1605 N. Main St. Room 102 in Belton.

The Creative Arts Division is for anyone who enjoys crafts, photography, painting, drawing, baking, canning, sewing, crocheting, weaving, quilting, ceramics or woodworking. The Creative Arts Division features competition in 255 separate categories everything: from cupcakes, cookies, muffins, and fruit pies in the Foods Division to quilts, embroidery, hand knit, crochet, items and needlepoint in the Textile Crafts Division. Other divisions include clothing, arts, food preservation and a honey division.

The Foods Division includes 34 classes for cakes, pies, cookies, quick and yeast breads and candies. The Textile Division

has 57 classes including cross-stitch and other needlework, pillows, dolls, jewelry, recycled items and quilts. In the Food Preservation Division there are 17 classes that include jelly, preserves, canned fruits and vegetables and pickles. In the Honey division, there are 14 classes, which include liquid honey, comb honey, beeswax and food made with honey. The Clothing Division features 16 classes for children's clothing, adult, garments and sewn accessories.

Arts and Other Arts Division has 101 classes, which include oil and acrylic paintings, photography, ceramics, leather crafts, models, baskets, wreaths and decorated garments. In the Grandparents Brag Division, grandparents will have a chance to show off their grandchildren with photos and a short essay. There are 16 classes in the Grandparents Brag Division based on the grandchild's age and gender or if the display shows multiple numbers of grandchildren.

The competition is divided into five categories: Juniors, age eight and in the third grade through age 13 and Seniors, ages 14-19. Adults are divided into three separate groups based on their skill. Adult II is more than five years with specific craft or skill and Adult III is anyone that is actively in-

involved in selling or teaching craft or skill.

Entry fees are \$1 per item and exhibitors may enter one entry per class. All exhibits must be prepared solely by the exhibitor and within the last twelve months.

Award ribbons will be given to the first through fifth place winners in each class. Merit ribbons will be awarded to all other entries in the class. Tricolor ribbons will recognize the outstanding entry for each category such as best cake of the show, best wood craft entry etc.

The Fair will pay \$5 per each first place award, \$4 for each second place and \$3 for each third class place, \$2 for each fourth place and \$1 premium for fifth place award in the Creative Arts Division.

