Col. ESC Robertson home open for tour this weekend

One of the most complete historical landmarks in Texas, the E.S.C. Robertson Plantation in Salado will be on tour April 18-19.

The 1852 plantation home of Col. E. Sterling C. Robertson has 22 rooms, two stairways and four porches, according to Mrs. Sterling C. Robertson, who lives in the house and offers it to benefit the Central Texas Area Museum.

The Robertson home is so complete because the house, grounds, slave quarters, stables and family cemetery have been used and maintained by ne family for over 130

The two-acre yard is bisected in three directions by walks, and the white columned house stands in a grove of oak trees. Lumber for the house, cypress for the exterior, cedar, pine and oak for the interior, was brought by oxcart from saw mills.

Built in Greek Revival architectural style, the home features a central

The home features five "service rooms" of native limestone: dining room, kitchen servant's dining. inside laundry and meat room.

hallway with symmetry on both sides.

At either end of the front porch are Col. Robertson's office and the Stranger's guest room. The wide double entry doors open into a high-ceilinged hall which runs the entire length of the house.

The entry-hall stairway is a fine example of Texas craftsmanship as each of the balusters were handcrafted on the site.

Visitors this weekend will be shown the 12 rooms downstairs.

The front and back parlors will also be featured. The back parlor has portraits of Gen. James Robertson (1742-1814), E.S.C. Robertson in Confederate Brigadier General's uniform and other family members. Col. Robertson was a soldier, patriot and leader in Texas, Bell County and Salado.

Much of the furniture and other furnishings are original to the house.

Some of the documents to be displayed had a direct bearing on the formulation of plans for the Republic of

Tickets for the tour are available at the door. They are \$4 per person to benefit the Central Texas Area Museum on Salado's Main St. Tour hours are 9 a.m.-Five of the rooms on tour noon and 1-4 p.m. April 18-19. Belton Historic Homes Tour features McWhirter home, beginning of 19th century Sanctificationist movement

Martha McWhirter. Her name still conjures up visions of wealthy, well-educated women abandoning their husbands and their homes and moving with their children into Martha and George McWhirter's fine new house on Pearl Street in Belton to become part of the Sanctificationist Religion.

The fine new house (1867-70) and probably Central Texas' first splitlevel house, which really housed the only successful commune in the United States, is a part of the 15th Annual Belton Historical Homes Tour April 25-26.

The home of Dr. and Mrs. Robert Kimball, the Bell County limestone house at 400 N. Pearl St. carries a bullet-hole in the north parlor door facing, shows off the original water well and six-inch-wide cypress floors as part of adaptive living for 1992.

Admission is \$6 for adults and \$3 for students age six through college. Tickets are available at all five tour sites plus tour headquarters in the Bell County Museum at N. Main St. and 1st Ave. Other tour sites are the 1866 Summers Mill, a grist mill and its accompa-

nying ranch house dating froom 1870 through 1902, the 1893 elegant Baggett-Lastovica Victorian mansion, the 1914 Watters-Kelley mail-order catalogue bungalow and the replica of an Antebellum Texas-Style Ranch House.

All tour proceeds go to the maintenance and operation of the Bell County Museum in the 1904 Belton Carnegie Library building, one of 11 Carnegie buildings left in Texas.

The Sanctificationists grew out of a dispute between Martha McWhirter the Methodist preacher on "when, how

and by what means a person was 'sanctified' in light of New Testament teaching." The group was really the first arrangement of battered wives banding together for help from each other.

The Sanctificationists never numbered less than 20 nor more than 70, never attempted to bring others into their belief, and did not have any religious creed, no Bible study and seldom attended the church they had belonged to before they joined the

They worked hard, owned and operated a hotel, a laundry, dairy, two farms, a wood yard, catering service and household maid business in Belton and hotels in Waco. They dressed well and traveled extensively over the United States, but kept aloof of Belton residents.

At first, they made fun of Martha McWhirter, Maj. George McWhirter's red-headed wife. Then they asked her to join the


Education plans abound!!


Late last week, Governor Ann Richards unveiled her education plan that will be presented to the Special Session of the Legislature set to begin sometime in May. The idea is one more in a stream of schemes to equalize spending of education dollars among the millions of public school students in Texas. Three times the State Supreme Court has shot them down.

Each time the hang-up revolved around both the method and constitutionality of taking money from property rich areas of the state and giving it to poor districts. Especially without a reference to a popular vote amending the state Constitution.

