Early voter turnout low in trustee election

Election day voting will be 7 a.m.-7 p.m. May 3 at the Thomas Arnold Elementary cafeteria.

Five candidates have filed for two three-year terms on the Salado school board.

They will appear in the following manner on the ballot: Mike Gunter, Mike Wiley, Jerry Adams, Carse Williams and Tom Berrier.

TAAS results released for exit-level exams

Salado ISD recently received the results of Texas Assessment of Academic Skills exit level test, given to sophomores earlier this year.

The results show that 67 percent of sophomores mastered all three portions of the test. As eighth graders, 59 percent of the class mastered all three portions of the test.

The sophomores scored highest on the writing portion, with 91 percent showing mastery, compared to 89 percent as eight-graders.

In reading, 89 percent showed mastery, compared to 68 percent mastery as eight-

In math 72 percent showed mastery, compared to 61 percent mastery as eight-graders.

Last year's sophomore class showed 96 percent mastery in writing, 90 percent mastery in reading, and 77 percent mastery in math.

"We have again done better than the state average," said Salado ISD Supt. Steven Ervin. "The teachers have worked long and hard this year."

Students in grades three through eight are taking the TAAS test this week, as well as those who failed one or more portions of the exit-level TAAS earlier this year.

Comptroller opens new office in Bell County

State Comptroller John Sharp officially opened his new taxpayer service office in Belton April 24 with a ribboncutting ceremony attended by various officials from Bell

The office is located at 2429 North Main Street, in the Grothway Square Shopping Center, which includes Little Caesar's Pizza.

The Comptroller's new office will serve Central Texas taxpayers, providing quicker, more convenient access to tax information, applications for business tax permits, and assistance in filing state tax re-

Introduced as someone who has "saved taxpayers over eight billon dollars" during his six-year tenure as state comptroller, Sharp said it makes

sense to have an office in an area that created 2,300 jobs between February 1996 and the same month this year.

He said "a heck of a lot of people from Bell County" were having to go to Austin to do business with the State Comptroller's office.

The office will also be the headquarters for Nancy Felix, the Comptroller's Local Government Assistance Representative for a 14-county regional stretching from Belton to San

The Comptroller's office once had a Belton field office, but it was closed in 1986 to cut

Agony on April 15

By now most of you have endured April 15, Tax Day. This is an appropriate time to cite a few statistics which illustrate what makes Tax Day possible:

* 136,000 — The number of employees at the IRS and elsewhere in the government responsible for administering the tax laws.

*\$13.7 billion — The amount of tax dollars spent by the IRS to enforce the tax code.

* 8 billion — The number of pages of forms and instructions sent out by the IRS every year.

Congress is trying to find ways to let Americans keep more of their hardearned income. We want to stop penalizing young couples for getting married by increasing the standard deduction for married couples filing jointly. In 1993, 40 percent of married couples in the United States paid higher taxes than their unmarried friends ... just because they are married. Our tax code is

biased against marriages and should be changed.

A lower capital gains tax rate is the key to America's ability to save, invest, create new jobs and generate cutting-edge technology. Yet our current tax code punishes men and women who save and invest. Lowering the capital gains rate would bring immediate relief to homeowners, small investors, small businesses, workers, farmers, homeowners, and the elderly. It would entice billions of dollars of tied-up capital back into the productive economy.


We want to cut estate taxes so the rewards of a lifetime of hard work and striving are no longer wiped out by a death in the family. Anyone who has had to struggle to save the family farm or family-owned business after an untimely death knows this is perhaps the cruelest tax the government imposes, exacted at a time of sorrow and distress.

I don't think most Americans object to taxes in principle; we all know some taxes must be paid to provide for a national defense, for infrastructure, for police and schools and for other services. But what bothers us is how much we pay compared to what we're getting in return that we didn't ask for — regulatory overkill, government intrusion into our private lives, the usurpation of property rights.

