

Mrs. Robertson passed away at her residence, the Robertson Plantation, at the age of 92.

A Bell County native, Mrs. Robertson was an active member of the Sterling C. Robertson chapter of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas, and the Betty Martin chapter of the Daughters of the

Her interest in history led her to found the Central Texas Area Museum located on Main St. Salado in 1959.

The Central Texas Area Museum is sponsor of the Annual Scottish Games and Gathering of the Clans, which marks it 37th year in November. The Museum also sponsors Christmas by Candlelight in Old Salado, and the Reader's and Writer's Roundtable, among other events.

In addition to her tireless dedication to the Museum. Mrs. Robertson was an organizer and president of the Antique Glass Club of Temple, served on the board of advisers of KNCT at Central Texas College and a member of the Temple Federation of Women's Clubs.

She was presented in 1990 with a medal from the Cultural and Historical Resources Commission of the state of

FEDERAL DEATH TAX SHOULD BE BURIED

Central Texans have a saying that you're only guaranteed two things in life — death and taxes.

Congress can't do much about

death.

But it can do something about

taxes — specifically correcting a provision in the tax code called the "death tax."

Death taxes, also known as inheritance or estate taxes, are the portion of assets Uncle Sam takes when a person dies.

Most of us never want to think about losing a loved one. We sure don't want to be worrying about tax formulas and how deep the tax bite will be.

The fact is these death taxes end the lives of many small businesses and family farms.

To satisfy the tax man, surviving family members are forced to sell-off property and assets. Money that would be better spent buying equipment or land is instead sent to Washington.

Because of the death tax, jobs are destroyed and families lose farms and businesses that loved ones built.

I believe that is wrong and it is a waste.

That is why I fought to include a family-friendly provision in the tax break bill passed by Congress. Currently only \$600,000 of an estate is exempt from the federal death tax

In the bill passed by Congress, the exemption would be increased to \$1 million by 2007.

Although that is a good start, I don't believe the exemption was put into place soon enough to help family farms and businesses.

Instead I supported accelerating the time it takes to reach a \$1.3 million exemption for familyowned businesses and farms.

Under the plan I pushed and which was accepted by Congress, the \$1.3 million level would be in force by 1998, nearly a decade sooner.

That is ten years when more family-owned farms and businesses could remain in the hands of heirs.

Keeping Central Texas families on the farm, running the ranch or managing the firm is a top priority and putting the death tax on lifesupport is one way to reach that goal.

ART FAIR FUTURE

The Thirty First Annual Salado Art Fair is now history. The number attending; profits realized; evaluation by artists and vendors and the general assessment of the overall Art Fair

as compared to previous years is yet to be determined.

Some few have grumped around saying the Fair is dwindling in popularity; volunteers harder to get each year; crowds not as large or as enthusiastic as in past years.

This is a normal post-fair reaction but what is really needed after a brief rest (and cooling off) period, is to objectively review this year's fair compared to the past several years and then if there is a need to improve - go ahead and do so - but without finger pointing or the traditional irascibility that a few of our pettypals are wont to demonstrate when given half a chance.

The Annual Art Fair is needed as the prime source of revenue for the Chamber of Commerce. Without these funds the chamber would have to forgo many civic duties that they are forced to carry out due to our not having a village government.

Whatever changes might be necessary to keep the Art Fair

NATIONAL GUARD FITS THE BILL

"A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed." — Amendment II to the U.S. Constitution ratified on December 15, 1791

he fall of the Berlin Wall in 1989 radically changed America's defense needs. This brought about a reexamination of our national spending priorities. As we try to balance the budget, we must make better use of scarce resources and seek greater value for every dollar spent. Accordingly, Congress has supported the Defense Department's efforts to reduce its size prudently and address changed security threats.

The Defense Department's force structure now is roughly 30 percent smaller than it was in the 1980s. Its budget has also declined to about 60 percent (in real terms) of its peak in 1985. We have reduced our military forces to

the lowest levels since just before the outbreak of World

One of the little-noticed implications of this changed defense landscape is the increased reliance we now put on the National Guard.

Our eight National Guard divisions are an integral part of America's defense readiness. A recent study of Texas' 49th Armored Division by the Institute for Defense Analysis concluded that it could mobilize, train and be ready for deployment in little more than 90 days.