Governor Richards plan would allow the state, rather than the schools, to tax all businesses and commercial activities within a school district. These dollars would go to Austin and then be redivided among schools on some sort of an equalizing formula designed to achieve the elusive per pupil dollar equality that some feel would allow "poor" students to compete with their rich contempo-

spending. One immediate problem with the Richards plan is that it lacks sufficient approval by enough members of the legislature to pass it into law much less the necessary two-thirds to place the statute before the public in a constitutional amendment form by November. Another problem is the position members of the legislature put themselves in at reelection time by voting out a controversial tax bill that will have built-in opposition by

the anti-tax segment of the population. Most observers feel that there are too many equality "plans" already floating around Austin at this time and too many problems associated with each idea to make calling a session at this time practical. At any rateit will be most important gathering of the lawmakers in many-a-year!

Wish I Had Said That

Ross Perot was quoted by the Austin American Statesman recently in a way that was too good not to repeat. Asked about the national debt, Perot quipped: "The total national debt was \$1 trillion when President Reagen took office. It is now \$4 trillion. Maybe it was voodoo economics. Whatever it was, we are now in deep voodoo!"

The fiesty Perot may not become president but he will be more fun to watch and listen to than the major party front runners who are afraid to say anything approaching common sense and truth for fear of hurting some voting


Academy was able to put a few hits together in the fifth and sixth ining and produced single runs each inning.

Helpful hints on Easter eggs

Our modern custom of decorating and giving eggs at Easter is a symbol of the Resurrection, but history reveals that the custom originated more than 5,000 years ago with the Persians celebration of spring. Colored eggs were exchanged as tokens of goodwill. It was the Pennsylvania Dutch who brought the Easter egg to the New World in 1728 and invented the custom of egg rolling. First Lady Dolly Madison popularized the tradtion of egg rolling contests on the White House lawn in 1810.

If you will be preparing Easer eggs this week, here are some tips from Exten-

you'll find useful.

1. To prepare hardcooked eggs, use enamel, steel or glass pans. Never use irmo or aluminum. A chemical reaction between the iron and aluminum pan and the egg shells may keep the color from adhering properly to the shell.

2. If you want to empty an egg, make a small hole in one end of the shell end and a slightly larger one at the other end and then blow through the small end. Contents will be forced through the larger hole. You'll also find that the yoke can be more easily removed if eggs are at room temperature and if you briskly shake the egg before piercing the hole to break the yoke.

3. Hard-cooked eggs often do not peel easily because they are so fresh. For picture perfect eggs, use older eggs and store the eggs small-end up to help center the yoke before cooking.

4. Finally, be sure you don't overcook the eggs.

sion poultry specialists High heat and overcooking toughens the protein in the egg white or albumen. Overcooking also intensifieds the union of sulfur from the albumen with iron from the egg yoke, forming the harmless but unattractive dark iron sulfide ring.

> 5. To cook eggs use one of these methods:

> *Place eggs in room temperature water, bring to a boil and remove from the heat. Cover and let stand 18-20 minutes. Immediately run cold water over the eggs or place in ice water until they are cooled.

*Bring water to a boil and carefully add eggs which have been temperatured in warm water. Reduce heat and simmer for 18 to 20 minutes. Cool eggs promptly in cool water.

*To color and decorate eggs, follow instructions on egg coloring kits. Hard cooked and decorated Easter eggs can be stored safely for several days in the refrigerator.





Rose Mansion opens restored log cabin

One of the oldest remaining log structures in Bell County checked in its first guest at the Rose Mansion Bed & Breakfast Inn recently, after being moved from the Dice Grove crossing of Little River. The structure was restored by Tommy Dean.

This split elm, two story find originally served as a barn to the Mitchel Garrison family in the late 1840s.

"The logs have survived the ravages of time because for the last half-century, they have been covered by a larger barn," said owner George Kolb.

Dean's renovation has converted the structure into a log cabin with fire-place, add-on bathroom and porch below, plus an upstairs sleeping loft.

Although cleverly concealed, the cabin also boasts central air and heat and features early Texas furnishings.

To make reservations for a night's stay in this quiet, secluded cabin on the grounds of the Rose Mansion, call 817/947-5999. The Rose Mansion Bed and Breakfast also has rooms in the original 1870 Greek Revival home of Maj. A.J Rose, who started the Grange movement in Texas.





Healthcare costs skyrocket

"The skyrocketing cost of health care in Texas is akin to a run-away elevator that threatens to fly through the roof," reportes State Comptroller John Sharp.

"Escalating costs to business to provide health insurance for employees is so serious that many employers view it as one of the major survival tests of the 1990s.

The family picture is certainly not rosy either. An analysis by the Comptroller's Office and a national study by the Families USA Foundation both indicate that family spending on health care in Texas more than doubled during the last 10 years, and is likely to double again in the coming decade," Sharp said.

"We found that a socalled 'typical' Texas family that was insured and earning an average income in 1991 still doled out \$5,349 for health services and supplies.

family's health care bill was augmented by an employer's contributioon equaling \$3,693, to bring total spending on health care per faimly to \$9,042," Sharp said.

