## Town meeting called can Business Womens' Association at Church of for old school house

The much publicized minutes of their time to be "Town Hall" meeting to discuss the renovation of the red brick school building on Main Street is scheduled to begin at 7 p.m. April 30 at the high school cafetorium.

The meeting, sponsored by the Salado Chamber of Commerce is designed to present a complete feasiblity report on the ways and means to be pursued by the Chamber in reopening the old high school building for use by the Chamber of Commerce's visitor';s bureau and business office as well as by the Salado Public Library and other local groups who have expressed interest in having office space in the remodeled structure - provided there is sufficient public support to warrant this major community activity.

Chamber President Denver Mills noted: "It is the sincere hope of the board of Directors of the Chamber that there will be a good many citizens in atendance at the open meeting to discuss the various factors that will go into this massive renovation project. Without public support there can be no progress made on this activity that we have been working on for years."

He continued, "I hope that as many Saladoans as possible will take a few

present tomorrow evening and let us know if we have a viable project or not since we cannot discover this other than by having people come forward in a public forum and express their opinions and ideas."

The meeting will be chaired by Mills and a panel including the chamber's building project chairman Bob Cottle and board member Patsy Sanford together with Don Legge, Salado architect who drew up the feasiblity study and floor and site plans, will all be on hand to discuss the various aspects of the renovation.

It is hoped that a phased in plan will be acceptable to the community, with the first floor to receive the initial renovation. This, plus some ground work outside, will be included in Phase One. Later phases will include completion of the second floor, kitchen facilities and landscaping as well as expanded parking for cars and buses.

Copies of the recently published feasibility study that appeared in the April 22, issue of the Salado Village Voice, will be available as a handout to those attending the meeting along with other facts and figures on estimated costs for construction plus operating budget numbers.





Customers of Central Telephone Company of Texas (CENTEL) in Salado will soon be asked to choose their long-distance company. Beginning May 1, ballots containing a list of long-distance companies available in the area will be mailed to customers. From the list, customers should select the company they want to provide their long distance service.

The selection process is the first phase of equal access. Mandated by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC), equal access was designed to give all long-distance companies "equal access" to customers. In turn, customers will have more control over their long-distance service through the company of their choice.

Freezing is the perfect way to preserve the nutrients, color and fresh taste of harvest-time peaches. Why not take advantage of this season's abundant crop by visiting a nearby roadside stand, farmers' market or local supermarket? With minimal preparation, you'll be ready to freeze.

Before packing the peaches to freeze, wash them under cold water (be sure to choose well-ripened fruit and handle with care to avoid bruising). To peel, submerge the peaches for 30 seconds in boiling water, then plunge them into ice water so the skin can be removed easily. 


