Tamasha, the annual gala sponsored by the Contemporaries, will begin at 6 p.m. March 7 at the Frank W. Mayborn Civic and Convention Center. The black-tie optional event, which this year commemorates the quin-

**Dogfight** is a slice of Americana, though it is far from a slice of mom, apple pie and Coca-Cola. Rather it is a look at a group of young men at the start of the Vietnam War. It is a love story of Corporal Birdlace (River Phoenix), who falls for his date to a dogfight.

From this premise, director Nancy Savoca brings us close to the two young adults as they discover each other before Birdlace goes to war.

### First Aid course offered by S & W

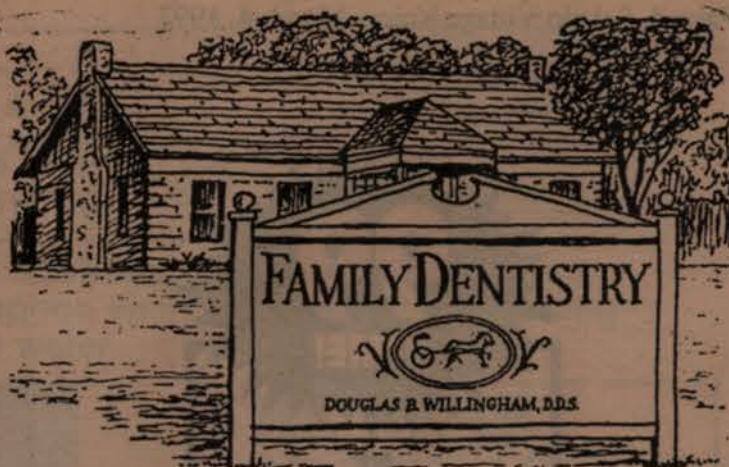
The public is invited to register for a basic first aid class to be held 7-9 p.m. March 24 in the Doctors Conference Room at Scott and White in Temple.

**Characteristics of hyperkinesis**

Continuing our discussion of hyperkinetic children: Here are some of the other characteristics of hyperkinetic children.

**5. Short attention span**, with the inability to concentrate. The hyperkinetic child rarely completes a project, and his capability of sitting quietly through school, meals, or TV programs is very limited. For example, the child may be enjoying a television program but he cannot sit still and watch it. He gets up, moves to another chair, sits down on the floor, goes back to his original seat -- continually moving about throughout the program.

**6. Very poor coordination**. The child is often considered clumsy and inattentive to what he is doing; however, closer observation shows that he cannot coordinate the right side of his body with the left. Buttoning clothes and generally dressing is difficult; he has difficulty in writing and drawing because his eyes and hands fail to function together; he is poor in sports, such as catching and throwing a ball. He will frequently bump into objects.

Poor condition extends also to the thought processes. The child may mean one thing and say exactly the opposite. He may be told to do something, yet he does exactly the opposite. This is not failure to obey, but confusion within the thought processes.

**7. Poor sleep habits**. The child is usually a restless sleeper who does not want to go to bed. He will wake often through the night. Many hyperkinetic children cannot get enough sleep for their bodies' needs.

Many children diagnosed as hyperkinetic have been given medication to bring the condition under manageable control. There are two types of medication used -- stimulant medication, which paradoxically reduces the child's activity, and tranquilization. Sometimes both stimulants and tranquilizers are used on the same child.

# Bullet trains boils down to railroad technology vs. aviation technology

As a biased observer of the national aviation scene for the past five decades, it's my opinion that the current hassle over the French Consortium/Texas Bullet Train boils down to a question of railroad technology versus aviation technology. Which technology can transport the most inner city commuters for the least overall cost per seat mile?

With this column, let's update ourselves on a progression in aviation technology that has taken place here in Texas just in the last decade.

Let's go back a few decades to the early '50s when some of us Air Force types made the transition from piston engine aircraft to jet propulsion. We neophytes quickly learned that a couple of those new jet machines were hoggish about runways - they really hugged the ground on take-off, particularly when runway temperatures were high on hot afternoons.

