MAKING OSHA A PARTNER, **NOT AN ENEMY**

alvin Coolidge once said, "The business of the American people is business." Therefore, our government should be working with busi ness not against it. Nowhere does this ring truer than in current debate over reforming the Occupational Health and Safety Administration (OSHA).

As a former small business owner, and having spoken with literally thousands of employers and employees throughout Texas, I am convinced employers and workers alike would benefit if OSHA functioned in a way that helped establish workable safety standards and enforced those standards fairly and reasonably

Rather than look to OSHA as a partner in safety, many employers I know fear the agency and its random inspections that turn their work sites upside down. We need to put behind us the days of Byzantine regulations and "gotcha" enforcement practices. We must recast OSHA into a modern, effective partner in the rapidly evolving American workplace.

The fundamental, statutory flaw in OSHA is that current law does not require the agency to consider the feasibility and unintended consequences of its regulatory actions. Nor does current law provide the agency with any incentive to do so.

I have a bill before the Senate, the Occupational Safety and Health Reform Act, to transform OSHA from an agency based on fear to one based on cooperation, from an agency of arbitrary procedures to one focused on

Key elements of my bill would:

* Require OSHA to consider the feasibility of the requirements it seeks

to impose on employers before promulgating any new regulation.

* Require OSHA to weigh the costs and the expected benefit regulations and articulate the results each regulation would achieve

* Require OSHA to determine whether it has chosen the most costeffective means of meeting those goals.

On the enforcement side of the equation, my bill would allow and encourage employers to take their own steps to improve health and safety, as well as to utilize government approved safety consultants to help them improve the workplace. Employers who demonstrate this commitment through low injury rates would be exempt from some of the more unfair and

Make no mistake: I realize that there are employers out there for whom safety is not a priority. To them, I say: Beware. My bill will free OSHA to concentrate its resources and enforcement efforts on those employers who willfully disregard workplace safety and health

But the vast majority of employers want to do right by their employees. They should have the ability to work on meeting health and safety objectives in a way that makes the most sense for their company. For this vast majority of American businesses, we're trying to send relief



Early voting continues until Aug. 5 on constitutional amendment

Absentee voting for the August 9, referendum on the statewide constitutional amendment (Proposition One) ends this coming Tuesday, August 5, at 5 p.m. Nearest place for Saladoans to vote in advance of the regular election day, would be the Bell County Courthouse - second floor.

This amendment will, if passed, increase homeowner's school district homestead exemption from the current \$5 thousand to \$15 grand. The local tax break will amount to about \$130.00 when tax notices start arriving October 1.

Prop One also includes a secondary break for school district homeowners in that it will, (again, if passed), allow a person to take his (or her) "frozen" school tax assignment with him should said taxpayer move to a new homestead.

Currently folks over 65 have a tax "hold" on their current domicile only. Any move forces the senior to start over with a new and often times higher tax-freeze level.

Two good reasons for citizens to vote in favor of the August 9, referendum.

IN THE DARK ABOUT CAR REPAIR?

AR REPAIRS can be one of the biggest headaches a consumer faces. Today's cars and trucks are so complex that it is sometimes very difficult to diagnose problems. This can make it hard for the average consumer to know if the proposed repair will actually fix th car.

It can also make it easy for an unscrupulous mechanic to include unnecessary but expensive work as part of the repair job, use second-hand parts, or bill you for repair work that was not done. We at the Office of the Attorney General want to assist you in avoiding this kind of "repair" job.

DTPA protects consumers

Texas has no law specifically governing auto repairs. However, the Texas Deceptive Trade Practices Act — the state's most comprehensive consumer protection law — includes several sections that cover repairs. Under this act, it is illegal

- Knowingly make a false or misleading statement about the need for matter or meair.
- for parts or repair.

 State that work has been done or that parts were replaced when that is not true.
- Claim that the parts used in the repair are new or original, when in fact they are second-hand or reconditioned.

Do your homework

The simplest way to avoid a problem is to find a reputable mechanic or repair shop to do your repairs. Ask your relatives or friends for referrals. Call the local Better Business Bureau and our office to see whether anyone has complained about the shops you are considering. Also ask for the names of customers you may contact to see if they are satisfied with the work done by the shop. If you suspect the repair shop has violated the law, and you cannot get the problem resolved to your satisfaction, take your car to another shop and have the repair work inspected. Get the second shop's report in writing. You will need it in the event of mediation or a lawsuit.

Remember, if you refuse to pay a repair bill, the shop owner has the legal right to keep your car until you pay. You may find the only way to resolve the situation is to pay the bill (making clear to the mechanic that you do not agree to it), then either seek mediation or file suit against the shop under the DTPA in small claims court.

Don't go broke when your car breaks

To reduce the risk of becoming a victim, consider the following tips:

- Always get a written estimate before any work is done.
- Tell the mechanic to call you in advance if additional work is

needed.

- Ask to have the old parts returned to you.
- Get everything in writing, including an explanation of the difference between the estimate
- and final bill, and keep every piece of paper.
- If your charge is much higher than the estimate, or if the work was done without your authorization, politely, but firmly, question the hill
- Try to settle the matter amicably before taking any other action.

Honest repair shops know that their business depends on their good reputation. They will try to resolve the problem to everyone's satisfaction

For more information

We're here to help. If you have a repair problem that the shop will not correct to your satisfaction, contact the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Office nearest you and ask for a complaint form. Or call us toll free at (800) 621-0508. Also, the consumer complaint form is available at our web site on the Internet at http://www.oag.state.tx.us.

Our trained mediators will attempt to resolve the dispute between the consumer and repair shop. Your local Better Business Bureau may also provide mediation services



Temple College is focus of Lions Club talk

The hottest market in community education involves senior citizens going back to school to learn computers.