This is the kind of essential support that makes it possible to downsize our active-duty force without compromising readiness or national security.

Dollar for dollar, the National Guard is one of the best defense investments we can make. In fighting for full funding for the National Guard in next year's defense bill, I pointed out to my Senate colleagues that the Army National Guard trains its recruits at only 20 percent of the cost of training a regular Army soldier. That's a savings no one can afford to ignore.

The administration's requested defense budget for next year would have severely cut funding for the National Guard. But in July, the Senate voted to restore critical funding for the National Guard (as well as reserve programs). Historically, with the exception of the period of the Cold War, the United States has not maintained a large, standing defense force. We have relied instead on the National Guard and reserve programs.

It would be shortsighted to gut our reserve capabilities at the same time we are dramatically downsizing the active force.

RUMOR CORRECT

The rumor that Brookshire Brothers have dropped plans to erect a gasoline kiosk just west of their store, where they planned to sell top grade fuel at cut rate prices - is true!

Our bet is that sooner or later the pumps will be installed and locals can save a trip to Belton to buy gas at a proper price, assuming the Brookshire chain really gets (and stays) competitive.

DEVILISH PLAN

For years the private employment agencies in concert with major business giants and many conservative lawmakers have schemed to change the status of the American worker from a traditional employee, loyally associated for life with a given company, to that of either a temporary worker or an independent contractor.

Reason is simple, albeit cruel and mercilessly profiteering. If a person is secured from a temporary employment agency or can be listed as an "independent contractor," the worker does not go on the "hiring" company's payroll which means there is no health insurance to pay, no retirement plan to eat away profits, no workers' compensation in case of an

accident, no unemployment insurance should the economy sour and no fooling around with arbitration rights or a forum to secure justice when the employee is maltreated.

The employer does not even have to pay his share of the social security and medicare payment to the feds.

Most companies, until recent times, have felt a loyalty to their workers and would not consider denying them a decent wage with special benefits in order to have a loyal and productive workforce. Morale and lifetime job security were high which in turn increased productivity.

Today, thanks to hostile takeovers and mergers that toady only to quick profits and downsizing, the worker is the last to be considered and the first to be dropped.

And finally, the overseas movement of business operations, like the Nike Shoe Company for example, that moved to a third world area where they can pay pennies an hour to children who produce play shoes selling for over a hundred dollars a pair.

Result? - profits in the billions and American workers out in the cold.

Now we see the final act in this obscene drama to drive the American workforce over the edge and make second class citizens out of them. In the current tax and spend package that passed congress last week, is a greatly enhanced and broadened definition of the term "independent contractor" which could disenfranchise millions of workers, deny them benefits and further increase the value of profit bloated major compa-

nies

Microsoft and Pacific Bell are two giants that have been pushing for the new terminology thus allowing them to reduce the number of traditional employees. Bill Gates just can't seem to amass enough billions to satisfy his needs reckon?

Clinton with all his faults, scars, warts and applied denigration --mostly deserved-would do well to knock this provision out of the tax bill through a line item veto.

In doing so he could at least

leave office with the knowledge that he stopped some of the harm being done to the American workforce by greedy companies that care. nothing for their workers; sneer at loyalty; plunder worker retirement funds when they merge and laugh at a tax system that allows them to "loop-hole" their fair share while the rest of us pay and pay and pay.

That's -30-




Texas' population boom


Population growth

Elementary and middle school youth have an excellent opportunity to learn about common safety hazards and how to avoid them at the Safety Day Camp scheduled for Aug. 16 in Temple. The event is being held at the Texas Early Day Tractor and Engine Association grounds on Eberhardt Road. Registration begins at 8 a.m. and general sessions on electrical safety and fire safety start promptly at 9 a.m.

Registration fees for 8- to 13-year-old participants are \$5 per person which includes lunch, snacks, a t-shirt and bag of safety items. All interested youth are urged to contact the Bell County Extension Office at 1-800-460-2355, Ext. 5305 to preregister for the safety camp by Aug. 1.