Yet from those "runway hogs," we learned that eventually someday there had to come diminishing returns to jet take-off requirements. That is, aircraft had to be developed with the shortest takeoff and landing requirements

possible. Of course, the British came up with the ultimate, the military jump jet, The Harrier, which ascends vertically.

When we look back in aviation history, something like 60 years before Orville and Wilbur: we find another Briton, Sir George Caley (1773-1857), who in 1843 designed the "convertiplane" (as it would be called today) with four helicopter screws (rotor foils) for vertical lift and two propellers for forward propulsion.

In this century, the state of Texas has become the cradle and home of the modern convertiplane the Bell/Boeing V-22 Osprey Tiltrotor Aircraft. On March 18, 1989, the Tiltrotor made aviation history with its successful first flight at the Arlington flight research center of Bell Helicopter Textron Corp. (Ft. Worth).

The Bell/Boeing Consortium's V-22 Tiltrotor has fulfilled the dream of us early jet pilots

by eliminating the need for a runway. The Tiltrotor can get off the ground vertically or make a teen-weeny running take-off of 750 feet with over-optimum loads.

Once we get airborne, chief Test Pilot Roy Hopkins needs only to move the conversion switch from "helicopter" to "aeroplane" (the engine nacelles change from vertical position to horizontal position) and away we go straight and level at 350 mph.

There are now five V-22 Tiltrotors being flown and tested during the present developmental phase. Next comes the production phase. There are commercial versions on the drawing boards which could carry 75 passengers. The 50 passenger version is considered by Bell/Boeing to be especially effective in providing short-haul (within 600 miles air transport between cities like Dallas to Austin to San Antonio, and Dallas to Houston.

Who needs a French Consortium "Bullet train" rattling 200 mph across our beautiful peaceful Texas countryside, scaring our farmers cattle and horses when we can eventually haul the same commuters quietly at 10,000 feet at a zippy 350 mph?

Our Texas-built Tiltrotors will relieve the coming gridlock at congested regional airports, eliminate the need for ever longer runways and bigger airports and become a super export item to Japan the European Community and the world.

Japan needs our Tiltrotors more than they need our automobiles. The Japanese have already begun planning the necessary infrastructure (vertiports of five acres) to support the eventual implementation of vertical flying convertiplanes like our Tiltrotors to their national transportation system. If we don't build'em they will build'em! If American know-how can get the full production of Tiltrotors in this decade, then, once again our aviation technology will have thrust our aerospace industry into the forefront of world trade.

