
According to Carpenter, the culture of the Eskimo has been dramaticaly affected by the media: "There are no Indians and Eskimos left. There are

only media Indians and Eskimos. But nobody is aware of this, not even the Indians and Eskimos themselves. In the media world, only the fake is genuine."

Carpenter plans to explore the topic of Eskimo identity in his March 14 seminar "Self in the Electronic Age" at 10 a.m. at the Inn on the Creek.

His lecture "What Identity? Whose Identity?" will be presented 4 p.m., March 15 at the Mill Creek Inn.

Rain delays local farmers planting

Rain continues to delay all farming activities across Central Texas. The time to get "spring planted" is getting very short.

Many people are starting to call the office about weed control and fertilizer on coastal bermuda grass pastures. Many coastal fields on flat land which do not drain well, have water standing in them at this time. In that situation it is not a good idea to put out fertilizer until the soil surface dries. Fertilizer put out on standing water will more than likely evaporate rather than soak into the soil.

Coastal fields that have drained well could be fertilized at this time as they will be greening up very soon. The fertilizer needs to be down and working early to make that good cutting of hay in May. As fertilizer is being put out, a good application of herbicide would also be recommended in areas where weeds are a problem. Most broad leaf weeds can be easily taken care of in the Spring with hormone type herbicides or Ally. Any winter annual grasses (Little Barley) would need to be sprayed now with a grass herbicide (Roundup) prior to green up of the coastal. Once the coastal starts to green up a grass herbicide cannot be used because it will also damage the coastal.

At this time, 1992 looks to be a challenging year for all agriculture. Decision making is going to be most difficult due to all the environmental factors we are facing. Anyone needing help with decisions on fertilizer, herbicides or cultural practices are more than welcome to call the County Extension Office. With the help of the various specialists located both on and off campus at Texas A & M University, we should be able to get information that will help producers in their decision-making process.