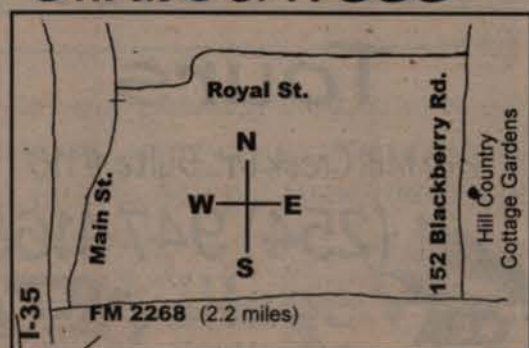

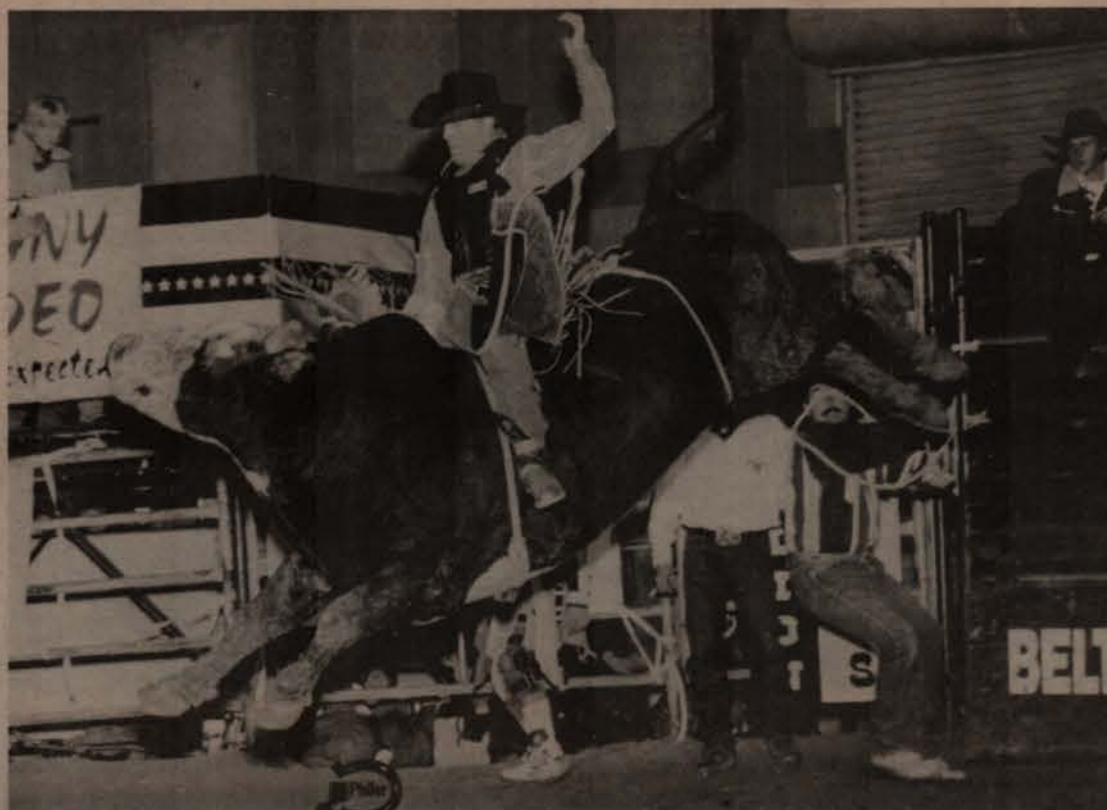

Dust will fly at Expo Center Aug. 29-30

The dust will be flying at the Bell County Expo Center when the Professional Bull Riders (PBR) Touring Pro Division (TPD) joins the Central Texas State Fair celebration 7:30 p.m. Aug. 29-30 for the "BLOW OUT". This year's Central Texas State Fair will be held over Labor Day weekend Aug. 28-Sept. 1.

The PBR is a corporation established for and operated by the bull rider members. In 1992, the top cowboy competitors joined together to make bull riding into its own stand alone sport.

Special skills needed to stay alive on I-35

It takes special driving skills and knowledge to drive safely around big rigs along I-35 or other highways. You cannot drive around the big rigs the way you drive around other vehicles. The most important tip is to give a wide berth to the big rig.

Statistics show that collisions between large trucks and lighter vehicles frequently results in death to the driver or occupants of the "other vehicle." In 80 percent of fatal accidents involving big trucks and lighter vehicles, it is not an occupant of the big truck who dies.

Those big rigs are different because they have a much longer stopping distance than other vehicles, and longer still on wet roads. The ability of the rig driver to control their rig during emergency braking

is very limited. Also, truck drivers cannot see you nearly as well as you can see the truck, and if there is a crash, you lose.

Drivers of smaller vehicles need to practice the following safety tips-

* As a general rule, keep as much space as possible between your vehicle and large trucks.

* Do not cut in front of a truck just because you see open space there. That space is the truck's cushion of safety because of its longer stopping distance. If you have to stop suddenly, it will be very difficult for the truck to avoid hitting you. Also, if the truck has a long hood the driver may not be able to see you at all.

Do not linger alongside a truck. You may be in the trucker's blind spot. The size and configuration of many trucks, especially those with trailers, create large blind spots for truck drivers. If you cannot

see a truck driver's face in one of his mirrors, he cannot see you and probably does not know that you are there.

* If you are following a truck and cannot see the truck's side mirrors, you are driving too close. The driver cannot see you, so back off.

* Always give trucks plenty of room when they are turning. The relationship between the cab, mirrors and trailer change constantly during a turn, creating varying blind spots. Also, trucks need extra space to turn because of their size.

A collision with a large truck can have tragic consequences for the occupants of the smaller vehicle. Always adjust your driving around the big rigs.