"So they can E-mail their grandkids," said Dick Archer, director of institutional advancement for Temple College, formerly Temple Junior

Archer addressed the Salado Lions during their July 23 meeting at Mill Creek Country Club.

Introduced as TC's "public relations man," Archer gave an overview of a community college that has experienced a resurgance since Marc Nigliazzo took over as president two years ago.

Archer reminded the Lions that Dr. Nigliazzo (pronounced Nig-Lee-Ozzo) had addressed them at a similar luncheon after taking over as president in 1995. Archer made a return visit to tell the Lions how Dr. Nigliazzo's ambitious goals have become reality.

Enrollment is expected to reach 3,000 this fall, up from 2,860 last year. Archer said enrollment hovered around 2,400 for several years.

The passage of a \$3.2 million bond issue in June will allow for improvements on the campus and in classrooms. A center for student services will be the first new building on campus in 15 years, Archer

noted.

This lone building will handle what offices in several buildings were once doing. It testing center.

In the past, students were forced to go to Waco or Austin to take such tests as college entrance exams and the like.

As for financial aid, Archer said the college offers more than 200 scholarships. While most of the scholarship money

is awarded to students with a specific degree program (such as nursing), nearly a third of it is awarded with "no strings atwill also house a much-needed tached" other than financial

Archer pointed out that TC is supported by taxes from only Temple. In fact, it has the smallest taxing district of the state's 50 community colleges.

The college's biggest fundraising event, the Temple College Foundation Benefit Golf Classic, raised \$12,000 last year. The goal of this year's event, set for Sept. 22 at Wildflower Country Club in Temple, is \$15,000.

The money is used to provide scholarships, reward faculty for outstanding performance and enhance the quality of the academic environ-

There's also the annual jazz festival, which attracted 1,500 people over two days this past April, including several from Salado, Archer said.

As for new projects on campus, TC's nine-hole golf course has been leased to a local business group that plans a \$250,000 project to convert it into a nine-hole executive course. It will remain affordable to the public, Archer stressed.

The course encompasses 78 acres. It was built by German POWs during World War II and dedicated by legendary golfer Byron Nelson.

Another new project involves a 32-unit housing project on three acres behind

"The first requirement he had of me was that I take his classes in Face reading so I'd know what he was looking for in the illustrations, said Williams. " I was actually a bit miffed that he thought I couldn't just draw the features. A nose is a nose, right? Wrong After taking the classes, I had an appreciation for why he wanted me to begin learning the subject to illustrate is accurately."

Mikulecky is latest artist chosen for 31st Annual Salado Art Fair scheduled for Aug. 2-3 in Pace Park

HE PAINTS WITH FIRE

David Mikulecky is the latest artist to be accepted to show in the 31st Annual Salado Art Fair in Pace Park Aug. 2-3.

At his East Texas farm/studio, David Mikulecky, young and accomplished artist and potter, reunites the basic elements of earth (clay), fire, air and water using his own handthrown pottery, an outdoor propane kiln, inventive containers and artistic ingenuity.

David enjoys firing his creations in the ancient Japanese Raku technique-with a country spin. His glazed bisque ware is fast fired to 1700 degrees in an outdoor kiln, removed while still red-hot and placed into a unique container (the front end loader of the farm tractor) lined with newspaper. The newspaper quickly ignites and combustion activates the glaze. As fire encircles each pot, brilliant flames, ranging in colors from crimson to cobalt blue, paint images onto the clay. The flames are then smothered by wrapping each piece with additional newspapers. Artistic instinct determines when to freeze the graphic images onto the surface by submerging it in water. Each piece is a literal clay canvas, painted with fire.

The Raku firing process is enhanced by David's throwing skills on the potter's wheel.

Each piece is an individual and breathtakingly gorgeous work of art which cannot be duplicated. Each is named and signed.

David is a young 21-year-old visionary pursuing his artistic dreams. He has been throwing pottery for 5 years. Today David's pieces grace multimillion dollar homes from Florida to California. His work is presently on display at Canton First Monday Trade Days-Country Crossing Village #35 at Wild Willies II Mountain. He will also be demonstrating his throwing techniques at the upcoming Salado Art Fair.

The Salado Art Fair draws some of Texas' finest artists in several media, including all styles of painting, sculpture, jewelry, wood crafts, handmade clothing and handmade toys. This year, 150 juried artists, from a list of over 600 applicants, will show their work at the Art Fair.

The Art Fair is set in Pace Park, under the giant oak trees along the banks of Salado Creek. Admission to the Salado Art Fair is \$3 per person, free to children age 10 and under. The Fair will be open 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Aug. 2 and 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Aug. 3.

Fishing rods: The short and the long of it

by Keith R. Warren Texas Angler

A common question many

folks ask me is "why do you you use. use so many different rods?" My obvious reply is that it zontally, making long casts. helps me catch more fish, but An extra long rod will increase there's more to it than that.

fishing you're doing, and quickly upon a hook set. where you are fishing, should determine what length of rod

Most of the time I fish horithe casting distance and allow Depending upon the type of you to take up more line

Short rods are used in situations where you are fishing vertically (bottom fishing) or having to cast under overhanging brush. A standing angler can easily cast under overhangs with a short rod and not hit the surface with his rod tip upon making the cast.

Rod handles vary in length as well. Short handles such as pistol grips are easy to use and light weight. However, they do not provide the angler with enough leverage as do rods with long handles.

Short handled rods are often used by topwater fishermen as well as others who need to work a lure quickly. The long handle often will get in the way and minimize your efforts to manipulate the lure.

A good rule of thumb is to choose a rod that is at least as tall as you are. (Short anglers have difficulty using longer

A good fishing rod is a tool that enable the angler to work the lure more efficiently.
