Historic Halley House on Main sells, to become Bed & Breakfast

Worth and Salado has purchased the historic Halley House, circa 1865, and the 27 acres on which it is located next to the old red school building on Salado's Main St.

The house was built by Captain Robert Bonner Halley of the Confederate Army and his wife, Lydia, who were parents of eight children. Very active in early Bell County development, Captain Halley served as Sheriff and

addition to other elected offices.

The two-story eight room Halley House has been awarded a Texas Historical Commission marker and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The large adjoining carriage house was built in 1960.

Mrs. Barton said there are plans underway for the property but that initial emphasis will be in converting the Halley House

The Salado congregation will also be commemorating the first services held in their new building four years ago this month and as a special part of the day long event, members will be inviting their friends and neighbors from Salado and the surrounding area to take part many friends in Salado in the combined Historical Anniversary Service and Friends Day. All Bentsen would have to do is agree to a draft and the Democrats, for the first time in nearly 30 years would have a winning ticket - in this writer's opinion. It has been a long time since an incumbent president has been so vulnerable but it will take more than Clinton to unseat Bush.