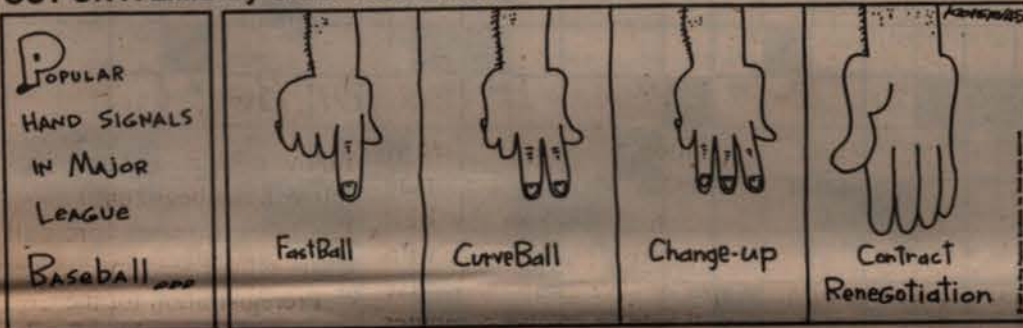

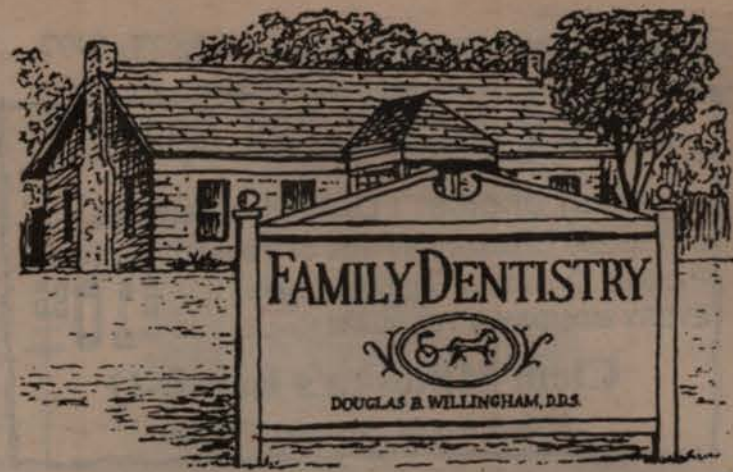

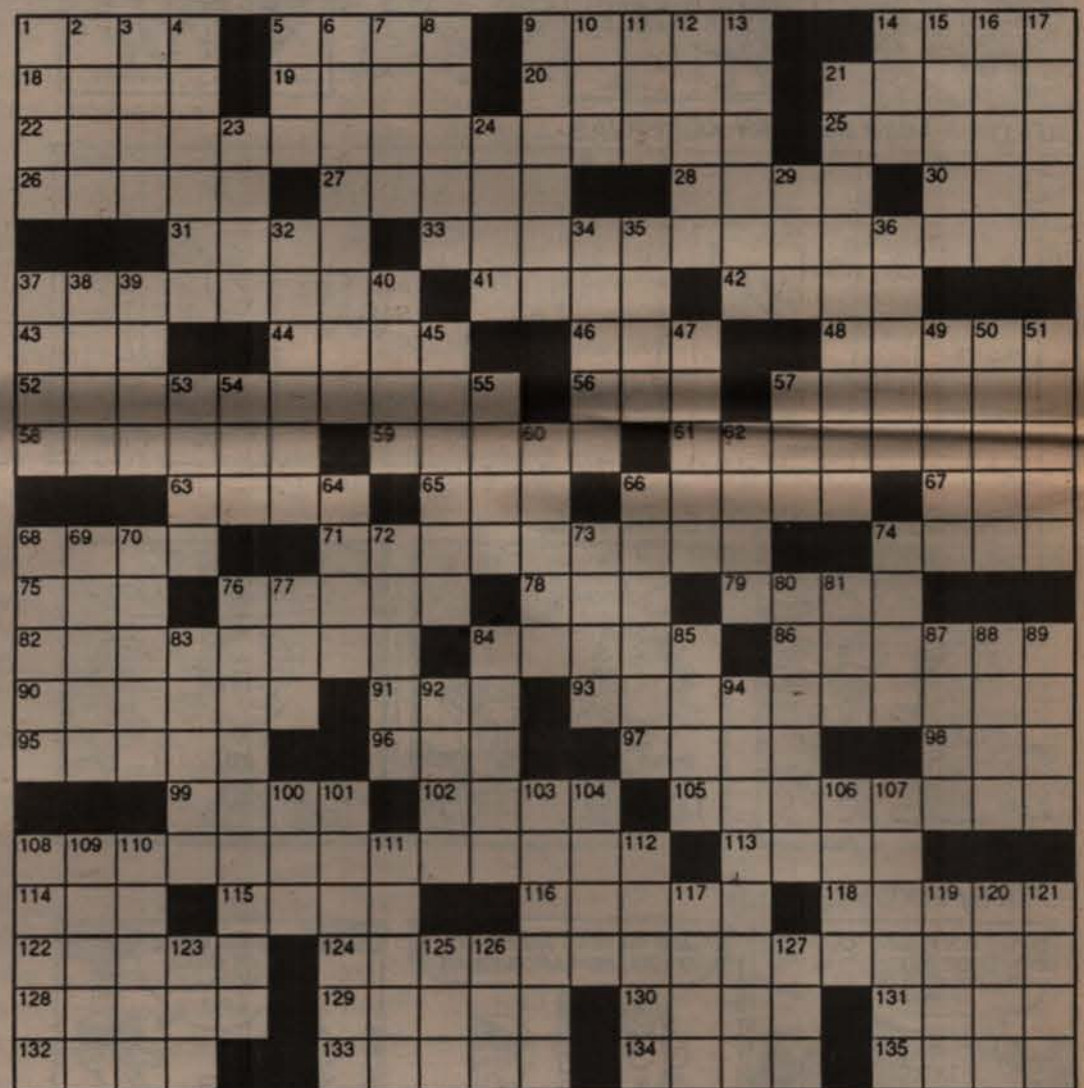

Composer overcomes adversity to write song for Salado Legends

At 71, Houstonite Buster Cearley had a stroke that rendered his right arm useless. Today, three years later, he still walks with the use of a cane and a brace but fortunately his mind is sharper than ever.

Buster, a composer, playwright and musician, recently confided, "I returned to hunt-and-peck at my computer, but I couldn't touch the piano for over 18 months. It pained me even to look at it. I decided never to compose again. I'd show the world! Oddly enough, the world didn't miss a beat. I had to change. Today I'm enjoy composing at my piano more than ever—as well as many other skills."

"Texas," a Buster Cearley song, has been a hit in the outdoor musical drama *Salado Legends* for the past three years. "Texas," says Buster, "was previously used as Ann Richards' campaign song, and

she won! She didn't use it in her campaign for reelection, and she lost!" The author of *Salado Legends*, Jackie Mills, states that she is not superstitious, but, the song "Texas" will remain in *Salado Legends* until the end of time or forever, whichever comes first."

This spring Buster wrote a new song for the 1997 performance of *Salado Legends*. His song, "In One Tiny Twinkle of a Star," was written with the theme and story line of the outdoor musical-drama in mind. "The scene called for a two-hankie song," said

"In the 50's, I wrote with many excellent composers, Buster reminisced. "I collaborated with Andy Razaf some. He wrote a few of my favorite songs, like "Ain't Mis-