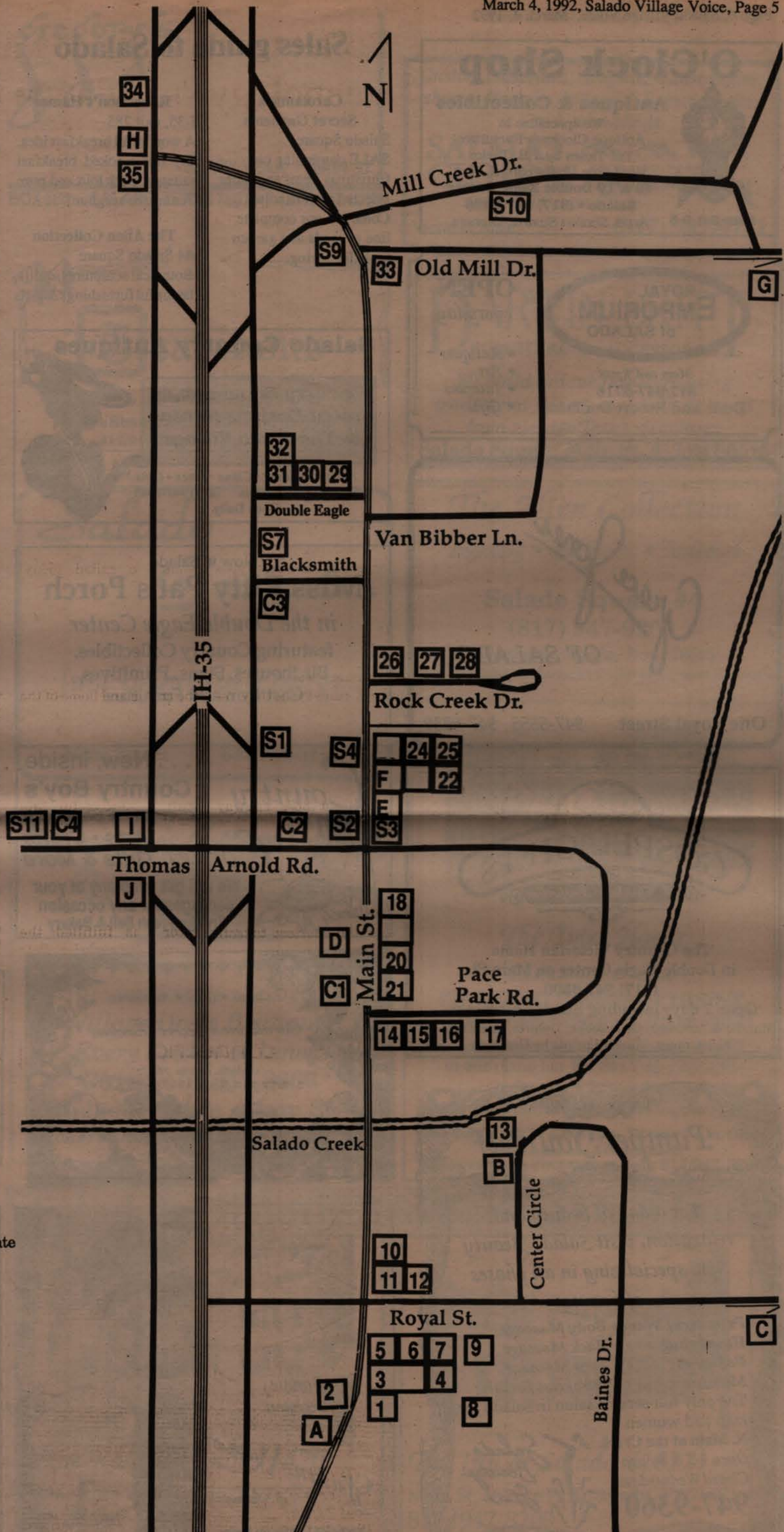

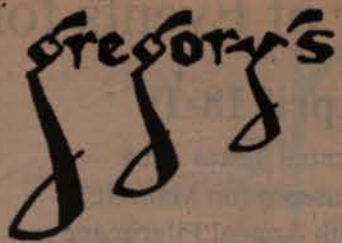

## Cadet Douglas Gilpin named to Air Force Fall Dean's List

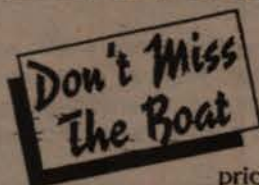

He is the son of John and Nancy Gilpin of Salado and a 1989 graduate of Salado High School.

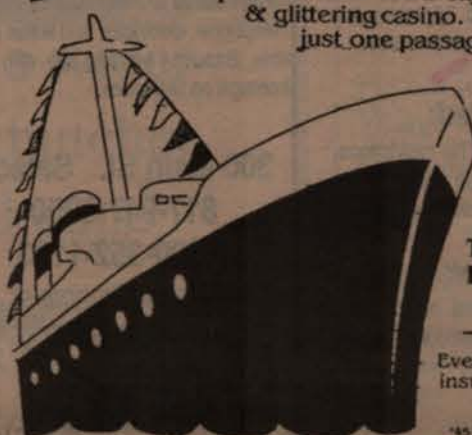
