Salado I.S.D. trustees unveiled information for a \$6.5 million bond election called for Sept. 27 during a special meeting of the board Aug. 13.

would pay for construction of a 60,000 sq. ft. middle school between the elementary and high school buildings. It would also pay for renovation and reconstruction necessary at the elementary and high school.

The new school will include 2,080 square feet for administration, 2,425 for media center. 14,000 sq. ft. for student activities, 15,625 for academics and 11,950 for physical education.

A dining area of 6,000 sq. ft. will handle a capacity of 400 students at a time, in addition to a 1,500 sq. ft. stage and approximately 2,300 sq. ft. for food preparation and service.

The proposed middle school will have a 9,000 sq. ft. gym with a capacity for 400 people.

The academic area will include eight English classrooms, four social studies classrooms, a computer lab, science lab with storage, resource room, special classroom and gifted and talented classroom.

Tall Ranger tells Lions tales

A member of the elite Texas Rangers, with a name that Louis L'Amour would love, gave the Salado Lions Club a rare look inside the state's oldest law enforcement agency.

Clete Buckaloo, a lieutenant stationed with Company F in Waco, addressed the Lions during their Aug. 13 noon luncheon at Mill Creek Country

Buckaloo, 40, was the youngest of the approximately 100 Texas Rangers when he joined the organization 10 years ago. Ten years earlier, he was the youngest trooper in his recruit class of 120.

Because Texas law prevented anyone under 21 from buying ammunition, Buckaloo pointed out that as a 20-yearold trooper, he "could carry a pistol but couldn't buy ammunition."

Buckaloo became part of a legendary organization that began in 1823 when Stephen F. Austin, "the father of Texas," asked for 10 volunteers from among the colonists to help protect outlying settlers.

The Rangers were initially armed with just a single-shot musket and Bowie knife. But legendary Ranger Samuel Buckaloo, raised and edu- Walker went to gun maker developed a weapon, the Walker-Colt, that upgraded the Rangers' arsenal.

In 1935, the state of Texas way patrolman and eight years combined the Rangers with the Highway Patrol and formed the Department of Public Safety

> The DPS now includes traffic enforcement, criminal investigation, administration and the Rangers.

There are 105 Rangers, which includes 90 field Ranger sergeants and 15 of supervisory rank. The number of Rangers is set by the Texas Legislature, Buckaloo said.

Each of the six Ranger com-

panies has a captain, a lieutenant and 14-20 Rangers. Company A is in Houston, B is in Dallas, C is in Lubbock, D is in San Antonio, E is in Midland and F is in Waco.

Buckaloo's Waco co located next to the Texas Ranger Museum at Fort Fisher, includes one of the only two female Rangers; the other is stationed in San Antonio.


Buckaloo said the Rangers assist local law enforcement agencies that request assistance. Some agencies in rural areas simply don't have the training and resources the Rangers have.

One investigation that stands out to Buckaloo involved a wealthy rancher in Bandera County (northwest of San Antonio) who was killed by four shots from a .410 rifle

Children's Clothing Gets Caught When **Exiting School Buses**

Across the U.S., children are being injured or killed when their clothing is caught in the bus handrail, door, or other equipment, and they are dragged by the bus. Jacket or sweatshirt drawstrings, backpack straps, scarves, or other loose clothing are especially dangerous.

Your vigilance can prevent a tragedy.

atch a drawstring. Check with your supervisor to determine in recalled. Defective handrails should be corrected immediate

To assure safety, at each stop, monitor the children as they exit your bus. If you are unable to account for a child outside the bus, secure the bus & check both around & underneath the bus.

Never move the bus until you are positive all children are safely out of the Danger Zones.

After each stop, carefully scan the entire area before moving. Be alert for any warnings (from bystanders, teachers, or motorists outside the bus or student inside the bus) as you pull away from the bus stop.

Eighteen months ago Saladoans were given an opportunity to extend their local telephone calling area to include up to five nearby cities, in addition to Belton which was already considered a "local" call at that time.

The deal was that we could add five towns for a single fee of \$3.50 per month, per home phone. The Public Utilities Commission in Austin authorized a vote and Sprint (then Centel-Sprint) mailed out the ballots.

When the furor, over what the voting was all about and how much it was going to cost, crested - Saladoans, thinking the price was going to be \$3.50 for each new "local" town, voted to add Temple only.

Later we discovered our error in that we could have added all five towns to our local calling area for the same \$3.50!

Under PUC rules we can ask the commission, through a 100 name petition, to allow us to go back and add the four towns we missed the first time around. And, according to Sprint spokesperson, Linda Green, we can do it for the same \$3.50 we are already paying. No increase in cost!

We have to bear in mind that we are talking about \$3.50 for each home phone and double that for each business phone. Exactly what we are paying right now!

Since Salado is more and more tied to the west end of Bell County with many Saladoans working in Killeen, Fort Hood, Harker Heights and Nolanville, plus plenty of potential customers in those towns that like to shop in Salado, it would seem that adding them to our extended local calling area (ELC) would be appropriate while at the same time saving long distance toll





The Salado High volleyball team began its season last week under the direction of second-year coach John Black.


The Lady Eagles opened the year Aug. 19 at Milano and then played in the Bartlett Tournament Aug. 23.



TC to offer astronomy telecourse

"Universe: the Infinite Frontier," explores the wonders of the universe in a visually rich astronomy telecourse which will be available this fall through the Distance Education program at Temple College.