behavin," "Honeysuckle Rose" and "S'posin." When we worked together in the 1950's, it was always Andy's lyrics, my melodies. Ernie Burnett of "Melancholy Baby" fame asked me to work with him on a few songs. It was my lyrics and his melodies with Ernie. I was fortunate to work with Mort Dixon who was famous for "Bye, Bye Blackbird", "I'm Looking Over a Four Leaf Clover" and several Warner Bros. musicals. With Mort it was always his lyrics, my melodies. Eubie Blake, who wrote "I'm Just Wild About Harry," and "Memories of You" to name a few, was fun to work with. Eubie's melody, my lyrics when we worked to-

gether!"

Buster has written in just about every category you can name: show numbers, rock, country-western, novelty, operatic, jazz, classical, semiclassical and any number of combinations of all of the above.

A lover of sheet music, Buster's collection numbers 6,000, and he is still counting. "My special room is teeming with songs, on the walls, in the files, everywhere. The War Wall alone is lined with some 70 numbers, a few dating back to the 1880's. Show tunes and Hollywood Musicals comprise the most choice pieces. Many of the covers of the 20's on back to the 1890's are paintings by the best-known artists of the day. Their favorite subject, as always, was lovely ladies."

Buster has two-dozen songs recorded, three complete scores published and produced, plays including dramas and melodramas penned. His most recent production is a concert by Kiiana Wiseman, "Love Fills the Night With Music", and his most recent publication in 1996 is a comedy, *Frontier*. Buster will not give in to health problems or give up his music.

A&M to increase health education to rural Texans

Texas A&M University Health Science Center now has the wheels to hit the Texas highways in an effort to increase access to health education and screenings for rural Texans.

Officials from Texas A&M's Health Science Center joined state and local officials July 14 to dedicate a new 40-foot van that will help deliver health education and outreach programs to rural Texans as part of the developing School of Rural Public Health's Health Education and Rural Outreach (HERO) program.