The latest issue of Fiscal Notes, a monthly publication of the Comptroller's Research Division, presents a "typical" Texas family that is insured, receiving two paychecks and gram for the poor and dis-

coping with pressure of day-to-day financial mat-

With two paychecks, the family earns a combined \$34,000 a year, which reflects the average family income in Texas. The family income has increased by 74 percent from 1980 to 1991, but the family health bills rose by 128 percent during the same period. In 1991 about 16 percent of the family income went to pay health care expenses, including \$1,749 in premiums to participate in a companysponsored health care plan.

"But there's more," Sharp said. "There are many other health care costs that the average family may not consider because they don't directly affect the family budget when it comes time to pay the monthly household

Fiscal Notes reports that Texans pay a variety of taxes to finance the "On top of that, the same health care system. Some payroll taxes fund the federal Medicare program for senior citizens and the disabled. Some of the proceeds from individual income taxes and other taxes paid by individuals and businesses are used to fund numerous federal health care programs.

State taxes are used to provide the state match for the federal Medicare Proabled. The state operates mental hospitals, maternal and child health programs and other public health activities.

Cities and counties statewide also rely on general revenues to fund other public services, such as health clinics and city hospitals. State city and county health departments spent an estimated \$437 million in 1990, about half of which was federal funds.

Businesses also spend an average of \$228 per family each year for other health care needs such as workers compensation, temporary disability and industrial in-plant clinics. These businesses in turn have a built-in cost related to health care on the price of products they sell to their customers.

The issue of health care will be explored in detail in an upcoming special report prepared by the Comptroller's Office on how the spiraling cost of premiums, health-related taxes and expenses is taking a toll not only on businesses but on workers' take-home pay.







"Talk is not cheap when the budget deficit climbs \$12,600 every second Congress talks about reform. What we need is fiscal sanity and financial security built into the system now."



Recent research exposes fallacies of lawn care

Sound research over the past 25 years has helped expose some of the fallacies of lawn care. To help make your lawn care efforts more productive, for the next three weeks we will discuss some of the more common fallacies:

Fallacy No. 1: Shade is not a problem for a lawn. You can overcome the effects of shade with fertilizer and water. Unfortunately shade is a problem with lawns. Sometines parts of lawns will be affected for the first time because the tree canopy has become more dense over the years.

The leaf shape and leaf arrangements of grasses are such that they need high light intensities to absorb adequate energy (radiation) to carry on photosynthesis. At low light intensities, even socalled shade-tolerant grasses such as St. Augustine and tall fescue have low levels of photosynthesis activity. As a result, the grasses produce only minimum amounts of

Other Home Areas-

Most people don't realize that fleas, during the the carbohydrates needed for growth. Reserve carbohydrates stored in stem, crowns, and rhizomes of grasses are utilized to produce leaf tissue. In grasses, root growth is secondary to leaf growth and roots suffer when energy (food) reserves are depleted.

Under continuous low light intensities reserve carbohydrates are depleted, roots deteriorate, leaf blades elongate and enlarge to absorb more light and the growth of the grass (new shoots or runners) slows significantly. Under those conditions any additional stress such as disease, drought or severe cold may kill the grass. As an example, the freeze in December, 1989 killed most of the St. Augustine grass in shaded lawns (unless it was protected from the north wind.)

Fertilizer, water or anything else you can put on the lawn will not overcome the effect of shade. Increasing light penetration

by thinning trees or removing trees is the only practice that will help the

Grasses differ in their tolerance to shade. Among the warm season grasses, St. Augustine grass is the most shade tolerant. Tall fescue, a cool season turfgrass, will persist under deciduous shade trees where St. Augustine grass dies out. Even though the shade tolerance of the two grasses are similar, tall fescue rejuvenates in late winter and early spring before the tree canopy re-

Fallacy No. 2: Grass clippings cause thatch. Many people routinely catch and remove grass clippings because they think the clippings are the cause of thatch. Grass clippings produced by mowing consist primarily of leaf blades that readily decompose if left on the lawn. Clippings from lawns that are mowed at least once a week during the growing season contribute very little to thatch. The excep-

tion might be on lawns that are excessively fertilized. The abundance of clippings on excessivley fertilized lawns can lead to thatch problems.

Thatch consists primarily of plant tissue that is high in lignin (fiber) such as stolons (stems), roots, crowns and leaf sjeaths (the lower part of a grass leaf that is not removed by mowing). Those tissues accumulate over time as a

function of growth rate. Grasses that produce abundant solon (or tiller) growth such as the hybrid bermuda grass, zoysia and bluegrass should be fertilized only moderatley to reduce thatch accumula-

Regular mowing (5-6 day intervals) and moderate fertilization reduces potential thatch problems and eliminates the need to remove grass clippings.