Long ago, the authors of the Federalist Papers warned, "It will be of little avail to the people that the laws are made by men of their own choice if the laws be so voluminous that they cannot be read, or so incoherent that they cannot be understood."

In contrast to this goal of simplicity, our current tax code is excessively expensive to comply with and nearly impossible to understand. It is time to simplify the tax code and give hard-working Americans more of their money back

Early voter turnout shows apathy in local school board election

Saladoans are three days away from the annual school board election. At this point in time there appears to be every indication of a light to moderate turnout. At press time Monday a total of less than 4 percent of the eligible voters in the district had cast absentee ballots - a normally reliable predictor of what will take place on election day.

Voters stayed away in droves from the "Meet The Candidates" forum last week. Fewer than 40 villagers attended the one pre-election opportunity they had to become acquainted with the candidates who have offered their time and effort to serve on the school board.

Just another potential sign of disinterest and apathy which is almost oxymoronic, considering that within the past six months the number of registered voters in the Salado ISD has grown from 2600 to 2906.

This 10-plus percent jump in registration highlights the rapid growth in the district's population and should also indicate a growing interest in village politics.

Unfortunately the latter does not appear to be the case at the present time.

By 7 o'clock this Saturday evening, when the two winners from a field of five candidates are announced, the total number of citizens taking time to vote will give us a more objective picture of just how interested we are in the one election held each year that is closest, in terms of distance and importance, to the residents of this community.

It would be a shame, almost a disgrace, if the total votes cast represents less than a fourth of the registered voters in the school district.

Some of our more cynical observers of village elections

have quipped that the only thing that brings out voters in large numbers in Salado is a ballot dealing with the possible assessment of tax dollars.

They use, as proof of their pessimistic opinions, the large number of voters taking part in the most recent school bond election and incorporation vote.

Both reportedly failed by high percentages thanks, in large part, to the anticipated costs successfully denounced by "penny-wise and pound-foolish" ad valorem taxpayers. At least that is what many voters noted in post election interviews.

APATHY OR WHAT?

Another area that should be of concern to Villagers, in addition to the somewhat lackadaisical attitude towards the upcoming school board election, is the general let-down in support of the one major organization that serves both as a quasi-governmental and business support group - the Salado Chamber of Commerce.

At the end of the first four months of the current chamber year, a total of only 229 members had paid their dues as compared to 340 last year. This unusual 33 percent drop not only cuts into the budgetary needs of the chamber but also points out what appears to be an apathetical feeling towards a group that is dedicated to serving both the commercial and residential citizens within the village.

The chamber serves as a coordinating agent within the community as well as a sounding board for various voices

either seeking redress or promoting new ideas for a better way of life in the village.

No other group over the years has worked harder to do as much good as the local chamber. Without these good people who make up the chamber, there would be no one to operate Pace Park; no Art Fair, no forum for those wishing to improve the community from within or without.

There would be no business committee thus leaving merchants to their own devices. Not to mention major funding for the youth programs and support of the village's main meeting place - the civic center. The list is almost endless up to and including lighting Main Street.

The local fledgling COPs program is also suffering from lack of financial support due in part to the chamber's current budget problem which in turn goes back to the lack of support that comes from a large dues paying membership.

The other part missing in the financial support of the COPs program, that serves the business and residential sections of the village, is lack of financial interest from a few businesses and nearly all of the main residential district - Mill Creek!

PROBLEM NEEDS SOLVING

All this lack of attention to the needs of the community, from non-voting in a school board election.... to diminished support of the chamber of commerce and the local Citizens on Patrol..... to an indifferent attitude on the part of newcomers willing to join the weary, always faithful veteran volunteers.... and finally to the lack of appreciation given to those who accept leadership roles in

Galveston Historical Foundation Tour of Homes set May 3-4,10-11

For almost a quarter of a century, Galveston Historical Foundation has opened the doors of some of the island's finest privately-owned, restored houses during the Galveston Historic Homes

On May 3, 4, 10 and 11, springtime visitors will enjoy guided tours of ten historic homes showcasing Galveston's 19th- and early 20th-century architecture.