Temple College's Distance Education also is offering seven other telecourses and two Internet-based courses that students can take at home for college credit. Telecourses consist of 26 half-hour video tapes which can viewed at home plus a study guide that coordinates the tapes and printed materials for the student's learning. Courses via Internet may be taken on a home computer that has Internet service or at the TC computer labs.

Topics for the astronomy course span the formation and evolution of planets, stars, galaxies and the universe itself. Heat, crowded lakes make this the time of year that fishermen dread

This is the time of year that most fishermen dread. Long hot summer days are not only uncomfortable for anglers, but the fish don't seem to cooperate as well as they do in cooler weather.

In addition, increased activity from recreational boaters and water skiers only adds to the already frustrating conditions. So what should someone do if they need a good summertime trip? Try night fishing.

By changing your trip to nighttime you have eliminated both the heat and the boat traffic. Plus, this is when the fish are most active.

From my past experience, the best summertime action can be found after dark. Plan your trip around the full moon phase.

Normally three days either side of a full moon is best.

You'd think that your vision would be very limited. Not so. You'll be surprised how well you can see by the light of the

Safety is a natural concern anytime on the water and especially at night. Make sure your boat lights are working properly, life jackets are handy and worn while motoring, have a good flashlight and also some strong insect repellent. It's also a good idea to let someone know of your plans in case something should happen.

Best color lures to use are either black ones or white ones, defending upon where you are fishing. Use the lighter colored lures under lights and dark lures when fishing areas with no artificial light.

Lighted boat docks and piers are favorite spots to target. The lights attract bait, and

in turn attract gamefish. There is a line of submergible fishing lights that work great in both fresh and saltwater. Its green color seems to draw fish from far away and concentrate them in a feeding frenzy. The light is called the Fisherman's Greenlight and currently is only available directly through the manufac-



as he slept in his bed one night. The rancher's wife, who was sleeping next to him, said shots rang out after someone opened the bedroom door.

Buckaloo, who was called in to investigate, was told by officers on the scene that the case "just doesn't smell right."

The wife, who was unhurt despite sleeping next to her husband, didn't seem all that upset.

She had a reputation for being mean, and gave the impression while being interviewed that "I run the show here," Buckaloo recalled.

Investigators eventually learned that an illegal alien who had worked at the ranch had left there upset after being spoken to harshly by the woman.

"He had come back to murder her, but shot her husband instead," Buckaloo said. "He dearly loved the rancher."

Buckaloo said officials tried to entice the alien back from Mexico with a bogus letter stating that the rancher had left the alien something in his will.

That didn't work, but the Rangers got word later that the man was planning to go back to San Antonio. He was eventually captured along I-35 and is now serving a life sentence in the Texas prison system.

Buckaloo was asked by one Lion about the incident earlier this year in which members of the Republic of Texas, led by Richard McLaren, were holed up in their West Texas compound after taking hostages.

McLaren eventually surrendered after negotiating with the Rangers, who developed a rapport with McLaren and used a "sit and wait" approach, Buckaloo said.

"The Rangers used good country boy charm over a period of time and the gentleman decided to come out," he said.

The Rangers have been the inspiration for a museum, the name of a major league baseball team and a TV show,

"Walker, Texas Ranger," starring Chuck Norris.

"That program," Buckaloo told the Lions, "has brought a lot of positive publicity."

Reporter's notebook: Salado Lion Truman Head, the club's program director who introduced Buckaloo, mentioned that his great, great, great, great grandfather was a Texas Ranger.

Later on, he told me a little about the man.

James Alfred Head came to Texas in 1835 from Alabama, accompanying settlers to the Robertson colonies.

James Head, who was approaching 40 when he came here, settled near Kosse in Limestone County, east of Waco (and north of what is now Robertson County). Before his death in 1872, he become run down.

served two different terms as a Congressman for the Republic of Texas.

James' wife Elizabeth, whom he married when she was 14 (and he was 21), gave birth to 13 children before her death at age 41. James never remarried.

Before he died at age 75. James gave each of his children 200 acres of land from the grant of land (4,400 acres) he received when he arrived in Texas.

James Head was buried on his land under a large mesquite tree, as he requested.

In 1992, the cemetery in which he was buried was relocated to the nearby Ebenezer Baptist Church cemetery. "They have a beautiful cemetery," Truman said, explaining that the old cemetery had



Bike crashes deadly

Bicycle crashes are one of the most common causes of sports and recreational injuries. More than 1,000 people die annually in America from bicycle injuries with as many as 75 percent of death being caused by head trauma. Each year, brain injuries permanently disable 7,000 to 9,000 American bicyclists. The real tragedy is that head trauma doesn't have to happen.

Research shows that bike helmets may reduce risk of head injury by 85 percent. Helmets work by absorbing the distributing the impact of the crash before reaching the brain. A bicyclist must wear a helmet on every bike trip.

Here are some tips for choosing and wearing bicycle helmets:

- Look for a helmet label with ANSI, ASTM, or Snell.
 These labels note that the helmet has passed a safety standard.
- Choose a properly-sized helmet. The helmet should fit snugly and feel comfortable.

 The front straps should be vertical and in front of the ear (see manufacturing instructions)

• The helmet lip should fit about one inch above the eyebrows. This is about the width of two fingers.

 Never buy a helmet for a child to grow into - it needs to fit properly at the time of purchase.

 The helmet should be level, front to rear and side to side.

• Wearing a helmet just makes sense. Remember, wearing an approved bicycle helmet is the best prevention for brain injury. Never ride without one!