Dr. Michael L. Friedland, Texas A&M vice president for health affairs and dean of Texas A&M's College of Medicine, presided at the informal ceremony, which took place at the northwest corner of the Scott and White Memorial Hospital parking lot on 31st Street in Temple.

"We see the outreach and educational programs this van will carry as a vital part of meeting our traditional land grant mission of improving the lives of the citizens of Texas," Friedland says.

"We have 254 counties in Texas and 203 of these counties are designated 'rural.' With 17 of these counties having no physician, the services provided by this van are particularly important," says John Montgomery, M.D., president of Scott & White Clinic.

Studies have shown health-related issues ranging from substance abuse to family violence are top concerns of rural Texans, says Barbara J. Quiram, director of administrative services for the Rural Health Initiative at Texas A&M Health Science Center.

"This van will allow us to work with communities to bring educational programs and health screenings to residents who might otherwise not have access to them," Quiram says. The van has three separate rooms that will be used for dental screening, health education and health screenings.

Health education specialist already in place in rural areas throughout Texas will work with health professionals and volunteers in the communities, along with other members of The Texas A&M University System to coordinate health education programs and health screenings as appropriate for each community. Initial plans call for the van to visit rural areas in Central Texas, but the van will also deliver health education programs in the other areas of the state, especially south Texas and the Rio Grande Valley.

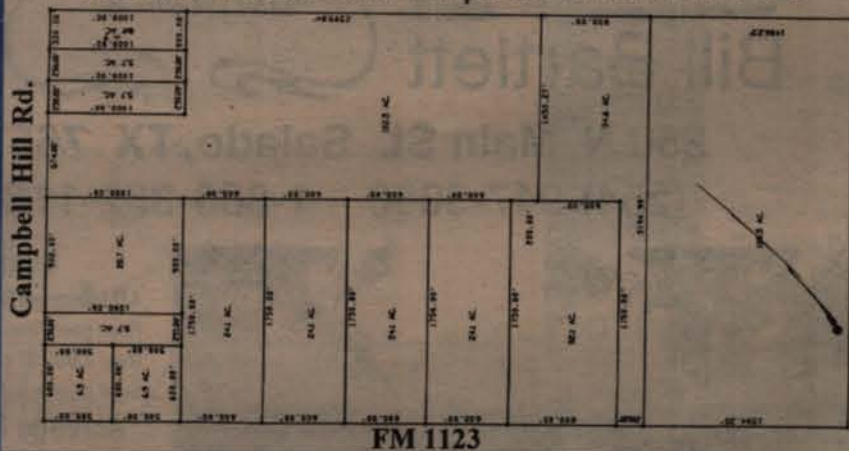

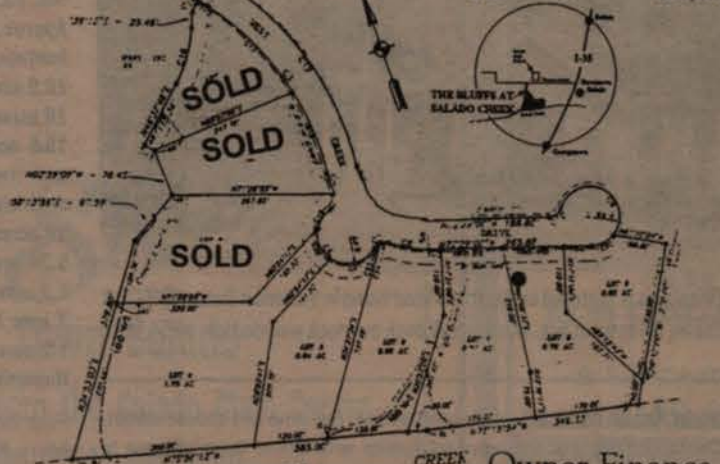

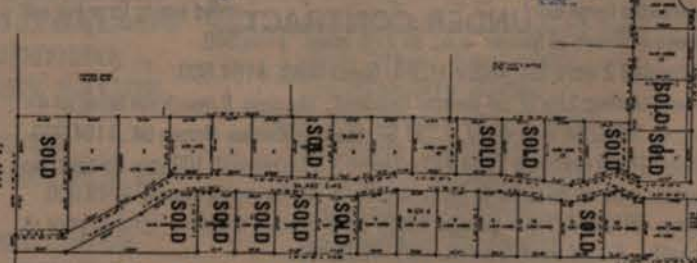
