The Salado Chamber of Commerce will begin work on Phase I of the renovation of the old school house on Main St. when \$50,000 has been raised to match money dedicated by the Chamber and a \$100,000 loan to complete the work.

Old schoolhouse on Main to be renovated

The Chamber of Commerce has dedicated its efforts in the coming years to renovate the old red school house on Main St. for use as a centralized civic center.

Following an overwhelming show of support at a town meeting April 30, the Chamber will devote \$50,000 in reserve to the project. Further, the Chamber will secure a \$100,000 seven-year loan dedicated to the renovation project. The Chamber will raise another \$50,000 to begin the \$400,000 project, divided into three phases of construction.

Over \$22,000 in pledges was raised at the town meeting. Patsy Sanford will coordinate the fund-raising efforts of the Chamber.

Architect Don Legge and committee chairman Robert Cottle discussed in detail

gathered for the meeting the procedures the Chamber will take to renovate the 1920s schoolhouse. The building will be used as Chamber of Commerce offices, Tourism Information, public restrooms, public library and meeting places for Salado

The Chamber will take on a three phase renovation on a pay-as-you-go basis. In Phase I, estimated at \$202,000, the building will get a new roof, new windows, new electrical wiring, and new plumbing throughout.

Also, the first floor of the building will be completely renovated for public use. Located on the first floor will be the Chamber of Commerce office and Tourist Bureau, Salado Public Library, a gallery for Salado artists work and gathering rooms for small groups.

An estimate of the yearly operational costs for the renovated building was given at \$15,000 per year, most of which will be provided by the Chamber and Library.

The Chamber will continue to dedicate and raise funds for the second and third renovation phases of the project.

Phase II will include work on the exterior of the building: a covered porch, parking lot, landscaping estimated at

Phase III will include renovation of the upstairs for a large gathering room and several offices for civic groups, installation of a lift

Town meeting is successful

Last week's Town Hall meeting here in Salado was a total success. Attendance was high-- well over 150 villagers-- and the results were outstanding. A total commitment by everyone present in support of the renovation of the old red brick school house on Main St. Those attending complimented the Chamber of COmmerce Board of Directors for a well-prepared and presented outline of the future Civic Center. Villagers backed up their favorable vote with an inicontribution of \$22,800.00 including pledges.

It is expected that the Chamber Board next week will begin plans for an immediate start on the project following all the necessary and proper paperwork steps needed to complete a short-term loan as well as securing the balance of the \$50,000 needed in contributions for phase one of the project. The Chamber has an additional \$50,000 on-hand for Phase One of the r tion and this group's board will begin at once redrawing their current budget in

order to redirect funds towards the project. The fund-raising committee will be contacting each and every Saladoan for contributions and pleages. If all goes well, construction could begin early this summer.

Next year's Chamber budget will include the first year's principal and interest payment on the \$100,000 loan that is pending. As a result, other

pending. As a result, other items in the normal annual budget will be trimmed or completely cut. Since most of the Chamber's income each year comes from the Art Fair, it is anticipated that at least half of each year's profit will be directed to the renovation project in one way or another.

All of these decisions are being carried out by an elected board, which feels now that, with the outpouring of commitment and backing that came from the Town Meeting, there is a mandated feeling to go forward as well as knowing that the months and years of hard work to prepare the project has been well worthwhile.

Behind any venture of this sort is a lot of work and preparation. Pre-planning was the key to success and the Chamber did their job properly and well. They spent months in committee work. Additional time going over the feasibility study and then more time planning how to present it to the citizens of the community. This all came together with a resoundingly successful conclusion last week as citizen after citizen-- fully informed-got on the renovation band-wagon.

All of this gives us a lesson in how to achieve results of a positive nature when it comes to a major community project. Get the facts, every one of them, pro and con. List every cost. Bring in the total community and go over each item. Keeping nothing hidden. Properly informed, most citizens will back any well-defined program that is useful and worthwhile. The school renovation appears to be a text-book example of how to bring a major project into being.

One final word on the Town Meeting-a personal one at that! It has been some time since this writer has been in a meeting that howed so much coming together (if that is a proper description) as this one did. I was proud to be a part of Salado and from all I heard after the meeting and even into the following days, folks were pleased and proud of the new spirit of Salado and the things that are about to happen.

It is easy to bad-mouth what goes on in a town-- we

Lawncare fallacies: brownpatch & fertilizer

James M. Davis

County Extension Agent This week we will discuss lawncare fallacies which focus brownpatch and fertiliza-

tion.

Brownpatch is a disease caused by a fungal organism, Rhizoctonia solani. When night temperatures are in the 60's and day temperatures are in the 80's and when moisture is provided from rainfall, or irrigation, dew brownpatch developes on St. Augustine grass. Although nitrogen fertilizers promote growth and perhaps increase the "succulence of grass leaves, there is little evidence that they increase brownpatch. They do, however, enhance the color contrast between healthy turf and diseased turf and cause recommendation. the disease symptoms to be noticeable.

tilized in the fall is more competitive with winter weed, holds its color longer into the fall and recovers faster from brownpatch than grass not fertilized in the fall. Overall, the benefits of fall fertilization far exceed the risks of increased brownpatch prob-

Fallacy: Fertilizers high in phosphorus relative to nitrogen and potassium promote rooting in grasses. For years lawn fertilizers high in phosphorus were recommended as a "willierizer" to promote root growth and enhance winter survival. Again, research with warm sea-

son grasses (St. Augustine, bermuda, zoysia, centipede, etc.) has not generally supported that

High-phosphorus fertilizers such as 10-20-10, 12-St. Augustine grass fer- 24-12 and 16-20-0 do pro-

mote a rate of spread in newly seed, sprigged or plugged turf, but they do not enhance rooting in established turf.

Current research has focused on the role of potassium in root growth, winter survival, wear tolerance and the overall health of a turfgrass. Potassium like nitrogen, is needed in much larger amounts than phosphorus. Grass leaves contain about 2% potassium compared to 0.2-0.3 percent phosphorus. Research has generally shown that grasses high in potassium (2% or more) have greater root development, cold tolerance and stress tolerance then grasses low in potassium relative to phosphorus. fertilizers high in phosphorus are only needed during the early establishment phase of turfgrasses.



And that's -30- for this


