# Rep. Edwards returns \$232K unused office funds in 1991

U.S. Representative Chet Edwards, who returned \$232,000 in unused office expense funds in 1991, has been ranked in the top 20 percent for office expense savings among members of the U.S

House of Representatives, according to a national newspaper report.

The renovation project to bring back the old red school house on Main street is expected to get a real shot-in-the-arm financially on Saturday, Oct. 17, when the fundraising arm of the mammoth rebuilding endeavor presents a unique and interesting auction that is expected to draw a large crowd, according to Patsy Sanford, chairman of the fund drive. The event is slated to begin at 6 pm. at the Salado school cafetorium.

Prior to the silent and later the not-so-silent auction will be a barbecue feast prepared by the Salado Lions Club with fixings and trimmings being supplied by volunteers from the village. Tickets are now on sale at either of the banks, the S&W store, Seasons of Salado, Sir Wigglesworth, Royal Emporium and the Stagecoach Coffee Shop. Price is \$5 for adults and \$2 for

children. Tickets may also be purchased at the door on Oct. 17.

Over 100 items will go on the auction block including some special services that will attract interest. Included in this category may be a monthly pie or cake especially prepared for the buyer which will be delivered to the highest bidder over a year's time period. Car washes, babysitting, and a variety of other special services are being sought as auctionable items.

All proceeds will go towards the work expected to begin on Nov. 30, to completely renovate the old school building on Main Street which will be turned into a village civic and cultural center housing the public library, historical society's exhibit, chamber of commerce offices, visitors center, senior center and public restrooms.

Edwards spent only 75 percent of his official expense account running his Washington, D.C. and Waco offices.

"I believe my first responsibility is to the people of the 11th Congressional District who pay my salary and expenses," Edwards said. "Part of my job is to give the taxpayers their money's worth and still serve the needs of my constituents."


USA Today reported last week that Edwards

was one of only 90 members out of 435 House members and five delegates who spent only 75 percent of their allocated expense budget in 1991. Total budgets are derived through a formula that includes funding for office expenses, payroll and franked mail.

"There have been abuses of mass mailing privileges from some congressional offices," Edwards said. "I have resisted covering Central Texas with congressional

mailers. I do try to read and personally respond to every single letter from the District and keep Central Texans informed about what Congress is doing."

"When the economy is floundering and people are tightening their belts, I believe Congress should cut its own spending," Edwards said. "This ranking is proof that the people of Central Texas can have their questions answered, their problems solved and their interests served while costs are kept down."





\*have a longer attention span than other children his/her age?

\*have a wide range of interests which he/she actively pursues?

\*prefer the companionship. of older children and adults?

\*perform better in school than his/her peers?

\*have a high degree of verbal ability and advanced vocabulary?

If the above characteristics accurately decribe your child - it is possible that your child is a high potential child. To help foster a high potential child's educaitonal talents it is important that parents employ practices at home which will enhance, develop, and direct these such medias as television.

potentials.

Give your child plenty of exposure to good books, magazines, newspapers, encyclopedias, and charts.

When planning weekend trips and family vacations consider places which would offer enriching experiences for the high potential child (museums, libraries, art galleries, educational institutions, historical places or theatres).

Encourage your child to pursue hobbies and collec-

As an independent thinker your child may have values and thoughts which do not correspond to your own. Let the child know that while you may not agree with him you respect his opinion.

Instill within your child discrimination in taste by discussing the giving examples of what is good and what is poor. The quality of

radio, cinemas, newspapers, and comics serves as avenues to refine your child's tastes.

As a risk taker the high potential child sets himself up for failure. The child must be rewarded for taking risk, whether or not they succeed in the particular task.

Work with your child in developing his social skills in relation to other children his age. Social skills are usually the high potential child's weakest skills.

Insist that your child does the best of his ability in all the work he does. Getting straight "A's" is not acceptable work if it involves only a minimum amount of effort.


Finally, remember that above all else the high potential child is a child. Don't expect him to be incredible, fantastic and interesting all of the time.

High potential is not a synonym for perfect!

rior Chapter.


Danny Hill and Trey Bethke also honored Salado by receiving their State FFA Degrees.