The Farm Safety Camp is sponsored by Progressive Farmer Magazine and eight national sponsors. Local sponsors include the Texas Early Day Tractor and Engine Association, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Bell, Coryell, McLennan, Falls and Milam counties and the City of Temple.

A foster child may get free or reduced-price meals regardless of your income. The reduced price is \$.40 for lunch and \$.30

TO GET FREE OR REDUCED-PRICE MEALS FOR YOUR CHILDREN, YOU MUST COMPLETE AN APPLICATION AND RETURN IT TO THE SCHOOL. WE CANNOT APPROVE AN APPLICATION THAT IS NOT COMPLETE.

HOW TO APPLY

If you now get food stamps or AFDC/TANF for the children you are applying for, the application must have the children's names, a food stamp or AFDC/TANF case number for each child, and the signature of an adult household member. If you are applying for a foster child. the application must have the child's name, the child's "personal use" income, and an adult signature. Temple College will award the students a "Certificate of Completion for Small Business Survival Skills."


The Temple Chamber of Commerce will monitor students throughout the program, offering an entrance and exit survey to assist with future adjustments to the course.

Participation in the competition is open to any Texas youth (8 or older) or adult. Items to be judged must have been completed in the past twelve months by the contestant. Check-in for judging is set for Aug. 26, 3-6 p.m. at the Bell County Expo Center.

Prize money and ribbons are presented to the top five entries in each class. A tricolor ribbon is awarded to the Best of Show in each category such as best cake, best pickled food or best oil painting. Entries will be on public display during the Central Texas Fair Aug. 28-

Some of the categories expected to attract interest include cakes, pies, cookies, candy, breads in the foods division. Food preservation entries include jellies, canned fruits and vegetables, pickled foods, tomato products and homemade wine.

The textile division features 57 different classes including needlework, crochet, knitting, weaving, quilts, pillows, tops and recycled items. Clothing entries include dresses, tai-

lored suits, sewed accessories and children's clothes.

In the Arts Division, you may enter oil or acrylic paintings, drawings, watercolor, ceramics, pottery, painted porcelain or paper art. Photography, woodwork, jewelry, wreaths and baskets, and decorated or painted fabrics are examples of the variety of items you can enter in the other arts category. Two other divisions include honey competition and the new Grandparents Brag competition.

Our office is located at 1605 North Main, Room 102 in Belton. Copies of the catalog are also available from the Bell County Expo Center.





But the non-resident tuition may have been comparable to that of a private school like Austin College, a 148-year-old institution related by covenant



to the Presbyterian Church.

AC fields several athletic teams but, as a Division III school, it does not award athletic scholarships.

The high cost of attending the school (approximately \$21,000 yearly for all costs) forces many students to come up with various ways to fund their education.

Austin College has awarded Avila a Dean's Scholarship that will furnish him \$10,000 a year for the next four years.

Dean's scholarships are awarded to students who enhance the cultural diversity of the AC campus. They are generally a first-generation college student, a student from a minority population traditionally under-represented in higher education or an international student. All recipients have a strong academic record in a college preparatory curriculum and most rank in the top 10 percent of their high school class. These scholarships are renewable annually and have a four-year value of \$24,000-\$40,000.

Avila will combine the scholarship with a \$4,000 gift he received from an anonymous donor in January. He has also received \$500 from an individual in Salado and another \$500 from the Ladies Auxiliary of the Salado Chamber of Commerce.

Two other donors have committed \$1,000 apiece for each of the next four years and another has committed \$500

Rev. Dugger said Avila is about \$2,000 shy of having his first year funded. While part of the committed money could be used to cover that gap, "We don't want to tap into future funding, if we don't have to," Rev. Dugger said.

Other individuals and groups are doing a variety of things to help out, too.

Not to be overlooked in this effort are Avila's parents, who also have three teen-agers younger than Ismael.

"They are very, very appreciative of what has been done on Ismael's behalf," Rev. Dugger said.

Avila has been in Mexico the past few weeks, competing in swim meets. He advanced from regionals to the Mexico nationals, finishing eighth in one event and 12th in another.

Rev. Dugger believes Avila may still be suffering the lingering effects of the mononucleosis he got in the spring.

Despite not being at full speed, Avila advanced to the nationals after earning seven first places at regionals, three of which qualified him for nationals.