"Each of the homes on tour has a unique history. Some have survived devastating fires, Galveston's 1900 hurricane, and, in many cases, years of abandonment and neglect; yet they remain vital parts of our community," said Gina Spagnola, the event's director. "We're proud co have played a role in their preservation and very pleased to share these homes with our visitors."

The 1887 Alexander A. Allen Home, 1110 Sealy, is one of the highlights of this year's tour. The turreted house sits in a lush cottage garden. Inside, the influence of English designer William Morris is evident in the romantic mix of antique and contemporary furnishings.

Among the other nine houses on tour is the Powhatan S. Wren Home, 1402 Broadway. Originally built in 1873, this colorful cottage was enlarged in 1885 and now features exceptional Victorian interiors. The 1907 Morris

Wansker Home, 1817 Sealy, features collections of Oriental and French antiques, heirloom cut-glass and handpainted china.

Each home will be open for continuous guided tours throughout all four days of the event. Tour hours are 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., Saturdays, May 3 and 10, and noon to 6 p.m., Sundays, May 4 and 11. Tickets may be used during both weekends of the Homes Tour. Each ticket provides one admission to each home on tour.

Visitors will receive an illustrated Homes Tour catalogue with a map and descriptions of each home; guests set their own pace and route. Complimentary shuttle service connects each home on tour as well as 1859 Ashton Villa, 2328 Broadway, and The Strand Visitors Center, 2016 Strand.

Advance purchase discount tickets are available for \$13 per person through Friday, May 2, only. After May 2, all tickets will be on sale for \$15 per person at each home on tour. The Strand Visitors Center and 1859 Ashton Villa.

Backyard Stewardship theme of Soil, Water Conservation Week

"Backyard Stewardship," the theme of the 1997 Soil and Water Stewardship Week observance, suggests that one of the best places to practice individual stewardship responsibility over natural resources is right in our own backyards. Organizers of the event say there is great potential good if each of us takes care of the immediate surroundings where we work or live. They note that good backyard stewardship practices extend far beyond the backyard to the neighborhood, region, continent and the world.

To encourage beneficial conservation practices in back-yards, the-Little River-San Gabriel Soil & Water Conservation District is encouraging interested individuals and organizations to join with the National Association of Conservation Districts in celebrating the annual Soil and Water Stewardship observance, April 27 - May 4.

Henry Abel, chairman of the Little River-San Gabriel SWCD, said the "Backyard Stewardship" theme will have special appeal to an estimated 78 million adult Americans who are active gardeners. He pointed out that some common gardening practices can be considered con servation practices as well. For example, backyard gardeners can terrace or contour their gardens, use drip irrigation, mulch bare soil, add trees and shrubs for windbreaks or protection from the sun, and add a small pond for the benefit of wildlife.

On the road again

Denman Cabin moves to new home on Van Bibber

The Denman Cabin took another road trip recently, being moved to its new home on Van Bibber Lane earlier this month. This is at least the fourth time the cabin has been moved in its 130-year lifetime.

The descendants of Moses Denman, who was born in 1803, have given the Moses Denman log cabin to the Salado Historical Society.

The Historical Society moved the cabin next to the Boles-Aiken cabin on Van Bibber Drive earlier this month. That cabin was restored and moved to its present location in 1990.

The Salado Historical Society will host an old fashioned ice cream social on the porches of the historic cabins 3-5 p.m. June 8. The public is invited to attend the social.

Moses Denman, a native of Georgia, married vife Elizabeth in about 1822-23 and they

had 12 children (three of whom died in infancy).

Rev. Denman, who was a Primitive Baptist minister, moved the family to Texas in 1849, settling in the frontier village of Larissa in Cherokee County. They came by wagon train, bringing many relatives. slaves and farm equipment.

