## 26th Art Fair features works of artists as well as local authors

Art by native Texan in Barry Baxley will be part of the 26th Annual Art Fair Aug. 1-2 in Pace Park. The gates will open at 9 a.m. Aug. 1 and 10 a.m. Aug 2. Each evening the park will close at 5 p.m. Admission to the Fair is \$3 for adults and age 12 and under are admitted free.

Barry Baxley was born in Lubbock, Texas into the fifties era of mom/pop culture. #### SISD School Supplies Town meeting set here July 23

The Salado Historical Society will sponsor a town meeting and pot luck Supper 6 p.m. July 23 at the Salado Methodist Church.

The speaker will be James McCaine from the Commission's On-Site Wastewater Section. Mc-Caine will also answer questions about rapid development and septic tank systems in rural areas of

Some of the questions that will be addressed are these:

1) The 1990 Department of Health Construction Standards for on-site sewerage facilities is being revised; We would like to know which will affect rural Bell County?

2) At what point of local population increase (e.g., 3000 residents) are septic tanks considered an inadequate method of sewage disposal?

3) What are the state requirements (not recommendations) for construction of a ) building or a residence: b) a septic system? When must permits be procured for septic systems, electricity, plumbing? Is this different in rural and urban areas?

4) Septic systems density: will the threat of ground saturation vary in different soil types and different geologic settings with close placement of septic systems? Who determines how many are too many, and how is this determined? What is done if this situation is discovered? How can it be avoided?

5) If you were preparing to build a residence in Salado, what would your concerns about having a septic systems? How much would you be willing to spend? Would you want reassurance about your near neighbors septic systems? Would you want reassurance about possible pollutants in the 5 city water wells? What would be your concerns about Salado Creek and how to guard against its contamination?

The Salado Historical Society invites you to bring a covered dish and a question and join them in learning more about septic systems and the preservation of Salado Creek.

#### First Nations: A Current Event is Institute symposium Oct. 23-25

At the urging of the Canadian Consulate in Dallas, the Institute for the Humanities at Salado is presenting a symposium on the indigenous people of Canada. The event, titled FIRST NATIONS: A CURRENT EVENT, will take place October 23-25, 1992, at the Longhorn Room of the historic Stagecoach Inn.

FIRST NATION will feature Indians and Inuit from Canada and Greenland. Several of the speakers include John Kim Bell. the world's first Native American symphony conductor; Robert Petersen, president of the University of Greenland; Olive Dickason author of Canada's First Nations: A History of Founding People; and Bill Reid, world famous Haida sculptor: y uniditan maca de

This event will occur when the issues of the new Canadian constitution, native self-government,

and Quebec's separation will all come to a climax. It also takes place at the time when increasing attention is being paid to the Free Trade Act and the interethnic struggles in Canada and the United States.

The Institute for the Humanities received partial funding for FIRST NATIONS from the Canadian Consulate General, Dallas; the Rockwell Fund, Houston; and the Texas Committee for the Humanites, a state program of the National Endowment for the Humani-

The Institute for the Humanities is a small, non-profit, autonomous corporation for public programs in the humanities. It is a grass roots organization where world-class scholars come and talk to ordinary people. FIRST NATIONS: A CURRENT EVENT is the sixth major symposium sponsored by the Institute since its founding in 1980.
