The Norton-Orgain house is now owned and operated as The Inn at Salado, a Bed & Breakfast Inn, by George Kolb.

Edward Buckles built the house in 1872. He is listed in George Tyler's History of Bell County as a founder of Salado in 1859. The stonework of the house was probably done by John Hendricks, who built all the stone chimneys in Salado, according to Thelma Fletcher. Buckles also owned Shady Villa (known today as the Stagecoach Inn).

Nimrod Lindsay Norton and wife Mary bought the house from Buckles for \$2,323 in 1873.

Norton, a farmer in Missouri organized one of the first companies north of the Missouri River to defend the state from federal invasion during the Civil War. He rose to the rank of Colonel in the Confederate Army.

He moved from Missouri to Texas in 1867 and later to Salado.

He was a charter member of Grange No. 1 in Salado in 1873, which along with the State Grange organization influenced the Texas Constitutional Convention of

In 1880 Norton was appointed a member of the two-man capitol building commission which considered 11 designs. An extended controversy resulted as to whether the new capitol should be built of Limestone or of Texas red granite.

The Norton-Orgain House on Main St.

Norton along with Joseph Lee and W.H. Westfall, G.C. Lacey, John Hancock and O.M. Roberts ended the limestone-granite controversy in 1882 by donating all of the red granite needed for capitol construction.

It has been stated, "To Col. Norton more than any other person, Texas is indebted for the magnificent structure that adorns Capitol Hill."

After moving to Austin, Norton died in 1903 and was buried in Oakwood Cemetery in Austin.

John H. Orgain bought the house from Norton and lived there 25 years with his wife Kate Alma.

MCCA & Lions sponsor Health Fair May 16

The first meeting of the Fund Raising committee to "Save The Red School House" was held May 3 at the Salado Library to outline the steps to be taken to raise money for the renovation. As announced at the April 30 Town Meeting, the initial goal is \$358,600 plus a supplemental amount to furnish the building and provide for operation and maintenance.

Sanford announced that an offer of a large donation from a Bell County benefactor has been withdrawn due to unspecified complications and that the fund raising responsibility will rest entirely with the Salado community.

"Following the enthusiasm expressed at the town meeting for the school project, a group of donors has already contributed over \$30,000 and new pledges are being received at the Chamber of Commerce every day," said Sanford. "We are hoping every organization and individual in the community will help with the fund raising."

An Alumni Committee is being formed to reach out to all those who attended school in the old building and several other committees are in the process of being organized. Expressions of support have been announced from some organizations and it

is hoped that others will follow.

Lottery to begin in Texas May 29

The Texas Lottery begins on May 29, 1992, with what is expected to be a day full of pomp and ceremony usually reserved for more important state functions. Thousands of merchants across Texas will begin pushing the purchase of lottery tickets with a promise of rewards beyond imagination for the lucky few and a voluntary tax contribution by the unlucky many.

Texas Comptroller John Sharp, who truly hungers for the Governor's Mansion, is in charge of the mammoth lottery project. If all goes well and millions flow into the general revenue fund - then he will have bragging rights as he presents himself, in a few years, as a candidate for the State's highest office. On the other hand - should a breath of scandal touch the lottery - Sharp will be dead in the water politically. Chances of something going wrong with a state sponsored gambling endeavor are high if experience in other lottery states is any guide. Gambling and crime and illegal payoffs and scandal are traditional running mates where games of chance are

legalized. Things may go perfectly well in Texas and Comptroller Sharp will be keeping a weather eye on the proceedings in high hopes that things do go well. There have been, to date, a few minor glitches including the problems last year surrounding the selection of a company to handle the mechanics of the lottery. And then there was the "big" story in April indicating that State Treasurer Kay Hutchison had accepted campaign contributions from a bank chosen as a depository for lottery funds. She turned on Sharp at once for his "failure" (her words) in not notifying folks what companies are on the "no-no" list insofar as being connected with the lottery and hence not a legal giver to any campaign. Little things so far but a precursor perhaps of things yet to

Another interesting thing to watch will be exactly what the state revenue will be each year from legalized gambling. Bet it does not come close to the half billion that was touted when the lottery plan was first introduced.

Good Move

Top State officials together with the Legislative Budget Board are already warning state agency heads that when lawmakers convene for the 73rd Session in January 1993, there will be a strong movement against raising taxes or conjuring up new revenue sources. In fact these folks may be looking for a "zero growth" budget for the first time in history. This would mean that many agencies would take a cut since normal population growth causes budget increases, on an almost automatic basis, for most service related agencies.

People are tired of the courts taking over legisla-

tive duties and mandating higher costs which translate into higher taxes.

Tired of politicians that have campaign promised to take the tax burden off the old homestead but once elected fail to follow thought- thus hiking the ad valorem levies on the same old non-productive land. And tired of having to work a little longer each year to pay the total tax bill presented by all levels of government.

Truth of the matter is that we can have a "hold the line" budget for the next biennium if we can convince our elected officials that we will accept nothing less. And threaten them with a real term limitation if they don't pay attention. That is a limitation at the ballot box even if we can't get a legal limit put into statutory form.

Try that idea out on your local representative and see what happens.

The Texas Association of Museums (TAM announced at its annual meeting in San Antonio recently, the listing of award winners in the Thirteenth Annual Mitchell A. Wilder Publication Design Awards Competition. The entries came from large and small museums statewide and included materials ranging from exhibition posters and catalogues, to public service announcements.


The Bell County Museum received awards for the Governor Miriam Ferguson exhibition poster, the Miriam Ferguson commemorative badge and ribbon, and the "Me for Ma" promotional button. These materials were used in conjunction with the opening of the Governor Miriam Ferguson collection at the Bell County Museum which was acquired for the museum by the former Exec. Director Carl McQueary of Salado. McQueary, who designed the award winning material, is now the Director of Museum operations for the Daughters of the Republic of Texas Museum in Austin.

"I knew that the Ferguson poster had been very popular around the state, but I never dreamed that I would win a Wilder. I could not be happier for the Bell County Museum. This is quite an honor for the people of Bell County." said McQueary. Director Carol Kehl accepted the award for the museum.



Rich Strawberry Cheesecake without the Guilt

Don't let strawberry season with its tempting shortcakes and pies steer you away from your goal to reduce fat in your diet. The following recipe for Guilt-Free Strawberry Cheesecake has the flavor of the rich cheesecake you've always loved, without the extra calories.

Gingersnaps, one of the cookies that are lowest in fat, add an unusual twist to a traditional crumb crust. With a rolling pin, crush the cookie crumbs in a gallon-size Reynolds Sure-Seal zipper bags are strong enough to withstand the pressure of crushing cookies for the cheesecake crust. 2 packages (8 oz. each) light cream cheese, softened

egg whites


1/4 cup sugar

Preheat oven to 325°F. For crust, place cookies in a gallon-size Reynolds Sure-Seal storage bag. With a rolling pin or heavy smooth object, crush cookies into fine crumbs. 
For topping, in a food processor or blender, puree 1 cup thawed, sliced strawberries. Add 1/4 cup sugar and blend. Pour mixture into small bowl; stir in remaining 1 cup sliced strawberries. Serve over cheesecake.