In 1858, the family moved to Houston County, and continued farming. In January 1861, Elizabeth died and Rev. Denman remarried later that year to Mary Hall, the daughter of a local farmer. They had four children.

In 1868, after the Moses Denman homeplace was sold, Rev. Denman moved to Bell County, married a third time and became a prominent farmer in the Cowhouse Valley. He and wife Laura Ann McMinn, a daughter of his former overseer, Robert McMinn, had seven children.

The Moses Denman log

Rev. Denman passed away Feb. 23, 1885, at age 81, and is buried in Resthaven Cemetery in Belton. Third wife Laura, who died in 1929, at age 81, rests at his side.

In 1993, the Moses Denman log cabin was moved to Salado by his great, great grandson Robert Denman and placed on his property next to the historic Barton House. He moved it from Troy, where he had dis-

Robert's daughter, Cathy Sands, is the sixth generation, and her sons, Monty and Zachery, make it seven genera-

cabin, built in Cowhouse Valley, was moved to Belton in the 1950s when the community of Sparta was vacated to create Lake Belton. It was designated a historical monument by the Bell County Historical Survey Committee.








Sharp team studies state's largest school system

My Texas School Performance Review team spent much of last year in the Houston Independent School District (HISD), studying the operations of the state's single largest system of public schools. We came up with 228 detailed proposals to save tax-payers \$116 million over the next five years while improving a wide range of educational services.

Recently, I returned to issue a six-month report card on the district's progress thus far in implementing my recommendations, and I was pleased to find that HISD has earned a solid "B" at this early stage. Although I plan to take another look after they have had a full year to act on my plans, HISD's commitment to change mirrors closely the response that the Texas School Performance Review has received over the past six-and-a-half years in public school districts across the state.

Since 1991, my team and I have tried to show school districts how to cut administrative overhead and spend all available education dollars in the classroom, where they belong. We've offered a total of 2,200 specific recommendations in 23 different districts, large and small rural and urban, rich and poor. By taking our ideas seriously, those districts have been able to save their local taxpayers nearly \$275 millionand they're not finished yet.

They've also been able to save their teachers' jobs. In Dallas, for example, district leaders faced the very real prospect of laying off more than 300 teachers or asking voters to dig deeper into their pockets at tax time. Our 1992 performance review allowed the district to avoid both.

Through the years, we've identified ways to erase or shrink red tape and bureaucratic requirements, improve transportation and food service, and reduce ongoing maintenance costs. By settling

in for weeks, or even months, of detailed study at no c¹ to a district, we've been able to take the time to find new investment strategies, better strategic planning methods, and help increase campus security.


And we've done all this without recommending that a single classroom teacher be laid off or fired,

Our goal is to show public school districts how they might accomplish more with the same amount of money. With the help of outside management experts, we consult a wide range of administrators, principals, teachers, parents, community groups, and business leaders. We solicit suggestions from frontline district employees and students. We sponsor public forums, and we encourage everyone to call our special 1-800-BEATWASTE hotline and tell us what they think. Invariably, we find that our best ideas come from the people who live and work in the district itself.

The Texas School Performance Review team is now at work in both Corpus Christi ISD and Spring ISD. Like our previous school reviews, these are tailored to the unique needs of each community, because making the most appropriate recommendations requires us to thoroughly understand local expectations. But I believe the lessons learned in one district can often help others across the state hold the line on taxes, keep pace with the growing costs of education, and improve the quality of instruction for the children who pass through their halls.

There are 1,044 school districts in Texas, and my goal is to review two percent of their student population each year. At that rate, it would take 50 years to cover the state. That's why I encourage district officials and school leaders to study the work we've done to date. By applying what we've learned in other districts, they just may be able to save their teachers' jobs, improve their students' services - and make their local taxpayers happy, too.
